ply of the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland for the ensuing Season only, Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, Rice, and Live Stock may be imported into the faid Island from any of the Territories belonging to the faid United States, by British Subjects, and in British-built Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, and which shall, within the Space of Nine Months previous to the Time of fuch Importation, have cleared out from some Port in Great Britain, or some other Port of His Majesty's Dominions in Europe, for which Purpose a Licence shall have been granted by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ircland, or any other Person or Persons who may be duly authorifed in that Kingdom respectively, in the Manner and Form hereinafter mentioned; which Licence shall continue and be in force for Nine Calendar Months from the Day of the Date upon which fuch Licence is respectively granted, and no longer; provided that no fuch Licence as aforefaid, granted after the Thirtieth Day of September next, shall be of any Force or Effect: And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, That the Master, or Person having the Charge or Command of any Ship or Veficl to whom fuch Licence shall be granted, shall, upon the Arrival of the faid Ship or Vessel at the Port, Harbour, or Place in the Island of Newfoundland, where he shall discharge such Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, Rice, and Live Stock, deliver up the faid Licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs there, having first indorsed on the Back of fuch Licence the Marks, Numbers, and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, or Rice, and the Number of Live Stock, under the Penalty of the Forfeiture in the faid Act mentioned: And the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs at Newfoundland is hereby enjoined and required to give a Certificate to the Master, or

HEREAS, in purfuance of the Fourth Article of the Articles of Union between Great Britain and Ireland, as the fame have been ratified and confirmed by Two Acts of Parliament, the one passed in the Parliament of Great Britain, and the other in the Parliament of Ireland, and both intituled, "An Act for the Union of Great Britain " and Ireland," We have thought sit to declare, by Our Royal Proclamation, issued under Our Great Seal of Great Britain, on the Fifth Day of November last, that it was expedient that the Lords and Commons of the then Parliament of Great Britain should be Members of the respective Houses of the First Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland on the Part of Great Britain: And we did, by the same Proclamation, notify Our Intention to appoint Thursday the Twenty-second Day of January inflant for the affembling of fuch First Parliament of the said United Kingdom, by Proclamation, under the Great Seal of Our faid United Kingdom: And whereas, by force and in pursuance of an Act, passed in the Parliament of Ireland, and recited in and made Part of the said

Two Acts for the Union of Great Britain and Ireland, and intituled, "An Act to regulate the Mode "by which the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and " the Commons, to serve in the Parliament of the " United Kingdom on the Part of Ireland, shall be " fummoned and returned to the faid Parliament:" And, in confequence of Our having by Our faid Proclamation, under Our Great Scal of Great Britain, of the Fifth Day of November last, declared that it was expedient that the Lords and Commons of the then Parliament of Great Britain should be the Members of the respective Houses of the Fish Parliament of the United Kingdom on the Part of Great Britain, Four Lords Spiritual, and Twenty-eight Lords Temporal, and One Hundred Commoners, have been appointed, chosen, and declared. 

hereof to be worn on board all Ships or Vessels belonging to any of Our Subjects whatsoever, and to issue this Our Royal Proclamation to notify the same to all Our loving Subjects, hereby strictly charging and commanding the Masters of all Merchant Ships and Vessels belonging to any of Our Subjects, whether employed in Our Service or otherwise, and all other Persons whom it may concern, to wear the said Ensign on board their Ships or Vessels: And to the End that none of Our Subjects may presume, on board their Ships, to wear Our Flags, Jacks, and Peudants, which, according to ancient Usage, have been appointed as a Diffinction to Our Ships, or any Flags, Jacks, or Peudants in Shape and Mixture of Colours so far resembling Ours as not to be castly distinguished therefrom, We do, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, hereby strictly charge and command all Our Subjects whatsoever, that they do not presume to wear in any of their Ships or Vessels, Our Jack, commonly called the Union Jack, nor any Pendants,

nor any fuch Colours as are usually borne by Our Ships, without particular Warrant for their fo doing from Us, or Our High Admiral of Great Britain, or the Commissioners for executing the Office of High Admiral for the Time being: And We do hereby also further command all Our leving Subjects, that without such Warrant as aforefaid, they prefame not to wear on board their Ships or Veffelo any Flags, Jacks, Pendants, or Colours, made it Imitation of, or refembling Ours, or any Kind of Pendant whatfoever, or any other Enfign than the Enfign described on the Side or Margin hereof, which shall be worn instead of the Ensign before this Time usually worn in Merchant Ships; faving that for the better Dillingtion of fuch Ships as shall have Commissions of Letters of Mart or Reprifals against the Enemy, and any other Ships or Veffels which may be employed by the principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy, the principal Officers of Our Ordnauce, the Commillioners for Victualling Our Navy, the Commissioners for Our Cultoms and Excise, and the Commissioners for Transportation for Our Service relating particularly to those Offices, Our Royal Will and Pleasure is, that all fuch Ships as have Commissions of Letters of Mart or Reprifals shall, besides the Colours or Ensign hereby appointed to be worn by Merchant Ships, wear a Red Jack with a Union Jack deferibed in a Canton at the upper Corner thereof, next the Staff; and that fuch Ships and Vessels as shall be employed for Our Service by the principal Officers and Commissioners of Our Navy, the principal Officers of Our Ordnance, the Commissioners for Victualling Our Navy, the Commissioners for Our Customs and Excife, and the Commissioners for Transportation for Our Service relating particularly to those Offices, shall wear a Red Jack with a Union Jack in a Canton at the upper Corner thereof, next the Staff as aforefaid, and in the other Part of the faid Jack faall be described the Seal used in such of the respective Offices aforefaid by which the faid Ships and Veffels shall be employed: And We do strictly charge and command that none of Our loving Subjects do pre-fume to wear any of the faid Diffinction-Jacks, unleis they shall have Commissions of Letters of Mart or Reprifals, or be employed in Our Service by any of the before-mentioned Officers: And We hereby require Our High Admiral and Commissioners for executing the Office of High Admiral, the Governors of Our Forts and Caltles, the Others of Our Cuftoms, and the Commanders or Officers of any of Our Ships, for the Time being, upon their meeting with or otherwife observing any Ships or Vessels belonging to any of Our Subjects, neglecting to wear the Enfign hereby appointed to be borne as aforefaid, or wearing any Flag, Pendant, Jack, or Enfign contrary hereunto, whether at Sea or in Port, not only to feize, or cause to be forthwith seized, such Flag, Pendant, Jack, or Enlign, worn contrary to Our Royal Will and Pleafure herein expressed, but also to return the Names of fuch Ships and Vessels neglecting to wear the Enlign hereby appointed, or wearing any Flag, Pendant, Jack, or Enlign, contrary hereunto, together with the Names of their respective Masters or Commanders unto Our High Admiral or Commissioners for executing the Office of High Admiral, or the Judge of Our High Court of Admiralty, for the Time being, to the
