HEREAS by Order in Council, bearing Date the Eleventh of June, One thousand eight hundred and fix, His Majesty was pleased, among other Things contained in the faid Order, to declare it to be His Pleasure that no Goods, Wares, or Merchandize which should be imported into the Settlement of the Cape of Good Hope, or the Territories or Dependencies thereof, from any Part of His Majesty's Dominions, should be subject to any Duty; His Majesty having taken into His Royal Confideration the present State of the Trade, Commerce, and Revenues of the faid Settlement, and the Territories and Dependencies thereof, is hereby pleafed, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to revoke, and doth hereby revoke, fo much of the faid Order of the Eleventh of June, One thou-fand eight hundred and fix, as exempts from Duty any Goods, Wares, or Merchandize which shall, after due Notice to be given by the Governor of the faid Settlement, as hereinafter directed, be imported into the faid Settlement, or the Territories or Dependencies thereof, except Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes of the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of Great Britain or Ireland, and so much of the faid Order shall, from and after such due Notice, cease and determine: And His Majesty is further pleased to declare, and it is hereby declared, that it shall and may be lawful for the Governor of the faid Settlement, and of the Territories and Dependencies thereof, for the Time being, to impose on all Goods, Wares, and Merchandize not of the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of Great Britain or Ireland, which shall be imported into the faid Settlement, or the Territories or Dependencies thereof, from any Part of His Majesty's Dominions after such due Notice, a Duty not exceeding Fifteen per Cent. on the Value thereof, such Duty to be rated and collected in the fame Manner as is in Use with Regard to the Import Duty now levied at the faid Settlement, and the Territories and Dependencies thereof, from and in Ships and Vessels belonging to the Subjects of Countries and States in Amity with His Majesty, and upon the Goods and Merchandize imported in the same; provided always, that the

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Time of the Commencement of fuch Duty shall be 1 the Seventh Year of His present Majesty, for the fixed in the Proclamation, or other lawful Inftrument, which shall be made and issued by the said Governor for the Purpose of imposing such Duty, which Time shall not be less than Six Months from the Day of iffuing such Proclamation or other lawful Instrument : And provided also, that the Rate of Duty imposed on the Importation of Goods (not the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of Great Britain or Ireland) from any Part of His Majesty's Dominions, when so imported in British-built Veffels, owned and navigated according to Law, shall in no Case be so high as that which shall be imposed on the like Goods to imported in the Vessels of Foreign States.
