By the KING. A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE R.

7 HEREAS divers Persons have been guilty of the illegal Practices of clandestinely importing and running of prohibited and uncultomed Goods, and thereby subjected themselves to great Penalties, for which some have been already convicted, some are in Execution for the same, and others are under Profecution, and many more liable to such Penalties, in consequence of which they abscoud, or are gone into foreign Parts, which has, or may prove the Ruin of themselves and their Families: And whereas they may yet be of Ule to Us and their Country in the present Conjuncture of Affairs, in case they are rendered capable thereof by Our gracious Pardon; We being defirous of giving them an Opportunity of rendering them felves of Service to the Public, have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to iffue this Our Proclamation; and We do hereby p omife, and declare, that in case any Person or Persons not standing charged with the Crime of wilful Murder, nor liable to be so charged, who has or have incurred any Penalties, in, by, or for the clandestine import ing, running, landing, relaiding, unshipping, concealing, or receiving, or being affiling in fuch running, landing, relauding, or unshipping any prohibited Goods, Wares or Merchandizes, or any Go de liable to the ayment of the Duties, under the Management of the Commissioners of Customs or Excile, or who have best abused, obstructed, or hindered any Officer or Officers of the faid Revenues in the due Execution of their Duty, or by Reason or Means, or on Account of any such Officences as aforesaid, or who are under any Prosecution tions, Judgment, Outlawry, or under, or subject to any Execution, for any of the said Offences, and who are at this Time gone beyond Sea to avoid the fame, shall, on or before the First Day of September next return to Our Kingdom of Great Britain, and shall surrender himself or themselves unto the Collector or Comptroller of Our Customs, in any o the Ports of Great Britain, and shall enter into Bond to Us, Our Heirs, and Successors, with One sufficient surety, to be approved by such said Col-

lector or Comptroller as aforesaid, in the Amount of any Sum or Sums of Money with which he or they may stand charged for his or their good Behaviour; and that he or they will not in future be concerned in any illegal Practice against Our Revenue: and further, that he or they will not depart from Our Kingdom of Great Britain during the Continuance of War, without Our Leave for that Purpose first had and obtained; all and every fuch Person or Persons so returning and surrendering himself or themselves, and entering into Bond as aforefaid, upon Certificate thereof from the faid Officers of Our Customs; which Certificate Our said Officers respectively are hereby required to make out and grant, to be by such Person or Persons entering into such Bond produced or transmitted by such Officers to Our Office of Cultoms or Excise in London respectively, as the Case may be, to be there registered and keps, shall have Our gracious Pardon, of, and for all and every such Offence and Offences and Penalties, and all Indictments, Informations, Prosecutions, Convictions, Judgments, Executions, and Outlawries fued, incurred, had or given, or that may arise or accrue, for, or by Reason or Means of any of the faid Offences, or other Matters or Things aforefaid; and such Certificate so registered as aforesaid, or a Copy thereof duly authenticated, shall be deemed and taken as Evidence in all Cases that such Person or Persons has or have complied in every Respect with the Conditions of this Our Proclamation.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Twentieth Day of July One thousand eight hundred and three, in the Forty-third Year of Our Reign.

Copy of a Letter from Captain Parker, of His Majesty's Ship Amazon, to Sir Evan Nepean, Bart. dated at Sea the 16th Inflant.

I BEG you will make known to the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that His Majesty's Ship Amazon, under my Command, captured this Morning at Eight o'Clock, after a Chase of Four Hours, Le Felix, a very fine Copper bottomed French Schooner Privateer, armed with Sixteen Four-Pounders, (Fourteen of which were thrown overboard during the Chase,) and a Complement of Ninety-fix Men. She belonged to La Rochelle, from which Port she had been out Twenty-four Days, and had made but One Capture, the Esther, a British Ship, from Honduras bound to London, the Master of which, with Part of the Crew, were found on board.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

We admit that the chance of Winds may afford to the Inemy a Possibility of eluding the Vigilance of the un-exampled Valour of the British Navy, but relying upon the Magnanimity of your Majesty's Mind, and recollecting the Triumphs of your Majesty's Army, and the Victories of Lincelles, of Acre, and of Alexandria, and placing a just Dependance upon the Spirit of the Militia, and the unanimous Exertions of the British People when fighting for British Liberty on British Ground, we are confident that although a temporary Success may attend their Arms, and even carry them into the Metropolis, Defpair will find no Place in your Majesty's Councils; and that, under your Majesty's Example, the Courage of Englishmen will rise in Proportion to the Dangers they may have to encounter.
