AT the Court at the *Queen's Palace*, the 27th of June 1804,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS, in virtue of the Powers vested in His Majesty by an Act passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to continue several Laws relating to the suspending the Operation of Two Acts of the Fifteenth and Seventeenth Years of the Reign of His present Majesty, for restraining the Negotiation of Promissory Notes and Bills of Exchange, under a limited Sum, in England; and the prohibiting the Exportation from, and permitting the Importation, into, Great Britain, of Corn, and for allowing the Importation of other Articles of Provision, without Payment of Duty, until the Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and five; and to the regulating the Trade and Commerce to and from the Isle of Malta, until Six Months after the Ratification of a Definitive Treaty of Peace;" His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council, bearing Date the Eighth of May last, to permit, for the Space of Three Months, from the Date of the said Order, the Importation of sundry Articles of Provisions therein specified Duty free; And whereas it is judged expedient that the said Permission should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty is thereupon pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to allow, and doth hereby allow, for and during the Space of Three Months, to commence from the Eighth Day of August next, the Importation into any Port or Place of Great Britain of any Beans called Kidney or French Beans, Laves, Lentiles, Calavancies, and all other Sorts of Pulse; and also Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, and Swine; Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, and Lamb, whether salted or otherwise; Bacon, Hams, Tongues, Butter, Cheese, Potatoes, Sago, Sago-Powder, Tapioca, Vermicelli, Millet-Seed, Poultry, Fowls, Eggs, Game, and Sour Crout, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Vessel belonging to Persons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of

any Duty whatsoever; provided that a due Entry shall be made of all such Articles as aforesaid, that shall be so imported, with the proper Officers of the Customs at the Port where the same shall be imported, under the Penalties and Forfeitures mentioned and referred to in the said above-recited Act.—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS, in virtue of the Powers vested in His Majesty by an Act, passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act for permitting, until the Fifth Day of May One thousand eight hundred and five, the Importation of Hides, Calf-Skins, Horns, Tallow, and Wool (except Cotton Wool), in Foreign Ships, on Payment of the like Duties, as if imported in British or Irish Ships;" His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council, bearing Date the Twenty-third Day of April last, to permit, for the Space of Three Months from the Date of the said Order, the Importation in Foreign Ships of any Hides, Pieces of Hides, dressed or undressed, Calf-Skins, or Pieces of Calf-Skins, dressed or undressed, Horns, or Pieces of Horns, Tallow, and Wool (except Cotton Wool), on the Duties specified in the said Order; And whereas it is judged expedient that the said Permission should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty is thereupon pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to allow, and doth hereby allow, for and during the Space of Three Months, to commence from the Twenty-third Day of this instant July, the Importation of any Hides, Pieces of Hides, dressed or undressed, Calf-Skins, or Pieces of Calf-Skins, dressed or undressed, Horns, or Pieces of Horns, Tallow, and Wool (except Cotton Wool), in any Foreign Ship or Vessel; and that on the Arrival at any Port of the United Kingdom of any Foreign Ship or Vessel with any of the Articles

above-mentioned, the said Goods shall be admitted to Entry on Payment of the same Duties of Customs and Excise as are due and payable on the like Goods when imported in any British or Irish-built Ship or Vessel.—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

An Act to regulate the Importation and Exportation of Corn, and the Bounties and Duties payable thereon.

An Act for the Relief of certain Insolvent Debtors.

Westminster, July 31, 1804.

THIS Day His Majesty came to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes, seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers; the Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to give the Royal Assent to

An Act for granting to His Majesty a certain Sum of Money out of the Consolidated Fund of Great Britain; and for applying a certain Sum of Money therein-mentioned for the Service of Great Britain for the Year One thousand eight hundred and four; and for further appropriating the Supplies granted in this Session of Parliament.

After which His Majesty was pleased to make the following most gracious Speech:

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

BEFORE I put an End to the present Session of Parliament, I am desirous of expressing My entire Approbation of the Zeal and Assiduity with which you have applied yourselves to the great Objects of public Concern which have come under your Consideration.

You have wisely continued to direct your Attention to the Encouragement and Improvement of that respectable and powerful Volunteer Force which the Ardour and Spirit of My Subjects has enabled Me to establish to an Extent hitherto unexampled: You have at the same Time endeavoured to combine an additional Establishment for Our domestic Defence, with the Means of augmenting Our Regular Army, and of maintaining it on such a

Scale as may be proportioned to the Circumstances of the Times, and to the Rank which this Country ought ever to hold among the Powers of Europe.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

You are entitled to My warmest Acknowledgments for the fresh Proof which you have given Me of your constant and affectionate Attachment to My Person and Family, and your Regard to the Honor and Dignity of My Crown, by the liberal Provision which you have made for the Payment of the Debt on My Civil List Revenues, and for furnishing Me with the additional Means of defraying the Increase which has unavoidably taken place in different Branches of My Expenditure.

I must also return you My warmest Thanks for the extensive Provision which you have made for the Exigencies of the public Service; and especially for the just and prudent Attention which you have shewn to true Economy, and to the permanent Credit and Welfare of the Country, by the great Exertions you have made for preventing, as far as possible, the Accumulation of Debt, and for raising so large a Proportion of the Expences of the War within the Year.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

I have now only to recommend to you to carry into your respective Counties the same Zeal for the public Interest which has guided all your Proceedings. It will be your particular Duty to inculcate on the Minds of all Classes of My Subjects, that the Preservation of all that is most dear to them requires the Continuance of their unremitting Exertions for the National Defence.

