AT the Court at *St. James's*, the 21st Day of *January* 1801,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-sixth Day of December, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-two, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His said Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Majesty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the said Month of February, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-three, to promise and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman fit to serve on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers appointed to raise Men on Shore, or

by the Captains or Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels in the Ports, or on the Coasts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the said Proclamations for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward hath been prolonged and extended to the Thirty-first Day of this instant January; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Reward should be continued to be paid for some Time longer, His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward be prolonged and extended from the said Thirty-first Day of this instant January to the Thirtieth Day of April One thousand eight hundred and one, inclusive: Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Copy of a Letter from Rear-Admiral Duckworth, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels at the Leeward Islands, to Mr. Nepean, dated Leviathan, Martinique, 27th October 1800.

S I R,

HAVING directed the *Gipsy*, of Ten Four-Pounders and Forty-two Men, Tender, to the *Leviathan* under the Command of Lieutenant Co-

Coryndon Boger, to carry the Charlotte Merchant Ship (in which my late Captain, Carpenter, took his Passage), to the Northward of the Islands, I am to beg you will inform the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that on the 7th Instant, in passing near Guadaloupe on the above Service, he chased and brought to Action a French Sloop of very superior Magnitude, and manned with Double his Number of select Troops of Guadaloupe. For the Particulars of this very handsome Contest I shall refer their Lordships to Lieutenant Boger's Letter; but I should not do Justice to His Majesty's Service, from the Knowledge I have of this valuable Officer's Character, and from the unanimous Voice of his Crew, if I did not say his modest Recital of his Gallantry does him as much Honor as the Action itself, and I flatter myself he will be honored with their Lordships' Protection.

*Gipsy, in St. John's Roads,
October 8, 1800.*

SIR,

I Have the Honor to acquaint you, that at Eight A. M. off the North End of Guadaloupe, I chased and came up with an Armed Sloop; on firing a Shot at her she hoisted French Colours and returned it; an Action instantly commenced; we remained at very close Quarters for an Hour and an Half, when, finding that her Musketry did us considerable Damage, I hauled a little farther off and kept up a sharp Fire of Round and Grape: At half past Ten I had the Satisfaction to see her strike; she proves to be Le Quiproquo, commanded by Tourpis, formerly a Capitaine de Frigate in the Service of the King, and was charged with Dispatches from Curacao bound to Guadaloupe; she mounts Eight Guns Six and Nine-Pounders, and had on board Ninety-eight Men, Eighty of whom were Guadaloupe Chasseurs and Cannoniers. I am sorry to add that our Loss is considerable, having had one Killed and Eleven Wounded; among the latter I include Mr. Clarke and myself. Finding it necessary to get Medical Assistance as soon as possible I put into this Port, and have got all the Wounded into an Hospital. The Loss on the Side of the Enemy was the Captain and Four killed and Eleven Wounded; both Vessels have suffered much in their Sails and Rigging, but I am happy to say His Majesty's Schooner has not suffered in her Hull. I cannot omit, Sir, mentioning the great Assistance I received from the Charlotte Merchant Ship under my Convoy, both in securing the Prisoners, and giving every Assistance to the Wounded that lay in their Power.

The Petty Officers and Men you did me the Honor to place under my Command, behaved extremely well on the Occasion.

I am sorry to add that Two Men have since died of their Wounds.

We wrote to you sometime ago desiring you to compell your Tenants to sell Corn out to the Poor at a lower price no notice as been taken of our letter but laughd at by your Tenants mentiond in the letter, you shall soon see whether or not our threats are put in execution, as well as several others, that we wrote to—The building mentiond in our first letter would by this time have been burnt to the ground but our recit for combustible was not a good one it mis'd but one we have now will not mis you may depend upon it—The time is not far off when most of the Farmers and Millers shall suffer part of them we will cut off their Ears and slit their Noses to the Bone as a mark that the country may know them and those mentiond in our letter shall hang as we have describ'd.—When we can all settle it to meet together we do not fear the Soldiers sent to keep peace three parts out of four bare from to join us when they are sure we are a body sufficient to conquer and that we are already we only wait for orders from our leaders which are some of the best Gentlemen in the Kingdom. we wrote to you by their direction and orders that you might save your life and buildings but now you have treated our warning with contempt you shall suffer with the rest, It was not for the sake of the Farmers occupying your Farms mentiond in our first letter that we wrote to you but for your sake only

the Farmers mention'd are the worst of all Farmers — We have found out as great a rogue since we wrote to you before as the other we are informed of one Batch of the Green House who has bought 200 Acres of Corn growing for 8s a strike and will not sell it till it is at 20s we are determined to have part with him before he is much older but if We cannot have our share we will burn it to the Ground that he may damn as well as we we are inform'd also of Wilson and Waldron of Bebridge Wilson of Arly and a Tonge of the Park who have thrashed 7 or 8 hundred strike and hid it in the chaff. We have distributed Notes to Wolverhampton Dudley Stourbridge He walle Brighnorth to let our Friends know of the above person that they may know where to find Corn out of all the Farmers for 15 Miles round W. Hampton we can only find 3 Good ones and those we will protect to our last drop of Blood and any Friends they shall wish. We hav in a letter drop'd let our Friends know who the are that they may be safe and we shall soon send them our pss word but if they expose it that any other may know it they will suffer with the rest.
