The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twenty-first Day of November last, for prohibiting the Exportation out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the Sixth Day of June next: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever, (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service,) do at any Time, during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said Sixth Day of June next, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt-Petre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Salt-Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or

"Ammunition:"—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the rest of the principal Officers of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS during the Interval which has elapsed since His Majesty found himself compelled, by the hostile Measures of His Majesty the King of Prussia, to lay an Embargo on the Ships and Goods belonging to His Subjects, and to Places under His Controul, such hostile Measures have not been discontinued: And whereas the Town of Papenburgh cannot but be considered as dependent on, and under the absolute Controul of Prussia; His Majesty therefore is pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that General Reprisals be granted against the Ships, Goods, and Subjects of the King of Prussia, and of the Town of Papenburgh, (save and except any Ships to which His Majesty's Licence has been granted, or which have been directed to be released from the Embargo,) so that as well His Majesty's Fleets and Ships, as also all other Ships and Vessels that shall be commissioned by Letters of Marque or General Reprisals, or otherwise, by His Majesty's Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, shall and may lawfully seize all Ships, Vessels, and Goods belonging to the King of Prussia, or His Subjects, or others inhabiting within the Territories of the King of Prussia, or belonging to the Town of Papenburgh, (except as aforesaid,) and bring the same to Judgment in any of the Courts of Admiralty within His Majesty's Dominions; and to that

And, His Majesty's Advocate-General, with the Advocate of the Admiralty, are forthwith to prepare the Draft of a Commission, and present the same to His Majesty at this Board, authorising the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral, or any Person or Persons by them empowered and appointed to issue forth and grant Letters of Marque and Reprisals to any of His Majesty's Subjects, or others, whom the said Commissioners shall deem fitly qualified in that Behalf, for the apprehending, seizing, and taking the Ships, Vessels, and Goods belonging to Prussia, and the Vassals and Subjects of the King of Prussia, or any inhabiting within His Countries, Territories, or Dominions, or belonging to the Town of Papenburg (except as aforesaid); and that such Powers and Clauses be inserted in the said Commission as have been usual, and are according to former Precedents; and His Majesty's Advocate-General, with the Advocate of the Admiralty, are also forthwith to prepare the Draft of a Commission, and present the same to His Majesty at this Board, authorising the said Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral, to will and require the High Court of Admiralty of Great Britain, and the Lieutenant and Judge of the said Court, His Surrogate or Surrogates, as also the several Courts of Admiralty within His Majesty's Dominions, to take Cognizance of, and proceed upon all and all Manner of Captures, Seizures, Prizes, and Reprisals of all Ships and Goods that are, or shall be taken, and to hear and determine the same, and according to the Court of Admiralty and the Laws of Nations to adjudge and condemn all such Ships, Vessels, and Goods as shall belong to Prussia, or the Vassals and Subjects of the King of Prussia, or to any others inhabiting within any of His Countries, Territories, and Dominions, or as shall belong to the Town of Papenburg, (except as aforesaid); and that such Powers and Clauses be inserted in the said Commission as have been usual, and are according to former Precedents; and they are likewise to prepare and lay before His Majesty at this Board, a Draft of such Instructions as may be proper to be sent to the Courts of Admiralty in His Majesty's Foreign Governments and Plantations for their Guidance herein; as also another Draft of Instructions for such Ships as shall be commissioned for the Purposes above-mentioned.

HIS Majesty having taken into Consideration the present State of Hamburgh and Oldenburgh, and the Circumstances under which several Vessels belonging to Bremen and Papenburg, have arrived in the Ports of the United Kingdom, is pleased, by

and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, That the Embargo now subsisting upon all Ships and Vessels belonging to Hamburgh and Oldenburgh, be taken off: And it is hereby further ordered, That the Embargo be also taken off those Vessels belonging to the Towns of Bremen and Papenburg, which had cleared out for Ports of the United Kingdom previous to the Prussian Notification, dated Twenty eighth of March last, whereby British Ships were excluded from the Ports of the Prussian Dominions, and from certain other Ports in the North of Europe; and that the said Ships and Vessels, with their Cargoes, not being Prussian, or Enemies' Property, be permitted to sail to any Port not blockaded: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, and the Judge of the High Court of Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein as may to them respectively appertain. *W. **T**HE following Addresses of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland having been transmitted by Francis Lord Napier, His Majesty's Commissioner, to the Right Honorable the Earl Spencer, One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, have been by him presented to the King; which Addresses His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously:

*May it please your Majesty,*

**T**HE gracious Letter with which your Majesty hath been pleased to honor this General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, was received with the warmest Feelings of Respect and Gratitude.

The renewed Appointment of Lord Napier to represent your Royal Person in this Assembly, is to us, a most gratifying Pledge of your Majesty's firm Attachment to the Christian Religion, and tender Regard for the particular Rights and Privileges of the Church of Scotland;—his well known Zeal in the Cause of revealed Religion, and his long Experience in the Ecclesiastical Affairs of Scotland, teach us to look to him with Confidence and respectful Affection, as the steady Friend of our National Church.

