His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT in Council.

HIS Royal Highness having been pleased, in the name and on the behalf of His Majesty, to appoint Henry Lascelles, Esq. commonly called Viscount Lascelles, to be Lord Lieutenant of the west riding of the county of York, and of the city of York and county of the same, his Lordship this day took the oaths appointed to be taken thereupon, instead of the oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy.

THE following Addresses, having been transmitted to Viscount Sidmouth, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, by the several persons whose names are respectively subjoined to each Address, have been presented by His Lordship to His Royal Highness the Prince Regent, who was pleased to receive the same very graciously:

To His Royal Highness George Prince of Wales, REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

The dutiful and loyal Address of the Lord Provost, Dean of Guild, Bailies, and Town Council of the Ancient Metropolitan City of St. Andrews, in Common Hall assembled.

May it please your Royal Highness,

WE, the Lord Provost, Dean of Guild, Bailies, and Town Council of the City of St. Andrews, consider it our duty, on the present occasion, to approach the Throne with the renewed expression of our firm attachment to our glorious Constitution, and to the sacred Person of His Majesty, and that of your Royal Highness.

We cannot but view with horror the atrocious attempts that have been lately made to overturn both the Government and the Religion of the State; but we trust that the good sense and well-known patriotism which have heretofore overcome every danger, will, through the blessing of Divine Providence, enable the people most effectually to resist the insidious designs of those who would dare to deprive them of their temporal privileges and eternal hopes.

We entreat your Royal Highness to be persuaded that our utmost efforts shall be used for the maintenance of that peace and good order in this district, for which, we are proud to say, it has all along been so eminently distinguished.

And we desire to assure your Royal Highness that we entertain the most perfect confidence that His Majesty's Government, aided by the wisdom of Parliament, will devise the means best calculated for allaying the existing ferment, and for restoring and establishing inviolably the security and liberty of this great empire.

To His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, REGENT of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

WE, the Chancellor, Rector, Principals, and Professors of the University of St. Andrews, at a time when profane attempts are made to bring upon our native land the miseries of anarchy, are anxious to unite with all loyal subjects in presenting to your Royal Highness the expression of our deep-rooted veneration for the British Constitution, and our devoted attachment to His Majesty's Person, Family, and Government.

Happily resident in a district of the kingdom where we are shocked by no such appearances of disaffection, where all classes of His Majesty's subjects have borne inevitable privations with becoming peaceful submission, we yet grieve that in any

part of this favoured country there can be found persons so grossly ignorant and depraved, so insensible or regardless of our civil and ecclesiastical blessings, as to plot the destruction of that admirable system of laws, which with unrivalled wisdom distributes and guards the rights of freemen throughout all the different orders of the State; and to pave the way for this work of ruin by extinguishing in the minds of the people, not only that respect for constituted authorities, but that reverence for the sacred principles of religion and morality, without which regular government and civil society must be dissolved. We are, however, gratified to perceive that the evil, both from its own enormity and the manifest designs of its authors, is now calling forth the resistance by which it will be speedily subdued; serving as the signal for all that is wisest and best, and most powerful within the empire, to rally round the Altar and the Throne; administering to every man a serious warning, as he values whatever is most precious and dear to the human heart, to be in his place and office active in impressing upon the young and ignorant reverence for religious truth and legitimate rule; and thus tending ultimately to strengthen the bulwarks by which, under Divine Providence, the venerable fabric of the British Constitution has been, and we trust will be to the latest ages, preserved inviolate.

May it please your Royal Highness,

WE, His Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the Lower Ward of Lancashire, in Quarter Sessions assembled, impressed with the necessity of assiduously fulfilling the duties of our situation in the present times, when wicked and designing men, taking advantage of the temporary distress of the country, promulgate the most revolutionary doctrines under the specious pretence of reform, and by every means attempt to destroy the religious principles of the people, and their allegiance to His Majesty, are imperiously called upon to address your Royal Highness, and to declare that we shall,

to our utmost power, and by every lawful and constitutional measure, resist all such insidious and infamous attempts.

