. Copy of a Letter from Vice Admiral Rainier, late Commander in Chief of His Majefly's Ships and Veffels in the Eafl Indies, to William Marfden, Efq; dated Trident, Madras-Road, March 9, 1805.

SĮR, FEEL the higheft Gratification in having the Pleafure to enclose, for their Lordships' Information, Copy of a Letter I have very recently received from Captain Henry Lambert, of His Majefty's Ship St. Fiorenzo, containing the Particulars of his Succels in taking the French National Frigate La Pfyché, Captain J. Bergeret, preceded by a very ac-"tive Pursuit. The Lols of Men on both Sides is great, but, as ufually, much more fo on board the Enemy. It adds much to the Honor and Credit of Captain Lambert, his Officers and Crew, that the Character of Captain Bergeret stands high in the French Navy, being the fame Officer who command-· ed La Virginie, when captured by Sir Edward Pellew in the Indefatigable, to which may be added the Fincreafed Annoyance fustained by the St. Fiorenzo, from the great Support given the French Frigate by L'Equivoque Armed Ship. But I cannot help expressing myself much pleafed with the animated and spirited Resolution taken by Captain Lambert, for renewing the Attack, which was only prevented by Victory, as Attempts of that Kind have been .generally found to be fuccelsful, evincing the fupe--rior Valour of British Sailors, and exhibiting a most laudable Example for Imitation to the Service in ge-All the Trading Part of His Majefty's Subneral. jects throughout India rejoice on the Occasion of this Capture, as being more apprehensive of Depredations on their Trade from Captain Bergeret's Abilities and Activity, than from the whole remaining Force of the French Navy at prelent in these Seas united.

St. Fiorenzo, Kedgeree, Feb. 17, 1805. SIR, HAVE the Honor to inform you of my Arrival this Day off the Sand Heads, after having pro-ceeded to the Southward, in confequence of a Letter sreceived the 8th Inftant from the Chief Secretary of "Government, acquainting me of a suspicious Veffel having appeared off Vizagapatam, fuppoled to be -the National Frigate Plyche, and requelling, in the Name of his Excellency the Governor-General in Council, that I would either proceed towards that Place, or otherwife, as I might confider most ex-pedient to the Advantage of the public Service; I therefore thought that I should not be exceeding the Limits of your Orders by purfuing fuch a Courle as I conceived molt probable of intercepting the faid Veffel, should she be bound to the Northward and Eastward.

On the 13th Instant, at Six A. M., in Latitude 19 Deg. 35 Min. N., Lougitude 85 Deg. 25 Min. E., I had the Satisfaction to discover Three Sail at Anchor under the Land, who shortly after weighed and made Sail to the Southward ; I plainly obferved that one was a Frigate, and the other Two apparently Merchant Ships. 1 continued the Chafe until Half-paft Seven P. M. the following Day, when coming up with the flernmost Veffel, the proved to be the Thetis, Country Ship, Prize

to the French Frigate La Plyché, of Thirty-fix Guns, and Two Hundred and Forty Menunder the Command of Captain Bergeret, then a-head at a short Distance. Finding the Enemy had abandoned the Thetis, I left a Midshipman ia Charge, and continued the Chace-after the Frigate, then making off under all Sail. At Ten Minutes paft Eight commenced close Action, at the Diftance of about Half a Cable's Length, and continued fo until Half-patt Eleven, at which Time, finding all our running Rigging very much cut up, hauled off to repair the fame. At Midnight, bore up to renew the Conflict; but, juft as we were about to recommence our Fire, an Officer from the Enemy came on board to inform me Captain Bergeret, from Humanity's Sake for the remaining Survivors, had Bruck, though he might have borne the Contest longer. During the Action we were occasionally annoyed by the Fire of L'Equivoque Privateer, of Ten Guns and Forty Men, commanded by a Lieutenant. She proved to be the late Pidgeon Country Ship, fitted out by Captain Bergeret as a Privateer ; which Vef-(el, from failing very well, I am concerned to acquaint you, effected her Escape in the Course of the Night.

I beg Leave to observe, from the able Support which I received during the Action from Lieute-nants Doyle, Dawfon, Collier, and Davies; Mr. Findlayson the Master, and Lieutenant Ashmore, of the Marines, as well as the Reft of the Ship's Company, who displayed the most gallant and spirited Conduct on the Occasion, merit my warmest Encomiums. I also feel it a Duty incumbent off me to recommend Mr. Doyle, my First Lieutenant, to your Attention, from his meritorious and exemplary Behaviour throughout the Contest. I am grieved to relate that Licutenant Dawfon is dangeroufly wounded in the Breaft with a Boarding Pike while in the Act of boarding.
