Was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that The Lords, authorised by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by His Majesty, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act to authorise the issuing of Exchequer Bills for the payment of the proprietors of the Four Pounds per Centum Annuities in England and Ireland, who have signified their dissent under an Act passed in the present session, for transferring such Annuities into Three Pounds Ten Shillings per Centum Annuities.

An Act to repeal an Act, of the fifty-fifth year of His late Majesty, for procuring returns of persons committed, tried, and convicted for criminal offences and misdemeanors.

An Act to make provision for the lighting and watching of parishes in England and Wales.

An Act for the further improvement and support of the passage across the Frith of Forth, called the Queensferry.

An Act for paving, lighting, watching, watering, cleansing, repairing, widening, and otherwise improving the streets, lanes, and other public passages and places within the town of Yeovil, in the county of Somerset, and for regulating the police thereof.

An Act to amend two Acts of His late Majesty,

An Act to amend two Acts of His late Majesty, for paving, cleansing, lighting, and watching the town

of Dover, and for removing and preventing nuisances and annoyances therein.

An Act to enable the Commissioners of wide streets, to widen and improve certain ways, streets, and passages in and about the city and county of Dublin, and to amend and extend the provisions of two Acts, passed in the forty-seventh and fifty-seventh years of the reign of His late Majesty, for improving and rendering more commodious such parts of the county and county of the city of Dublin, as are situate on the south-side of the river Anna Liffey, and west of His Majesty's castle of Dublin.

An Act for more effectually maintaining, improving, and extending the harbour of Dundee, in the county of Forfar.

An Act to amend an Act, passed in the fifth year of the reign of His present Majesty, for the completing the harbour of Courtown, near Brenogue Head, in the county of Wexford.

An Act for enlarging, improving, and maintaining the port and harbour of Perth, for improving the navigation of the River Tay to the said city, and for other purposes therewith connected.

An Act for making and maintaining a navigable cut or canal from Lough Corrib to the bay of Galway, and for the improvement of the harbour of Galway.

An Act for improving the harbour of Port Glassow, constructing a wet dock, or wet docks, adjacent thereto, and for altering the road leading from Port Glasgow to Glasgow, near the said harbour.

An Act for better supplying the inhabitants of the borough of Macclesfield, in the county of Chester, with water, and to establish the rates payable for the same.

An Act for amending certain Acts for making the Glasgow and Garnkirk Railway, and for raising a farther sum of money.

An Act for the improvement of the Shannon navigation from the city of Limerick to Killaloe, by rebuilding the bridge called Baal's Bridge, in the said city.

An Act for establishing a floating bridge over the harbour of Dartmouth, from or near to Lower Sand Quay Point to Old Rock, in the county of Devon, and for building quays and landing-places, and for making roads and approaches thereto, with branches therefrom.

An Act for maintaining and repairing the road leading from the city of Glasgow, through Cowcaddens to the North End of the bridge, over that part of the river of Kelvin, called the Milnford of Garscube; and for making, repairing, and maintaining the road leading from Blackquarry toll bar by Possil to the bridge across the river Allander, at Langbank, in the counties of Lanark and Stirling.

An Act for rebuilding the bridges over the rivers Spey and Findhorn, for making accesses thereto, and for making and maintaining certain new roads in the

county of Elgin.

An Act for more effectually repairing the road from Ashborne, in the county of Derby, to a messuage or public-house, in the occupation of John Frost, near Belpar Bridge, in the said county of Derby.

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

THEREAS by a certain Act of Parliament, present Majesty, intituled "An Act to regulate the "trade of the British possessions abroad," after reciting, that "by the Law of Navigation foreign ships are permitted to import into any of the " British possessions abroad, from the countries to which they belong, goods, the produce of those countries, and to export goods from such posses-" sions to be carried to any foreign country what-"ever, and that it is expedient that such permission should be subject to certain conditions," it is enacted, "that the privileges thereby granted to " foreign ships shall be limited to the ships of those countries which, having colonial possessions, shall grant the like privileges of trading with those possessions to British ships, or which, not having colonial possessions, shall place the commerce " and navigation of this country, and of its possessions abroad, upon the footing of the most favoured nation, unless His Majesty, by His Order in Council, shall in any case deem it expedient to grant the whole or any of such privileges to the ships of any foreign country, although the conditions aforesaid shall not in all respects be fulfilled " by such foreign country:

