HIS Day the Lords being met, a Message was fent to the Honorable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that The Lords, authorifed by virtue of His Majesty's Commission for declaring His Royal Affent to several Alls agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of the Honorable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the faid Commission, empowering the Lord Arch-bishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and feveral other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Affent to the faid Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Affent given to

An Act for railing the Sum of Fourteen Millions Two Hundred Thousand Pounds, by way of

An Act for granting to His Majesty, until Twelve Months after the Ratification of a Definitive Treaty of Peace, certain Additional Duties of Excise on Brandy in Great Britain.

An Act to grant to His Majesty certain Inland Duties of Excise and Taxes in Ireland, and to allow certain Drawbacks in respect thereof, in lieu of former Duties of Excise Taxes and Drawbacks,

An Act to provide for regulating and fecuring the Collection of certain Rates and Taxes in Ireland, in respect of Dwelling-Houses, Fire-Hearths, Windows, Male-Servants, Horses, Dogs, and Car-

An Act to secure the Collection of the Duties on Auctions in Ireland, and to prevent Frauds

An Act to amend several Acts for the Sale of His Majesty's Quit-Rents, Crown, and other Rents, and of certain Lands forfeited and undisposed of in Ireland.

As several Artificers and Manufadurers, Subjects of Great Britain, have, from Time to Time, gone into Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms, the following Abstracts of Ads of Parliament of Their late Majesties King George the First and Second, and of His present Majesty, for preventing such Practices, are published, for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penalties they may incur by Disobedience to them: And it will be observed,

that fuch Penalties likewise extend to those who are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Sending or Enticing Artificers or Manufasturers out of these Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manusasturers themselves.

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27.

If any Person shall contract with, entice, or solicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer of Great Britain, to go into Foreign Countries out of the King's Dominious, and shall be convicted thereof, upon Indictment or Information in any of the Courts at Westminster, or at the Assizes or Quarter Sessions, he shall be fined any Sum not exceeding ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for the first Offence, and shall be imprisoned Three Months, and till the Fine be paid. And if any Person having been once convicted shall offend again, he shall be fined at the Discretion of the Court, and imprisoned Twelve Months, and till the Fine be paid.

If any of the King's Subjects, being such Artificers, shall go into any Country out of His Majesty's Dominions, to exercise or teach the said Trades to Foreigners; and if any of the King's Subjects in any such Foreign Country, exercising any of the said Trades, shall not return into this Realm within Six Months after Warning given by the Ambassador, Minister, or Consul of Great Britain, in the Country where such Artificers shall be, or by any Person authorised by such Ambassador, &c. or by one of the Secretaries of State, and from heuceforth inhabit within this Realm; such Persons shall be incapable of taking any Legacy, or of being an Executor or Administrator, or of taking any Lands, &e. within this Kingdom, by Descent, Devise, or Purchase, and shall forfeit all Lands, Goods, &c. within this Kingdom, to His Majesty's Use, and shall be deemed Alien, and out of His Majesty's Protection.

Upon Complaint made, upon Oath, before any Justice of Peace, that any Person is endeavouring to seduce any such Artificer, or that any such Artificer hath contracted or is preparing to go out of His Majesty's Dominions, for the Purposes afore-said, such Justice may fend his Warrant to bring the Person complained of before him, or before fome other Justice; and if it shall appear by the Oath of One Witness, or by Confession, that he was guilty of any of the faid Offences, such Justice may bind him to appear at the next Affizes or Quarter Seffions: And if such Person shall refuse to give Security, the Justice may commit him to Gaol till the next Affizes or Quarter Seffions, and until he shall be delivered by due Course of Law. And if any fuch Artificer shall be convicted, upon Indictment, of any fuch Promife, Contract, or Preparation to go beyond the Seas, for the Purpose aforefaid, he shall give fuch Security to the King not to depart out of His Majefty's Dominions, as fuch Court shall think reasonable, and shall be imprisoned till Security given.

If any of the above Offences shall be committed in Scotland, the same shall be prosecuted in the Court of Justiciary or the Circuits there.

Statute 23 George II. Chap. 13.

