AT the Court at *Weymouth*, the 7th of September 1801,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.
WHEREAS by Order in Council, dated the Tenth of December last, it was ordered by His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, in pursuance of the Powers vested in His Majesty, by an Act passed in the Forty-first Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to authorize His Majesty, from Time to Time, to prohibit the Exportation of Provisions or Food;" and mentioned in the said Order, that from and after the Date of the said Order, until the First Day of October next, no Person or Persons whatsoever, should export, or should load or lay on board any Ship or other Vessel, with the Intent to export from any Port or Place in this Kingdom, the following Articles, viz. Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, Swine, Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, Lamb, whether salted or otherwise, Bacon, Butter, Cheese, Onions, Potatoes, and Pulse of any Sort, Barley hulled, or Pearl Barley, subject to the Provisions and Exceptions in the said Order contained: And whereas it is judged expedient that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer; His Majesty, therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, pursuant to the Powers vested in His Majesty by the said Act, hath thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the said Prohibition to export, or to lay on board any Ship or Vessel, with Intent to export any of the Articles as aforesaid, shall continue and remain in force until the Expiration of Six Weeks after the Commencement of the next Session of Parliament, subject to the like Provisions and Exceptions as are contained in His Majesty's said Order of the Tenth December last, and in a subsequent Order of His Majesty in Council, bearing Date the Thirtieth of the said Month of December; and the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

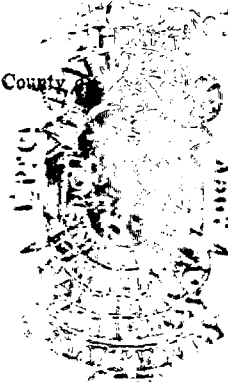