That we deeply commiserate the distress under which we know so many of our fellow subjects are suffering, and are individually resolved to afford them every alleviation; and although most earnestly desiring at all times to exercise the authority entrusted to us by the laws, in the most conciliatory and temperate manner, we shall still, when these laws are attacked, enforce them with such steadiness and vigour, as effectually to protect the well disposed, and suppress the designs of the lawless and disaffected.

That we are in an especial manner called upon to reprobate the circulation of those blasphemous and seditious publications at present so widely diffused, and that we shall, by every legal means, endeavour to arrest the progress of an evil so obviously detrimental to the best interests of individuals and of society.

That with sentiments of most unalterable attachment to the House of Brunswick, under which we and our ancestors have enjoyed so much civil and religious liberty, we are resolved to transmit the same blessings to our posterity, and to resist every endeavour to supersede them by the introduction of new doctrines, the termination of which, we are well convinced, must be fatal.

Lastly, as guardians of the public peace, feeling as we do the necessity of strenuously opposing that prevalent spirit of disaffection in this large and populous district, and of enforcing that due subordination to lawful authority on which the welfare of all classes depends; we shall, at all hazards to ourselves, and without regard to the clamour or threats of the factious, resolutely persevere in the performance of our duty, the preservation of the public peace, the putting in-execution the laws of the land, and the supporting, as far as in our power, that excellent Constitution under which it is our fortune and our happiness to live.

WE, His Majesty's most loyal subjects, the Noblemen, Gentlemen, and Justices of the Peace, Commissioners of Supply, and Heritors of the County of Roxburgh, feel ourselves called on in the present disturbed state of several districts of the king-

The conduct of these respectable functionaries, for such even the enemies of peace and of good order allow them to be, is to be submitted to the regular tribunals of their country; and we deem it unwarrantable, unfair, and ungenerous, to endeavour to cast an odium on men acting on unprecedented and trying occurrences, to the best of their judgment, during the interval that must necessarily elapse before their case can be investigated, a delay which cannot be imputed to them, but to those persons whose acts called loudly for their interference, and who, availing themselves of the lenity of our laws, have postponed a decision, which it is usually the desire of conscious innocence to accelerate.

Strongly impressed with these sentiments—firmly attached to our King and Constitution, and reposing the most implicit confidence in the paternal care of your Royal Highness and the wisdom of Parliament, to preserve inviolate that Constitution and the liberties it secures to us, we look forward with anxious expectation to the legislature adopting, by a firm and wise controul, the best means to allay or subdue the evil spirit which exists; and while we deeply lament the distresses of the times, and will endeavour to give aid and relief to the unhappy sufferers, we beg leave at the same time to assure your Royal Highness that, collectively and individually, we shall exert our best endeavours to counteract the progress of infidelity and disaffection, and to impress upon the minds of those connected with us, a reverence for and submission to the laws of their country, which have hitherto preserved the liberty, protected the property, and increased the enjoyments of a free and prosperous people.

May it please your Royal Highness,

WE, His Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Noblemen, Freeholders, Justices of the Peace, Magistrates of Towns, Commissioners of Supply, and Heritors of the County of Renfrew, beg leave most respectfully to approach your Royal Highness, and to request you graciously to accept this tribute of our loyalty and duty to your sacred Person, and of our affectionate attachment to your illustrious House, which, from its accession to the Throne of these kingdoms, has so well understood, appreciated, and maintained our invaluable Constitution.

We deeply lament the occasion of our present address to your Royal Highness. The severe, though we trust temporary pressure on the manufacturing classes of this county excites our warmest sympathy, and commands our earnest and unremitting endeavours to alleviate it; while we view, with shame and indignation, the too successful efforts of impious and seditious men, availing themselves of such a moment of distress, to withdraw the weak and unwary from their allegiance to their Sovereign, and

their responsibility to the more awful Majesty of Heaven.

