AT the Court at St. James's, the 23d of November 1803,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased by His Order in Council, of the Twenty-sixth of October last, to declare, in pursuance of the Act therein recited, that an infectious Distemper at that Time raging at New York, was of the Nature of the Plague; and did therefore, in pursuance of the same Act direct, That all Ships, Vessels, Persons, Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes then arrived, or which might thereafter arrive in any of the Ports of Great Britain, or the Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, from New York, or any Port within the State of New York, and should have cleared out from New York, or any Port within the State of New York, subsequent to the Fifteenth Day of August last, should perform a Quarantine of Fourteen Days at the several Places appointed, and according to the Rules prescribed by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twenty-ninth of July One thousand eight hundred: And whereas His Majesty has received Information, that the said Infectious Distemper so raging in the City of New York, hath extended itself to the City of Philadelphia, in the State of Pennsylvania, and to Alexandria, in the State of Virginia; His Majesty by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth thereupon order, that the Quarantine at present subsisting upon all Ships and Vessels coming from New York, or from any Port within the State of New York, be extended to all Ships, Vessels, Persons, Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes coming from the City of Philadelphia, or any Port within the State of Pennsylvania, or from Alexandria, or any Port within the State of Virginia, and which shall have cleared out from any of the said Ports subsequent to the Sixth Day of September last; and His Majesty, with the Advice aforesaid, doth hereby further order, require, and command, That all Ships and Vessels whatsoever, coming from the City of Philadelphia, or any Port within the State of Pennsylvania, or from Alexandria, or any Port within the State of Virginia, and all Persons, Goods, and Merchandizes on board the same, that are al-

ready arrived, or that shall hereafter arrive in any of the Ports of this Kingdom, or of the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, do make their Quarantine for Fourteen Days, and do strictly conform themselves in all Respects to the Rules and Regulations now in force, and required to be observed by His Majesty's said recited Order in Council, bearing Date the Twenty-sixth Day of October last: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General and the Rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief for the Time being of the said Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain. *Steph. P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twenty-fifth Day of May last, for prohibiting the Exportation out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the Sixth Day of December next: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever, (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service,) do at any Time, during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said Sixth Day of December next, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on board any Ship or Vessel in order to transporting

he same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying he same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt-Petre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Salt-Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition:"—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the rest of the principal Officers of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

A DISPATCH, of which the following is a Copy, was this Morning received at the Office of the Right Honorable Lord Hobart, One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, from General William Grimfield, commanding His Majesty's Troops in the Windward and Leeward Charibbee Islands:

MY LORD, *Starbrock, Demerary, Sept. 27, 1803.*

IT is with real Satisfaction I have the Honor to acquaint your Lordship, with my having this Day received Lieutenant-Colonel Nicholson's Report of the Surrender by Capitulation of the Colony of Barbice and its Dependencies to the British Arms.

The Report of Lieutenant-Colonel Nicholson, containing the Summons and Capitulation, is herewith transmitted. I cannot speak too highly of the Conduct of that Officer: I must likewise beg leave to express my entire Satisfaction with the Conduct of the Officers and Men in this Expedition.

I have the Honor to send these Dispatches to your Lordship, by the Deputy Adjutant-General to this Army, Captain Harvey, whose State of Health, I am sorry to say, requires the European Climate; to him I beg to refer you for any Particulars I may have omitted to mention.

SIR,

AGREEABLE to your Orders of the 19th Instant, I proceeded with the Troops under my Command, and arrived off the River Berbice on the 23d Instant in the Morning, where the Ships of War and Transports came to Anchor; as it was from thence Captain Bland and myself agreed to send Brigade Major Armstrong and Lieutenant Pardoe, in a Flag of Truce, with a Summons to the Provisional Governments, the Naval and Military Commanders, to surrender the Colony of Berbice to His Majesty's Forces under our Command. The Flag of Truce returned early the next Morning, having on board a Committee of the Provisional Government, a Captain of Artillery, and a Lieutenant of the Batavian Navy, to treat for the Surrender of the Colony, which was done, and the Articles of Capitulation signed; but as the Commandant of the Batavian Troops would not sanction the Surrender, without consulting the Officers under his Command, it was agreed that the Netly Schooner, with the smallest of the Transports, should pass over the Bar, there anchor, and wait until the Flag of Truce returned from the Fort with the Commandant's Answer; which not arriving as soon as was expected, the Netly and the Transports got under weigh, and were proceeding to pass the Forts, when the Flag of Truce returned, with a Captain of Artillery, to signify the Commandant's Approval of the Terms, but requesting the British Troops might not land until this Day, which was complied with, and they remained on board the Vessels, at Anchor off the Town, until Noon this Day, when the Troops landed and took Possession of the Forts, &c; and the Batavian Garrison, consisting of upwards of Six Hundred Men, were made Prisoners.

