AT the Court at *St. James's*, the 27th day of July 1831,

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the third year of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act for further continuing, altering, and amending several Acts for the better regulation of lastage and ballastage in the River Thames, and for enabling the Corporation of Trinity-house of Deptford Strond to reduce, alter, modify, relinquish, or abolish dues payable to the said Corporation, and for other purposes connected therewith," after reciting that, under the authority and by virtue of the several Acts of Parliament, and grants therein recited, as well as of other Acts of Parliament, and of divers charters, grants, and letters patent of Kings and Queens of this realm, and also by prescriptive right, the Master, Wardens, and Assistants for the time being of Trinity-house of Deptford Strond aforesaid, had collected, taken, levied, and received from, or in respect of, ships and vessels requiring ballast, the several rates and prices specified in the Act of the forty-fifth year of the reign of His said late Majesty King George the Third, therein mentioned, and certain dues or duties, rates or tolls, of various denominations, from, or in respect of, all British ships or vessels, and from, or in respect of, all foreign ships and vessels, entering or departing from the ports, harbours, or roadsteads

of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland; and that the Master, Wardens, and Assistants of the Trinity-house of Deptford Strond aforesaid had not, by the terms of the said several Acts of Parliament, charters, grants, and letters patent, or any of them, any power to reduce, modify, alter, relinquish, or abolish any of the rates, prices, dues, duties, and tolls, imposed or granted, collected, taken, levied, and received as aforesaid: and that it was expedient that the said Master, Wardens, and Assistants should be empowered (under the regulations hereinafter contained) to reduce, alter, modify, relinquish, or abolish, and at any time or times thereafter to revive and re-establish, any of the rates, prices, dues, duties, and tolls aforesaid, or any part or parts thereof, from time to time, as to them the said Master, Wardens, and Assistants should seem meet, just, and reasonable; it is thereby enacted, that the Master, Wardens, and Assistants for the time being of the Corporation of Trinity-house of Deptford Strond aforesaid shall be, and they are thereby authorised and empowered, from time to time, and at any time or times thereafter, upon the requisition or with the consent of His said late Majesty, His heirs and successors, in His or their Most Honourable Privy Council, to reduce, relinquish, abolish, alter, or modify all or any or either of the rates, prices, dues, duties, or tolls imposed or granted by the said several grants, charters, or Acts of Parliament, or any of them, or collected, taken, levied, and received under the authority

hereof respectively, or by ancient usage, custom, or prescription, or any part or parts thereof, so far as may be consistent with the charitable and other uses, purposes, and intents for which the said Corporation has been established and maintained; and that it shall also be lawful for the Master, Wardens, and Assistants for the time being of the said Corporation of Trinity-house of Deptford Strand, at any time or times after the passing thereof, to revive and re-establish any rates, prices, dues, duties, or tolls which may have been relinquished or abolished, or to increase or otherwise alter or modify any rates, prices, dues, duties, or tolls which may have been reduced, altered, or modified under the authority of the said Act, and so from time to time to relinquish or abolish and revive or re-establish, and reduce or increase, alter or modify, all or any of such rates, prices, dues, duties, or tolls as occasion may require; so as nevertheless that no such rates, prices, dues, duties, or tolls shall at any time be increased beyond the amount which might be collected, taken, levied, or received by the said Corporation in respect thereof before the passing of the said Act: and it is thereby provided, that no such relinquishment, abolition, reduction, alteration, or modification, or subsequent revival, re-establishment, increase, alteration, or modification of any such rates, prices, dues, duties, or tolls, or any or either of them, or any part or parts thereof, shall at any time be deemed valid or take effect until the same shall have been submitted by the said Master, Wardens, and Assistants to and shall have been assented to and confirmed by His said late Majesty, His heirs, or successors in His or their Most Honourable Privy Council, and such assent and confirmation shall have been signified in writing unto the said Master, Wardens, and Assistants; and that it shall be lawful for the said Master, Wardens, and Assistants to fix and determine the period (so that the same do not exceed three calendar months from the receipt by them of such assent or confirmation as aforesaid), from and after which all and every the rates, prices, dues, duties, or tolls so relinquished or abolished shall be discontinued and no longer collected, taken, levied, or received, or from and after which all and every the rates, prices, dues, duties, or tolls so received or re-established, reduced, increased, altered, or modified respectively as aforesaid, shall and may be collected, received, levied, or taken: and whereas the said Master, Wardens, and Assistants have submitted to His Majesty in His Privy Council, the propriety of modifying and reducing the duties payable for the

