The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleafed, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-fixth Day of December, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-two, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every fuch Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Twenty-eighth Day of February then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raifing Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His said Proclamation, to declare, that all Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as aforefaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Majesty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously

Sixteenth Day of the faid Month of February, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-three, to promise and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman fit to ferre on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majelly's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majefly's Sea Oshicers appointed to raise Men on Shore, or by the Captains or Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels in the Ports, or on the Coasts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the faid Proclamations for Payment of the faid Bounties and Reward was prolonged and extended to the Thirty-first Day of January, and afterwards to the Thirtieth Day of April now respectively last past; and it having been judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Reward should further be continued to be paid, the same have been since accordingly paid from the said Thirtieth Day of April last, and ftill continue to be paid: And whereas it is expedient that the Payment of the same Bounties and Reward, fince the Thirtieth Day of April now last past, should be consirmed and approved, and that such Payment should be still further continued for fome Time longer, His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Payment of the faid Bounties and Reward, made fince the Thirtieth Day of April last, be confirmed and approved, and that the like Payment be further made and continued from the Date hereof to the Thirtyfirst Day of October One thousand eight hundred and one, inclusive: Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accord-

THEREAS His Majesty, by His Order in Council of the Thirty-first of December last, was pleafed to order that the Prohibition contained in His Majetty's Order in Council of the Tenth of the same Month upon the Exportation, or the loading or laying on board any Ship or Veffel, with the Intent to export from any Port or Place in this Kingdom the several Articles of Provision or Victual specified in the said Order, should be extended to the Articles of White and Red Herrings: And whereas it has been represented to His Majesty, that it may now be proper that the Exportation of Herrings should be permitted, His Majesty is thereupon pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to revoke and discharge the said Order of the Thirty-first of December last, prohibiting the Exportation of White and Red Herrings; and the faid Order is hereby revoked and discharged: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary W. The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twenty-ninth Day of October last, prohibiting the Exportation out of this Kingdom of any Sort of Rock Salt, has expired: And whereas it is judged expedient that the faid Prohibition should be renewed, and continue for fome Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever do at any Time, during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the Date of this His Majesty's Order, export, or attempt to export, transport, carry, or convey, or load or lay on board of any Ship, Veffel, or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried, or conveyed out of any Port or Place in Great Britain, any Sort of Rock Salt whatfoever, without Leave and Permiffion being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act, passed in the Thirtyfixth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act for indemnifying all Persons " who have been concerned in adviting or carrying " into Execution an Order of His Majesty in " Council respecting the Exportation of Rock Salt, " for preventing Suits in confequence of the same, " for authorifing His Majesty to prohibit the Ex-44 portation or carrying Coastwife of Rock Salt,

" to:" His Majesty, nevertheless, by the Advice aforesaid, hath thought fit to order, that nothing herein contained shall prevent Rock Salt being carried Coastwife, under the usual Rules, Regulations, and Restrictions, nor the Exportation of the same to Ireland, or to any other of His Majesty's Dominions, under the usual Conditions and Regulations, and upon Security being given by the Exporter, and Two other Persons, (of whom the Master of the Vessel shall be one,) by Bond, in such Penalty as shall be directed by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, that the faid Rock Salt shall be exported to some Port or Place in His Majesty's Dominions, and none other; and that a Certificate shall be produced, within Six Months from the Date of the Bond, if fuch Rock Salt shall be entered out for any Part of His Majesty's Dominions in Europe; and within Twelve Months, if for any Part of His Majesty's Dominions in America or the West Indies; and within Eighteen Months, if for any of the British Settlements or Factories in Asia or Africa, under the Hand of the Principal Officer of the Customs at the Port or Place where such Rock Salt shall be so landed; and if there shall be no Officer of the Customs, then under the Hand of the Chief Magistrate of the Place, testifying that the faid Rock Salt has been duly landed at the Port or Place for which the same was entered out .-- And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twenty-ninth Day of October last, prohibiting the Transporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom any Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes, (except as in the said Order is mentioned,) has expired: And whereas it is judged expedient that the faid Prohibition should be renewed and continued for some Time longer: His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, That no Person or Persons whosoever do, at any Time during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the Date of this His Majesty's Order, export, or attempt to export, transport, carry, or convey, or lade or lay on board of any Ship, Veffel, or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried, or conveyed out of this Kingdom, any Pot-Ash or Pearl-Ash, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty, or

His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act, passed in the Thirtyfourth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled "An " Act for indemnifying all Persons who have been 66 concerned in advising or carrying into Execu-66 tion an Order of the Lords Commissioners of His " Majesty's Treasury respecting the Exportation " of Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes; for preventing Suits in confequence of the same; for authoriting His " Majesty to prohibit the Exportation or carrying " Coastwife of Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes, and for " making further Provision relative thereto:" But it is, nevertheless, His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be confirued to extend, to prevent the Exportation of the faid Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies: Provided that, upon the Exportation of the faid Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of the said Articles do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which they shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and fufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satiffaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the faid Articles to the Places for, which they are so entered Outwards, and none other; and fuch Bond shall not be cancelled, or delivered up, until Proof be made to the Satisfaction of the faid Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the faid Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in fuch Form and Manner as shall be directed by the faid Commissioners, shewing that the said Articles have all been duly landed at the Places for which they were entered Outwards .- And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treafury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may re-W. thorifed by virtue of His Majesty's Commission for de-claring His Royal Assent to several Assenged upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of the Honorable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commiffion read; and the Commons being come thither, the faid Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the faid Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act for allowing, until the Twentieth Day of August One thousand eight hundred and one, the Importation into Ireland of British and Foreign Hops at a like Duty as is payable in Great Britain for the same.

An Act for enabling the Lord Lieutenant, or other Chief Governor or Governors of Ireland, to prohibit for a limited Time. To as fuch Prohibition shall not endure beyond the Expiration of Six Weeks from the Commencement of the next Serfion of Parliament, the Exportation from Ireland of Corn or Potatoes, and of all Provinious what-foever; and to permit, for fuch limited Time, the Importation into Ireland of Corn and Fifth, and all Provisions whatsoever, without Payment of Duty; and for indemnifying fuch Perfons as have acted for the Service of the Public in adviling or carrying into Execution certain Proclamations of the Lord Lieutenant and Council of Ireland.

Nolosed is a Letter which I have received from Lieutenant Lake, commanding His Majesty of the Reign of His present Majesty, for repairing | Hired Brig Lady Ann, giving an Account of his



having captured the Victoire French Cutter Privateer after a Chace and running Fight of Seventeen Hours. The Lady Ann, after landing Fifty-five Prifoners at Bridlington, arrived here this Day with her Prize and Twenty Prifoners.
