HIS Majesty, in Council, was this Day pleased to declare His Grace William Henry Cavendish Duke of Portland Lord President of His Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council, and His Grace took his Place at the Board accordingly.

His Majesty having been pleased to appoint the Right Honorable Thomas Lord Pelham to be one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, his Lordship was, this Day, by His Majesty's Command, sworn One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State accordingly.

It is this Day ordered by His Majesty in Council, that the Parliament which stands prorogued to Thursday the Sixth Day of August next be further prorogued to Tuesday the Fifteenth Day of September next.

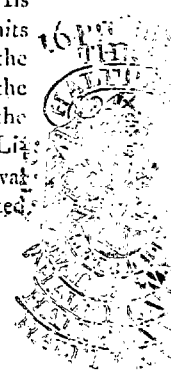

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council, of the Eleventh of February last, prohibiting the exporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom, of any Sheet Copper, or Copper in Boltstaves, Bars, Sheets, Rings, and Nails, or of Copper in such a State as may be easily converted into, or made useful as a Naval Store, will expire upon the Twelfth Day of August next; and whereas it is expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be, in Part, continued for some Time longer, His Majesty doth, therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever, do at any Time for the Space of Six Months, to

commence from the said Twelfth Day of August next, presume to export out of this Kingdom to any Parts beyond the Seas, within the Limits of Europe, any Sheet Copper, or Copper in Boltstaves, Bars, Sheets, Rings, and Nails, or any Copper capable of being converted into a Naval Store, or ship, or lade any of the Articles above-mentioned, on board any Ship or Vessel in order to exporting the same beyond the Seas, without Leave or Permission being first had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act passed in the Thirty-third Year of His Majesty's Reign, Cap. 2. and also by an Act passed in the Thirty-fourth Year of His Majesty's Reign, Cap. 34: But it is His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend or be construed to extend to the Exportation of any of the aforefaid Articles from Great Britain to Ireland, or from Ireland to Great Britain, respectively, or to any Exportation of any of the said Articles, by, or on board of His Majesty's Ships of War, or any other Ships, or Vessels, or Boats in the Service of His Majesty, or employed or freighted by His Majesty's Board of Ordnance, or by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy; nor to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on board such Quantities of the said Articles as may be necessary for the Use of such Ship or Vessel during the course of her intended Voyage, or to any Exportation thereof by Licence from the Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, or from the Commissioners of the Admiralty for the Time being, or from the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland; nor to the Exportation of the said several Articles to His Majesty's Yards and Garrisons within the Limits of Europe, nor to the Exportation of any of the said Articles to any Port or Place without the Limits of Europe, provided that in case of the Exportation to any Port or Place without the Limits of Europe, either of Copper being a Naval Store, or of Copper capable of being converted,



into a Naval Store, the Exporters thereof, do first make Oath of the true Destination of the said Articles to the Port or Place without the Limits of Europe, for which the same shall respectively be entered outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in Great Britain, or to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, as the Case may be, to carry the said Articles to the Port or Place, without the Limits of Europe; for which the same shall respectively be entered outwards, and such Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up until Proof be made to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in Great Britain, or of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, as the Case may be, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the said Commissioners respectively, and specified in such Bond of a Certificate or Certificates in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners respectively, as the Case may be, thereby shewing that the said Articles have been duly landed at the Port or Place without the Limits of Europe for which they were respectively entered outwards: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

Issue may take and use the Surname, and bear the Arms of Fenwick only, in Compliance with the Directions contained in the last Wills and Testaments of the said Robert Fenwick and Nicholas Fenwick, Esqrs.; such Arms being first duly exemplified according to the Laws of Arms, and recorded in the Heralds'-Office:

And also to order, that these His Majesty's Concessions and Declarations be registered in His College of Arms, otherwise to be void and of no Effect.