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the sixth year of His late Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to regulate the trade of the British possessions abroad," it is, amongst other things, enacted, that certain ports, therein particularly mentioned, in the island of Jamaica, and in the provinces of Nova Scotia, Canada, and New Brunswick, and in the island of Barbadoes, shall be free warehousing ports for the purposes of the said Act; and it is further enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Majesty in Council, from time to time, to appoint any port in His Majesty's possessions in America, to be a free warehousing port for the purposes of the said Act; and that every such port, so appointed by His Majesty, shall be a free warehousing port under the said Act, as if appointed by the same, in as full and ample a manner in all respects as any of the ports thereinbefore mentioned are free warehousing ports appointed by the said Act:

And whereas His Majesty doth deem it expedient, that the port of Kingstown, in the island of Saint Vincent, should be appointed a free warehousing port for the purposes of the said Act, His Majesty

doth therefore, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, and in pursuance and exercise of the power in him vested, in and by the said Act of Parliaments order and appoint, that the said port of Kingstown, in the island of Saint Vincent, shall be a free warehousing port for the purposes of the said Act:

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Right Honourable Viscount Goderich, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, are to give the necessary directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fifty-sixth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to suspend the ballot or enrolment for the local militia," it is enacted, that it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by any Order in Council, to direct that no ballot or enrolment for the local militia shall take place, but that such ballot and enrolment shall remain and continue suspended for the period specified in any such Order in Council, and from time to time, by any like Order or Orders in Council, to continue such suspension so long as His Majesty shall deem the same expedient, any thing in any Act or Acts of Parliament to the contrary notwithstanding; and whereas by an Order in Council, made the twenty-eighth of June one thousand eight hundred and thirty, it was ordered by His Majesty in Council, that no ballot or enrolment for the local militia should take place for the space of one year from the sixteenth of July one thousand eight hundred and thirty, but that the ballot should remain and continue suspended for the space of one year from the said sixteenth of July; and whereas it is deemed expedient to continue such suspension of the ballot and enrolment for the local militia for the space of one year, from and after the sixteenth of July in this year; it is, therefore, ordered by His Majesty, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, that no ballot or enrolment for the local militia do take place for the space of one year, from and after the sixteenth day of July in this year, but that the ballot or enrolment for the local militia do remain and continue suspended, for the space of one year from and after the sixteenth day of July instant.

A PROCLAMATION.

WILLIAM, R.

WHEREAS We did, by Our Royal Proclamation of the twenty-third day of April last, establish and declare a scale of rates at which freight

should be payable for public and private treasure conveyed on board any of Our ships and vessels We have, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, thought fit further to ordain, declare, and command, and We do hereby ordain, declare, and command, that, from and after the first day of September next, the freight for conveying gold and silver in any of Our packets between any two ports, the navigable distance between which shall exceed six hundred leagues, shall be fixed at the rate of one per cent. both for gold and silver: and We do hereby establish and declare, that the responsibility of the officer in charge of such treasure shall commence when it shall be safe alongside the said packet, and shall cease the moment that it shall be landed at the port of destination:

And it is further declared, that in all other respects the said Proclamation of the twenty-third day of April last, and the rules and regulations thereby established, shall continue in full force.

A PROCLAMATION.

WILLIAM, R.

WHEREAS We have thought fit to order that certain pieces of money should be coined, that is to say, certain pieces of gold money, to be called respectively double sovereigns, sovereigns, and half sovereigns; and certain pieces of silver money, to be called respectively crowns, half crowns, shillings, and sixpences; and certain pieces of copper money, to be called respectively pence, half pence, and farthings; to be of the several values and weights hereinafter particularly described, that is to say, the double sovereigns to be each of the value of forty shillings, and of the weight of ten pennyweights, six grains, and $\frac{5}{16}$ troy weight, of standard gold; and the sovereigns each of the value of twenty shillings, and of the weight of five pennyweights, three grains, and $\frac{2}{16}$ troy weight, of standard gold; and the half sovereigns each of the value of ten shillings, and of the weight of two pennyweights, thirteen grains, $\frac{1}{16}$ troy weight, of standard gold, according to the weight approved of and confirmed by Our Royal Brother, His late Majesty King George the Fourth, in Council, in pursuance of an Act, made in the fourteenth year of the reign of Our Royal Father King George the Third, intituled "An Act for regulating and ascertaining the weight to be made use of in weighing the gold and silver coin of this kingdom:" and whereas by an Act, passed in the fifteenth year of the reign of Our Royal Father, His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to provide for a new silver coinage, and to regulate the gold and silver coinage of the realm," the Master and Worker of Our Mint in London was em-

