REGULATIONS TO BE OBSERVED AT THE QUEEN'S DRAWING-ROOMS, AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

The Ladies, who purpose to attend Her Majesty's Drawing-Rooms, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names clearly written thereon, one to be left with the Queen's Page in Attendance in the Ante-room, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the same to Her Majesty.

Those Ladies who are to be presented at the Drawing-Room on the 14th of June next, are hereby informed, it is absolutely necessary that their names, with the names of the Ladies who are to present them, should be delivered at the Lord Chamberlain's Office before twelve o'clock, on the Tuesday previous to the Drawing-Room, or upon any earlier day, between the hours of eleven and four, in order that they may be submitted for The Queen's approbation; it being Her Majesty's command, that no presentation shall take place, unless the name of the Lady presenting, together with that of the Lady to be presented, shall appear on the card to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, which names shall correspond with those previously sent in to the Lord Chamberlain's Office. No presentations will take place at the Drawing-Room on the 19th of May next.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be very distinctly written upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

The Queen has been pleased to direct that the following Regulations respecting Foreign Orders and Medals shall be substituted for those now in force:

Regulations respecting Foreign Orders

- 1. No subject of Her Majesty shall accept a Foreign Order from the sovereign of any foreign country, or wear the insignia thereof, without having previously obtained Her Majesty's permission to that effect, signified by a Warrant under Her Royal Sign Manual.
- 2. Such permission shall not be granted to any subject of Her Majesty, unless the Foreign Order shall have been conferred in consequence of active and distinguished service before the enemy, either at sea or in the field; or unless he shall have been actually and entirely employed, beyond Her Majesty's dominions, in the service of the foreign sovereign by whom the Order is conferred.
- 3. The intention of a foreign sovereign to confer upon a British subject the insignia of an Order, must be notified to Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, either through the British minister accredited at the court of such foreign sovereign, or through his minister accredited at the court of Her Majesty.
- 4. If the service for which it is proposed to confer the Order has been performed during war, the notification required by the preceding clause must be made not later than two years after the exchange of the ratifications of a Treaty of Peace.

If the service has been performed in time of peace, the notification must be made within two years after the date of such service.

5. After such notification shall have been received, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs shall, if the case comes within the conditions prescribed by the present regulations, and arises from naval or military services before the enemy, refer it to Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the War Department, previously to taking Her Majesty's pleasure there-

upon, in order to ascertain whether there be any objection to Her Majesty's permission being granted.

A similar reference shall also be made to the Commander-in-chief, if the application relates to an officer in the Army, or to the Lords of the Admiralty, if it relates to an officer in the Navy.

6. When Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs shall have taken the Queen's pleasure on any such application, and shall have obtained Her Majesty's permission for the person in whose favour it has been made to accept the Foreign Order, and wear the insignia thereof, he shall signify the same to Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, in order that he may cause the Warrant required by clause 1 to be prepared for the Royal Sign Manual.

When such Warrant shall have been signed by the Queen, a notification thereof shall be inserted in the Gazette, stating the service for which the

Foreign Order has been conferred.

- 7. The Warrant signifying Her Majesty's permission, may, at the request and at the expense of the person who has obtained it, be registered in the College of Arms.
- 8. Every such Warrant as aforesaid shall contain a clause providing that Her Majesty's licence and permission do not authorize the assumption of any style, appellation, rank, precedence, or privilege appertaining to a Knight Bachelor of Her Majesty's realms.
- 9. When a British subject has received the Royal permission to accept a Foreign Order, he will at any future time be allowed to accept the decoration of a higher class of the same Order, to which he may have become eligible by increase of rank in the foreign service, or in the service of his own country; or any other distinctive mark of honour strictly consequent upon the acceptance of the original Order, and common to every person upon whom such Order is conferred.
- 10. The preceding clause shall not be taken to apply to decorations of the Guelphic Order which were bestowed on British subjects by Her Majesty's predecessors, King George IV and King William IV, on whose heads the crowns of Great Britain and of Hanover were united.

Decorations so bestowed cannot properly be considered as rewards granted by a foreign sovereign for services rendered according to the purport of clause 2 of these regulations. They must be rather considered as personal favours bestowed on British subjects by British Sovereigns, and as having no reference to services rendered to the foreign crown of Hanover.

Regulations respecting Foreign Medals.

