HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twenty-fourth Day of May last, for prohibiting the Exportation out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwife, Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the Sixth Day of December next: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the faid Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whatloever, (except the Matter-General of the Ord-nance for His Majesty's Service,) do at any Time, during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the faid Sixth Day of December next, prefume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on board any Ship or Vessel, in order | read by John Silvester, Esquire, the Recorder.

Seas, or carrying the same Coallwise, without Leave or Permillion in that Behalf first obtained from His Majetty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of Incurring and fuffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act, passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled "An "Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the " Exportation of Salt-Petre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition; and also to empower " His Majelty to restrain the carrying Coastwife of "Salt-Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or "Ammunition:"—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Committoners of the Majetty's Treatury, the Committoners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the principal Officers of the Ordnance, and His Majetty's Secretary at War, are to give the nocellary Directions herein, as to them may respectively apparation. tively appertain.
