TO all to whom these presents shall come; we the undersigned, the major part of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the county of Chester, assembled at the court of general quarter sessions of the peace, held at Nether Knutsford, in and for the same county, on Monday the nineteenth day of October, in the year of our Lord 1840, send greeting; whereas, by an Act of Parliament, made and passed in the third year of the reign of our Sovereign Lady Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act

to authorize the appointment of additional Coroners for the county palatine of Chester," it was, amongst other things, enacted, that from and immediately after the passing of the said Act, it should be lawful for the Lord High Chancellor, from time to time, upon the application or representation of the justices of the peace for the said county of Chester, in quarter sessions assembled, or at any adjournment thereof, to issue or cause to be issued Her Majesty's writ, de Coronatore Eligendo, for the election of one or more additional head coroner or coroners for the said county of Chester, as in any such application or representation should be required; and it was by the said Act further enacted, that the justices of the peace for the said county, assembled at the quarter sessions to be holden in the month of October in the now present year, or at some adjournment thereof, or at some special sessions to be appointed by them so assembled as aforesaid, should divide the said county (with the exception of that district or portion of the county which was commonly called or known by the name of Halton Fee), into three or more divisions, and should set out and determine the extent of limits of such divisions, and what parishes, townships, extra parochial places, and other portions of the said county should be included therein respectively, and should fix and determine at what place within each division the court for the election of head coroner for such division should be holden, and should cause an instrument to be prepared under the hands and seals of the justices so assembled as aforesaid, or the major part of them, describing the divisions into which the said county should be divided, and the name by which each such division was to be distinguished, and the parishes, townships, extra parochial places, and other portions of the county intended to be included therein respectively, and the place at which the court for the election of the head coroner for such division was to be held, a copy of which instrument should be published in the London Gazette, and also in two or more newspapers published or usually circulated within the said county, and that the original thereof should be deposited with the Clerk of the Peace for the said county, to be by him safely kept amongst the public records of the said county; and that the said county should, after such publication as aforesaid, be deemed to be divided into such divisions as should be so determined and set out as aforesaid, and such divisions should continue and be in force until the same should be altered by the authority and in manner in the said Act mentioned; now we, the major part of the said justices here assembled, having maturely weighed and considered the subject matter of the said recited Act of Parliament, and the several matters and things hereinbefore recited or referred unto, do hereby order, declare, and direct that so much and such part or parts of the several parishes mentioned and set forth in the first schedule to this order annexed as comprise the several townships in the same schedule also set forth, and also the same several townships and the several extra parochial places and other portions of the said county in the same schedule also mentioned and set forth, shall form one division within and for which a head coroner shall be appointed under the provisions of the said recited Act, which said division shall henceforth and for ever hereafter

be called the Knutsford Division; and we do further order, declare and direct, that the place of election of head coroner for such division shall, from time to time hereafter, in the event of any vacancy in the said office, be at Nether Knutsford, in the said county; and we the same justices do hereby further order, declare, and direct, that so much and such parts of the several parishes mentioned and set forth in the second schedule to this order annexed as comprise the several townships in the same schedule also set forth, and also the same several townships and the several extra parochial places and other portions of the said county in the same second schedule also mentioned and set forth, shall form one other or second division within and for which a head coroner shall be appointed under the provisions of the said recited Act, which said last mentioned division shall henceforth and for ever hereafter be called the Chester division; and we do further order, declare, and direct, that the place of election of head coroner for such last mentioned division, shall, from time to time hereafter, in the event of any vacancy in such office, be at the castle of Chester; and we the same justices do hereby further order, declare, and direct, that so much and such parts of the several parishes mentioned and set forth in the third schedule to this order annexed, as comprise the several townships, in the same third schedule also set forth; and also the same several last mentioned townships, and the several extra parochial places, and other portions of the said county in the third schedule also mentioned and set forth, shall form one other or third division within, and for which a head coroner shall be appointed under the provisions of the said recited Act, which said last mentioned division shall henceforth and for ever hereafter be called the Stockport division; and we the same justices do hereby further order, declare, and direct that the place of election of head coroner for such last mentioned division, shall be within that portion of the borough of Stockport which is situate within the county of Chester. In witness whereof, we the said justices have hereunto set our hands and seals, the day and year first before written.

LEADING LIGHTS.

Nov. 1, 1840.

THE Directors of the Preston and Wyre Railway Harbour and Dock Company hereby give notice, that the harbour improvements having been so far completed, under the plans of Captain Henry Mangles Denham, R. N., F. R. S. as to permit a straight course direct from sea into the harbour: the same will be denoted, on and after the 1st day of December next, by the exhibition of two harbour lights, from which date the shore beacon, known as Wyre Mark, will be discontinued. These lights (of fixed white character), will appear to the Mariner in upper and lower order when brought in line upon the bearing of south, to which bearing their brilliancy is limited, and will guide him right up the sea-reach of Wyre according to his draught and time of tide, instead of depending on day-light for navigating the buoyed but serpentine deep. The said lighthouse structures are, in addition to the Screw-pile Lighthouse, erected at the western point of entrance last June; and present for a day leading-line two columns of the relative altitudes of 104 and 44 feet above half-tide level; the inner and higher column rises conspicuously from the town-site, is of red sand-stone colour, and when in line of the lower light appears between the Custom-house and the sea-view hotel, with a spired church half a point westward. The lower lighthouse stands at H. W. mark 850 feet in advance of the higher lighthouse; it is of light-coloured stone, springing from a square colonnade, and makes out in relief when in line of the higher column. The two lights by night, or a black ball at the lower column of the two by day, indicate at the present stage of harbour improvements nine feet water right up, which increases to eighteen upon neaps, and twenty-five feet upon spring tides; whilst in the buoyed deep eighteen at half-tide, twenty-four at H. W. neaps, and thirty-one feet on H. W. springs. The relative height of lights are so arranged as to

dip the higher below the lower when you have passed through the new cut, and may haul south eastward for the mooring-buoys, where twenty feet water is retained at low-water springs. Two black buoys mark the eastern side of the cut, and a black and white chequered buoy the western side. The cut lies at the inner, i. e. southern, portion of the leading line of lights.*
