Downing Street, May 11, 1801. DISPATCHES, of which the following are Copies, addreffed to the Right Honorable Henry Dandas, were last Night received at the Office of the Right Honorable Lord Hobart, one of His Majelty's Principal Secretaries of State, from Lieutenant-General Trigge, Commander in Chief of His Majelty's Forces in the Leeward and Windward Charibbee Iflands.

On loard His Majefty's Ship Leviathan, at Sea, IR, 22d March, 1801. SIR,

AVING already detailed in my Difpatches of H AVING already detailed in my Dispatences of the 1ft, 14th, and 15th Inftant, (Nos. 7, 8, and 9.) the various Arrangements that had been made to enable me to carry into Effect His Majefty's Commands, communicated in your Letters of the 14th and 31ft of January, I have now the Honor to acquaint you, that having been joined on the r6th at Sr. John's. Antigua, the appointed Ren-16th, at St. John's, Antigua, the appointed Ren-dezvous, by the 8th Welt India Regiment, from English Harbour, we failed the fame Evening, with the Force there collected, coufiling of a Detach-ment of the Royal Artillery, the 3d and 11th Regiments of Foot, and the 8th Weft India Regiment, but owing to the Calms and light Winds that prevailed, we made fo little Progrefs, as not to ar-rive at St. Bartholomew's, until the Morning of the 20th, although the Paffage is generally made in the Courle of a few Hours.

Rear Admiral Duckworth, conceiving it might be useful to order the Andromeda from Antigua, with a View to prevent any Veffels communicating with the Ifland of St. Bartholomew, Captain Bradby was accordingly difpatched on that Service, of which Opportunity I availed myfelf to fend Lieutenant Colonel Shipley, the commanding En-gineer, for the Purpofe of making Obfervations, and to discover where a Landing might be made with the least Risk to the Troops. The Report of Lieutenant Colonel Shipley, and Captain Brachy, was very correct, and, had Occafion required us to have acted on their Information, would no doubt have proved of very effential Confequence, in facilitating the Reduction of the Ifland.

A Difpolition was made for landing on the Morning of the 19th; but being becalmed the Whole of that Day, in Sight of the Ifland, and

thereby losing the Advantage that would have been derived from a fudden and unexpected Attack, together with the Information we had received by a Veffel lately from St. Bartholomew, that the Go-vernor was unprepared, and indeed poffeffed no Means of Defence, we determined at once to fend in a Summons, which was accordingly done on the Morning of the 20th, and I am happy to acquaint you was followed by the immediate Surrender of the Ísland.

His Majefly's Ship Leviathan, at Sea, 271h March 1801.

SIR, Have the Honor to acquaint you, that the Ifland of St. Martin furrendered to the British Forces on the 24th Instant.

It being confidered of much Confequence that the leaft Delay possible should take place after the Sur-render of St. Bartholomew, every Exertion was made to complete the Arrangements necessary to enable us to leave that Ifland, which were finally concluded on the 22d.

At the Moment when we were about to fail, the Profelyte from England, with Nine Transports under Convoy, hove in Sight, on which we immediate-



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The Ships of War and the Transports, during the Night of the 23d, drew as near to the Island of St. Martin as appeared confisient with Safety, and at Daylight the following Morning flood into Little Cole Bay.

The Troops having been divided into two Brigades, a Difpolition was made for Landing. The First Brigade, under the Command of Brigadier-General Fuller, was composed of the 1st Battalion of the Royals, the 11th Regment, and 2d Weft In-Gia Regiment, and was defined to make an Attack on Fort Chefterfield, near the Town of Marigot, fituated in the French Quarter of the Island:

The Second Brigade, commanded by Brigadier-General Maitland, confifted of Six Companies of the 3d Regiment, 'the 64th, and Four Companies of the 8th Welt India; and was intended for the Attack of Fort Amflerdam, and the Town of Philipfburgh in the Dutch Quarter, a Proportion of Field Artillery being attached to each Brigade.

The Bay fixed on for the Troops to Land in being in the Dutch Quarter, and contiguous to Fort Amflerdam, the 2d Brigade was in confequence landed first, which was effected without Oppolition. During this Operation, the Transport arrived with the part of the 64th Regiment, which had been missing, and being ordered to run close in with the Shore, the Men were landed in Time to join their Regiment.

