Orders for the Court's going into Mourning, on Thursday the 19th Instant, for her late Royal Highness Philippina Charlotte, Duchess Dowager of Brunswick, viz.

The Ladies to wear Black Silk, plain Muslin or Long Lawn, Cape or Love Hoods, Black Silk Shoes, Black glazed Gloves, and Black Paper Fans.

Undress.—Black or dark Grey unwatered Tabbies.

The Gentlemen to wear Black Cloth, without Buttons on the Sleeves or Pockets, plain Muslin or Long Lawn Cravats and Weepers, Black Swords and Buckles.

Undress.—Dark Grey Frocks.

The Court to change the Mourning, on Thursday the 16th Day of April next, viz.

The Ladies to wear Black Silk, fringed, or plain Linen, White Gloves, Necklaces, and Earrings, Black or White Shoes, Fans, and Tippets.

Undress.—White or Grey Lutestrings, Tabbies, or Damasks.

The Gentlemen to wear Black, full-trimmed, fringed, or plain Linen, Black Swords and Buckles.

Undress.—Grey Frocks.

The Court to change the Mourning further on Thursday the 23d Day of April, viz.

The Ladies to wear Black Silk or Velvet, coloured Ribbons, Fans, and Tippets; or plain White, or White and Gold, or White and Silver Stuffs, with Black Ribbons.

The Gentlemen to wear Black Coats, and Black or plain White, or White and Gold, or White and Silver. Stuff Waistcoats, full-trimmed, coloured Swords and Buckles.

And on Thursday the 30th of April the Court to go out of Mourning.

SIR,

BE pleased to acquaint my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty of the Arrival of His Majesty's Sloop Favorite, having brought in with her L'Optimiste French Schooner Privateer, of Fourteen Guns and Forty-seven Men, which she captured, after a short Chace, on the 12th Instant. I enclose, for their Lordships' Information, Captain Westbeach's Letter to me on the Subject; and am Sir, &c. &c. &c. ARCH. DICKSON.

SIR, Favorite, at Sea, March 13, 1801.

I Beg: Leave to acquaint you, that at Half-past Ten Yesterday Morning, I chased a Luggier from under Scarborough, and continued so till Ten P. M. when I lost Sight of her; I then saw a Sail to windward, to which I also gave Chace, and captured; she proves to be L'Optimiste French Schooner Privateer of Dunkirk, (sailed from thence Seven Days,) mounting Fourteen Carriage Guns, manned with Forty-seven Men, commanded by Jean Baptiste Corenwinder.

Extract of a Letter from Lord Viscount Galles, Captain of His Majesty's Ship the Hussar, to Ewan Nepean, Esq; dated Cove of Cork, the 11th Instant.

IN Latitude 34 Deg. N. Long. 25 Deg. W. I captured the French Schooner Privateer and Letter of Marque Le General Bessieres, pierced for Fourteen Guns, armed with Four, and Six Swivels, and manned with Twenty-four Men; from Bourdeaux bound to St. Domingo.
