AT the Court at Brighton, the 30th day of December 1817,

PRESENT,

His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the twenty-eighth year of the reign of His present Majesty, entitled "An Act for regulating the trade between the subjects of His Majesty's colonies and plantations in North America and in the West India Islands and the countries belonging to the United States of America, and between His Majesty's said subjects and the

"Foreign Islands in the West Indies," it is, amongst other things, enacted, that it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty in Council, by Order or Orders to be issued and published from time to time, to authorise, or by Warrant or Warrants under His sign manual, to empower the Governor of Newfoundland for the time being, to authorise, in case of necessity, the importation into Newfoundland of bread, flour, Indian corn, and live stock, from any of the territories belonging to the said United States, for the supply of the inhabitants and fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the then ensuing season only; provided always, that such bread, flour, Indian corn, and live stock, so authorised to be imported into the Island of Newfoundland, shall not be imported except in conformity to such rules, regulations, and restrictions as shall be specified in such Order or Orders, Warrant or Warrants respectively, and except by British subjects, and in British-built ships, owned by His Majesty's subjects, and navigated according to law:

And whereas it is expedient and necessary, that provision be made for fully supplying the inhabitants and fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the ensuing season, with bread, flour, Indian corn, and live stock, His Royal Highness the Prince Regent doth thereupon, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, hereby order and declare, that for the supply of the inhabitants and fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the ensuing season only, bread, flour, Indian corn, and live stock, may be imported into the said island from any of the territories belonging to the said United States, by British subjects, and in British-built ships, owned by His Majesty's subjects, and navigated according to law, and which within the space of nine months previous to the time of such importation, have cleared out from some port of the United Kingdom of Great Britain or Ireland, or other His Majesty's dominions in Europe, for which purpose a licence shall have been granted by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, or any other person or persons who may be duly authorised in that kingdom respectively, in the manner and form herein-after mentioned; which licence shall continue and be in force for nine calendar months from the day of the date upon which such licence is respectively granted, and no longer; provided that no such licence as aforesaid, granted after the thirtieth day of September next, shall be of any force or effect: and His Royal Highness is hereby further pleased to order, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, and by and with the advice of His Majesty's Privy Council, that the master or person having the charge or command of any ship or vessel to whom such licence shall be granted, shall, upon the arrival of the said ship or vessel at the port, harbour, or place in the said Island of Newfoundland where he shall discharge such bread, flour, Indian corn, and live stock, deliver up the said licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs there, having first indorsed on the back of such licence the marks, numbers, and contents of

each package of bread, flour, Indian corn, and the number of live stock, under the penalty of the forfeiture in the said Act mentioned; and the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs at Newfoundland, is hereby enjoined and required to give a certificate to the master or person having the charge or command of such ship or vessel, of his having received the said licence so indorsed as before directed, and to transmit the same to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland respectively, by whom such licence was granted. *Chetwynd.*

FORM OF LICENCE.

By the Commissioners for managing and causing to be levied and collected His Majesty's Customs, Subsidies, and other Duties in [where]:

WHEREAS [the name of the person] one of His Majesty's subjects, residing at [place where] hath given notice to us the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs [in Great Britain, or Revenue in Ireland] that he intends to lade at [some port of the United States of America] and import into [some port of Newfoundland] in the [ship's name] being a British-built ship [describing the tonnage and what sort of vessel] navigated according to law, whereof [master's name] is master, bound to [where]; and it appearing by the register of the said ship [ship's name] whereof [master's name] is master, that the said ship, the [ship's name] was built at [place where] and owned by [owner's name] residing at [place where] all His Majesty's British subjects, and that no foreigner, directly or indirectly, hath any share, part, or interest therein.

Now be it known, that the said [person's name] hath a licence to lade on-board the said ship, [ship's name] at and from any port or place belonging to the United States of America, bread, flour, Indian corn, or live stock, the produce of the said United States, and no other article whatever; and to carry the said bread, flour, Indian corn, and live stock, to some port or place in the Island of Newfoundland; and on the arrival of the said ship at any port, harbour, or place of discharge in Newfoundland, the master or person having the charge or command of the said ship, is required and enjoined to deliver up the said licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of His Majesty's Customs there, and to indorse on the back thereof the marks, numbers, and contents of each package of bread, flour, Indian corn, and the number of live stock, and shall thereupon receive a certificate thereof from the said Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs.