The Preparations which the Enemy has long been forming for the declared Purpose of invading this Kingdom are daily augmented, and the Attempt appears to have been delayed only with the View of procuring additional Means for carrying it into Execution.

Relying on the Skill, Valour, and Discipline of my Naval and Military Force, aided by the voluntary Zeal and Native Courage of My People, I look with Confidence to the Issue of this great Conflict; and I doubt not that it will terminate, under the Blessing of Providence, not only in repelling the Danger of the Moment, but in establishing, in the Eyes of Foreign Nations, the Security of this Country on a Basis never to be shaken.

In addition to this first and great Object, I entertain the animating Hope that the Benefits to be derived from Our successful Exertions will not be confined within Ourselves; but that, by their Example and their Consequences, they may lead to the Re-establishment of such a System in Europe as may rescue it from the precarious State to which it is reduced; and may finally raise an effectual Barrier against the unbounded Schemes of Aggrandizement and Ambition which threaten every independent Nation that yet remains on the Continent.

Then the Lord Chancellor, by His Majesty's Command, said,

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

IT is His Majesty's Royal Will and Pleasure, that this Parliament be prorogued to Tuesday the Fourth Day of September next, to be then here holden; and this Parliament is accordingly prorogued to Tuesday the Fourth Day of September next.

SIR,

ENCLOSED is an Extract of a Letter from Captain Columbine, of His Majesty's Ship Ulysses, giving an Account of his capturing a small Privateer.

Extract of a Letter from Captain Columbine, of His Majesty's Ship Ulysses, to Commodore Hood, dated May 7, 1804.

ON the 30th of April we fell in with, off the Bocas, and captured, after a few Hours Chase, Le-Petit Decidé, a French Lugger Privateer, J. Bideau, Master, with One long Brass Four-Pounder and Twenty-six Men; quite new, had been a Fort-night from Guadaloupe, but had taken nothing.

As several Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, have, from Time to Time, gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms, the following Abstracts of Acts of Parliament of Their late Majesties King George the First and Second, and of His present Majesty, for preventing such Practices, are published, for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to them: And it will be observed, that such Penalties likewise extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these



Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.

IF any Person shall contract with, entice, or solicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof, upon Indictment or Information in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Assizes or Quarter Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Person having been once convicted shall offend again, he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being such Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Majesty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the said Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any such Foreign Country, exercising any of the said Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister, or Consul of Great Britain, in the Country where such Artificers shall be, or by any Person authorized by such Ambassador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from henceforth inhabit within this Realm; such Persons shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, or of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devise, or Purchase, and shall forfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majesty's Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majesty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made, upon Oath, before any Justice of Peace, that any Person is endeavouring to seduce any such Artificer, or that any such Artificer hath contracted or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's Dominions, for the Purposes aforesaid, such Justice may send his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or before some other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of One Witness, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the said Offences, such Justice may bind him to appear at the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions: And if such Person shall refuse to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Gaol till the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions, and until he shall be delivered by due Course of Law. And if any such Artificer shall be convicted, upon Indictment, of any such Promise, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas, for the Purpose aforesaid, he shall give such Security to the King not to depart out of His Majesty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till Security given.

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland, the same shall be prosecuted in the Court of Judicatory or the Circuits there.

Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.

IF any Person shall contract with, or endeavour to seduce any Artificer in Wool, Mohair, Cotton, or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brass, or other

Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland into any Foreign Country not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted, upon Indictment or Information, in the Kings Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein such Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Judicatory or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such Offence be committed in Ireland; the Person so convicted shall, for every Artificer contracted with or seduced, forfeit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Forfeiture be paid: And in case of a subsequent Offence of the same Kind, the Persons so again offending shall forfeit, for every Person contracted with or seduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until such Forfeiture be paid.

If any Person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on board any Ship or Boat, not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any such Tools or Utensils as are commonly used in, or proper for the Preparing, Working up, or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manufactures, or any Part of such Tools, he shall, for every Offence, forfeit all such Tools, or Parts thereof, put on board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Session in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin respectively, wherein no Effoin, &c. shall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to seize and secure, in some of His Majesty's Warehouses, all such Tools or Utensils prohibited to be exported, as such Officer shall find on board any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools so seized shall, after Condemnation, be publicly sold to the best Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall seize and secure the same.

If the Captain of any Vessel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the said Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on board his Vessel, he shall, for every such Offence, forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inflicted upon Persons exporting the Tools; and, if the Vessel belongs to His Majesty, the Captain shall not only forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, but shall also forfeit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employment under His Majesty.

If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain

or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly suffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or sign any Cocket or Sufferance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the said Tools, or knowingly suffer the same to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS; to be recovered as aforesaid, and also forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office under His Majesty.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the same.

Statutes 14, 21, 25, and 26 of His present Majesty.

BY these Statutes the like Penalties and Forfeitures as above-mentioned are extended to Persons packing or putting on board any Vessel, not bound directly for some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, any Machine, Engine, Tool, Press, Paper, Utensil, or Implement whatsoever, used in or proper for the working or finishing of the Cotton, Steel, or Iron Manufactures of this Kingdom, or any Part or Parts of such Machines or Implements, or any Models or Plans thereof; and all Captains of Ships and other Persons receiving or being in Possession of any such Articles, with an Intent to export the same to Foreign Parts, and all Custom-house Officers suffering an Entry to be made thereof, are respectively liable to the like Penalties as are above-mentioned, in the case of Tools and Utensils used in the Woollen and Silk Manufactures.