powered to coin silver bullion into silver coins, consisting of crowns, half crowns, shillings, and sixpences, of the standard of eleven ounces and two pennyweights of fine silver and eighteen pennyweights of alloy to the pound troy, and in weight after the rate of sixty-six shillings to the pound troy: and whereas, in virtue of the power so given, a coinage of crowns or five shilling pieces, half crowns or pieces of the value of two shillings and sixpence each, at the rate and of the standard aforesaid, has been made, as well as a coinage of copper pieces, called respectively pence, half pence, and farthings: and whereas We have further ordered that such double sovereigns shall have for the obverse impression Our effigy, with the inscription "Gulielmus III, D. G. Britanniarum Rex F. D." and for the reverse the ensigns armorial of the United Kingdom contained in a shield, encircled by the collar of the Order of the Garter, mantled and surmounted by the Royal Crown, with the date of the year, and upon the edge of the piece the words "Decus et Tutamen," and the year of Our reign; and that every such gold sovereign and every such half sovereign so ordered to be coined, shall have for the obverse impression Our effigy, with the same inscription and date, and for the reverse the ensigns armorial of the United Kingdom contained in a shield, plain, with the date of the year, and a graining on the edge of the piece; and every such crown has for the obverse and reverse impressions the same effigy, inscriptions, and dates as are hereby ordered for each double sovereign; and every such half crown has for the obverse and reverse impressions the same effigy, inscriptions, dates, and graining as are hereby ordered for each sovereign; and every such shilling has for the obverse impression the same effigy, inscription, and date, and for the reverse the words "one shilling," placed in the centre of the piece, within a wreath, having an olive branch on one side, and an oak branch on the other; and the sixpences have the same obverse and reverse impressions as those upon the shilling, except the word "sixpence," instead of the words "one shilling:" and We have also thought fit to order that each of the said penny pieces, half penny pieces, and farthings shall have the same obverse impression, effigy, inscription, and date, and for the reverse the figure of Britannia: and whereas pieces of money of all the above descriptions have been coined at Our Mint, and will be coined there, in pursuance of orders issued by Us, We have therefore, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, thought fit to issue this Our Royal Proclamation, and We do hereby ordain, declare, and command that the said pieces of money so coined, and to be coined, shall be current and lawful money of the Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and shall be called by the several names, and shall pass and be received as current and lawful money of the Kingdom, at the several values hereinafter assigned to them, in all payments whatsoever.

THIS day, the Lords being met, a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorised by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by His Majesty, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read;* and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act to repeal so much of certain Acts as requires certain oaths to be taken by Members of the House of Commons, before the Lord Steward or his deputies.

An Act to reduce the salary of the Master and Worker of His Majesty's Mint.

An Act to continue compositions for assessed taxes until the fifth day of April one thousand eight hundred and thirty-three, and to grant relief in certain cases.

An Act to suspend, until the end of the next session of Parliament, the making of the lists, and the ballots and enrolments for the militia of the United Kingdom.

An Act to abolish certain oaths and affirmations taken and made in the Customs and Excise departments of His Majesty's revenue, and to substitute declarations in lieu thereof.

An Act to enable His Majesty to make leases, copies, and grants of offices, lands, and hereditaments parcel of the duchy of Cornwall, or annexed to the same.

An Act for continuing, until the thirtieth day of June one thousand eight hundred and thirty-two, the several Acts for regulating the turnpike roads in Great Britain, which will expire at the end of the present session of Parliament.

An Act for better raising and securing the fund established for making provision for the widows of the Writers to His Majesty's Signet in Scotland.

An Act to amend an Act for vesting and securing to John Stephen Langton, Esq. certain profits and emoluments for a limited time.

An Act to alter and amend an Act, passed in the sixth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, for regulating the conversion of the statute labour within the barony of Gorbals, in the city of Glasgow, and county of Lanark.

An Act to amend certain Acts, passed in the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, for opening a street from the Cross of Glasgow to Monteth-row.

An Act to enable the Yorkshire Fire and Life Insurance Company to sue and be sued in the name of their Secretary, or of any one of the Directors of the said Company.

An Act for erecting and maintaining a bridge over the river Lagan, at Belfast, and for making suitable approaches thereto.

An Act to amend and enlarge the several Acts relating to the Bolton and Leigh Rail-way.

An Act to alter the line of the Avon and Gloucester Rail-way, to make certain branches from the same, and to amend the Act for making the said rail-way.

An Act for settling disputed rights respecting tithes within the parish of Ashton-under-Lyne, in the county palatine of Lancaster, and for fixing certain annual payments in lieu thereof.