Brigadier-General Maitland, having gained the Heights towards Fort Amfterdam, was foon oppared by detached Parties of the Enemy. The 8th, Weft India Regiment, being principally engraged on those Occasions, was always fuccessful.

gaged on those Occasions, was always successful. It appeared that almost the whole Force of the Enemy had been drawn to the Dutch Quarter, whereas it was expected that the principal Rehtance would have been made at Fort Chefterheld.

The Enemy, rather than await an Attack from our Troops, which they were led to expect, by our poffeffing the Heights at no great Diftance from the Fort and Town, determined to attack, with a considerable Part of their Force, one of the Politions. which we occupied, and brought out Two Field', Pieces with about Three Hundred Men for the Pur pofe.

The Body of our Troops, on which this Attack was made, confifted of Four Companies of the Sixty fourth Regiment, under the immediate Command of Licutenant-Colonel Pakenham, and Two Companies of the 8th Well India Regiment, who evinced, on this Occafion, the greatelt Courage and Steadinefs, repulfed and purfued the Enemy, and took Poffeffion of the Two Field Pieces.

The Lofs of the Enemy, which they themfelves flate to be much more confiderable, was certainly not lefs than between Fifty and Sixty killed and wonnded, which must appear a great Number when compared with the few Men we had wounded in this. Affair.

That the 64th, one of the finelt Regiments I ever Inv. commanded as it was, fould have behaved in a

diffinguished Manner is not furprising; but I have peculiar Satisfaction in being enabled to add, that the Sth Weft India Regiment, formed within the last Three Years, and composed almost entirely of new Negroes, who never had before feen an Enemy, engaged with a Degree of Gallantry, and behaved in a Manner that would do Honor to any Troops.

After the Attack now mentioned, the Enemy made no further Attempt, but between Four and Five o'Clock in the Afternoon a Communication was opened, and the Capitulation finally concluded by Twelve that Night. The Firft Brigade, when landed, proceeded to the

The First Brigade, when landed, proceeded to the French Quarter without Opposition, and took Poffession of Lee's Hill, which commands Fort Chefterfield, and had prepared to commence an Attack, which was ordered to be made on that Post at Daybreak on the 25th.

The Crews of some Privateers, who formed a confiderable Part of the Enemy's Force, finding the Attack on our Polition had failed, returned to their Ships and put to Sea.

The Regular Troops, to the Number of at leafl. Three Hundred and Twenty, had laid down their Arms before my Departure; and it is probable there were flill more who had not then furrendered.

The Officers of the Navy and the Seamen went through the laborious Tafk of difembarking the Troops and dragging the Guns up fleep and rugged Hills, with a Spirit and Cheerfulnefs highly honorable to themfelves and gratifying to thofe who witneffed their Zeal-and Exertions. Were I merely to fay that Rear-Admiral Duckworth gave every poffible Affiliance, I might be underflood only to mean that he did his Duty i an Expredion totally inadequate to convey what I feel, as, exclusive of all that can be comprehended under the most extensive Meaning of the Word Duty, his many Acts of Limburgs. I must be remembered by me with Gratitude, and by every Officer and Soldier ferving on this Expedition.

every Officer and Soldier ferving on this Expedition. I have also much Pleasure in bearing Testimony to the Zeal manifested by the Whole of the Troops, whose Conduct was so highly creditable, as to entitle them to my warmest Praise.

It likewife affords me particular Satisfaction to a have an Opportunity of expreffing, through this Channel, my Acknowledgments to Brigadiers General Fuller and Maitland, for the Manner in which they conducted the Services entrufted to them, and to Lieutenant-Colonel Gleoftanes, the Adjutant-General, Lieutenant-Colonel Laye, commanding the Royal Artillery, and Lieutenant-Colonel Shipley, the commanding Engineer, for the unremitting Exertions which they ufed in their refpective Situations, as well as to the Officers commanding the feveral Corps, for the Attention and Alacrity fo eminently confpicuous in the Difeharge of their Duty.

29th March, 1801. AVING completed fuch Arrangements as ap-SIR, II peared necessary for the Security of Saint Martin's, we were enabled to leave that Island on , the Afternoon of the 26th, and arrived here Yefter-

day. The Ships of War and Transports having anchored at Noon, and the Troops being immediately difpofed in the Order of Landing, the Summons was fent in without further Delay, and I have the Sadisfaction to acquaint you, that the Islands of Saint Thomas and St. John, together with their De-pendencies, were furrendered on Capitulation to His Majefty's Troops, and taken Polieffion of in the Afternoon.