Copy of a Letter from Rear-Admiral Sir James Saumarez, to Ewan Nepean, Esq; dated on board His Majesty's Ship Caesar, at Gibraltar, the 6th July 1801.

S I R,

I Have to request you will be pleased to inform my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that, conformably to my Letter of Yesterday's Date, I stood through the Streights, with His Majesty's Squadron under my Orders, with the Intention of attacking Three French Line of Battle Ships and a Frigate, that I had received Information of being at Anchor off Algeziras; on opening Cabareta Point, I found the Ships lay at a considerable Distance from the Enemy's Batteries, and having a leading Wind up to them, afforded every reasonable Hope of Success in the Attack.

I had previously directed Captain Hood, in the Venerable, from his Experience and Knowledge of the Anchorage, to lead the Squadron, which he executed with his accustomed Gallantry, and although it was not intended he should anchor, he found himself under the Necessity so to do, from the Wind's failing, (a Circumstance so much to be apprehended in this Country,) and to which Circumstance I have to regret the Want of Success in this well-intended Enterprise; Captain Stirling anchored opposite to the inner Ship of the Enemy, and brought the Pompée to Action in the most spirited and gallant Manner, which was also followed by the Commanders of every Ship in the Squadron.

Captains Darby and Ferris, owing to light Winds, were prevented for a considerable Time from coming into Action; at length the Hannibal getting a Breeze, Captain Ferris had the most favorable Prospect of being alongside one of the Enemy's Ships, when the Hannibal unfortunately took the Ground, and I am extremely concerned to acquaint their Lordships, that after having made every possible Effort with this Ship and the Audacious, to cover her from the Enemy, I was under the Necessity to make Sail, being at the Time only Three Cables' Length from one of the Enemy's Batteries.

My Thanks are particularly due to all the Captains, Officers, and Men under my Orders; and although their Endeavours have not been crowned with Success, I trust the Thousands of Spectators from His Majesty's Garrison, and also the surrounding Coast, will do Justice to their Valour and Intrepidity, which was not to be checked by the Fire from the numerous Batteries, however formidable, that surround Algeziras.

I feel it incumbent upon me to state to their Lordships the great Merits of Captain Brenton, of the

Cæsar, whose cool Judgment and intrepid Conduct, I will venture to pronounce, were never surpassed. I also beg Leave to recommend to their Lordships' Notice my Flag-Lieutenant Mr. Philip Dumaresq, who has served with me from the Commencement of this War, and is a most deserving Officer. Mr. Lamborne and the other Lieutenants are also entitled to great Praise, as well as Captain Maxwell of the Marines, and the Officers of his Corps serving on board the Cæsar.

The Enemy's Ships consisted of Two of Eighty-four Guns, and One of Seventy-four, with a large Frigate; Two of the former are aground, and the Whole are rendered totally unserviceable.

I cannot close this Letter without rendering the most ample Justice to the great Bravery of Captain Ferris: the Loss in his Ship must have been very considerable both in Officers and Men; but I have the Satisfaction to be informed, that His Majesty has not lost so valuable an Officer.

SIR,

I Herewith enclose the Copy of a Letter from Captain Ferris, of His Majesty's late Ship Hannibal, which I request you will please to lay before their Lordships; and I have only to express my deep Regret that his well-meant Endeavours to bring his Ship to close Action should have occasioned so severe a Loss.

SIR,

Algeziras, July 7, 1801.

I Have little more to tell you of the Fate of His Majesty's Ship Hannibal than yourself must have observed, only, that from the Number of Batteries and Ships, Gun-Boats, &c. we had to encounter, our Guns soon got knocked up; and I found it was impossible to do any Thing either for the Preservation of the Ship or for the Good of the Service, our Boats, Sails, Rigging, and Springs being all shot away; and having so many Killed and Wounded, which will appear by the annexed List, I thought it prudent to strike, and thereby preserve the Lives of the brave Men that remained.

