

Whitehall, November 16, 1803.

The King has been pleased to order a Writ to be issued under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland for summoning the Right Honorable Robert Banks Jenkinson (commonly called Lord Hawkebury) up to the House of Peers, by the Style and Title of Baron Hawkebury, of Hawkebury, in the County of Gloucester.
