Esterday Morning His Maje?ly received the News of the Entire Descat if the Rebels, of which we have the following Account.

N Sunday morning the Earl of Fever form marched from Semerton to Weston wi h. in three mil s of Eridgewater; He quartered his Horse and Dragoons in the said Village and Encamped his Foot in an advantagious Post near it, fronting towards a Moore being a specious plain, and having a Ditch before them. In the Evening he had not ce that the Rebels were drawing out of the Town, which made him keep his Troops in a readiness, and fend out frequent Parties to observe them. The Rebels so ordered their March and with so great filence that they found a quiet passage into the said Moor, and there towards Morning formed their Foot in Battle to the number of between 5 and 6000, the late Duke of Monmouth being at the Head of them, and marched near to our Camp. My Lord Feversham having notice of it immediately put his Majeslies Forces, being about 2000 Foot and 700 Horse Grenadiers and Dragoons into a posture to receive them. The Rebels began with a great Volley of shot and shouts, which was returned by ours in the same manner. In the mean time the Rebels were bringing their Horseto second their Foot, but were hindered by a Party of Horse Commanded by Colonel Ogletborpe who engaged them till my Lord of Oxfords Regiment and the Detachement of the Guards came in to form the Line: The refistance of the Rebels Horse which were between 1000 and 1200 Commanded by the late Lord Gray, was very inconfiderable, being never drawn up in a Body but giving way before all that charged them, and soon after quitting the Field. All this while the Foot stood very firm on both sides, and exchanged great Volleys, the Ditch beforementiened hindring them from closing, but our Cannon coming up, and our Horse breaking in upon them they were at last entirely Routed, and three pieces of Cannon, all they had there, taken. About 2000 of them were killed; And many taken Prisoners; The most remarkable among these are Colonel Holms, and Perros his Major, the Constable of Crockeborne. and Williams Servant to the late Duke of Monmouth, who had about him 200 Guineas, all the Monies he fays the faid late Duke had left; The Coat which he ufually wore was likewife taken.

The Earl of Feversham his Majestics Lieutenant General was during the Action every where present giving the necessary Orders with great readiness and Conduct: My Lord Churchil, who Commanded next under him, likewise performed his part with all the Courage and Gallantry imaginable. The Duke of Grafton, and all the Commanders of Batallions and other Officers, behaved themselves with great Resolution and Bravery.

4 Of His Majesties Forces there were about 300 killed, and divers wounded, of whom a farther account will be given in a more particular Relation that will be published of this Action.

After the Field was cleared of the Rebels, the Fail of Feversham Marched with 300 Foot, and some Horse and Dragoons to Bridgwater, the Rebels that were left there having Fled and dispersed themselves in several places. His Lordship left these Men in the Town under the Command of Colonel Kirke; A dhearing that the late Duke of Monnouth was bled with about 30 Horse, the greatest number of the Rebels that were left together, he sent out several Parties in pursuit of them.

My Lord Feversham intended to March yesterday with His Majestics Forces to Wells, and this day to Bath.

Venice, June 25. We have advice that the Turkish Fleet Commanded by the Captain Bassa hash appeared off of Scio with several Men of War of Barbary; That they have but 45 Gallies, and that these are so ill provided, that the Coptain Bassa hath sent 12 of them back to the Dardenelles; The Men of War are likewise very ill Manned, the largest not having above 200 Men on Board. The last Letters from Constantinople informed us that the Grand Signior will remain at Adrianople during the Campagne; But that to encourage the Troopsit was given out that the Grand Visier will go into the Field with them. And that a great Convoy was arrived at Constantinoplewith Provisions and Ammunition from Alexandria, We are informed by the way of Otranto that Captain General Morosini is Sailed from Prevesa to go and meet the Turkish Fleet.

Vienna, June 24. The Letters from the Army give an account that the Duke of Lorrain expected the coming up of the Artillery and a great Convoy of Provisions, after which he would attack Newbeufel or Novigrad. Count Leslie will part from hence in fews days for Croatia, where he is to Command the Emperors Forces; The National Troops of that Country are in the mean time drawing together, and will be in a Body by that time General Leslie arrives there. They write from Cracow of the 18th Instant that the differences between that Crown and the Moscovites are in a fair way to be accommodated. And that the King of Poland is expected at Leopol about the middle of the next month, having appointed the General Rendezvous of his Army to be near that

Commanded by the Dake of Lorrain; Prince Wa deck is to Command the Foot as Marcichal de Camp General, and will have under him the Dune de croy General of the A.tillery, the Prince of Newbourg Great Malter of the Teutonich Otder, the Count de Souch-s, and the Count de Scheiffenberg, the two latter in quality of Majir Generals. The Count de Caprara is to Command the Horse as Mareichal de Camp General, and under him Prince Louis of Baden and the Count de Dunewaldt as Generals of Horie, the Count de Palfi is to be Lieutenant General, Count Taff, the Bason de Mercy, the Count de Lodron, and the Count de Stieum Major Generals. The Prince de Salms is to Command the Cavalry in Croatia, and the Marquis de Lavergee the Infantry under General Lofte. And the Emper re Forces that are to act against the Rebels in Upper Hungary will be Commanded by General Senuaz. The fail advice we have from the Turkish Territories is, that there are 12000 Nen in Garison in Buda with the necessary Provision as well of Victuals as Ammu nition for its defence; That leveral thouland Turks have lately passed the Bridge of Eseck, but that the Serasquier is fill with the rest of the Ottoman Army at Belgrade expecting the Proops of Afix; That he has a politive Command from the Grand Signior to hazardall for the relief of Newbeufel. And that he has sent orders to 10000 Tartars to affist Count Teckeley. They write from Presbourg that the Count de Caprara has been with 3000 Horie very near Novigrad, and that upon his approach the Garison which has been lately reinforced with 500 Januaries abandoned the Town and retired into the Castle be-Lieving the Christians were coming to ittack them. The Elector of Baviria is expected here in the beginning of the next month; The 15th b ing fixed for the C. lebrating his Marriage with the Arch Dutches; His Electoral Highness will im a short time after go for Hungary to put him elf at the Head of his Forces; Which in the interim are to obey the Orders of the Duke of Lorrain. The Count de Lobcowits whom the Emperor has named to go in quality of h s Envoy xtraordinary to the Most Christian King is preparing for his departure.

The Duke of Saxe Gothi and the Count de Hobenloe are arrived here; The latter is fent by the Emperor to several Princes of the Empire · And it's faid he has a particular Commis floa to endeavour to compose the differences between the Elector of Cologne and this City; And that to that end he as already had feveral Conferences with the Burgermaster Billein. The Letters from Vienna zell us that the Duke of Lorrain was marching with the Imperial Army to attack Novigrad.