The steady and active Co-operation of Captain Bland and the Officers, Seamen, and Marines employed on this Service, demand my warmest Acknowledgments; and it is my Duty to report to you how much I am satisfied with the Zeal and active Exertions of Lieutenant-Colonel M^cCreagh of the 7th West India Regiment, and all the Officers and every Individual of all the Corps employed on this Service.

I am engaged in preparing the Returns of Ordnance and Stores of every Description found in the Enemy's Forts and Magazines, which I shall have the Honor of presenting to you on my Return to Demerara, which I expect will be in Three Days from this Date.

Herewith I enclose a Copy of the Summons and Articles of Capitulation, and have the Honor to remain, &c.

By Captain Loftus Otway Bland, Commander of His Britannic Majesty's Ships, &c. &c. and Lieutenant-Colonel Robert Nicholson, Commander of His Britannic Majesty's Land Forces, &c. &c. under the Orders of their Excellencies Lieutenant-General William Grinfield, and Commodore Samuel Hood, Commanders in Chief of His Majesty's Land and Sea Forces in the Windward and Leeward Charibbee Islands, &c. &c.

THESE are requiring you the Governor, and Court of Police, and Military and Naval Forces of the Colony of Berbice and its Dependencies, to surrender the said Colony to His Britannic Majesty's Forces under our Command, and to place the same under His Britannic Majesty's Government.

In which Case the Laws and Usages of the Colony shall remain in force and be respected, the Mode of Taxation now in Use be adhered to, and the Inhabitants shall enjoy the public Exercise of their Religion in the same Manner as heretofore; no new Establishments shall be introduced without the Consent of the Court of Police, as the Legislature of the Colony. The Public Officers, whether in the Civil Law or Church Establishment, as well as the Members of the respective Courts (except the Governor) shall be continued in their respective Offices and Situations until His Majesty's Pleasure shall be known, excepting those who may be attached to French Principles.

The Inhabitants, those who are at present in the Colony, as well as those who may be abroad, shall be protected in their Persons, and have the free Enjoyment of their Properties, without being troubled or molested for any Acts whatsoever, other than such as they might commit subsequent to the Capitulation, and in Violation of the Oath of Fidelity they shall be required to take.

The Sea and Land Forces of the Batavian Republic stationed in the Colony shall surrender themselves Prisoners of War, and proper Vessels will be provided at the Expence of His Britannic Majesty to convey them with the most convenient Speed to one of the Ports of the Batavian Republic; but they are not to bear Arms against Great Britain or her Allies, until regularly exchanged or released.

The Officers shall retain their Arms, and the whole of their Baggage; and the Non-commissioned Officers and Privates, their Baggage only.

With regard to the Military Forces, the Officers, Non-commissioned Officers and Privates of the same, may, if agreeably to themselves, enter into the British Service, and receive Pay, and every Advantage and Emolument enjoyed by those of the same Rank in His Britannic Majesty's Service.

Should these liberal Terms, which in fact extend to the Inhabitants of this Colony a free Participation in the great Advantages enjoyed by the Subjects of His Britannic Majesty, be refused, the Governor and Court of Police, and all concerned, must be answerable for the Consequences, as an immediate Attack will be made by the Land and Sea Forces, which will render every Resistance vain.

One Hour and no more, is given to the Governor, from the Delivery of this by Brigade Major Armstrong, and Lieutenant Pardoe, to accept or not.

ANSWER TO THE SUMMONS,

By Captain Loftus Otway Bland, Commander of His Britannic Majesty's Ships, &c. &c. &c. and Lieutenant Colonel Robert Nicholson, Commander of His Britannic Majesty's Land Forces, &c. &c. &c. under the Orders of their Excellencies Lieutenant General William Grinfield, and Commodore Samuel Hood, Commanders in Chief of His Majesty's Land and Sea Forces in the Windward and Leeward Charibbee Islands, &c. &c. &c.