I have done myfelf the Honor to enclose to you a Copy of the Articles of the Capitulation, on which thefe Islands have been put into our Possession; but have conceived it unneceffary to transmit the Summons, it being fimilar to that of Saint Bartholonew, a Copy of which accompanies this Difpatch ; and also to annex, for your Information, a Return of the Ordnance found in this Island.

SIR, Have the Honor to acquaint you that we failed from Saint Thomas's on the Evening of the 30th Ultimo, and arrived off this Ifland the following Day

Having illued Orders to the Troops preparatory to their Landing, and made the Arrangements ne-ceffary for that Purpofe, it was judged inexpedient to take any further Steps until the Summons had been fent in, which was immediately done; and I have the Honour to acquaint you that the Island of Saint Croix was furrendered to his Majefty in the courle of the Afternoom; but it being then too late in the Day to take Possefilion, it was deferred until this Morning, when the British Troops were landed, and marched into the different Forts and Towns of Chriftiaustadt and Frederickstadt.

I have the Honor to enclose for your Information a Copy of the Articles of Capitulation, and of the Governor-General's Reply to the Summons; as likewife a Return of the Ordnance found in the feveral Forts and Batteries.

Captain M'Mahon, of the 53d Regiment, my Aid-de-Camp, will have the Honor of prefenting this Difpatch, who I am perfuaded you will find fufficiently prepared to afford you fuch further Information as you may with to be in Poffellion of.

VAPTAIN EKINS, late of His Majefly's Ship Amphitrite, arrived laft Night with Difpatches

Efq; Secretary of the Admiralty, of which the following are Copies:

S1R, Leviathan, at Sea, March 27, 1801. LIAVING confulted with Lieutenant-General Trigge, on the Subject of the Orders of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, we determined not to wait for the expected Reinforcements, but collect the Troops that the General thought might be employed with Difpatch; and we failed on the 16th, with about One Thousand Five Hundred Troops, for the Purpole of attacking the various Islands specified in our Orders, the General and myfelf confidering it most judicious to commence with the weathermost one St. Bartholomew, though by Calms and very variable Winds we were prevented from getting to Grand Saline Bay (our intended Place of Landing) till the Morning of the 20th, when, having prepared every Thing for that Purpofe, and placed the Andromeda, L'Unité, and Drake Brig to cover it, the General and myfelf deemed it expedient to prevent Delay, by fending Brigadier-General Fuller, and Captain King of the Leviathan, with a Summons, which, after fome little Hefitation, was accepted, and the Capitulation I transmit, entered into. I then detached the Andromeda with the Alexandria Tender to affift in watching St. Thomas's, when every Exertion was uled to land a Garrifon, and form fuch temporary Arrangements as the Urgency of the Service would admit; all of which were effected by the Morning of the 22d. We found here Two Swedish Ships nearly laden with Produce of this Country, a Danish Ship in Ballaft, befides a Variety of finall Craft, Swedish, and Three small French Vessels; and I left Captain Thomas Harvey, in L'Unité, to co-operate with the Commandant of that Island, and at Ten o'Clock A. M. were in the Act of weighing, when Ten Sail were feen from the Malt-Head, I therefore ordered the Drake Brig and L'Eclair Schooner to reconnoitre, keeping the Wind, myfelf concluding they were our Theops from Eugland, which the General and myfelf had fent Orders to Barbadoes to follow us after landing their Sick, with Women and Children; this, from light Airs, was not afcertained till Ten o'Clock at Night, when they proved as conjectured, and the Profelyte joined in the Afternoon of the 24th. Upon this Accumulation of Force, the General and myfelf, after fome Deliberation, judged it would be highly injurious to His Majefty's Service, and render Saint Bartholomew very unfafe, if we omitted attacking the Ifland of Saint Martin: We therefore, (though it was not mentioned in our Instructions,) prompted by the Rectitude of our Intentions, decided upon endeavouring to reduce it, and at Midnight of the 22d bore away for that Purpofe ; but the unprecedented Variablenels of the Winds prevented our getting there till Daylight of the 24th; and on the After-noon of the 23d the Coromandel joined with the 2d Weft India Regiment, when, having placed Captain Fowke in the Profelyte, with the Drake Brig in Coles Bay to cover the Landing under the Direction of Captain Ekins of the Amphitrite, (who had been fick at Barbadocs, but joined me in the Profelyte, and handfomely voluntcered this Serfrom Rear-Admiral Duckworth, Commander in vice,) which commenced at Half path Eight o'Clock; Chief of His Majetty's Ships and Vessels at Bar- and with his judicious Arrangements, the Second