Under these trying and conflicting circumstances, we humbly conceive that we best promote your Royal Highness's benevolent feelings towards your people, and best discharge the sacred trust that devolves upon us, by solemnly pledging ourselves to use our utmost influence in recalling the misguided to a sense of duty, and by detecting and exposing to the just vengeance of the law, the base destroyers of the peace and happiness of society.

We look with confidence to the wisdom of Parliament, about to be assembled by your Royal command, for effectual means of extinguishing a spirit so fatal to the security, the happiness and the best interests of our country.

We humbly entreat your Royal Highness to be assured, that in every crisis of public danger, His Majesty's faithful subjects in Renfrewshire, who compose this meeting, will ever be found at their posts, zealously rallying round the Throne and the Constitution, in support of those civil and religious blessings, which it has pleased Providence to bestow on this Kingdom.

WE, His Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Mayor, the Aldermen, the High Steward, the Freemen, and other Inhabitants of the ancient Borough of Saint Alban, in Common Hall assembled, approach your Royal Presence with our warmest expressions of attachment to your Illustrious House and the established Constitution of our Country. At a period so eventful as the present, when Publications of the blackest description, doctrines blasphemous and pernicious to the happiness equally of poor and rich, are widely disseminated; when even our Courts of Justice are daringly insulted, and every possible effort made to bring into contempt all our venerable institutions, we deem it our duty to appear before your Royal Highness, and in the face of our Country to make a public declaration of our loyalty, and to express, in the strongest language, our decided detestation of such doctrines and proceedings. We have observed, with pain, the exertions of the disaffected to to accelerate the progress of infidelity, and have viewed, with mingled feelings of indignation and alarm, their insidious attempts, systematically pursued, of subverting the Constitution, by deriding and vilifying Christianity, its great corner stone. The British Constitution is not a hasty production; but, occasionally meliorated by the incidents of time and experience, has received the sanction and approbation of ages, and is, at the present moment, the admiration of the world. Although fully sensible that the respectable part of society are sound and invulnerable; yet the mode of circulating those

dangerous doctrines through the inferior walks of life, where education has not previously fortified the minds of men, excites our serious alarm. Consequences may be anticipated of the most disastrous kind, unless promptly and vigorously opposed. With these feelings and sentiments deeply impressed upon our minds, we beg leave to assure your Royal Highness of our steady loyalty, and our decided resolution to maintain, with our lives, and fortunes, the inheritance of our ancestors, that glorious Constitution under which we have acquired and enjoyed a degree of renown and happiness unknown to the rest of the world.

To His Royal Highness the PRINCE REGENT.

Most Gracious Prince,

WE, His Majesty's dutiful subjects, the Lord Provost, Magistrates and Common Council of the City of Glasgow, humbly beg leave to approach the present agitated state of the Country, to approach the Throne with renewed assurances of our loyal zeal, and of our warm attachment to our revered Sovereign, to your Royal Highness, and to the other members of your august Family.

From our local situation, we have had too much opportunity of observing the privations and distresses to which the labouring classes in this populous manufacturing district have from various causes been for some time subjected. We have been anxious to employ all the means in our power for the alleviation of these distresses. We are earnestly desirous of continuing and extending these exertions, and we fondly hope that at no distant period the revival of commerce will render such exertions unnecessary.

We have, at the same time, with regret and indignation, the insidious machinations of worthless men, in taking advantage of the present depressed state of trade and manufactures, and in endeavouring to mislead the understandings of the less informed classes of the community, to irritate their feelings, and to urge them on to acts of violence and outrage; and while we willingly confide in the loyalty of the great body of the people, we cannot but perceive that disaffection, and a disposition to subvert the happy Constitution of this Country, exist to a great extent, independently of the present distress, and prevail in quarters where the hardships of low wages or of want of employment have never been felt.

In maintaining the public peace of this City, we have endeavoured to exercise the powers, which by law are vested in us, with all practicable lenity and mildness; and we hope there will be no occasion for adopting in future a different line of conduct. But should difficulties increase, we have no doubt they will be met with corresponding energy, and that the threats of the disaffected and the turbulent will strengthen and consolidate the union of the loyal. And, as they have distinguished themselves on former occasions by their attachment to the House of Brunswick, and their zeal in the cause of Civil and Religious Liberty, so happily secured by our inestimable Constitution, we confidently trust,

that the Citizens of Glasgow will now shew their firm and determined resolution to resist, to the utmost, the attempts of those guilty and misguided men, who are propagating the doctrines of infidelity and anarchy,

REGENT of the United Kingdom.