THE Sovereignty of the Colony, with its Forts, Posts, Artillery, and Ammunition of War, will be surrendered to His Britannic Majesty's Forces, on the Capitulation offered, with the following Articles, viz.

Article I. The Inhabitants shall have the full and immediate Enjoyment of all Property, whether on Shore or Afloat; absent Persons shall, as far as regards their Property in the Colony, be considered as Inhabitants of Berbice. The Shipping now in the River, either belonging to resident Inhabitants of the Colony, or to absent Proprietors of Plantations, shall be as sacred as other Property in the Colony, and be allowed to proceed to Europe, or to any Part of America, or disposed of in the Colony, at the Option of the Owners or their Agents.

Answer.—With respect to absent Inhabitants and their Property, this Colony will be on the same Footing with Demerara. The Shipping and all belonging to them must be given up; but a particular Case may be considered.

Art. II. The Plantations, Lands, Manufactories, Workshops, Slaves, Effects, and Possessions, of the Berbice Association, of whatever Nature, shall be considered as private Property, in the same Manner as agreed to by the Capitulation with General Whyte in May 1796.

Answer.—All private Property whatever, of Individuals, to be respected.

Art. III. Provocations, or Appeals of Sentences and Dispositions passed in the Colony, shall be allowed as usual, and made unto such Court of Justice or Judges, as shall be agreed upon; yet, with this Provision, that such Court or Judges shall determine the Case appealed, by the now existing Dutch Laws in the Colony.

Answer.—Granted, until decided which Country the Colony belongs to at the End of the War; in the

mean Time, Appeals to be made to His Majesty in Council.

Art. IV. The Troops of His Britannic Majesty shall garrison all existing inland Posts, for the Protection of the Colony, against Insurrections of the Negroes, and as many more Posts shall be created for that Purpose, as in future may be deemed necessary by the Court of Police, on making Application to the Commander of His Majesty's Troops, at the Time being.

Answer.—The Colony will be protected by British Troops;—the Officer commanding and protecting the Colony is to judge where Posts are to be erected.

Art. V. The Colony Assignations, and other Paper Currency of the Colony, shall retain their present Value, and continue in Circulation, until such Time as Circumstances will permit a Plan to be agreed upon, for the withdrawing and cancelling the same, founded on Justice and Equity, and without Injury to Individuals.

Answer.—Granted.

Art. VI. All Salaries due by the Colony to the Provisional Government, Civil Officers, and other Persons thereto belonging, shall be paid out of the ordinary Duties and Taxes.

Answer.—Granted, out of the Colonial Fund.

Art. VII. All Debts contracted by the present Government, or by Governor Van Batenburg on account of the Colony, shall also be paid out of that Fund, or out of such other as might appear they belong to.

Answer.—Granted.

Art. VIII. The bartering of Provisions and other Commodities with the Citizens of the United States of America for the Produce of this Colony, shall continue on the same Footing as at present.

Answer.—On the same Footing as the British Colonies.

Art. IX. The Grants of Land made by the Council of the American Colonies and Possessions of the Batavian Republic, before this Date, shall be respected, and the Grantees admitted, and maintained in the peaceable Possession of the same, except such Lands as might appear to be disposed of otherwise by the Government or Council here, and such as are reserved for Public Purposes; also except a certain Part of a Grant the Governor and Council have in their Assembly of the 4th October, 1802, judged to have been obtained surreptitiously.

Answer.—All fair Grants to be respected; all others to be left for future Investigation.

Art. X. The Grants of Land made by the Governor and Council before this Date, shall be respected as conclusive, though the Approvement and Confirmation of the Council of the American Colonies and Possessions might not have arrived in the Colony; and Governor and Council shall have the Power to issue Letters of Confirmation (*Grondbruren*) to the Grantees, which shall be deemed a complete and indisputable Title to them and their Successors.

Answer.—Left for future Investigation, and if found to have been fairly obtained, will be confirmed.