An Act for erecting and maintaining a pier, and other works, for the more conveniently landing and embarking passengers, in the port of the town of Southampton.

An Act for the establishment of a chapel of ease, to be called Grosvenor Chapel, in the parish of St. George, Hanover-square, in the county of Middlesex, and for providing for the maintenance of the said chapel, and a stipend for the minister thereof.

An Act to amend and extend the powers of an Act for recovering, draining, and preserving certain lands, and for better supplying with water the mills, manufactories, and other works, situated on the River Leven, in the counties of Kinross and Fife.

An Act for making a turnpike road (with a branch therefrom) from the Angel Inn, near Darlington, in the county of Durham to Barton Lane-end, in the county of York.

An Act for more effectually repairing the road from Norwich to Cromer, in the county of Norfolk, and two branches of road leading towards Holt, and towards Wolterton, in the said county.

An Act for repairing and improving the road from Doncaster, through Ferrybridge, to the south side of Tadcaster-cross, in the west riding of the county of York.

An Act for more effectually repairing and improving several roads leading into and from the town of Cheltenham, in the county of Gloucester, and for making new branches of roads to communicate therewith.

An Act for making and maintaining a road from Thornset, in the county of Derby, to Furnace-coliery, within Disley, in the county of Chester, and two several branches therefrom.

An Act for more effectually repairing and improving several roads therein mentioned, leading to, through, and from the town of Monmouth, and for making several new lines and diversions of road to communicate therewith, in the counties of Monmouth, Gloucester, and Hereford.

An Act for repairing the road from the bridge on the Old River at Barton, to Brandon-bridge, in the county of Suffolk.

An Act for more effectually repairing and otherwise improving the several roads from the Southgate, in the borough of King's Lynn, into the parishes of East Walton, Narborough, Stoke-ferry, and Downham-market, in the county of Norfolk.

An Act for more effectually repairing the roads from the borough of King's Lynn, and other roads therein mentioned, and for making a new line of road at Castle Rising, all in the county of Norfolk.

An Act for more effectually repairing and improving the road between the city of Durham and the village of Shotley-bridge, in the county of Durham.

An Act for consolidating the trusts of certain

roads, called the Breamish and Wooler Turnpike Roads, in the county of Northumberland, and for more effectually improving and maintaining the same.

An Act for more effectually maintaining and improving the road from Soho-hill, in the parish of Handsworth, to the Walsall-road, on the northern side of Hamstead-bridge, and another road from Brown's-green to the Friary, in the county of Stafford.

An Act for repairing and improving certain roads in the counties of Stafford and Salop, leading to and from the town of Wolverhampton, in the county of Stafford.

An Act for more effectually repairing certain roads leading to and from the town of Abergavenny, in the county of Monmouth, and for making and maintaining several new branches of road to communicate therewith.

An Act for making and maintaining a road from the bottom of Kirkgate to the bottom of Westgate, both in the parish of Wakefield, in the west riding of the county of York.

An Act to amend an Act of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, for more effectually maintaining the road from Teignmouth to Dawlish, and for making roads from Dawlish to the Exeter turnpike roads, together with a road from Southtown to Chudleigh, and certain branches communicating with the same, all in the county of Devon, and to make and maintain other roads communicating with the said roads.

An Act for more effectually repairing, amending, and improving the roads from Liverpool to Prescott, Ashton, and Warrington, in the county palatine of Lancaster.

An Act to continue and amend an Act of the fifth year of His late Majesty, for repairing the roads from Durweston-bridge to Caundle Bishop, and other roads, in the counties of Dorset and Somerset, so far as relates to the vale of Blackmoor turnpike roads.

An Act for making and maintaining a turnpike road from the south end of Mitford-bridge, in the parish of Tedburn Saint Mary, to Chudleigh-bridge, and from Crockham-bridge to the Exeter turnpike road in Chudleigh, all in the county of Devon.

An Act for amending certain roads in the county of Somerset, and for placing them and other roads under the care and management of the Trustees of the Langport, Somerton, and Castle Cary roads.