And whereas by an Act, passed in the seventh and eighth years of His present Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws relating to the "Customs," it is, amongst other things, enacted, that no foreign country shall be deemed to have fulfilled the conditions so prescribed as aforesaid

in and by the said Act so passed in the said sixth year of His Majesty's reign, as to be entitled to the privileges therein mentioned, unless such foreign country had in all respects fulfilled those conditions within twelve months next after the passing of the said Act, that is to say, on or before the fifth day of July one thousand eight hundred and twenty-six; and for the better ascertaining what particular foreign countries are permitted by law to exercise and enjoy the said privileges, it is thereby further enacted, that no foreign country shall be deemed to have fulfilled the beforementioned conditions, or to be entitled to the privileges aforesaid, unless and until His Majesty shall by some Order or Orders to be by him made, by the advice of His Privy Council, have declared that such foreign country hath so fulfilled the said conditions, and is entitled to the said privileges; provided always, and it is thereby declared and enacted, that nothing therein contained, extends, or shall be construed to extend, to make void or annul any Order or Orders in Council theretofore issued, under the authority or in pursuance of the said recited Act of the sixth year of His Majesty's reign, or to take away or abridge the powers vested in His Majesty in and by the said Act, or any of those powers, any thing therein contained to the contrary in anywise notwithstanding:

And whereas His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, doth deem it expedient to grant the privileges aforesaid to the ships of the dominions of His Majesty the Emperor of Austria, His Majesty doth therefore, by the advice aforesaid, and in pursuance and exercise of the powers and authority in him vested by the said recited Acts of Parliament, declare and grant, that it shall and may be lawful for Austrian ships to import from the dominions of His Majesty the Emperor of Austria, into any of the British possessions abroad, goods, the produce of such dominions, and to export goods from such British possessions abroad, to be carried to any foreign country whatever:

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Right Honourable Sir George Murray, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, are to give the necessary directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

HEREAS by an Act of Parliament, made and passed in the fourth year of the reign of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for altering and amending two Acts, passed in the eleventh and thirty-third years of His late Majesty King George the Third, for consolidating, extending, and rendering more effectual the powers granted by several Acts of Parliament for making, enlarging, amending, and cleansing the vaults, drains, and sewers within the city of London, and liberties thereof, and for paving, cleansing, and lighting the streets, lanes, squares, yards, courts, alleys, passages, and places; and preventing and removing obstructions and annoyances within the same;" it was, among other things, enacted, that from and after the passing of the said Act, the number of coaches, chariots, cabriolets, or other carriages allowed to stand or ply for hire at any one time in the respective streets or places thereinafter named, should be no more than was thereinafter directed, that is to say (among other streets and places thereinafter named), in the middle of Fleet-street, between the end of Water-lane and the end of Fetter-lane, fifteen of such coaches and other carriages:

And whereas by another Act of Parliament, made and passed in the tenth year of His present Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for taking down the Parish Church of Saint Dunstan in the West, in the city of London, and building a new Church in lieu thereof," after reciting the said hereinbefore recited Act of the fourth year of His present Majesty's reign; and further reciting that it was expedient, in order to render the streets and approaches to the said intended new church more convenient for the public, that the present stand of hackney coaches in Fleetstreet should be removed: it is enacted, that from and after the passing of the said last mentioned Act,

so much of the said therein first recited Act, as authorised the standing or plying for hire of any coaches, chariots, cabriolets, or other carriages, in Fleet-street, should be, and the same is thereby, repealed; and that no hackney-coach, or other carriage, shall be allowed at any time to stand or ply for hire in any part of Fleet-street aforesaid; and that it shall be lawful for the Court of Mayor and Aldermen of the city of London, from time to time, to appoint proper places, in or near Fleet-street aforesaid, where hackney coaches and other carriages respectively may stand and ply for hire, and make such orders for regulating the number of Hackneycoaches and other carriages to stand in such places respectively, and the distances at which they shall stand from each other, and the times at and during which they may stand and ply for hire, and such other orders and regulations for the better ordering and regulating the said hackney-coaches and other carriages in the said streets, and the drivers, or other person or persons having the management thereof respectively, as to the said Court of Mayor and Aldermen shall seem proper; and from time to time to alter, amend, or repeal such rules, orders, and regulations, and to make others in the room thereof; and the said Court of Mayor and Aldermen shall cause all the rules, orders, and regulations to be made by them as aforesaid, and every alteration, amendment, and repeal thereof respectively to be advertised in the London Gazette, and in two or more newspapers circulated in the city of London; and a copy thereof to be hung up for public inspection in the Town Clerk's Office, at the Guildhall of the said City, before the same, or any of them, shall be carried into effect, or be considered as repealed by the said Court of Mayor and Aldermen:

This Court doth, by virtue and in pursuance of the said Act of Parliament, made and passed in the tenth year of His present Majesty's reign, hereby appoint the proper places near Fleet-street aforesaid, where hackney-coaches, chariots, cabriolets, and other carriages respectively, may stand and ply for hire, and doth, by virtue and in pursuance of the said last-mentioned Act of Parliament, make orders for regulating the number of hackney-coaches and other carriages to stand in such places respectively, and the distances at which they shall stand from each

other, and the times at and during which they may stand and ply for hire, and also orders and regulations for the better ordering and regulating the said hackney-coaches and other carriages in the said streets, and the drivers or other person or persons having the management thereof respectively, in man-

ner following, (that is to say)

It is by this Court ordered and directed, and this Court doth hereby appoint the street, called Farringdon-street, leading in a line with Bridge-street from the north-east end of Fleet-street aforesaid to Holborn-bridge, southward, and formerly called Fleet-market, for hackney-coaches, chariots, cabriolets, and other hackney carriages, to stand or ply for hire, that is to say, in the middle of the said street only, and upon part of the site whereon the Fleet-market stood before the removal thereof.