Art. XI. The Grants of Land on the West Coast and West Bank of the River Correntine, made by Governor Frederici, of Surinam, (which Territory was formerly held to make Part of, and belong-

ng to that Colony; but since December 1799, has been placed under, and considered as belonging to the Government of Berbice) shall in the same Manner as proposed by the preceding Article, be respected and conclusive; and Letters of Confirmation (*Grondbruren*) issued by Governor and Council here, to the same complete and indisputable Effect as aforesaid.

Answered in Article X.

Art. XII. The Governor and Council shall have the Power to dispose peremptorily of yet ungranted Lands in any Part of the Colony, for Cultivation, to Persons that may petition for Grants, on customary Conditions, or otherwise as may be deemed most adapted to promote Agriculture, and of Course the Prosperity of the Colony.

Answer.—Cannot be granted.

Art. XIII. During Two Years from this Date it shall be permitted to resident and other Proprietors who wish to quit the Colony, or to withdraw their Interest from the same, to dispose of their Properties, and to transport or have remitted the Proceeds of it wherever they shall think proper.

Answer.—Granted.

Art. XIV. A Detachment of His Britannic Majesty's Forces to take Possession of the Gates of Fort St. Andrew, and of the Battery below the Fort, on Sunday Morning the 25th Instant, at Seven o'Clock.

Answer.—The Forces of His Britannic Majesty to take Possession of the Gates of Fort St. Andrew, and all other Posts in the Colony they may think proper to occupy, this Day at Ten o'Clock, or as soon after as possible before Two o'Clock.

Art. XV. The Garrison shall march out with the Honors of War, Horns blowing and Drums beating, and shall carry with them their Arms, Ammunition, and two Field Pieces.

Answer.—The Garrison to march out with the Honors of War, but no Arms, Ammunition, or Field Pieces can be allowed to Prisoners of War, except the Officers, who are to retain their Arms.

Art. XVI. The Commandant of the Troops, all the Officers, Soldiers, and other Persons belonging to the Military Department, sent out from Holland to this Colony, and their Wives and Children, shall be embarked within one Month from this Date, and conveyed to the Batavian Republic at the Expence of His Britannic Majesty, and not be Prisoners of War; and the Surinam Department having been sent only from that Colony for the Suppression of the Mutiny of the Garrison in this Colony, which took place some Months ago, shall be conveyed back to Surinam, the Garrison they belong to, also within the same Space of Time, and at His Majesty's Expence, and not to be Prisoners of War.

Answer.—They shall be conveyed to Europe as soon as possible, but must be considered as Prisoners of War, and are not to serve against Great Britain or her Allies, until regularly exchanged.

The Surinam Detachment to be also Prisoners of War, and on the same Footing as the other Troops; but the Officers of the said Detachment will be furnished with a Conveyance to Surinam, if they wish it.

Art. XVII. A Vessel shall be furnished as soon as possible for the Conveyance of the Commandant, his Family, and Officers, and the Baggage and Effects to them belonging.

Answer.—Granted.

Art. XVIII. The Sick shall be attended at the Military Hospital at the Expence of His Britannic Majesty, and, when cured, be sent to Holland.

Answer.—Granted.

Art. XIX. It shall be permitted to such Part of the Military Department as should not wish to return to Europe, to stay in the Colony, and seek for Employment in the Planter Line, or any other Business their Capacities and Inclinations may fit them for, or, if they choose it, to quit this Colony for any other Place.

Answer.—Such People as may be found useful to the Colony, on Proof and proper Representation will be allowed to remain.

Art. XX. The present Government of the Colony, and the Commandant of the Troops shall dispatch immediately the Republican Schooner the *Serpent*, now in this River, to give advice to the Government of the Republic, of the present Capitulation. The Naval Officers, Non-commissioned Officers, and Seamen shall not be Prisoners of War, but depart with the *Serpent* for the Batavian Republic, and the necessary Passports shall be furnished by the Commander of His Britannic Majesty's Naval Forces.

Answer.—Cannot be granted, but the same Vessel that takes our Dispatches to Europe will take theirs.

The Republican Schooner to be given up to His Majesty's Schooner *Netley*, at Ten o'Clock this Day.

Art. XXI. The Remainder of the Military Mutineers, who, by their Insurrection from the 11th of April to the 10th of May last, have put this Colony in Danger of total Destruction, and are now in Prison, shall be received in Custody of His Britannic Majesty's Forces, and within One Month from this Date be embarked and sent to the Batavian Republic at His Britannic Majesty's Expence, to be tried for their high Crimes, and receive the merited Punishment.