- 1. Application for permission to accept and wear medals which; not being the decoration of any foreign Order, are conferred by a foreign sovereign on British subjects in the Army or in the Navy for military or for naval services, should be addressed, as the case may be, to the Commander-in-chief, the Master-General of the Ordnance, or the Lords of the Admiralty, who, if they see fit, may submit the same to Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs for Her Majesty's sanction; upon obtaining which, they may grant such permission without any other formality.
- 2. Permission to wear a foreign medal cannot be granted to a British subject, unless such medal

is bestowed for military or naval services performed by the command or with the sanction of Her Majesty. But no permission is necessary for accepting a foreign medal, if such medal is not to be worn.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, the subjoined copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at Varna, enclosing copy of a Despatch addressed by him to Sir Edmund Lyons, respecting the existence of a dangerous current which prevails to the northward of Kalakria.

(Copy.)

My Lord, Varna, April 25, 1855. I HAVE the honour to transmit herewith, for the information of your Lordship, a copy of a Despatch which I have addressed to Rear-Admiral Sir Edmund Lyons respecting the general belief which prevails among sea-faring men with whom I have had the opportunity of conversing, respecting a current which is stated to set into the westward and north-westward, by which vessels navigating from Odessa, or the mouths of the Danube, to Varna or the Bosphorus, or from the Crimea to Varna, have been frequently drawn upon the shoals at Shabla.

Varna, April 23, 1855. SIR,

I HAVE the honour to acquaint you, that six merchant vessels have been wrecked during the last month, between Shabla and Mangolia, on this coast, all bound from Kamiesh to Varna. Of these, three were British -- the "Edinburgh," steamer, the "Banshee," barque, and the "Economy," schooner, and were all wrecked on the 15th ultimo.

H. M. steam sloop "Inflexible," being then at Varna, Commander Popplewell most promptly went to the assistance of the crews, consisting of about sixty persons, and brought them off. They were subsequently transferred, at Burzhas, from the "Inflexible" to H. M. S. "Harpy," which conveyed them to Constantinople.

The log-book of these vessels not having been brought to Varna, I am unable to state the precise circumstances attending the loss of these vessels. I deem it, however, to be my duty to bring under your notice the frequently expressed opinion of masters of merchantmen of all nations, and pilots, navigating the Black Sea, respecting the predominating causes of the shipwrecks, which have so continually occurred in the locality referred to.

In the month of December, 1852, no less than thirteen vessels, English, French, Austrian, and Sardinian, within the space of a week, went on shore near Point Shabla; and the masters of those vessels, who came to Varna, were unanimously of opinion, that a strong current sets into the westward and north-westward, drawing vessels navigating southwards from Odessa or the Mouths of the Danube, and bound for Varna or the Bosphorus, upon Shabla.

In the opinion of seafaring men, long resident on this coast, vessels so bound, and encountering northerly or north-easterly gales, incur the risk of being drawn, by the current, upon Shabla, while endeavouring to seek shelter under Cape Kalakria; the force of the current not being generally known, shipwrecks have occurred in that locality in dark and foggy weather, even without the prevalence of stormy weather.

In like manner vessels bound from the Crimea to Varna, and not steering a sufficiently S. W. course to allow for the current, are liable in thick or stormy weather, to be set to the northward, and to fall into the influence of the current referred to as prevailing to the northward of Kala-

WHEREAS the Trustees of the Butterton Moor, Warslow, Hartington, and Longnor Turnpike Road, acting under the powers of the Local Act of the 3rd of William the Fourth, cap. 97, have made application to Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, pursuant to the Act of the session holden in the 14th and 15th years of the reign of Her present Majesty, cap. 38, for a Provisional Order, to reduce the rate of interest on the mortgage debt charged or secured on the tolls or revenues of the said road, and to extinguish the whole of the arrears of interest due upon the said debt;

And whereas the said application is dated the seventeenth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, and is signed by three of the said trustees, who therein certify that the persons entitled to two-thirds of the money charged or secured on the tolls of the said road, and remaining unpaid, have signified their consents in writing under their hands to the said application;

And whereas it appears desirable to Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department that the aforesaid application should be granted upon the terms herein set forth;

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the power and authority of the said Act of the 14th and 15th of Victoria, cap. 38, given to me as one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and in conformity with the said application, I do, by this Provisional Order, under my hand, declare, subject to the confirmation hereof by Parliament, -that from the thirty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, the rate of interest shall be reduced from five pounds to three pounds ten shillings per centum, per annum, upon the bonded or mortgage debt of three thousand six hundred and eighty-seven pounds fourteen shillings and nine pence, charged or secured upon the tolls or revenues of the said road; and that the whole of the arrears of interest due and remaining unpaid upon the said debt at that date shall be extinguished.
