June, export, or attempt to export, transport, carry, or convey, or lade, or lay on board of any Ship, Vessel, or Boat, in order to be exported, transported, carried, or conveyed out of this Kingdom, any of the Wood called Lignum Vitæ, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act passed in the Thirty-fourth Year of His Majelty's Reign, intituled "An Act for indemnifying all Persons who have " been concerned in advising or carrying into Exe-" cution an Order of the Lords Commissioners of " His Majelly's Treasury respecting the Exportation " of Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes; for preventing Suits " in consequence of the same; for authorizing His " Majesty to prohibit the Exportation or carrying " Coaltwife of Pot-Ashes or Pearl-Ashes, and for 44 making further Provisious relative thereto:" But it is, nevertheless, His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be con-Arued to extend, to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on board any of the faid Wood called Lignum Vitæ, which may be necessary for the Use of the said Ship or Vessel during the Course of her intended Voyage; nor to present the Exportation of the faid Wood called Lignum Vitæ to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernfey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies Provided that, upon the Exportation of the faid Wood called Lignum Vitæ to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of the faid Wood called Lignum Vitæ do first make Oath of the true Dellination of the same to the Places for which it shall be entered Outwards, before the Entry of the fame shall be made, and do give full and fufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commillioners of His Ma-Jelly's Cultoms, to carry the faid Wood called Lignum Vitæ to the Places for which it is so entered Outwards, and none other; and fuch Bond shall not be cancelled, or delivered up, until Proof be made to the Satisfaction of the faid Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the faid Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a *Certificate or Certificates, in fuch Form and Manner as shall be directed by the faid Commissioners, shewing that the faid Wood called Lignum Vitæ has been duly landed at the Places for which it was

entered Outwards: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.