Answer.—The British do not protect Mutineers of any Country. The Disposal of them to be left to the Commanders in Chief of His Britannic Majesty's Forces in the West Indies.

Art. XXII. Should hereafter any Differences arise concerning the true Meaning of any of the Articles of the present Capitulation, the Interpretation of the same shall be always given in Favor of the Colonists.

Answer.—Granted.

This Answer and Additional Articles will be delivered by Johannes Vanden Brock, jun. Member of the Provisional Government; Z. I. C. Fricke, Member of the Court of Police; Paul Egger, Fiscal and Secretary; Roelof Stuyvelaar, Captain of Artillery; J. R. Claessens, Captain of the Rangers; and J. D. Gallas, Lieutenant of the Navy, who are authorized finally to conclude.

TERMS of CAPITULATION proposed by the Governor-General and the Court of Police of the Colonies of Essequibo and Demarary, and the Commanding Officers of the Sea and Land Forces of the Batavian Republic in the said Colonies, to Their Excellencies the Commanders in Chief of His Britannic Majesty's Sea and Land Forces off Demarary.

Art. I. The Laws and Usages of the Colony shall remain in force and be respected; the Mode of Taxation now in Use to be adhered to, and the Inhabitants shall enjoy the public Exercise of their Religion in the same Manner as before the Capitulation; no new Establishment shall be introduced without the Consent of the Court of Police, as the Legislature of the Colony. The constituted Authorities, the Officers, whether in the Civil Law or Church Establishments, as well as the Members of the respective Courts, (except the Governor-General,) shall be continued in their respective Offices and Situations until His Majesty's Pleasure shall be known.

Answer.—Granted.

Art. II. The Inhabitants who are at present in the Colony, as well as those who may be Abroad, shall be protected in their Persons, and have the free Enjoyment of their Properties, without being troubled or molested for any Acts whatsoever, other than such as they might commit subsequent to the Capitulation, and in Violation of the Oath of Fidelity they shall be required to take.

Answer.—Granted.

Art. III. The Inhabitants shall on no Account whatever be obliged to take up Arms against an external Enemy, but their Services shall only be required for quelling internal Commotions or Disturbances, according to the existing Regulations for the Burghers, and for maintaining the interior Tranquillity of the Colony, in conformity to what has taken place to this Day.

Answer.—Granted, until, at the Conclusion of the War, it shall be determined to what Government those Colonies shall be subjected.

Art. IV. The Debts contracted by the Government for the building of new Barracks, the Erection of Batteries, the Purchase of Provisions for the Garrison, the Salaries of Civil Officers due, shall, on the first Demand, be paid out of the Sovereign's or Government Chest; as well as all other Demands that would have been paid or reimbursed by Government had the Colony not been taken.

Answer.—Granted.

Art. V. The Sea and Land Forces of the Batavian Republic stationed in this Colony, shall be allowed to depart freely. They shall retain their Arms and the whole of their Baggage, as well the Officers, Non-commissioned Officers, as Privates. They shall be supplied by the Commandant of His Majesty's Forces with proper Vessels to convey them, with the most convenient Speed, to any of the Ports of the Batavian Republic; and during the Passage thither they shall receive, for Account of His Majesty, each according to his Rank, the same Rations, both as to Quantity and Quality, as are usually allowed to the British Troops.

Answer.—Granted; but the Troops and Seamen must be considered as Prisoners of War, and not to bear Arms against Great Britain, or her Allies, until regularly exchanged or released; and the Arms and Accoutrements of the Soldiers must be delivered up.

Art. VI. The Corvette Hippomenes shall be given up, unarmed, for transporting her Officers and Crew to one of the Ports of the Batavian Republic. As many of the Troops of the Batavian Garrison shall embark and take their Passage in the said Corvette as can conveniently be placed on board her.

Answer.—Cannot be granted. Proper Vessels will be furnished, at the Expence of the British Government, to convey the Troops and Seamen to Europe.

Art. VII. The Governor-General not having a Military Rank, shall be at Liberty to remain in the Colony, until he shall have collected the necessary Documents, or Proofs, towards enabling him to lay before his Sovereign an Account of his Administration; after which every Facility shall be afforded him to return to the Batavian Republic in a Manner suitable to his Rank. He shall be allowed to require such Copies of Papers from the Government and Colonial Secretary's Office, as he may deem necessary for the Purpose above expressed.