WE, the Mayor, High Steward, Recorder, Aldermen, Assistants and Common Council of the Borough of Colchester, in the County of Essex (a Borough as remarkable for its loyalty and attachment to the Constitution of this Kingdom, as by law established, as for its antiquity), feel it our indispensable duty, at this momentous period, to approach your Royal Highness, with the expressions of our inviolable attachment to His Majesty's person and Government, and our determination to make any sacrifice for the protection of them, against the diabolical attacks of those atheistical and deistical blasphemers of our sacred religion, whose aim appears to be the entire destruction of all social order, in this hitherto happy and enviable country.

We should not feel that this antient Borough deserved the high and honourable character for loyalty, which it has in the most turbulent periods of the English History ever maintained, if we, as the select body of its Corporation, did not take this opportunity of expressing our detestation of those principles, which have of late been so industriously circulated by wicked men, having really for their object the subversion of the civil and religious establishments of the country, whilst they speciously pretend to have in view a constitutional reform of the Commons House of Parliament.

When we reflect upon the numerous blessings which we have long enjoyed, and still continue to enjoy, under our free Constitution, the envy of the civilized world; and believing, as we most sincerely do, that the subversion of that Constitution, together with that holy religion which supports it, must necessarily produce the insecurity of the sacred rights of persons and of property, the annihilation of all distinctions of rank, and consequently the destruction of all order within these realms; we cannot but express our most anxious hopes that His Majesty's Government, by firm, decided, and energetic measures, may be able to counteract the effects of infidelity and disloyalty, and secure to us and our posterity a continuance of that internal peace, and that real liberty which has ever been dear to every Briton.

We beg leave to assure your Royal Highness, that we are resolutely determined to resist by every legitimate means, the introduction and dissemination of those seditious and blasphemous theories which have disgraced other places; which tend to licentiousness in its fullest extent, both in principle and in practice, and ultimately produce only anar-

chy and confusion; and that we will upon all occasions use our utmost exertions to bring to condign punishment, the disturbers of the public peace, and the distributors of wicked publications.

In testimony whereof, we, the Mayor, High Steward, Recorder, Aldermen, Assistants and Common Council of the said Borough, have caused to be affixed our Common Seal the eighteenth day of November, in the year of our Lord 1819.

The loyal and dutiful Address of the Noblemen, Freeholders, Justices of the Peace, and Commissioners of Supply, of the County of Selkirk, in general meeting assembled.

May it please your Royal Highness.

WE, His Majesty's most loyal and dutiful subjects, the Noblemen, Freeholders, Justices of Peace, and Commissioners of Supply of the county of Selkirk, request permission to approach your Royal Highness, with assurances of ardent loyalty towards our venerable and beloved Sovereign, and of sincere attachment to the person and Government of your Royal Highness, and to express our readiness at all times to support our admirable Constitution in Church and State; deeply impressed with the transcendent merits of that Constitution, and with the value of those blessings, which we have so long enjoyed under it, we cannot view without abhorrence the attempts which have recently been made to subvert it, by the dissemination of vicious and blasphemous publications, and by assembling seditious meetings of the people, under the delusive pretences of theoretical reforms. Nor is it our political institutions alone that are assailed, but we are concerned also to observe the profane attempts that are making to hold up to derision our holy religion, and to shake the confidence of the nation in that faith, which is the only sure foundation of our Government and all its blessings. We have, however, the satisfaction of being able to assure your Royal Highness, that in this district faction has made no progress, and that the loyalty of the people is unshaken; but, if any attempts shall hereafter be made to subvert those feelings, we trust, that remembering the endeavours by means of which, under the auspices of our beloved Monarch, and by the blessing of Providence, the progress of similar attempts was stenned at the commencement of the French revolution, we shall not now be wanting in a steady adherence to the same line of conduct, and a persevering resistance of all such unprincipled attempts.