Brigade of near One Thousand Five Hundred Men under Brigadier General Maitland, were on Shore with their Field Pieces, and One Hundred Seamen by Eleven o'Clock, as was the First Brigade of One Thousand Eight Hundred, under Brigadier-General Fuller, by Two o'Clock, with their Field Pieces, and One Hundred Seamen; the Second Brigade directly proceeded on to take the Heights in the Approach to the Town of Philipfburgh, which was quickly effected, though not without fome fmart fkirmissing, which afterwards brought on a short Action, in which fome Companies of the 64th, under Lieut. Col. Pakenham, and Two Companies of the Eighth Well India Regiment, displayed great Gallantry; heat the Enemy, and took Two Field Pieces; at this Time Brigadier General Fuller, with the First Brigade, marched on to take the Heights above Fort Chefterfield, or Maregot, where we had Reafon to expect the greateft Refiftance; but the former Check (in which the Enemy loft from Fifty to Sixty killed and wounded) evinced that Oppodition could only lead to Destruction; and they embraced a verbal Summons (fent in by Brigadier Ge-neral Maitland, at Five o'Clock) to propofe their Terms at Nine ; when Lieutenant General Trigge and Self, being on the Spot, the Capitulation was tigned and exchanged by Midnight of the 24th, of which I traulmit a Copy for their Lordship's Information. At the Commencement of the Attack we observed in Great Bay, Two Privateer Brigs, of Twelve Guns each, and a Schooner of the fame Force, with a Merchant Ship, Brig, and Nine or Ten fmall Craft; and as I confidered them likely to attempt getting off in the Courfe of the Night, if it was found neceffary to furrender, I ordered the Hornet and Fanny armed Brig, to work up to Great Bay, to prevent fuch Attempt from fucceeding, and at Sunfet sent the Drake to aid on that Service; but, unfortunately, the Two First did not get far enough to Windward to fulfil my Intention, by which Means One of the Brigs and the Schooner got out, with a few fmall Velfels, Five of which were taken; but I am to lament the Brig and Schooner getting away, after a Chace of Twentyfour Hours, by the Hornet and Fanny. We found remaining in the Bay, One Brig Privateer of Twelve Guns, an English captured Ship, a Merchant Brig, Four fmall Schooners, and a Sloop ; the Particulars of which my Time would not allow me to collect, as I'began to embark the Troops, Ordnance, &c. &c. the next Morning, the 25th, and failed for Saint Thomas's the Afternoon of the 26th, kaving the Profelyte, Hornet, and Drake, to affift in the Arrangements necessary for the Security of the Island, and Two Transports to embark the Garrison in, which confilted of between Three and Four Hundred, besides nearly a similar Number which got away in the Brig, &c.

I have ordered the Profelyte to relieve L'Unité, keeping with her the Drake for the affilting Protection of the Two Itlands, and L'Unité to conduct the Prifoners to Martinique, arranging and getting ready to convoy the Trade home.

I cannot conclude this Account of our fuccefsful Proceedings, for their Lordships' Information, without paying that grateful Tribute which is due to Lieutenant-General Trigge for his kind Support

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anxious Endeavours to preferve that particular Harmony and Unanimity between the Army and Navy, which must always contribute to the Success of every Undertaking. I fhould not do Juffice to the Officers and Men ferving under my Command, if I was to omit affuring their Lordships they have performed the haraffing and laborious Service they have been employed in highly to my Satisfaction, and with an Alacrity characteriflic of British Seamen; and I have the Honor to be, Sir, &c. &c. &c. THE King, our Master, having viewed with the deepest Concern the unjust Combination lately entered into between the Courts of Sweden, Denmark, and Ruffia, to support the Principles of an. Armed Neutrality, contrary to the Law of Na-tions and the politive Stipulation of Treaties, His Majelty, therefore, feels himfelf called upon to adopt fuch Measures, as a Conduct fo hotilie to the just and ancient Privileges of the British Flag requires, on his Part, for the Maintenance and Prefervation of the best Rights of His People, and in Support of the most folemn Treaties, thereby violated, and to confider, though with the greatest Reluctance, those Courts as Enemies of Great Britain.