THE following is a copy of an Order of His Majesty in Council, for dividing the parish of St Oswald, in the county and palatine of Durham, into two separate and distinct parishes, under the 16th section of 58th Geo. III, c. 45 :

At the Court at St. James's, the 13th of July 1831, present, the King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the 58th year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes," it is amongst other things enacted, "that in every case in which the Commissioners appointed for carrying into execution the purposes of the said Act, shall be of opinion that it will be expedient to divide any parish into two or more distinct and separate parishes, for all ecclesiastical purposes whatever, it shall be lawful for the said Commissioners, with the consent of the Bishop of the diocese in which such parish is locally situated, signified under his hand and seal, to apply to the patron or patrons of the church of such parish for his or their consent to make such division, and for such patron or patrons to signify his or their con-

sent thereto, under his or their hand and seal, and the said Commissioners shall, upon the consent of the said patron or patrons so signified, represent the whole matter to His Majesty in Council, and shall state in such representation the bounds by which it is proposed, with such consent as aforesaid, to divide such parish, together with the relative and respective proportions of glebe land, tithes, moduses, or other endowments, which will by such division arise and accrue and remain and be within each of such respective divisions, and also the relative proportions of the estimated amount of the value or produce of fees, oblations, offerings, or other ecclesiastical dues or profits, which may arise and accrue within each of such respective divisions; and if thereupon His Majesty in Council shall think fit to direct such division to be made, such Order of His Majesty in Council shall be valid and good in law for the purpose of effecting such division; provided always, that no such division of any parish into distinct parishes shall completely take effect until after the death, resignation, or other avoidance of the existing incumbent of the parish to be divided;" and whereas by an Act, passed in the 59th year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," and by another Act, passed in the 7th and 8th years of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled "An Act to amend the Acts for building, and promoting the building, of additional churches in populous parishes," further provisions are made for carrying such divisions into effect: and whereas the said Commissioners have made a representation to His Majesty in Council, stating that, in the year 1821, when the last census was taken, the parish of St. Oswald, in the county palatine and diocese of Durham, contained a population of 2520 persons, which has since considerably increased; that there is besides the parish church one chapel in the said parish, which together afford accommodation for about 780 persons, including 100 free seats in the said chapel appropriated to the use of the poor; that the said Commissioners have further represented to His Majesty, that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances attending this parish, it appears to them to be expedient that the said parish should be divided into two distinct and separate parishes, under the 16th section of the said Act, passed in the 58th year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third; and that the said parishes should be named respectively the parish of St. Oswald and the parish of Shincliffe, and that the chapel lately built at Shincliffe should be the parish church of the said parish of Shincliffe, and that the boundaries of the said parish of Shincliffe should be as follows:

The boundary commences at the bridge, over the river Wear, between Durham and Shincliffe, from which it ascends the river southward along the division, between the township of Shincliffe and Houghton, including on the west side of the river, two fields belonging to farms, in Shincliffe, from the latter of which, called the Island, it crosses the river to the point on the south side, where the township of Shintcliffe joins the Chapelry of Croxdale, from which it

passes eastward along the division, between Shincliffe on one side and the Butterby and Tursdale Estates on the other, till arriving at the road from Durham to Sedgfield, it crosses that road, and proceeds eastward, and then northward along the division between Shincliffe and Whitwell House Farms, till arriving at the junction of two small rivulets, it ascends the latter in an eastern direction by the same division, to where Whitwell House Lands meet those of Sherburn Hospital. Then going on to the road from Durham to Hartlepool, it turns northward, and passing the premises of Michael Wheatley, on the north east side, it descends to the river Pitting, which it follows westward to the commencement of the boundary between the parishes of Saint Oswalds and Sherburn, along which it ascends northward to the junction of these two parishes with Saint Giles, from hence it proceeds along the division between Old Durham and Saint Giles Moor, and descends to the river Wear, at the north extremity of Old Durham Estate, and thence follows the river southward to the bridge at Shincliffe, from which it commenced, enclosing the district in the map or plan hereunto annexed, and therein surrounded by a pink line. That there is about one acre of glebe belonging to the original parish of Saint Oswald, but that neither the rectorial or vicarial tithes belong to the Vicar of Saint Oswald's parish, that a money payment in the nature of a modus, arising from farms in the township of Shincliffe, and amounting to five pounds five shillings will belong to the Minister of the new parish of Shincliffe; that it is estimated that the amount of the value or produce of fees, oblations, offerings, and other ecclesiastical dues which will arise in the parish of Shincliffe, will be one fifteenth of the whole amount of those of the present entire parish, that the said chapel at Shincliffe is endowed with five pounds a year three per cent. stock, and with land purchased with money granted by the Commissioners of Queen Ann's Bounty, which produces eighty pounds a year.

That the consents of the Lord Bishop of Durham and of the Dean and Chapter of Durham, the Patrons of the said parish church of Saint Oswald, have been obtained, as required by the above mentioned section of the said Act of the 58th year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third; and humbly praying that His Majesty would be graciously pleased to take the premises into His Royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to His Majesty's wisdom shall seem meet:—His Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the map thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of His Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed division be accordingly made and effected, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts.
