REGULATIONS TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S DRAWING-ROOM.

The Ladies, who purpose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing-Room, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names legibly written thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance in the Presence-chamber, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to Her Majesty.

And those Ladies who are to be presented are hereby informed, that it is absolutely necessary that their names, together with the names of the Ladies who are to present them, should be sent in to the Lord Chamberlain's Office on *Tuesday the 30th of March instant, before twelve o'clock*, in order that they may be submitted for the Queen's approbation; it being Her Majesty's command, that no presentation shall take place unless the name of the Lady presenting, together with that of the Lady to be presented, shall appear on the card to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, which name shall correspond with those previously sent in to the Lord Chamberlain's Office.

It is particularly requested, that in every case *written cards only* be delivered.

NOTICE is hereby given, that the carriages proceeding to Her Majesty's Drawing-Room, at St. James's-Palace, on Thursday the 1st of April, are to fall into line and go down the left-hand side of St. James's-street, enter at the iron gate nearest the Palace, set down at the Arcade, turn round, and go out by the iron gate nearest Marlborough-House, to wait in St. James's-square. When called, they are to pass from the square

through Charles-street, into Regent-street and Jermyn-street, come down St. James's-street as before, take up, and go away through Pall-Mall.

No hackney carriages will be admitted within the gates.

For all persons having the privilege of the *entrée*, tickets will be delivered at the Board of Green Cloth, on Tuesday next, from eleven till three o'clock; their carriages are to pass through Constitution-hill-gate, into St. James's-Park: those belonging to the Ambassadors and Foreign Ministers are to set down at the Ambassadors'-entrance in Marlborough-court, at the east end of St. James's-Palace, and wait there till called: those belonging to the Cabinet Ministers and Great Officers of State are to set down in the Middle-court, and wait there: the carriages of all other persons having the *entrée* are likewise to set down in the Middle-court, and wait in Stable-yard, or St. James's-Park, till called: they are then to take up in the same order as they had set down, and pass away up St. James's-street.

No carriage will be admitted with company a second time with the same ticket; to prevent which, it must be produced at Constitution-hill-gate, and Stable-yard-gate also, where a corner of it will be torn off by the Marshalmen in attendance; and no person can be allowed the privilege of the *entrée* by any other approach to the Palace than as above directed.

the middle of that road to the spot marked **B** on the said map or plan, where the said road joins the road from Totness to Buckfastleigh and Ashburton, and from that spot the boundary proceeds in a direct line westward to the river Dart, and then proceeds northerly, north-easterly, and southerly, along the boundary line, separating the parishes of Buckfastleigh, Ashburton, Woodland, and Broadhempstone, from the parish of Staverton, to the said point marked **A**, as such district chapelry of Landscope is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured pink.

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Saint Germans, in the county of Cornwall, and in the diocese of Exeter, it appears to them to be expedient that particular districts should be assigned to the consecrated churches of Saint Anne, at Hessenford, and Saint Luke, at Tideford, in the said parish of Saint Germans, under and by virtue of the power or authority for this purpose contained in the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes;' and also in the third section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to certain churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes;' or under and by virtue of any and every other power or authority in this behalf vested in your Majesty's said Commissioners by the Church Building Acts, and that such proposed districts should be respectively named or called 'The District Chapelry of Hessenford' and 'The District Chapelry of Tideford,' and that the respective boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

"The district chapelry of Hessenford is bounded on the north and north-east by the turnpike-road leading from Liskeard to Torpoint, on the south-east by the parish of Sheviocke, on the south by the English Channel, and on the west by the parishes of Saint Martin and Morval, as such district chapelry is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured yellow.

"The district chapelry of Tideford is bounded on the east by the parish of Landrake, on the north partly by the parish of Quethiock and partly by the parish of Menheniot, on the north-west by the said parish of Menheniot, and on the south-west and partly on the south by the turnpike-road from Liskeard to Torpoint, as far as the point where the said road meets the road leading to the village of Tideford, and on the south is bounded by the latter road and the stream, as far as the said parish of Landrake, as such district chapelry is more particularly delineated on the said map or plan, and thereon coloured green.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent, that it also appears to them to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, should be solemnized or performed in the said church of Saint Anne, at Hessenford; and also that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, and churchings, and likewise burials (upon a burial ground being provided) should be solemnized or performed in the said church of Saint Luke, at Tideford, and that the

fees to arise therefrom (except those from marriages) should be forthwith paid and belong to the respective incumbents for the time being of the said churches at Hessenford and Tideford; and that the fees from marriages should be paid and belong to the incumbents for the time being of the said churches at Hessenford and Tideford, upon and after the next avoidance of the parish church of the said parish of Saint Germans.