Answer.—Granted.

Art. VIII. From the Day of the Colony being taken Possession of by the British Forces, the Batavian Troops shall be supplied with their usual Rations by the British Commander, until the Day of their Embarkation and from that Moment the Batavian Troops are to receive the same Rations as are usually

allowed to British Troops when at Sea, in the Manner mentioned in the Fifth Article.

Answer.—Granted.

Art. IX. The Batavian Troops shall continue to all Intents and Purposes under the Command of their own Officers. Every Respect and Honor shall be mutually shewn by the Troops of both Nations to one another, and Care shall be taken on both Sides to preserve Peace and Tranquillity, until the Departure of the Batavian Troops.

Answer.—Proper Quarters will be allowed for the Batavian Troops, and to which they must confine themselves, until their Embarkation.

Art. X. The Batavian Garrison shall be allowed freely, and without any Hindrance, to take along with it all Accoutrements and Arms belonging to it, also the Effects of deceased Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers, and Privates, that may be yet unfolded; whether the same be deposited in the Public Magazines, or in any other Place.

Answer.—That Part of the Article, relating to the Arms and Accoutrements, is answered in Article V. The remainder is Granted.

Art. XI. The Sick of the Batavian Troops, who may be left behind in the Hospitals, shall be treated and taken care of, in the same Manner with the British Soldiers; they shall be entitled to the same Terms of Capitulation, and enjoy the same Advantages as are stipulated for the rest of the Batavian Garrison, and in like manner as the latter; they shall, after their complete Recovery, be transported with the most convenient Speed, to one of the Ports of the Batavian Republic.

Answer.—Granted.

Art. XII. The Commanders of His Majesty's Forces, shall, immediately on the Colony being taken Possession of, furnish the Governor-General with a Conveyance, to transmit to the Batavian Government a Copy of the Capitulation, with a Statement of the Reasons that induced him, as well as the Council of Police, and the Commanding Officers of the Batavian Forces, to surrender the Colony to His Britannic Majesty.

Answer.—Granted. The Vessel which takes our Dispatches to Europe, will take those of the Governor of the Colonies.

Art. XIII. No Negroes shall be required from the Planters, for the Purpose of forming or recruiting any Black Corps.

Answer.—Granted.

Art. XIV. Should any Difficulties arise, in consequence of any dubious Expressions occurring in the present Capitulation, the same shall be explained or construed in the Sense most favorable to the Colony, or the Batavian Garrison.

DISPATCHES, of which the following are Copies, have been received at this Office from Commodore Hood, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels at the Leeward Islands.

Hornet, Demerary River,

September 27, 1803.

SIR,

It is with the greatest Satisfaction I have the Honor to acquaint you, for the Information of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that, in Concurrence with Lieutenant-General Grinfield, the Troops for the Expedition to this valuable Colony were embarked at Barbadoes on the 31st of August, on board His Majesty's Ships Centaur, Chichester, and Alligator, and Brilliant Transport, with the Heureux and Netley; also several small Vessels having Military Stores, &c. We put to Sea the next Morning; but, from light baffling Winds, and a strong N. W. Current, we did not arrive to our Anchorage at the appointed Rendezvous, a few Leagues to Windward of the River, until the Evening of the 18th.

The Netley, Lieutenant Lawrence, was sent forward with Mr. Casey, a Gentleman well acquainted with the Coast, to endeavour to gain Information, and procure a Number of Colony Boats, calculated for our Service; and we had the good Fortune to find, by the Exertion and Attention of this Officer, with the very useful Services of the before-mentioned Gentleman, our Wishes were fulfilled, and twenty-four Boats ready, in three Fathoms Water, to receive the Troops.

The Moment we anchored, a Flag of Truce was dispatched to the Governor of Demerary and Essequibo, with a Summons, and Orders to wait one Hour only.

The Centaur and Chichester, not being able to approach nearer the Shore, the Troops were early the next Morning removed to the small Vessels, and all ready in the Evening, waiting the Event of the Flag, which, detained by strong Winds, did not return until the following Morning, with a Deputation from the Colony, when Terms were agreed on.

