Whitehal, Fune 13. His Morning His Majelty received an account by an Express from the Mayor of Lyme, That on Thursday last there appeared three Ships off of that place, and that about feven in the Evening the Duke of Monmouth Landed with about 150 Men, and entring the faid Town, poffeffed himfelf of the fame, fending fome of his Traiterous Complices into the Neighbouring Counties to incite the People to an open Rebellion against His Majesty. Whereupon His Majefty caufed His Privy Council to affemble ; And ordered the following Proclamation to be published.

⁻Hereas We bave received Certain Information, That James Duke of Monmouth, Ford late Lord Gray Outlawed for High Treason, with divers other Traytors and Outlaws,

are lately Landed in an Hostile manner at Lyme, in Our County of Dotlet, And have Poffeffed themselves of Our faid Town of Lyme. And bave fent and dispersed some of their Trayterous Complices into the Neighbouring Countries to Incite them to Foyn in open Rebellion against Us.

We do bereby, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, Declare and Publish the faid James Dake of Monmouth, and all bis Complices, Adherents, Ahettors, and Ad-vifers, Traitors and Rebels; And do Command and Require all Our Lieutenants, Deputy-Lieutenants, Sheriffs, Fustices of the Peace, Mayors, Bayliffs, and all other Justices of the Peace, Majors, Bayings, and all ower Our Officers, Civil and Military, to ule their utmosf en-deavours to Seize and Apprehend the faid James Duke of Monmouth, Ford late Lord Gray, and all their faid Confederates and Adherents; And all and every other Person and Persons that shall be Aiding or Abetting the aforefaid Traitors and Rebels; And the faid Perfons, and every of them to Secure until Our furth.r Pleasure be known, as they will answer the contrary at their utmolt Peril.

Given at Our Court at Whitehall this Thirteenth day of Fane 1685. And in the First year of Our Reign.

GOD SAVE THE KING.

And His Majeffy having been pleafed to Communi-cate the faid Intelligence to both His Houfes of Parliament, They immediately refolved to make the following Addreffes to His Majefty, with which they feverally attended His Majefty in the Banquetting Houfe at Whitebal.

The Address of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal in Parliament Affembled.

Is Majesty having been Graciously pleased to impart to this House that he hath this Morning received Intelligence that the Duke of Monmouth and divers other bis Adherents in Hostile maxner, have Landed at Lyme in Dorsetsthire, and taken possible for of the said Town, This House doth therefore Resolve to wait on His Ma-jesty to give him their humble thanks for his favour in imparting the faid Intelligence to this House, and bumbly offer to affift and fland by His Majefty with their Lives and Fortunes against the faid Duke of Monmouth, and all Rebels and Traytors, and all other His Enemies whatfoever.

The Address of the House of Commons.

Most Gracious Soveraign,

E your Majesties most Loyal Subjects, the Commons of England in Parliament affembled, Do with all Daty return our most humble and hearty Thanks for your Majesties Gracious Mesfage, Communicated to us by the Earl of Middleton, one of your Majeflies Principal Secretaries of State, of the Invading this your Kingdom by that Ingrate-ful Rebel Fames Duke of Monmouth, and do with all Duty and Loyalty and utter Deteflation of fuch Rebels and Traytors, affure your Majefty, That we are, and always shall be ready to fland by and affift your Majefty with our Lives and Fortunes, against the faid *fames* Duke of *Monmouth*, his Adherents and Correspondents, and all Rebels and Traytors, and all others whatfoever, that thall affilt them or any of them.

And fince the prefervation of your Majeffics Perfon is of the highest concern to the Peace and Happinels of this Kingdom, We your most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, Do most humbly beleech your Majefty to take more than Ordinary care of your Royal Perfon, which we befeech God long to preferve.

Edinburg, Fune 9. Since our last we have received Intelligence that the late Earl of Argile, upon the Arrival of his Majesties Ships, hath-quitted the Isle of Boot, and is gone over to Cowal, one of the divifions of Argileshire, having first destroyed the Sheriff of Book's Ellate, burnt his Houle, and taken away his Furniture. He has brought his Ships and Boats into Loch fine towards Inverarey, where the Marquis of Atbol and the Earl of Braed Albin were then lying with a confiderable Body of Men; And we dayly expect to hear of Action between them and the Rebels, unless these shall avoid fighting by wasting over from one fide of the Loch to the other, where nevertheles they are now blockt up by his Majeflies Ships lying in the mouth of the Lock. The three Scotch Regiments, that were in the fervice of the States General of the United Provinces are daily expected here from Holland.

Vienna, June 3. We have an account by an Officer arrived this day from Hungary that the Lunenburgh Troops are on their March to joyn the Imperial Forces, which block up Newbensel under the Command of Colonel Heufler and Count Palfiy And that a Party of the Garilon of Gran hath taken a Turk in the difguile of an Hungarian Peafano who was going with Letters from the Buffa of Newhousel to the Vilier of Buda, to let him know the extremity they were reduced to; That the Garifon deferted daily, and that those that remained would be forced in few dayes to capitulate. We have likewife advice that the Turks who were drawn together between Peft and Vaccia were retired , and that they had lent the provisions defigned for the relief of New beufel to Buda fearing they should be attackt by the Imperialists if they stayd there. The 28th past a Regiment of Cuiraffiers which the Elector of Cologne has given the Emperor arrived in the Neighborhood of this City; And the fame day arrived here an Express to give the Emperor an account that the 6000 Men which his Electoral Highnels fends to bis affiltanec
