WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the first year of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend an Act for the regulation of municipal corporations in England and Wales," it is, amongst other things, enacted, that if the inhabitant householders of any town or borough in England or Wales shall petition His Majesty to grant to them a charter of incorporation, it shall be lawful for His Majesty, by any such charter, if he shall think fit, by the advice of His Privy Council, to grant the same, to extend to the inhabitants of any such town or borough, within the district to be set forth in such charter, all the powers and provisions of the Act of the fifth and sixth William the Fourth, cap. 76, for regulating corporations, whether such town or borough be or be not a corporate town or borough, or be or be not named in either of the schedules to the said Act; provided, nevertheless, that notice of every such petition, and of the time when it shall please His Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by His Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, one month at least before such petition shall be so considered :

And whereas the inhabitant householders of the borough of Warrington, in the county of Lancaster, have presented a petition to Her Majesty in Council, praying, that a charter of incorporation may be granted to the said borough; Her Majesty was this day pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the said petition be taken into consideration, by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on Tuesday the eleventh day of August next.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the ninth section of an Act, passed in the

session of Parliament holden in the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for the further amendment of the church building Acts," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the tenth day of February one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, in the words following, viz.

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances attending the several parishes of Saint John the Baptist and Saint Oswald, both in the city and diocese of Chester, it appears to them to be expedient to unite certain contiguous parts of the said parishes, and to form the same into one consolidated chapelry for the consecrated church, called Saint Paul's Church, situate in the said parish of Saint John the Baptist, for all ecclesiastical purposes, under the provisions of the ninth section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the eighth and ninth years of the reign of your Majesty, intituled "An Act for the further amendment of the church building Acts;" and that such consolidated chapelry should be named, "The Consolidated Chapelry of Saint Paul, Chester," with boundaries as hereinafter mentioned :

"The consolidated chapelry of Saint Paul, Chester, is to consist of the township of Great Boughton (being an out-township and part of the said parish of Saint Oswald) and a portion of the said parish of Saint John the Baptist, including Spital Boughton; the part taken from the said parish being bounded on the north by the Ellesmere and Chester Canal; on the east by the said township of Great Boughton; on the south by the river Dee; and on the west by Stephen-street, the east side of which is included in the said consolidated chapelry, and then by a line passing from the end of Stephen-street, across Foregate-street, to the west of a public-house known by the sign of the Coach and Horses; and thence by an imaginary line drawn in a southerly direction through Mr. Baxter's grounds to the river Dee. The part taken from the said parish of Saint Oswald, and called the township of Great Boughton, as aforesaid, being bounded on or towards the north by the parish of Plemstall; on the west by the respective parishes of Plemstall,