Feeling that Refiftance on your Part would only tend to increase the Calamities of War, which it is our most earnest Defire to alleviate, we have fent this Summons by Brigadier-General Fuller, of the Land Forces, and Captain King, of the Royal Navy, requiring you to furrender the Island of Saint Bartholomew, together with all Ships and Veffels,

Stores, and Public Property of every Defcription. Knowing how ardently it is the Defree of our Royal Maker to avert the Sufferings of Individuals, and it being no lefs our own Disposition and Wish to foften their Diffresses, we take this Opportunity to declare, that the private Property of the Inhabitants will be refpected, as well as whatever belongs to the Subjects of the United States of America; and in cafe of immediate Submiffion, that the Laws, Culloms, and Religious Ulages of the Island shall not be infringed.

At the Time of making this Communication, we hope not to be understood as conceiving any Thing of the Nature now alluded to, at all likely to occur. We feel fatisfied of the contrary, and have noticed it merely as a Measure of Precaution to those who might otherwife have been unwarily led into a Step, without being aware of the Confequences attendant.

Whereas War between Great Britain and Sweden being announced by the Arrival of an Armament at this Ifland, fummoning it to furrender to his Britannic Majefty, I do hereby agree to deliver it up to the Britifh on the following Conditions:

Art. I. That all His Swedish Majesty's Property, now delivered, shall, according to Inventory, be reflored, when the Colony is returned to his Majesty the King of Sweden.

Answer.—All His Swedish Majesty's Property must be delivered up to the British unconditionally. Art. II. That all the Inhabitants of this Colony,

That all the Inhabitants of this Colony, of what Nation foever, fhall be protected to their Perfons and Property, and at Liberty to leave the Island, or remain here; and, in the first Cafe, to take with them their Property, without Confiscation, or other Hindrance. Whereunder is comprehended, Goods, Merchandize, and Veffels.

Anfwer.—All Swedifh Inhabitants, and those of the United States of America, shall be protected in their Perfons and Property, and be at Liberty to leave the Island, or remain on it, while they do not act inconsistently with the Interests of the British; by Property is to be understood Goods and Merchandize on Shore.

Art. III. That all Military and Civil Officers, as well as the Garrifon, fhall, when defired, be tranfported to Sweden at the Expence of His Britannic Majefty, without being confidered Prifoners of War, and at Liberty to take their Property with them.

and at Liberty to take their Property with them. Anfwer.—The Garrifon mult be confidered as Prifoners of War; every poffible Indulgence will be granted them, and their Property refpected.

Art. IV. All Public Papers and Documents to be refpected, and allowed to be fent to Sweden.

Aniwer. - All Public Papers and Documents must be fubmitted to the Infpection of the British.

Art. V. Religion, Laws, and Cuftoms, shall remain in the fame State as they now are.

Anfwer.--Agreed to

Art. VI. The Papers and Documents belonging to the French Delegation here, to be fuffered to be fent away unmolefted.

Answer.-All Papers belonging to the Enemies of Great Britain muft be delivered up.

Art. VII. That Six Days be allowed to deliver up whatever may belong to His Swedifi Majefty, and for an Inventory to be made of the fame, during which Space of Time I defire to be guarded by my own Troops.

Anfwer. - Every Protection is infured to the Perfon of the Governor; but the Troops of His Swedifh Majelty mult be difarmed immediately after the Surrender of the Place; and His Swedifh Majefly's Property muft be delivered up to the Britifh as foon as poffible, and likewife all the Forts and flrong Poils muft be furrendered to the Britifh Troops as foon as thefe Article, are ratified by the Commander in Chief.

CAPITULATION of the Ifland of Saint Martin.

Art. I. That all Property, both French and Dutch, shall be refpected.

Anfwer.—All Public Property, Military and Naval Stores, must be delivered up; as likewife all Ships and Vessels, with their Cargoes, belonging to the Enemies of Great Britain and Ireland. The Private Property of the ancient Inhabitants, both French and Dutch, is to be respected; but we referve to ourselves the Right to determine with respect to fuch Property as has been acquired of late Years.

Art. II. The French Troops shall march out at 1 Eight o'Clock to-morrow Morning with their Arms, Drums beating, and be allowed to take their Baggage. Answer.-Granted.

Art. III. The French Delegate, the Commandant, and the Officers composing the Garrison of Saint Martin, shall be embarked with their Effects and Arms, which they are to be allowed to keep in their Poffeffion.

Anfwer.-Granted.

Art IV. The Officers of the Civil Department shall be treated as the Military, and a Veffel shall be granted to convey them to Gaudaloupe, where they fhall remain on Parole until exchanged.

