AT the Court at Buckingham Palace, the 8th day of June, 1854,

PRESENT.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act "to amend and render more effectual an Act passed "in the last session of Parliament for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes," and of the third section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the second and third years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision "for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the "Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and "for other purposes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a representation, bearing date the twenty-seventh day of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, in the words following, viz.:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent, that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Saint Martin, Birmingham, in the county of Warwick, and in the diocese of Worcester, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church of Saint John, situate at Ladywood, in the said parish of Saint Martin, Birmingham, under and by virtue of the power and authority contained in the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of King George the Third, intituled 'An 'Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional 'churches in populous parishes,' and in the third section of an Act of Parliament, made and passed in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes,' and that such proposed district should be called or named The District Chapelry of Saint John Ladywood, Birmingham,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

" The boundary line of the said district chapelry commences at the southern angle where Ladywood-lane is met by Morville-street, and proceeds along the middle of Morville-street north-easterly to the Wolverhampton and Birmingham Canal; then north-westerly along the middle of that canal as far as the Dudley-road; then westerly along the middle of the Dudley-road as far as the Public-house called the Cape of Good Hope and the boundary-line of the parish of Harborne; then south-westerly along such boundary as far as the Bear Inn, where it meets the boundary-line of the parish of Edgbaston; then easterly along such boundary-line across the reservoir, and along the middle of the Reservoir-road and Ladywood-lane to Morville-street aforesaid, where the boundaryline of the said district chapelry commenced; and as the same is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed and thereon coloured pink.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that it also appears to them to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, and churchings should be solemnized and performed in the said church of Saint John at Ladywood aforesaid, and that the fees to arise therefrom should be paid and belong to the minister or incumbent of such church for the time being.

"That the consent of the Right Reverend Henry Bishop of the said diocese of Worcester, has been obtained thereto, as required by the Acts and sections hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto, as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint John, situate at Ladywood, in the parish of Saint Martin, Birmingham, be accordingly made, and the

recommendations of the said Commissioners in respect of the publication of banns, and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, and churchings in the said church, and the fees to arise therefrom, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Worcester.

Brighton and Newhaven Road.

WHEREAS the Trustees of the Brighton and Newhaven Turnpike Road, acting under the powers of the Local Act of the 5th of George the Fourth, cap. 91, have made application to Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, pursuant to the Act of the session holden in the 14th and 15th years of the reign of Her present Majesty, cap. 38, for a Provisional Order upon the terms following; viz.:

To reduce the rate of interest on the mortgage debt charged or secured on the tolls or revenues of the said road from the sum of five pounds per centum, per annum, to the sum of two pounds per centum, per annum, and to extinguish the whole of the arrears of interest due upon the said debt.

And whereas the said application is dated the fifteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, and is signed by three of the said trustees, who therein certify that the persons entitled to two-thirds of the money charged or secured on the tolls of the said road, and remaining unpaid, have signified their consents in writing under their hands to the said application.

And whereas it appears desirable to Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department that the aforesaid application should be granted upon the terms herein set forth.

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the power and authority of the said Act of the 14th and 15th of Victoria, cap. 38, given to me as one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, I do by this Provisional Order under my hand declare, subject to the confirmation hereof by Parliament, that from the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, the rate of interest shall be reduced from five pounds to two pounds per centum per annum, upon the bonded or mortgage debt of ten thousand six hundred and fifty pounds, charged or secured upon the tolls or revenues of the said road, and that the whole of the arrears of interest due and remaining unpaid upon the said debt, at that date, shall be extinguished.