Met, as we now are, in Times of extraordinary Pressure and evident Danger both to Church and State, we feel that our Duties as Pastors of the Church of Scotland, are, in consequence, greatly multiplied, and our Responsibility much increased. Sensible that at no Period of our History have we stood more in need of the Aid and Support of Religion; that at no Time have sound Principles and virtuous Practice been more necessary to our Preservation as a Church and Nation. Entrusted with the Oracles of God, that we may instruct our People and lead them in the Paths of Righteousness; we feel the strength of the Obligations which bind us, in this Hour of Trial, to a conscientious and vigorous Discharge of our pastoral Duty.

Impressed with these Sentiments, and deeply affected with your Majesty's paternal Admonitions,

we do most solemnly pledge ourselves, through the Assistance of Divine Grace, to feed our Flocks with the wholesome Doctrines of the Gospel,—to regulate by the pure Standard of God's holy Word, the Morality which we teach, and so to preach Faith in our Lord Jesus Christ, as that it may become a Motive to Newness of Life. We pledge ourselves especially to lay to heart the Warning, so impressively and seasonably given us by your Majesty, concerning the Attempts which some have lately made to build on other Foundations, vainly relying on false Philosophy and worldly Wisdom. Knowing the Principles of such Men to be as impure in their Source as debasing in their Tendency, we trust that we shall never forget the sacred Duty of keeping the Church of Scotland free from their Stain.

The Approbation which your Majesty is pleased to bestow on our former Labours shall animate our future Exertions to promote the Good of this Church, and the Welfare of the People under our Charge. We pray that the God whom we serve may enable us so to adorn the one by our Life and Doctrine, and so zealously and faithfully to watch over the other, that, by his Blessing on our humble Endeavours, the Happiness and Prosperity of both may be advanced.

We entreat your Majesty to accept our humble Acknowledgments for your Attention to the Advancement of religious Knowledge in the Highlands and Islands of Scotland. Your Royal Donation for this Purpose we shall faithfully endeavour to apply, so as most effectually to promote the Design for which it is bestowed.

That Almighty God, the Father of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, may direct your Majesty's Councils and prosper your Government;—that He may bless our gracious Queen, their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Wales, and all your Royal Family;—that He may long preserve your Majesty to reign over a free, a loyal, and a virtuous People;—and that He may, through Christ, bestow upon you hereafter an eternal Crown, are the Prayers of, May it please your Majesty, your Majesty's most faithful, most obedient, and most loyal Subjects, the Ministers and Elders met in this National Assembly of the Church of Scotland.

*May it please your Majesty,*

**W**E, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Ministers and Elders of the Church of Scotland, met in the General Assembly, beg Leave to approach the Throne of our gracious Sovereign with the unanimous Expression of our affectionate and zealous Attachment to your Person and Government.

The present Circumstances of National Danger unite the Exertions of all your Majesty's faithful Subjects; and the immense Accessions of Strength acquired by our Enemy on the Continent of Europe, although they increase the Difficulties of the arduous Contest in which the Nation is engaged, invigorate in our Breasts every Sentiment of Loyalty and public Spirit. In the whole Course of his unexampled Career, the present Ruler of France has

never obtained any Triumph over Britain; and he has not hitherto been able even to attempt the Execution of his Threats of Invasion. The protecting Arm of Divine Providence has been extended over a Nation which has persevered in opposing its Influence to the wild Progress of inordinate Ambition. A succession of the most brilliant Naval Victories, clouded, alas! by the Death of Lord Viscount Nelson, but illumined by the Glory of many Heroes, who emulate his Fame, has given Security to our Shores, our Colonies, and our Commerce; and the Magnanimity and Patriotism with which all Orders of Men combine their Efforts in maintaining the Independence of Britain, have been rewarded by its remaining, amidst the Wreck of Nations, a great and powerful State, with all its Institutions entire, with its Spirit unbroken, and its Dominions enlarged by the most valuable Conquests.

As Servants of the Prince of Peace, we pray for a Termination of the present Commotions of Europe. But beholding with just Indignation the growing Iniquity of a System, which shakes the Stability of all regular Governments, and reading in the Fate of many States on the Continent an awful Warning against that unwise Policy, which would seek to escape present Danger by grasping at a delusive Peace, inconsistent with the Principles of Justice and Honor, we recognize your Majesty's paternal Care for your People, in calling forth the Resources of this flourishing Country to resist the repeated Aggressions of our Foe. Far from murmuring at the Sacrifices and Burdens which the Duration of the Contest may require, we join the unanimous Voice of our Fellow-Subjects in applauding the Promptitude and Energy of the Measures lately taken for vindicating our just Rights in the North of Europe. And we trust in God, that the Wisdom and Vigour of your Majesty's Councils, the Valour and good Conduct of your Fleets and Armies, and the Firmness, Fortitude, and good Sense of a loyal People, will enable your Majesty to conduct the Operations of a vigorous and successful War to an honorable Conclusion.

