pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of the said Month of February, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-three, to promise and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman fit to serve on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next, by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers appointed to raise Men on Shore, or by the Captains or Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels in the Ports, or on the Coasts of this Kingdom: And whereas the Time limited by the said Proclamations for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward was prolonged and extended to the Thirty-first Day of January, and afterwards to the Thirtieth Day of April now respectively last past; and it having been judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Reward should further be continued to be paid, the same have been since accordingly paid from the said Thirtieth Day of April last, and still continue to be paid: And whereas it is expedient that the Payment of the same Bounties and Reward, since the Thirtieth Day of April now last past, should be confirmed and approved, and that such Payment should be still further continued for some Time longer, His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Payment of the said Bounties and Reward, made since the Thirtieth Day of April last, be confirmed and approved, and that the like Payment be further made and continued from the Date hereof to the Thirty-first Day of October One thousand eight hundred and one, inclusive: Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twenty-ninth Day of October last, prohibiting the Exportation out of this Kingdom of any Sort of Rock Salt, has expired: And whereas it is judged expedient that the said Prohibition should be renewed, and continue for some Time longer; His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever do at any Time, during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the Date of this His Majesty's Order, export, or attempt to export, transport, carry, or convey, or load or lay on board of any Ship, Vessel, or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried, or conveyed out of any Port or Place in Great Britain, any Sort of Rock Salt whatsoever, without Leave and Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act, passed in the Thirty-sixth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act for indemnifying all Persons who have been concerned in advising or carrying into Execution an Order of His Majesty in Council respecting the Exportation of Rock Salt, for preventing Suits in consequence of the same, for authorising His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation or carrying Coastwise of Rock Salt,

and for making further Provisions relative thereto:" His Majesty, nevertheless, by the Advice aforesaid, hath thought fit to order, that nothing herein contained shall prevent Rock Salt being carried Coastwise, under the usual Rules, Regulations, and Restrictions, nor the Exportation of the same to Ireland, or to any other of His Majesty's Dominions, under the usual Conditions and Regulations, and upon Security being given by the Exporter, and Two other Persons, (of whom the Master of the Vessel shall be one,) by Bond, in such Penalty as shall be directed by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, that the said Rock Salt shall be exported to some Port or Place in His Majesty's Dominions, and none other; and that a Certificate shall be produced, within Six Months from the Date of the Bond, if such Rock Salt shall be entered out for any Part of His Majesty's Dominions in Europe; and within Twelve Months, if for any Part of His Majesty's Dominions in America or the West Indies; and within Eighteen Months, if for any of the British Settlements or Factories in Asia or Africa, under the Hand of the Principal Officer of the Customs at the Port or Place where such Rock Salt shall be so landed; and if there shall be no Officer of the Customs, then under the Hand of the Chief Magistrate of the Place, testifying that the said Rock Salt has been duly landed at the Port or Place for which the same was entered out.—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act, passed in the Thirty-fourth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act for indemnifying all Persons who have been concerned in advising or carrying into Execution an Order of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury respecting the Exportation of Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes; for preventing Suits in consequence of the same; for authorising His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation or carrying Coastwise of Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes, and for making further Provision relative thereto:" But it is, nevertheless, His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to prevent the Exportation of the said Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies: Provided that, upon the Exportation of the said Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of the said Articles do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which they shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Articles to the Places for which they are so entered Outwards, and none other; and such Bond shall not be cancelled, or delivered up, until Proof be made to the Satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the said Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said Articles have all been duly landed at the Places for which they were entered Outwards.—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

thorised by virtue of His Majesty's Commission for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of the Honorable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act for allowing, until the Twentieth Day of August One thousand eight hundred and one, the Importation into Ireland of British and Foreign Hops at a like Duty as is payable in Great Britain for the same.

An Act for enabling the Lord Lieutenant, or other Chief Governor or Governors of Ireland, to prohibit for a limited Time, so as such Prohibition shall not endure beyond the Expiration of Six Weeks from the Commencement of the next Session of Parliament, the Exportation from Ireland of Corn or Potatoes, and of all Provisions whatsoever; and to permit, for such limited Time, the Importation into Ireland of Corn and Fish, and all Provisions whatsoever, without Payment of Duty; and for indemnifying such Persons as have acted for the Service of the Public in advising or carrying into Execution certain Proclamations of the Lord Lieutenant and Council of Ireland.

An Act for defraying the Charge of the Pay and Cloathing of the Militia in England for the Year One thousand eight hundred and one.

An Act to permit Persons in Holy Orders to keep One Horse only for the Purpose of Riding, without being subject to the Duty granted by an Act of the Thirty-eighth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, under certain Limitations.

An Act to exempt Elephant Oil, sold by Auction in Great Britain, from the Duty imposed on such Sales.

An Act for the more effectually preventing the Forgery of Bank Notes, Bank Bills of Exchange, and Bank Post Bills.

An Act for enabling the Company of Proprietors of the Kennet and Avon Canal Navigation to complete the same, and for amending the several Acts passed for making the said Canal.

An Act for enabling Charlotta Bethell, Widow, to make and maintain a Navigable Canal from the River Hull, at a Point, in the Parish of Leven, near the Boundary between Eske and Leven Carrs, in the East Riding of the County of York, to Leven-

SIR,

Enclosed is a Letter which I have received from Lieutenant Lake, commanding His Majesty's Hired Brig Lady Ann, giving an Account of his



having captured the *Victoire* French Cutter Privateer after a Chace and running Fight of Seventeen Hours. The *Lady Ann*, after landing Fifty-five Prisoners at Bridlington, arrived here this Day with her Prize and Twenty Prisoners.

I Have the Honor to acquaint you, that I this Morning, at Eight A. W., I think it my Duty to make for the first Port to land the Prisoners, who are far too numerous for our Ship's Company after manning the Prize; I trust and hope my Conduct will meet your Approbation.