Anfwer.-Granted.

Art. V. The Sick and Wounded shall be treated with Humanity, and all poffible Affiltance given to them.

Answer.—Granted.

Art. VI. All Papers of the French Delegation fhall be given up to the Delegate. Aufwer.-Granted.

Aving had the Honor of flating to you, for the Information of the Lords Commillioners of the Admiralty, the fuccelsful Proceedings of this Armament to the Twenty-feventh, I have now further to add, that we arrived off this Island at Day-light of the Twenty-eighth, having previously concerted with the General the Arrangement for landing at Black Point Bay, about Three Miles to the Weltward of the Town ; but from the Wind throwing off the Land we were not able to obtain Anchorage till Noon, when I directed Captain Bradby in the Andromeda, with the Alexandria Tender, to place themfelves as close to the Beach as the Water would admit to cover the Landing ; which Service was ably executed : I alfo ordered the Southampton, Diana, and Amphitrite, (which had been previoufly directed here to prevent Succour from being thrown in,) to anchor close off the Town, to be in Readiness to attack the Forts, if requisite. This Service performed, and the Troops all ready to land, Lieutenant General Trigge and Self were of Opinion it would promote His Majefty's Service to fummon the Ifand, which was fert by Brigadier-General Maitland, and Captain King of the Leviathan, when a Capitulation was agreed on for this Ifland, Saint Johns, and its Dependencies (with the Delay anly of the Governor being permitted to fend Of sicers to afcertain that our Force was formidable as reprefented;) and Yellerday Morning we took Poffefson of the Forts, &c. fince when I have been con-itantly employed in landing a Garrison, and forming temporary Regulations, to move for our next Object. Santa Cruz this Evening, that my Time will not admit of my giving their Lordhips an exact Detail

of War Brig of Eighteen Guns which appears a very fine Veffel, and fit for His Majefty's Service. CAPITULATION of the Island of St. Thomas.

Art. I. The Islands of Saint Thomas, Saint John, and their Dependencies, are hereby placed under the Protection of his Britannic Majelty, until, by a Conclusion of Peace, it shall be fettled whe-

ther they are to be Danith or English Property. Answer.-The Islands of Saint Thomas, Saint John, and their Dependencies, must be furrendered to the Forces of His Britannic Majesty on the Conditions which follow.

Art. II. Military Honours are to be them by the Surrender. The Officers keep and continue to carry their Swords.

Anfwer. - Agreed.

Art. III. All Inhabitants of the faid Islands are to enjoy the fullest Security for their Persons and Property and other Rights, as well as a free Exercise of Religion.

Anfwer.--All Danish Inhabitants and the Subjects of the United States of America, shall enjoy the fulleft Security for their Perfons and Properties, as well as the free Exercife of their Religion, provided they do not endeavour collusively to cover the Property of the Enemies of Great Britain and Ireland. By Property is to be underftood all Goods and Merchandize now on Shore.

Art. IV. Arms and Ammunition to be delivered by a Commission composed of Officers of both Parties; alfo the Magazines and Provisions, and what elfe may be found in the Fort to-day, according to. Returns to be drawn up.

Anfwer .- Agreed.

Art. V. All Danish Officers, the Garrison, Naval Officers and Sailors, to be conducted conveniently and fafely to their native Country, and those that might defire to proceed via America, or elfewhere, to be provided with proper Pafiports. Answer.-The Garrison mult be confidered as

Prifoners of War, and will be conveyed to Europe as fpeedily as poffible, and every Indulgence fhewn them.

Art. VI. No Military to be quartered in Houfes, but in Barracks and decent Rooms, to be affigned by the Burgher Council, and a Commiffion appointed to that Ënd.

Anfwer. - Agreed.

Att. VII. The Danish Laws and Ordinances to remain in force. All Courts and Juridical Offices to be occupied by the prefent Officers. In cafe no Appeal can take Place to the High Court of Juffice at Copenhagen, One is to be eftablished here by the English Government, to consist of Three of admit of my giving their Lordships an exact Detail the most able Candidates in Law, and Two respect-of the Vessels in Harbour, but there was One Man able Citizens, acquainted with the Danish Language.

Answer .- The Danish Laws and Ordinances will remain in force as at prefent; but the Perfons filling Civil Offices must be fubject to the Approbation of their Excellencies the Commanders in Chief. In the Event of Appeal from the Courts here, the Appeal to lay to His Britannic Majefty in Council.