Deeply impressed with a Sense of the sacred Duty which, at such a Time as this, the Ministers and Elders of the Church of Scotland owe to their Country, we pledge ourselves to your Majesty that we will continue, in our several Stations, to exert our Influence with Alacrity and Zeal in cherishing those Sentiments of public Spirit which become a People who know the Value of their unrivalled Constitution, and in promoting that Righteousness which exalteth a Nation, which is the best Expression of Gratitude to the God of our Fathers, and the best Encouragement to hope that He will continue to bless our Land.

That Almighty God may give Success to your Majesty's Arms by Sea and Land; that the Means employed for the National Defence may effectually defeat the Designs of our Enemy; that Peace and Truth may meet in our Days; that the Administration of your Majesty's Government may continue to establish your Throne in the Hearts of your Subjects; and that Descendants of your illustrious House, forming themselves upon your Example, may sway the British Sceptre with Justice and Renown to the latest Posterity, are the earnest Prayers of, May it please your Majesty, your Majesty's most dutiful, most faithful, and most obedient Subjects,

*As several Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, have, from Time to Time, gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms, the following Abstracts of Acts of Parliament of Their late Majesties King George the First and Second, and of His present Majesty, for preventing such Practices, are published, for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to them: And it will be observed, that such Penalties likewise extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.*

*Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.*

If any Person shall contract with, entice, or solicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brasses, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries out of the King's Dominions, and shall be convicted thereof, upon Indictment or Information in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Assizes or Quarter Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Person having been once convicted shall offend again, he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being such Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Majesty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the said Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any such Foreign Country, exercising any of the said Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister, or Consul of Great Britain, in the Country where such Artificers shall be, or by any Person authorized by such Ambassador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from henceforth inhabit within this Realm; such Persons shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, or of taking any Lands, &c. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devise, or Purchase, and shall forfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majesty's Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majesty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made, upon Oath, before any



Justice of Peace, that any Person is endeavouring to seduce any such Artificer, or that any such Artificer hath contracted or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's Dominions, for the Purposes aforesaid, such Justice may send his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or before some other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of One Witness, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the said Offences, such Justice may bind him to appear at the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions: And if such Person shall refuse to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Gaol till the next Assizes or Quarter Sessions, and until he shall be delivered by due Course of Law. And if any such Artificer shall be convicted, upon Indictment, of any such Promise, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas, for the Purpose aforesaid, he shall give such Security to the King not to depart out of His Majesty's Dominions, as such Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till Security given.

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland, the same shall be prosecuted in the Court of Justiciary or the Circuits there.

*Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.*

IF any Person shall contract with, or endeavour to seduce any Artificer in Wool, Mohair, Cotton, or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufactures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland into any Foreign Country not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted, upon Indictment or Information, in the Kings Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Assizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c. wherein such Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Justiciary or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such Offence be committed in Ireland; the Person so convicted shall, for every Artificer contracted with or seduced, forfeit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Forfeiture be paid: And in case of a subsequent Offence of the same Kind, the Persons so again offending shall forfeit, for every Person contracted with or seduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein such Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until such Forfeiture be paid.

If any Person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on board any Ship or Boat, not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any such Tools or Utensils as are commonly used in, or proper for the Preparing, Working up, or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manufactures, or any Part of such Tools, he shall, for every Offence, forfeit all such Tools, or Parts thereof, put on board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court

of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Session in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin respectively, wherein no Essoin, &c. shall be allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to seize and secure, in some of His Majesty's Warehouses, all such Tools or Utensils prohibited to be exported, as such Officer shall find on board any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools so seized shall, after Condemnation, be publicly sold to the best Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall seize and secure the same.

If the Captain of any Vessel in Great Britain or Ireland knowingly permit any of the said Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on board his Vessel, he shall, for every such Offence, forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inflicted upon Persons exporting the Tools; and, if the Vessel belongs to His Majesty, the Captain shall not only forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, but shall also forfeit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employment under His Majesty.

If any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain or of the Revenue in Ireland, take, or knowingly suffer to be taken, any Entry outward, or sign any Cocket or Sufferance for the Shipping or Exporting of any of the said Tools, or knowingly suffer the same to be done, he shall forfeit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as aforesaid, and also forfeit his Office, and be incapable of any Office under His Majesty.

One Moiety of the Forfeitures shall be applied to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Use of the Person who shall sue for the same.

*Statutes 14, 21, 25, and 26 of His present Majesty.*

BY these Statutes the like Penalties and Forfeitures as above-mentioned are extended to Persons packing or putting on board any Vessel, not bound directly for some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, any Machine, Engine, Tool, Press, Paper, Utensil, or Implement whatsoever, used in or proper for the working or finishing of the Cotton, Steel, or Iron Manufactures of this Kingdom, or any Part or Parts of such Machines or Implements, or any Models or Plans thereof; and all Captains of Ships and other Persons receiving or being in Possession of any such Articles, with an Intent to export the same to Foreign Parts, and all Custom-house Officers suffering an Entry to be made thereof, are respectively liable to the like Penalties as are above-mentioned, in the case of Tools and Utensils used in the Woollen and Silk Manufactures.