The Hornet, which was lying off the Bar, blockading the Port, entered the River in the Evening, with the Netley and a Body of Troops; when Possession was taken of Fort William Frederick, the Hippomenes, a Ship pierced for eighteen Guns, fourteen only mounted, belonging to the Batavian Republic; and the Colonies of Demerary and Essequibo, were given up to us the next Day at Twelve o'Clock.

The Governor not being able to treat for Berbice, our further Dispositions and Arrangements, on signing the Capitulation, were immediately made; and Captain Bland of the Heureux, with the Alligator and Netley, and Brilliant Transport, having on Board a Detachment of the Troops, under Lieutenant-Colonel Nicholson, and the Marines of the Squadron, were sent against Berbice, the Result of which I have the Honor to forward herewith; and am, Sir, &c.

THE Commanders in Chief of the Land and Sea Forces of His Britannic Majesty, being fully assured

of their decided Superiority to the Force of the Batavian Republic, in these Colonies, and certain of being able to prevent Succours being thrown in, they consider themselves as authorized to require the immediate Surrender of the Colonies of Demerary, Essequibo, and Berbice, to the Forces under their Command. With the View, therefore, to prevent unnecessary Effusion of Blood, or the Mischief which must ensue to the Colonies, should the Troops be under the necessity of making good the Landing, and the Ships to enforce a Passage, the Commanders in Chief have thought it right to trouble your Excellency with this Summons, and trusting, that from your Excellency's Regard for the Colonies, the Certainty of not being able to resist, and for the Preservation of Individual Property, you will have no Hesitation in acceding to the Terms herewith transmitted.

The Officers, who will have the Honor to deliver this to your Excellency, have Orders to wait one Hour for your Answer.

TERMS proposed by their Excellencies Lieutenant-General William Grinfield and Commodore Samuel Hood, Commanders in Chief of His Majesty's Land and Sea Forces, for the Surrender to the British Government the Colonies of Demerary, Essequibo, and Berbice.

Art. I. The Colonies of Demerary, Essequibo, and Berbice, with their Dependencies, to be surrendered within twenty-four Hours to the Arms and Protection of the British Government.

Art. II. The Fort of William Frederick is to be taken Possession of, at by the Troops of the British Government.

Art. III. The Garrisons in these Colonies are to be, and to remain Prisoners of War, until released or exchanged, and to deliver their Arms, Accoutrements, and Ammunition, to the Person appointed to receive them: they will be allowed all the usual Honors of War; the Officers to retain and wear their Swords, and to have their Paroles; and the Officers and men their Clothing and Baggage.

Art. IV. The public Stores, Store-houses, Lands and Revenues, Ships and Vessels, belonging to the Batavian Republic, are to surrender to the British Government.

Art. V. The private Property, as well on Shore, as a float, of all Persons, who were *bona fide* Proprietors at the Time the said Possessions were restored by His Majesty to the Batavian Republic, will be respected, and not be considered as liable to Seizure.

Art. VI. The Civil Laws of these Colonies, as far as regards the Property, and Civil Jurisdiction, to remain as they now are, until the further Pleasure of the King shall be made known.

Art. VII. The Council, and the Civil Magistrates of the Colony, taking the Oaths of Allegiance to the British Government, to remain as they now are, with the Exception of such of either, as by their known Attachment to the Batavian Republic, would endanger the Colonies, by their remaining in Places of Trust and Confidence.

Art. VIII. The Government, and the Defence of the Colonies, belongs to the British Nation.

I HAVE had the Honor to receive your Excellencies' Letter of Yesterday's Date, requiring the immediate Surrender of the Colonies of Essequibo, Demerary, and Berbice, on the Terms transmitted to me by your Excellencies.

In conformity to the Constitution of this Colony, I have laid your Letter before the Court of Police, and the Commanding Officers of the Sea and Land Forces, assembled in a Council of War.