Had I been successful in the View before me, previous to the Ship's taking the Ground, my Praises of the Conduct of my Officers and Ship's Company could not have exceeded their Merits; but I have, notwithstanding, the Satisfaction to say, that every Order was observed and carried into Execution with that Promptitude and Alacrity becoming British Officers and Seamen.

Copy of a Letter from Rear-Admiral Sir John Thomas Duckworth, K. B. Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels at the Leeward Islands, to Evan Nepean, Esq; dated Martinique, 6th June 1801.

SIR,

I Enclose, for the Information of my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, a Letter from Captain Bland, of His Majesty's Ship Heureux, mentioning the Capture of the French National Schooner L'Egypte, of Sixteen Guns and One Hundred and Three Men. I am, &c. J. T. DUCKWORTH.

His Majesty's Ship L'Heureux, Barbadoes, May 31, 1801.

SIR,

CRUISING, according to your Orders, for the Protection of our Commerce, and the Annoyance of the Enemy, His Majesty's Ship under my Command captured on the Morning of the 28th Instant, Eighty Leagues to Windward of this Island, after a Chace of Sixteen Hours, and a running Fight which she maintained for Three Hours in Hopes to escape, the French National Schooner L'Egypte, of Sixteen Guns and One Hundred and Three Men. She is Copper-bottomed, and said to be the fastest sailing Vessel out of Guadaloupe, from which Island she had sailed Thirteen Days, and had not made a Capture.

TO OFFICERS ON HALF-PAY.

War-Office, August 1, 1801.

ALL Officers on the Half-Pay of the Land Forces, resident in Great Britain and Ireland, who are not serving in the Militia, or who do not hold Offices under Government, are hereby required immediately to transmit to the General Officers commanding in the Districts within which they respectively reside, an Account, in Writing, of their Age, past Services, and present Place of Abode, in order that their Services may be called for as Circumstances shall render it expedient: And such as think themselves, from Age or Infirmities, unfit for further Service even in this Country, are to accompany their Reports with sufficient Vouchers of their Inability, and the Causes thereof.

Such Officers on Half-Pay as are serving in the Militia, or are otherwise employed under Government, (Officers of the Yeomanry and Volunteer Corps excepted, whose Reports are to be made to the Generals commanding in Districts as above-mentioned,) are to transmit similar Accounts to the Secretary at War, specifying also the Nature of the Public Situations which they possess.

The General Officers commanding in Districts will make Returns to the Secretary at War of the Names of the Officers who shall report themselves in pursuance of the above Notice. And every Officer who shall neglect to make his Report, either to the Commander of a District or to the Secretary at War, according to the Circumstances of his Situation, within One Month from the Date hereof, will be considered as otherwise provided for, or dead, and his Name will be struck off the Half-Pay List accordingly.

NEW STAMP DUTIES ON DEEDS, &c.

Stamp-Office, Somerset-Place, July 3, 1801.

IN pursuance of Directions received from the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's

Treasury, His Majesty's Commissioners for managing the Stamp Duties do hereby give Notice, That, in order to prevent any Inconvenience to those Persons in the different Parts of the Kingdom, who shall not have been able to supply themselves with Vellum, Parchment, and Paper stamped according to an Act of Parliament, to which the Royal Assent was given Yesterday, owing to the Period for its Commencement taking place so soon after the passing thereof, there is a Clause in the said Act, empowering the Commissioners to cause such Instruments, viz. any Indenture, Lease, or other Deed, charged with an additional Duty of Three Shillings by an Act of the Thirty-seventh of the King, Cap. 90. as may, through Necessity, have been executed by any, or all of the Parties, upon Stamps in Use previous to the Year 1801, to be stamped with the additional Duties of FIVE SHILLINGS granted by Two Acts of the last Session of Parliament, on Payment of the said Duties only, without any Penalty, provided the same shall be brought or sent to the Head Office in Somerset-Place, before the ensuing 5th of December.