A PROCLAMATION,

Requiring Passes, formerly granted to Ships and Vessels trading in the way of the Cruizers belonging to the Governments on the Coast of Barbary, to be returned into the Office of the Admiralty of Great Britain, and other Passes of different Forms to be issued.

GEORGE, P. R.

WHEREAS by Our Royal Proclamation, bearing date the third day of November, in the forty-third year of Our reign, We did charge and command all Our loving subjects who then were, or should be, possessed of any passes for ships and vessels belonging to Our subjects trading to Portugal, the Canaries, Guinea, the Indies, into the Mediterranean, or elsewhere, in the way of the cruizers belonging to the Governments on the Coast of Barbary (except such passes as had been granted to ships gone or going to the East Indies, or other remote voyages where they could not be timely furnished with new passes), that they should, before the thirty-first day of December one thousand eight hundred and three, return the same and furnish themselves with passes of a new form, under the hands and seals of the Commissioners for executing the office of High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, in lieu thereof, for their several ships and vessels, in such manner as by the said recited Proclamation was directed: and whereas it hath been humbly represented unto Us, that there is the greatest reason to believe that many of Our passes may, either by accident or undue means have fallen into the hands of foreigners, who by the clandestine use of such passes may carry on their trade; We, taking the premises into Our Royal consideration, and judging it necessary to put a speedy stop to all such indirect practices, which do not only tend to the prejudice of Our trading subjects, but may occasion a misunderstanding between Us and the Governments on the Coast of Barbary, for preventing thereof have thought fit, by the advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby declare, that the passes of the present form shall continue in force for all vessels sailing from the ports of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland during the present year, in order to give sufficient time to Our trade to be furnished with passes of the new form, and that after the expiration of that time, no passes but those of the new form shall be considered as valid, except in the case of vessels returning from foreign voyages, where they cannot be timely furnished with new passes; and We do hereby further declare, that in the case of vessels returning from foreign voyages, passes of the present form shall continue in force during the terms hereinafter mentioned, that is to say,

For vessels returning from the ports to the northward of the Streights of Gibraltar, or from the ports within the Mediterranean, to the thirty-

first of March one thousand eight hundred and twenty.

For vessels returning from the West Indies, North America, and the western coasts of Africa, to the thirtieth of June one thousand eight hundred and twenty.

For vessels returning from the East Indies and all other distant parts, to the thirtieth of June one thousand eight hundred and twenty-one.

And We do hereby strictly charge and command all Our loving subjects, who are, or shall be possessed of any such passes, that they do, on or before the expiration of the periods herein before mentioned respectively, return the same into the office of the Admiralty of Great Britain, or to the respective Collectors of Our Customs at the out ports of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or to the Governors of some of Our foreign plantations or dominions, in order to their being cancelled; and that they do furnish themselves with passes of the new form, under the hands and seals of Our Commissioners for executing the office of High Admiral of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, in lieu thereof, for their several ships and vessels, according to the Treaties subsisting between Us and the said Governments on the Coast of Barbary, and the regulations made by Our Royal predecessor King George the First, by Order in His Privy Council on the fourteenth day of June in the year one thousand seven hundred and twenty-two, so far as the same remains unaltered, by the regulations made by Us by Our Orders in Council, bearing date respectively on the twenty-eight day of August one thousand seven hundred and seventy-six, on the thirty-first day of December one thousand seven hundred and eighty-three, and the third day of November one thousand eight hundred and two, or Our Order in Council of this day's date, and according to the further regulations then there made, and our instructions given to Our said Commissioners for executing the office of High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland touching the same: and whereas many ships and vessels belonging to Our loving subjects continue several years trading from port to port in the Mediterranean without returning home, whereby they cannot so conveniently procure their passes to be exchanged: We do hereby, for the ease of Our trading subjects, publish and declare, Our pleasure, that upon the application of any owner of any ship or vessel, or other substantial merchant, to the office of the Admiralty of Great Britain, and oath made by him of the property of such ship or vessel, and that three fourths of the company are our subjects, according to an Act made in the twelfth year of the reign of Our Royal predecessor King Charles the Second (intituled "An Act for encouraging and increasing of shipping and navigation), or such other proportion as may be authorised by Act of Parliament, and upon entering into a bond for the return of such pass at the end of the period therein specified: it shall and may be lawful for Our Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or Our High Admiral of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland for the time being, and they are respectively empowered to make