Art. VIII. The King's and Public Treafures, all Public-Book-keepings and Accounts, Archives · and Protocols, remain unmolefted, under the Hands of the respective Officers, for mutual Security and Ufe.

Answer .- All Property belonging to the King or the Government must be given up to His Britannic Majefty ; and all Public Papers and Records be fubmitted to the Inspection of the British, and the Records and Papers will afterwards be allowed to remain in the proper Offices.

Art. IX. His Majesty the King of Denmark having advanced Loans to the Planters, the faid Planters continue to pay off according to the Method regulated unto His faid Majefty the King of Den-mark, (who retains the Right of Mortgage on the faid Effates,) with the Exception that the Proprietors, in Confideration of precedent unfavourable Commercial Conjunctures, and the prefent Circumflances, make no Payments this Year upon the Royal Loan which has been effected for the Benefit of the Planters.

Answer-Answered in the last Article. But with Respect to the Payments to be made upon the Loan advanced by the King of Denmark to the Planters, it is agreed to be left to the Determination of the King of Great Britain and Ireland in Council how they are to be made and applied.

Art. X. No Inhabitants shall be compelled to carry Arms, or perform Duty, when he has made his Oath of Neutrality.

Anfwer.—Agreed to; but they will be required to take an Oath of Allegiance to the British Govern ment, expressing, that they will not either openly or fecretly do any Thing hostile to the British Government.

Art. XI. The Americans shall be permitted, without Constraint, to export the Produce of the Iflands, and provide them with Neceffaries; the Inhabitants alfo to fhip to America.

Answer.-These Colonies must trade under the fame Laws as govern the British West India Islands.

Art. XII. A fecret and feparate Convention to permit the Inhabitants from the neighbouring Iflands, or from the Main, to trade hither, in order to provide the Country with fresh Provisions.

Anfwer.-The Affirmative to this Proposition must depend upon the Decision of His Majesty the King of Great Britain and Ireland.

Art. XIII. The Free Coloured People of this Island shall be protected and regarded as heretofore under the Danish Government, and they shall not be forced to do any Military Duty.

Anfwer .- The Danith Free Coloured People will be protected as heretofore, and will not be forced to do Military Duty: but they must take the Oath of Allegiance conformably to the Tenth Article.

Art. XIV. The Preliminary Article, on which this proposed Capitulation depends, is, that the Re-

port of the Officers fent on board of the Flect, afcertains the Number of British Troops to be Three Thousand Men at leaf.

Answer .- His Excellency the Danish Governor is not expected to fign the Capitulation, until the return of the Officers he has fent to fee the British Troops.

Art. XV. In the general Claim of Danish and Neutral Property to be refpected as belonging to the lawful Owners, is also comprehended the Vefiels and all Property afloat in this Harbour, or what might arrive during the Time the Danish Colonies may remain in Poffeffion of His Britannic Majelly.

Answered by the Reply to the Taird Proposition.

ADDITIONAL.

All the Forts, Military Pofts, and Veffels of War, must be given up as foon as this Capitulation is ratified by the Commander in Chief.

ARTICLES of CAPITULATION pr:posed by Governor General Lindeman to their Excellencies Lieutenant-General Thomas Trigge, and Rear-Admiral John Thomas Duckworth, Commanders in Chief of His Britannic Majefly's Forces. Art. I. The Garrison shall evacuate the Forts,

and all the Troops of the Island give up their re-fpective Quarters. They shall march out of the faid Forts with their Arms and Baggage, and all the Honors of War, with Two Field-Pieces, Colours flying; Drums beating; but previous to the Evacuation they will difcharge all their Guns, and the Officers will keep their Side-Arms. Anfwer.-Granted."

Art. II. Proper Ships will be provided at the Expence of His Britannic Majefty to convey directly to Copenhagen all His Danish Majelty's Officers of the Army, Navy, and of the Civil Establishment, with their Domestics and Baggage, and also to con-vey the Garrison and Seamen; but should any of those Officers will to go to America in their Way Home, they will be provided with Paffports to that :Effect.

Anfwer.-The Garrilon and Seamen must be confidered as Prifoners of War, and will be conveyed to Europe as fpeedily as pollible; but fuch Officers as may defire it will be allowed Paffports to go by the Way of America, on their Parole of Honor not to ferve until regularly exchanged ; and muft depart from the Island in the Course of Two Months from the figning of this Capitulation.