IF any Person thall-contract with, or endeavour to feduce any Artificer in Wool, Mohair, Cot-

ton, or Silk, or in Iron, Steel, Brass, or other Metal, or any Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other Artificer in any other of the Manufac-tures of Great Britain or Ireland, to go out of this Kingdom or Ireland into any Foreign Country not within the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, and shall be convicted, upon Indictment or Information, in the King's Bench at Westminster, or by Indictment at the Affizes or General Gaol Delivery for the County, &c., wherein such Offence shall be committed in England, or by Indictment in the Court of Jufficiary or any of the Circuit Courts in Scotland, or by Indictment or Information in the King's Bench at Dublin, if such Offence be committed in Ireland; the Person so convicted shall, for every Artislicer contracted with or seduced, forfeit FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, and shall suffer Impriforment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein fuch Offender shall be convicted. for Twelve Calendar Months, and until Forfeiture be paid: And in case of a subsequent Offence of the fame Kind, the Perfons fo again offending shall forfeit, for every Perfon contracted with or seduced, ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, and shall suffer Imprisonment in the Common Gaol of the County or Stewartry wherein fuch Offender shall be convicted, for Two Years, and until such Forfeiture be paid.

If any Person in Great Britain or Ireland shall put on board any Ship or Boat, not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain, any such Tools or Utensils as are commonly used in, or proper for the Preparing, Working up, or Finishing of the Woollen or Silk Manufactures, or any Part of such Tools, he shall, for every Oftence, forseit all such Tools, or Parts thereof, put on board, and TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered by Action of Debt, &c. in any Court of Record at Westminster, or in the Court of Session in Scotland, or at any of the Four Courts in Dublin respectively, wherein no Essoin, &c. shall be

allowed.

It shall be lawful for any Officer of the Customs in Great Britain, or for any Officer of the Revenue in Ireland, to seize and secure, in some of His Majesty's Warehouses, all such Tools or Utensils prohibited to be exported, as such Officer shall find on board any Vessel not bound directly to some Port in Great Britain or Ireland, or to some other of the Dominions of the Crown of Great Britain; and all Tools so seized shall, after Condemnation, be publicly sold to the best Bidder; and one Moiety of the Produce shall be to the Use of His Majesty, and the other Moiety to the Officer who shall seize and secure the same.

If the Captain of any Vessel in Great Britain of Ireland knowingly permit any of the said Tools, prohibited to be exported, to be put on board his Vessel, he shall, for every such Ossence, forset ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be recovered as the Penalties inflicted upon Persons exporting the Tools; and, if the Vessel belongs to His Majesty, the Captain shall not only forseit ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, but shall also forseit his Employment, and be incapable of any Employment under His Majesty.

Statutes 14, 21, 25, and 26 of His present Majesty.

BY these Statutes the like Penalties and Forfeitures as above-mentioned are extended to Perfons packing or putting on board any Veffel, not bound directly for fome Port in Great Britain or Ireland, any Machine, Engine, Tool, Prefs, Paper, Utenfil, or Implement whatfoever, used in or proper for the working or finishing of the Cotton, Steel, or Iron Manufactures of this Kingdom, or any Part or Parts of fuch Machines or Implements, or any Models or Plans thereof; and all Captains of Ships and other Persons receiving or being in Possession of any fuch Articles, with an Intent to export the fame to Foreign Farts, and all Custom-house Officers fuffering an Entry to be made thereof, are respectively liable to the like Penalties as are above-mentioned, in the cafe of Tools and Utenfils used in the Woollen and Silk Manufactures.

W Hereas it hath been bumbly represented to His Majefly, that on the Evening of the 8th Inflant, a very numerous Mob affembled in the Town of Dover for the Purpose of rescuing from the Custody of the Peace Officers several Smugglers, who stood charged with Fe-long; and that although Proclamation was made by the Mayor of the faid Town for the Perfons affembled to disperse themselves, and peaceably depart to their Habitations, or to their lawful Bufiness, upon the Pains contained in the All made in the First Year of the Reign of King George the First, for preventing Tumults and Riotous Assemblies, yet the said Mob, consisting of several Hundred Persons, did not disperse till the Arrival of a large Party of Cavalry and Insantry, about Two Hours after the faid Proclamation, and Jucceeded in refcuing Three of the faid Smugglers, and severely offaulted an Officer and a Private of the Shropsbire Militia, and an Officer of the Royal Miners;