This licence to continue in force for calendar months from the date hereof.

The Mayor, Sheriffs, Burgesses, and Commons of the County of the Town of Drogheda, in General Assembly convened.

Most illustrious Prince,

WITH the deepest sense of disappointment and affliction for what we have lost, and some painful forebodings of what may follow, we venture to intrude upon your sorrows with, alas! a vain shadow of consolation. You have felt the sharpest pang which the heart of man can feel; the moral and social world has received a wound to which the peculiar favour of Heaven alone can afford a cure; for a virtuous and accomplished wife has been snatched away, a pattern of all the amiable virtues, placed on the highest pinnacle of earthly grandeur, and diffusing the example of piety and conjugal affection through the widest circle, has been removed. Whilst the hopes of the nation, founded on the prospect of a succession of Sovereigns, inheriting with the virtues of the House of Brunswick the qualities of the Saxon Line, to which the enlightened world already owes so much, and which your exalted virtues promised to transmit to remote posterity, are lost for ever. We cannot, Sir, be silent, while every voice in the empire echoes the lamentations of the surviving family of this most beloved and invaluable Princess. But we can only

fament to the God of Mercy, and to Him alone we must look for an alleviation of our regrets, and of your sufferings, in His good appointed time; and we humbly beseech His Divine Majesty, that He will be pleased to bestow on your future years, such portion of His blessings and favours as may bear a proportion to the weight of this visitation with which His wisdom has thought fit to afflict your early life.

Carlton-House, February 12, 1818.

This day His Excellency the Duke de San Carlos, Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary from His Catholic Majesty Ferdinand the Seventh, had an audience of His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, to deliver a letter from His Sovereign, announcing the death of the young Prince the Infanta of Spain: also the Baron de Stjernfeld, Chamberlain to His Majesty the King of Sweden and Norway, having been sent on a special mission to His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, had an audience of leave previous to his return to Sweden: likewise Mr. Rush, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary from the United States of America, and the Count Ludolf, Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary from His Majesty the King of the Two Sicilies, had their first audiences of His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, to deliver their credentials: to which several audiences they were all respectively introduced by Lord Viscount Castlereagh, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, and conducted by Robert Chester, Esq. Assistant-Master of the Ceremonies.

Carlton-House, February 12, 1818.

This day His Royal Highness the Prince Regent was pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to invest Vice-Admiral Sir William Domett and Major-General Sir John Oswald with the ensigns of a Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Military Order of the Bath.

By command of the Prince Regent, Vice-Admiral Sir William Domett was conducted, with the usual reverences, to His Royal Highness, preceded by Sir George Nayler (the Officer of Arms attendant upon the Knights Commanders), bearing upon a crimson velvet cushion the star, ribband, and badge of the second class of the Order.

The sword of state was thereupon delivered to the Prince Regent by His Royal Highness the Duke of Clarence, Knight Grand Cross of the Order, and Sir William Domett, kneeling, was knighted therewith, after which he had the honour to kiss His Royal Highness's hand.

Then His Royal Highness the Duke of York and of Albany, First and Principal Knight Grand Cross of the Order, having received from the Officer of

Arms the ribband and badge of a Knight Commander, presented them to the Prince Regent, who was pleased to invest Sir William Domett with the same.

The Vice-Admiral having again had the honour to kiss the Prince Regent's hand, and having received from His Royal Highness the star of a Knight Commander, retired.

Major-General Sir John Oswald was then introduced, knighted, and invested, with the same ceremonies.

Whitehall, February 13, 1818.

His Royal Highness the Prince Regent has been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to direct letters patent to be passed under the Great Seal of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, for constituting and appointing Thomas Philip Weddell, Lord Grantham, to be His Majesty's Lieutenant of and in the county of Bedford, in the room of the Earl of Upper Ossory, deceased.