Art. III. Such of His Majefly's Officers who fould with to remain on the Ifland are to be at Liberty fo to do.

Answer .- The Officers of the Army and Navy cannot be permitted to remain on the Island.

Art. IV. All Churches and religious Congregations in the Mand shall be supported in their respective Rites and Privileges.

Aufweri-Granted.

Art. V. The Danish Laws, and the Special Or. dinances of this Country, fhall remain in full and un-controled Vigour and Execution as hitherto, and Justice be administered by the Perfons now in Of-fice : the Appeals from the Upper Court to go as enfual in the last Instance to the High Court of Justice in Copenhagen, or to a High Court to be nominated by the British Governor, to confift of Three able Danish Lawyers, and two respectable Inhabitants who understand the Danish Language, and to · be prefided by the British Governor.

Anfwer .- The Danish Laws and Ordinances will remain in force as at prefent, but the Perfous filling Civil Offices must be subject to our Approbation; and in the Event of Appeal from the Courts here, the Appeal must be made to His Britannie Majesty in Council.

Art. VI. All the Inhabitants of this Island prefent and abfent of every Denomination, to remain in full and uncontrouled Poffeffion of their Property of every Defcription ; and they fhall meet with no Impediment in the Administration thereof.

'Anfwer .- The Property of all Inhabitants will be refpected, except the French, Spanish, and Dutch, who have become Refidents fince the 1ft of January 1794

Art. VII. Absent Officers in His Danish Majefty's Service, as well as other Abfentees, to be maintained in the Poffeffion of their Property, which shall be administered by their Attorneys.

Anfwer.-The Officers in His Danish Majelly's Service, and other Ablentees, except French, Spa-nish and Dutch, as specified in the aforegoing Article, provided they are not ferving those Governments, shall continue possessed of their landed Property, which shall be administered by their Attor-neys. But if any Perfon, refident in Deumark, shall have Warehoufes or other Depôts of Goods in the Island, they must be sequestered until His Britannic Majesty's Pleafure shall be known respecting them.

Art. VIII. No Inhabitant shall be compelled, on any Pretext-whatfoever, to bear Arms against H's Danish Majesty, or any other Power, or perform any Military Duty of any Denomination. Those who may with to remain on the Ifland fhall fwear to ob. ferve a strict Neutrality, and those who may will to quit the Island shall be allowed to dispose of their Property, or to appoint Attorneys for the Administration of the fame.

Anfwer.-Granted; but they will be required to take an Oath of Allegiance to the British Government, exprefling that they will not, either openly or fecretly, do any Thing hoftile to the Bri-tish Government: No Frenchman, Dutchman, or Spaniard, who has become a Refident fince the 1st January 1794, can be permitted to remain on the Ifland.

Art. IX. The Free People of Colour shall continue to enjoy the'r Freedom and Property, and in every-respect to be confidered on the same Footing as the other Inhabitants, as flipulated in the Eighth Article.

Answer.-Granted; on the Terms specified in the Anfwer to the Eighth Article.

Art. X. No Officers nor Soldiers to be 'billeted on the Inhabitants; every Affistance shall be given to procure proper Quarters.

Anfwer.-Granted; provided proper Quarters are procured.

Art. XI. The Inhabitants concerned in His Majeftv's Loan shall not be compelled to make any Payments on Account of the fame, as long as the Colony continues fubjected to His Britannic Maielby.

Aufwer .- The Inhabitants concerned in Ins Danish Majesty's Loan must make their Payments to His Britannic Majefty as they become due, whill the Colony remains under the British Govern-

Art. XH. All Public Books, Registers, Archives of Government, the Burgher Council, and all other Public Offices, shall, as well as Private Property, be neld faceed and unmolefied in the re-fpective Offices, under the Care of the prelease Officers.

Aufwer .- All Public Books and Records, of whatever Denomination, mult be fubmitted to our Examination, but will afterwards be allowed to remain in the proper Offices.



Art. XIII. The Ports of the Colony shall be] opened to all American Veffels, who fhall be per-nitted to import Provisions and Supplies, and to · export Produce; the Inhabitants shall enjoy the fame Liberty of Importation and Exportation in their own Veffels.

Aniwer .- The fame Indulgencies will be granted to all American Veffels, as in the Iflands under His Britannic Majelly's Government. The Inhabitants staking the Oath of Allegiance, will enjoy the fame Privileges with respect to Trade, as in the British &Colonics.