And it is by this Court hereby further ordered and directed, that all hackney-coaches, chariots, cabriolets, or other hackney-carriages, which shall at any time hereafter stand or ply for hire, in Faming-don street aforesaid, shall stand or ply for hire at the distance of ten feet at least apart from each other in a direct line, such space to be computed from the heads of the horses of one such hackney coach, chariot, or other backney carriage to the standing or plying for hire, within the said street.

And it is by this Court hereby further ordered and directed, that no hackney-coach, chariot, cabriolet or other hackney-carriage, shall stand or ply for hire in any part of Farringdon-street aforesaid, within the space or distance of twenty feet southward of the street or way, at Holborn-bridge, nor within twenty feet northward of the north-east end of Fleet-street aforesaid, nor opposite to any street, way, or entrance leading from Farringdon-street aforesaid, to the New Fleet-market on the west side of the said street, nor opposite to any other street leading from Farringdon street aforesaid, either on the east of west side of the said street.

And it is by this Court hereby further ordered and directed, that no greater number of hackneycouches, chariots, cabriolets, or other hackney-carriage shall at any one time stand or ply for hire in Parringdon-street aforesaid, than 'twenty-five such hackney-coaches, chariots, cabriolets, or other hack-

nev-carridges.

And it is by this Court hereby further ordered and directed, that if the master, owner, or driver of any brackney-coach, chariot, or cabriolet, or other hackney carriage, shall happen to come with his hackney coach, chariot, cabriolet, or other hackney carriage, into Farringdon-street aforesaid, for the purpose of standing or plying for hire there at any time when there shall be the full number of hackney-coaches, chariots, cabridlets, or other hackney carriages allowed by these orders already standing therein for hire as aforesaid, such master, owner, or driver shall, on being required by any street-keeper, or other person, immediately drive such hackney-coach, chariot, 'cabriolet, or other hackney carriage, from such standing and from and out of the said street without delay or lattering therein under any pretence whatsoever.

And it is by this Court hereby further ordered and directed, that no driver of any hackney coach, chariot, cabriolet, or other backney carriage, or any other person having the care or management thereof, or

employed in or about, or attending upon the same, or in or about any of the standings of any hackneycoaches, chariots, cabrielets, or other hackney carriages, hereinbefore appointed, shall wilfully obstruct the foot pavement of any part of Fatringdon-street aforesaid, or the free passage of His Majesty's subjects passing and repassing therein, or use any abusive, indecent, or other improper language to or towards, or in the hearing of, the person or persons hiring, or about to hire, or being conveyed in, or discharging, or about to discharge, any such hackney coach, chariot, cabriolet, or other hackney carriage, or in being taken up or set down in or from the same, or of any other of His Majesty's subjects being in the said street.

And it is by this Court hereby further ordered and directed, that no hackney coach, chariot, cabriolet, or other hackney carriage, shall stand or ply for hire in any other part of Farringdon-street aforesaid than

is hereinbefore appointed for that purpose.

And it is by this Court hereby further ordered and d rected, that no caravan, or other carriage used as an errand cart, or any other carriage whatsoever used for the purpose of carrying or conveying goods or pas-sengers for hire, shall stand, or be in any part of Farringdon street aforesaid, for any longer space of time than shall be necessary for taking up or delivering goods, or taking up or setting down passengers, and in no case to exceed the space of ten minutes for either or any of the said purposes.

And it is by this Court hereby further ordered and directed, that these rules, orders, and regulations be forthwith advertised in the London Gazette, and in the three newspapers circulated in the city of London, called the Times, the Morning Chronicle, and the Public Ledger; and that a copy of the said rules, orders, and regulations be forthwith hung up for public inspection in the Town Clerk's Office at the Guildhall of the said city, pursuant to the directions contained in the said Act of Parliament, of the tenth year of His present Majesty's reign, for that purpose.

And it is by this Court hereby further ordered and directed, that the foregoing rules, orders, and regulations shall be in full force from and immediately after the same shall be advertised, and a copy thereof hung up in the Town Clerk's Office as aforesaid, in in pursuance of the directions af the said last mentioned Act of Parliament.