The Colony of Berbice being a Government entirely distinct from this, I am not competent to answer your Excellencies' Letter, as far as regards that Colony. But in respect to the Colonies of Essequibo and Demerary, under my Government, I, as well as the other Members of the combined Council of War, have thought it our Duty to propose some Terms of Capitulation, which we have framed on our Part, and to which we entreat your Excellencies' Consideration, as conceiving them best calculated for the Interest of these Colonies: The same will be laid before your Excellencies by a Committee from the Council of War, consisting of the Commandeur of Essequibo, Mr. Trotz, a Member of the Court of Police, Mr. Kroll, two Officers, and the Secretary of the Colony, which Gentlemen are to wait upon your Excellencies, and are fully authorized to conclude the Capitulation.*

By their Excellencies Lieutenant-General William Grinfield and Commodore Samuel Hood, Commanders in Chief of His Britannic Majesty's Land and Sea Forces in the Windward and Leeward Charibbee Islands, &c. &c. &c.

WHEREAS by the Articles of Capitulation proposed to the Inhabitants of Demerary, &c. &c. &c., and accepted by them, which Places are now in His Majesty's Possession, and the Inhabitants thereof are become Subjects of His Majesty, we have thought fit, by virtue of the Powers and Authorities in us vested, to publish this Proclamation, hereby permitting and allowing, that from and after the Publication hereof, until His Majesty's Pleasures shall be made known, that all His loving Subjects may lawfully trade to and from such Places as are in His Majesty's Possessions, subject nevertheless to the same Duties, Rules, Regulations, Conditions, Restrictions, Penalties, and Forfeitures, to which the Trade to and from His Majesty's Colonies, Plantations, and Islands in the West Indies, is or shall be subject by Law; but nothing herein-contained shall extend to prevent the Importations in Americans, or other Neutral Bottoms belonging to the Subjects of any Power in Amity with His Britannic Majesty, of Provisions, Cattle, Grain, Wood of every Kind from

the United States of America, so long as the same shall be allowed, in pursuance of and under the Terms and Conditions of the said Articles of Capitulation, or any other Privileges or Exemptions granted by the said Articles of Capitulation.

It is further ordered and declared, that all Commodities being of the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of the aforesaid Places, shall be shipped to Great Britain or Ireland, or any British Plantation, in British Ships navigated according to Law: And it is further ordered, That no Produce shall be exported in foreign Bottoms, except what may be deemed absolutely necessary, in Return for Provisions, and that only to the Amount of such Provisions.

SIR, *Heureux, off Berbice, 26th September, 1803.*

I AM happy to inform you, that His Majesty's Forces are in Possession of the valuable Colony of Berbice; to give you the first Information, I dispatched Major Crozier, of the Marines, by Land, whose Party I landed at the Desire of Lieutenant-Colonel Nicholson.—The Provisional Government and Court of Police, sent off their Deputies to answer the Summons sent them to surrender, and agreed to the Capitulation, which I enclose with the Summons*.

The Garrison thought proper not to join, nor did they give an Answer, till we arrived with the British Land and Sea Forces, nearly within Gun-Shot of their Works: seeing we were determined, a Boat was hurried off to inform us they would surrender, if we would wait till next Day, which was agreed to, on our being allowed to go into the Harbour that Night, and take Possession of the Shipping, which consists of a very fine National Schooner, the *Serpent*, and several large Merchant Ships.

From the vigorous Exertions and Animation of all, and the Dispositions made by the Lieutenant Colonel, I have not a doubt every Thing must have fallen in a Storm.

Quays or Wharfs, and not elsewhere, and compelling such Ships and Vessels belonging to or frequenting the Port of London, as shall be used or employed in the West India Trade, to ship or take in their respective Cargoes, and be loaded either in some or one of the said Docks, or in such Part of the River Thames as shall be below the Entrance into the intended Canal at Blackwall aforesaid, shall take Effect, and be in full Force and Operation, and the said Term of Twenty-one Years, during which the aforesaid Provisions are to be in force, shall commence at, and be computed from the Expiration of ten Days from the Time of the first Publication of the said Certificate as before mentioned, any Thing in the said recited Act, contained to the contrary notwithstanding.

And whereas, by two several Certificates under the Hands of Three of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, one of them granted on the 21st Day of August, which was in the Year of our Lord 1802, and the other of them granted on the 22d Day of August last, in pursuance of the said Act passed in the 42d Year of His present Majesty's Reign, the said Lords Commissioners did certify, and make known, that the following Works made and erected by the said West India Dock Company, under the Authority of the said Acts, were so far completed, that in their Judgment the same were fit for the Reception of Ships and Goods respectively, viz.
