Decasion, to maintain unimpaired the Rights and Privileges of the Reformed Protestant Church established in our happy Land, and to resist any Attempt to raise the Members of the Romish Church to an equal Share of civil Privileges with their Protestant Fellow-subjects, or to such a Measure of Power or Authority as might eventually overturn the Protestant Ascendancy in the State.

That it may please Almighty God, the great King and Head of his Church, by whom Kings reign and Princes decree Justice, to prolong your Majesty's Reign upon Earth, as a Blessing to these highly favoured Lands, and afterwards to promote you to his heavenly Kingdom, is the servent Prayer of, may it please your Majesty, your Majesty's most loyal and faithful Subjects, the Ministers and Elders of the Synod of Ross, met in Synod.
