Appointment of Legal Quay.

WE, the undersigned Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, do hereby, under the authority of an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the ninth and tenth years of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to amend the Laws relating to the Customs," appoint the place hereinafter mentioned within the Port of Peterhead to be a Legal Quay for the lading and unlading of goods, and we do hereby declare the extent of such Quay to be as follows; that is to say: all that open place, quay, or wharf situate on the north side of the entrance to the South Harbour, called the West Pier, being in length from east to west one hundred and fifty feet, and from north to south with the bend opposite the Harbour Street seven hundred and eighty-seven feet.

And we, the said Lords Commissioners, do hereby annul all other Legal Quays already set out or appointed within the said port of Peterhead.
