His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, as Sovereign of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, has been pleased, by a commission of this date, under the Great Seal of the Order, to constitute and appoint His Excellency George Earl of Aberdeen, K. T. His Majesty's Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to the Emperor of Austria, Sir Isaac Heard, Knight, Garter Principal King of Arms, and Sir Thomas Tyrwhitt, Knight, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, to be the Sovereign's Plenipotentiaries for investing His Imperial and Royal Apostolic Majesty with the ensigns and the whole habit of the Most Noble Order of the Garter.

His Royal Highness has also been pleased to approve that George Frederick Beltz, Esq. Secretary to Garter Principal King of Arms, be the Secretary to the said Commission.

*Extract of a Letter from Captain Malcolm, of His Majesty's Ship Rhin, to Rear-Admiral Brown, Commander in Chief at Jamaica, dated in the Mona-Passage, the 5th June, 1814, and transmitted by the Rear-Admiral to John Wilson Croker, Esq.*

I HAVE much pleasure in informing you, that at half past two A. M. Cape Enganno in the Mona-Passage, bearing S. W. by W. four leagues, I captured, after an anxious and close chase of eleven hours, the American privateer schooner Decatur, commanded by Captain Dominique Dirou

the same who commanded her last year when she took His Majesty's schooner *Dominica*, Captain Barette; she sailed from Charleston on the 30th March, and had made no capture.

The Decatur is a beautiful vessel, and was only launched in April 1813, coppered and copper-fastened, two hundred and twenty-three tons; she is well calculated in every respect for His Majesty's service.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent hath been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to give and grant unto James Powell Mounsey, of Charlotte-Street, Bedford-Square, in the county of Middlesex, Esq. His Royal licence and authority, that, from and immediately after his intended marriage with Anne Cranmer, of Queen-don-Hall, in the county of Essex, spinster, he may take and use the surname of Cranmer only, instead of that of Mounsey, and also bear and use the armorial ensigns of Cranmer and Mounsey quarterly; and that such surname and armorial ensigns may be borne and used by the issue of the said intended marriage, according to the laws of arms; such arms being first duly exemplified according to the laws of arms, and recorded in the Heralds' Office, otherwise the said royal licence and permission to be void and of none effect:

And also to command, that this His royal concession and declaration be registered in His Majesty's College of Arms.

WHEREAS it hath been humbly represented unto His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, that the following depredations have lately been committed in Scotland, viz.