out a new pass for such ship or vessel, and send the same to such of Our Consuls in the Mediterranean as the said owner or merchant shall desire, with directions to such Consul, that, upon application to him from the master of the ship, for which the pass is made out, and surrendering up his old pass, and entering into bond for the return of such new pass, he shall deliver out the said new pass to such master, and transmit the old one with the bond to the office of the Admiralty of Great Britain.

And in order more effectually to hinder, for the future, any abuses that may be attempted by foreigners, relating to the new passes to be issued as aforesaid, we do hereby further declare Our Royal will and pleasure, that the new form of passes, marked A, as recommended to Us by Our Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, in their memorial, bearing date the eighth day of September last, and approved by Us by Our Order in Council, of this day's date, shall be issued from and after the first day of January next, within the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and as soon after in His Majesty's colonies, as the same may be received at each colony respectively; and that passes issued in the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, of the above-mentioned form, shall be in force during the voyage for which the said passes shall be taken out, and no longer, and shall be returned, at the termination of such voyage, to the Commissioners of our Customs, or to their Chief Officer at one of the outports, provided such voyage shall terminate in the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or to the Governor or Lieutenant-Governor in any of the islands of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, or Man; and in case such voyage shall terminate in any of our possessions abroad, then that such passes shall be delivered up to the Governor or other person having chief authority there; but if such voyage shall terminate at any place out of our dominions, then such pass shall be delivered up to our Consul or his Deputy at such place, or who may be nearest thereto; and that passes to be issued in our colonies or possessions abroad shall, in like manner, be in force during the voyage or voyages for which they shall be taken out respectively, and no longer, and shall be returned at the termination of such voyage or voyages respectively, in the manner hereinbefore directed, according to the port or place in which such voyage or voyages shall terminate respectively; and that in all cases whatever of passes to be issued, such surety, by way of bond, shall be given to secure the due return of the passes, and to guard against any fraudulent or improper use of them, as hath been usual, or as our Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or Our High Admiral of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland for the time being, may deem necessary to require according to the circumstances of the case.

And whereas it has been recommended to Us, by our Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral of Our United Kingdom of

Great Britain and Ireland, that for the more effectual prevention of abuses, and for the diminution of expence it may be convenient, in certain cases, that passes to be granted for the purposes aforesaid should be united with the ship's certificate of registry, Our will and pleasure is, that if any person shall be desirous of having the Mediterranean pass annexed to the certificate of registry of his ship, such pass so annexed may be issued agreeably to the form B, recommended to Us by Our Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland in their memorial as aforesaid; and that such pass shall not be separated from such certificate of registry, but shall be returned at the same time when such certificate of registry shall be delivered up to be cancelled, and as often as any new certificate of registry shall be granted, an annexed pass shall also be granted under the same conditions, if the party shall be desirous thereof.