"That the consent of the Right Reverend Henry, Bishop of the said diocese of Exeter, has been obtained thereto, as required by the Acts and sections hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that on the eighteenth day of April one thousand eight hundred and forty-three, your Majesty's said Commissioners, with the consent of the late Right Reverend James, Bishop of the diocese of Lichfield, made a representation to your Majesty in Council that it appeared to them to be expedient, and therefore humbly prayed, that a particular district might be assigned to the consecrated church of Saint Michael, at Brereton, in the parish of Rugeley, in the county of Stafford, and in the said diocese of Lichfield, under and by virtue of the power or authority for such purpose contained in the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament,

' for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes;' and that such proposed district should be called 'The Chapelry District of Brereton;' and that the boundaries thereof should be such as were mentioned or described in the said representation :

" Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that by an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the tenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and forty-three, your Majesty was graciously pleased, by and with the advice of your Privy Council, to approve of the assignment of the said district, and was pleased to order that the same should be accordingly made, and also that the recommendations of your Majesty's said Commissioners in respect of the solemnization of baptisms, churchings, and burials, and the fees arising therefrom, should be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Act :

" Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that the said Order in Council did not direct that banns of marriage should be published and marriages solemnized in the said church of Saint Michael, at Brereton aforesaid, and that having taken into consideration the present circumstances of the said district so assigned to the said church, it appears to your Majesty's said Commissioners to be expedient that banns of marriage should hereafter be published, and that marriages should hereafter be solemnized or performed in the said church of Saint Michael, at Brereton aforesaid, and that a supplemental Order for such purpose should be made, pursuant to the provisions of the fourth section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the seventh and eighth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled ' An Act concerning banns and marriages in certain district churches or chapels,' and that the fees to arise therefrom should be paid and belong to the minister or incumbent of the said church of Saint Michael, at Brereton aforesaid, for the time being :

" That the consent of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of the said diocese of Lichfield, has been obtained thereto, as required by the Act and section lastly hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation :

" Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto, as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is by this supplemental Order ordered, that the recommendations of the said Commissioners in respect of the publication of banns and the solemnization of marriages, and the fees arising therefrom, be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Act ; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased to direct, that this supplemental Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Lichfield.

" Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of West Derby, in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Chester, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church of Saint Stephen the Martyr, situate at Edge Hill, in the said parish of West Derby, under and by virtue of the power or authority in this behalf contained in the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled ' An Act to amend ' and render more effectual an Act, passed in the ' last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in ' populous parishes;' and in the third section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled ' An Act to make better provision ' for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts ' to churches or chapels augmented by the ' Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and ' for other purposes;' or under and by virtue of any and every other power or authority in this behalf vested in your Majesty's said Commissioners by the Church Building Acts, and that such proposed district should be named or called ' The District Chapelry of Saint Stephen, Edge Hill,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say: the said district chapelry commences at the northern end of High-street, Edge Hill, and proceeds southerly by an imaginary line down the middle of High-street, Sidney-place, and Myers-street, as far as Smithdown-lane; then south-easterly along the middle of Smithdown-lane to its junction with Falkner-street; then westerly along the middle of Falkner-street into Crown-street, and along the middle of that street, north-westerly, to its junction with West Derby-street; then south-easterly, along the middle of West Derby-street, Mount Vernon-road and Irvine-street, to a point opposite to the northern end of High-street, crossing over to the northern end of High-street, where the said district chapelry commenced, and as the same is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured pink :

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent to your Majesty, that it also appears to them to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, and churchings, and likewise burials (upon a burial ground being provided for the said district chapelry), should be solemnized or performed in the said church of Saint Stephen, at Edge Hill, and that the fees to arise therefrom should be equally divided between the rector or incumbent for the time being of the said parish of West Derby and the minister or incumbent for the time being of the said church of Saint Stephen, at Edge Hill aforesaid.

"That the consent of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of the said diocese of Chester, has been obtained thereto, as required by the Acts and sections hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment be accordingly made; and the recommendations of the said Commissioners, in respect of the publication of banns, and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, and the fees arising therefrom, be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Chester.

and His Royal Highness the Prince Albert, having passed into the Throne Room) they proceeded, with the Officers of the Order, into the presence of the Sovereign.

The Sovereign was then pleased to signify Her royal pleasure touching the election of a Knight into the Order; whereupon the Knights Brethren proceeded to the election, and the suffrages having been collected by the Secretary (commencing with the junior Knight), were by him, kneeling, presented to the Sovereign, who was pleased to declare, that the Right Honourable Alexander-George, Lord Saltoun, had been duly elected a Knight of the Most Ancient and Most Noble Order of the Thistle.

Then, by command of the Sovereign, Lord Saltoun was received at the door of the Chapter Room by the Marquess of Breadalbane and the Earl of Camperdown, the two junior Knights Brethren present, and conducted between them to Her Majesty, preceded by the Secretary (bearing on a velvet cushion the ensigns of the Order), and by the Gentleman Usher of the Green Rod.

Lord Saltoun (being already a Knight) was not knighted on this occasion; but standing on the right hand of the Sovereign, the oath was administered to his Lordship by the Secretary.

His Lordship then kneeling near the Sovereign, and the Secretary on his knee presenting to Her Majesty the Ribband and Jewel of the Order, the Queen was graciously pleased to place the same over Lord Saltoun's left shoulder.