But whereas the laws for the registry of British shipping do not apply to ships belonging to Gibraltar and Malta, and whereas it is expedient that passes granted to the ships of the said places should be accompanied by some document proving that they belong to His Majesty's subjects in His Majesty's said possessions respectively, it is Our further will and pleasure, that the Governors or Deputy-Governors of the said possessions respectively, who shall be authorised to issue passes, shall issue them only in the form marked C, as recommended to us by Our Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland in their memorial as aforesaid, and that the said Governors or Deputy Governors shall issue them only to such ships as shall be certified (in such manner as We shall be pleased by any Order or Orders in Council to direct), to belong to Our subjects, and to the possessions under their respective Governments, except that when any ship having a pass issued in the United Kingdom, or in any of His Majesty's Colonies, the time of which pass shall have expired, and which by these regulations ought to be returned, or where the owner or master of a ship having a British certificate of registry shall be desirous of obtaining a Mediterranean pass, the Governors or Deputy Governors as aforesaid may grant for such ship a pass of the form aforesaid marked C. to be in force to the end of the ship's then voyage, and no longer, and to be returned to be cancelled at the end of such voyage as hereinbefore directed in other cases respectively; and the said Governors or Deputy Governors shall sign their names in the margin of all passes issued by them respectively as specified in the said form; and in all cases the Governors or Deputy Governors issuing such passes shall take a bond (as above directed), for the delivery up of such pass on the first ensuing arrival of such ship in any port of the United Kingdom, or of a British possession, of which the Governor or Deputy Governor may be authorised to issue passes.

It is Our further will and pleasure, that for the more convenient issue of such passes, Our Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High

Admiral of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or Our High Admiral of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland for the time being, shall be authorised to furnish to the Commissioners of Our Customs in London, Edinburgh, and Dublin, and to the Governors of Our Colonies, and of Gibraltar and Malta, passes of the necessary forms signed and executed by Our Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or Our High Admiral of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland for the time being, in blank as to the names of the ship, which passes the Commissioners of Our Customs as aforesaid or their Officers; and the said Governors shall be authorised to fill up and issue on the receipt of the bond required to be taken for the same.

And it is Our further will and pleasure, that it shall be lawful for Our Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or Our High Admiral of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland for the time being, and they are hereby empowered to lodge Mediterranean passes of the same form with the new passes for ships and vessels belonging to Gibraltar and Malta, in the hands of Our Lord High Commissioner of the Ionian Islands, and to empower our said Lord High Commissioner of the Ionian Islands to issue and deliver out such passes to any of the inhabitants of the said Islands, to be applied to ships actually belonging to the said Islands, and none other, provided the person or persons applying for the same do comply with and conform to the several rules and regulations now in use, or that may be required to be observed by Our subjects, or that may be directed to be observed by the said inhabitants of the Ionian Islands by Our Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or Our High Admiral of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland for the time being.

And We do hereby order, that the Commissioners of Our Customs in Great Britain and Ireland do cause to be carried into execution such parts of the said Order of Council, of the fourteenth day of June one thousand seven hundred and twenty-two, concerning passes as relate to themselves and the proper Officers under them, so far as the same remains now in force, and of Our Orders aforesaid made in Council on the twenty-eighth day of August one thousand seven hundred and seventy-six, on the thirty-first day of December one thousand seven hundred and eighty-three, and the third day of November one thousand eight hundred and two, or Our Order in Council of this day's date, that they do direct their Officers in the several parts of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland to demand of the masters of all merchant ships, so soon as they shall return into port from a foreign voyage, all passes granted as aforesaid which shall be in their possession to be produced to the said respective Officers of Our Customs; and if the same shall appear to be of an older date than the periods herein before severally and respectively mentioned for the return of the passes of the pre-

sent form, then such passes shall be delivered up to the said respective Officers of Our Customs, and be by them returned to the Office of the Admiralty of Great Britain. And in case the master of any such ship or vessel shall refuse to produce or deliver up such passes according to the true intent of Our said Order, then the said Officer shall certify the name of every such master, and of the ship or vessel, to Our Commissioners for executing the office of Lord High Admiral of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, or to Our High Admiral of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland for the time being, to the end that directions may be given for putting the bond entered into on the granting any such pass, in suit. And all Our Governors, Lieutenant-Governors, and Commanders in Chief of any of Our islands, colonies, or plantations, Consuls residing in foreign parts, and all other Our Officers and Ministers whatsoever, and all other Our loving subjects whom it may concern, are hereby expressly required and commanded to yield due obedience unto, and strictly to observe all the orders, instructions, regulations, and directions before mentioned, on pain of Our high displeasure.

Given at Our Court at Carlton House, this twentieth day of November one thousand eight hundred and nineteen, in the sixtieth year of Our reign.
