THE Queen has been graciously pleased to signify her intention to confer the Decoration of the Victoria Cross on the undermentioned Officers and Non-Commissioned Officer of Her Majesty's Army, who have been recommended to Her Majesty for that Decoration,—in accordance with the rules laid down in Her Majesty's Warrant of the 29th January, 1856,—on account of Acts of Bravery performed by them before the enemy during the late War, as recorded against their several names, viz. :

Regiment.	Rank and Name.	Act of Bravery for which recommended.
Royal Artillery ...	Lieutenant Christopher Charles Teesdale, C.B. Date of Act of Bravery, 29th September, 1855	For gallant conduct, in having, while acting as Aide-de-Camp to Major-General Sir William Fenwick Williams, Bart., K.C.B., at Kars, volunteered to take command of the force engaged in the defence of the most advanced part of the works,—the key of the position—against the attack of the Russian Army; when, by throwing himself into the midst of the enemy, who had penetrated into the above redoubt, he encouraged the garrison to make an attack, so vigorous, as to drive out the Russians therefrom, and prevent its capture; also for having, during the hottest part of the action, when the enemy's fire had driven the Turkish Artillerymen from their guns, rallied the latter, and by his intrepid example induced them to return to their post; and further, after having led the final charge which completed the victory of the day, for having, at the greatest personal risk, saved from the fury of the Turks, a considerable number of the disabled among the enemy, who were lying wounded outside the works,—an action witnessed, and acknowledged gratefully before the Russian Staff, by General Mouravieff.
13th Light Dragoons	Serjeant Joseph Malone Date of Act of Bravery, 25th October, 1854	For having stopped under a very heavy fire to take charge of Captain Webb, 17th Lancers, until others arrived to assist him in removing that Officer, who was (as it afterwards proved) mortally wounded. Serjeant Malone performed this act of bravery while returning on foot from the charge at the Battle of Balaklava, in which his horse had been shot.
7th Fusiliers (late)...	Captain Henry Mitchell Jones Date of Act of Bravery, 7th June, 1855	For having distinguished himself, while serving with the party which stormed and took the Quarries, before Sebastopol, by repeatedly leading on his men to repel the continual assaults of the enemy during the night. Although wounded early in the evening, Captain Jones remained unflinchingly at his post until after daylight the following morning.
18th Regiment ...	Captain Thomas Esmonde Date of Acts of Bravery, 18th and 20th June, 1855	For having, after being engaged in the attack on the Redan, repeatedly assisted, at great personal risk under a heavy fire of shell and grape, in rescuing wounded men from exposed situations; and also, while in command of a covering party, two days after, for having rushed with the most prompt and daring gallantry to a spot where a fire-ball from the enemy had just been lodged, which he effectually extinguished, before it had betrayed the position of the working party under his protection,—thus saving it from a murderous fire of shell and grape, which was immediately opened upon the spot where the fire-ball had fallen.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation of the duties of postage," power is given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury from time to time, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British postage payable by law on the transmission by the post of foreign or colonial letters or newspapers, or of any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant.

And whereas further powers are given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by another Act of Parliament, passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post-office."

And whereas certain powers are also given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury by another Act of Parliament passed in the eighteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act to amend the laws relating to the stamp duties on newspapers, and to provide for the transmission by post of printed periodical publications."

And whereas a convention hath been lately made and concluded between the Post-office of the United Kingdom and the Post-office of Belgium, for regulating the communications by post between the United Kingdom and Belgium. And it is expedient for the better carrying out of the same, that certain regulations should be made in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

Now, we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers reserved to us in and by the said hereinbefore-recited Acts of Parliament respectively, and every of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do by his Warrant under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners, by the authority of the Statute in that case made and provided, order and direct as follows, that is to say:

1. On every letter not exceeding one half of an ounce in weight, posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to Belgium, or posted in Belgium addressed to the United Kingdom, and transmitted by the post between any part of the United Kingdom and any place in Belgium, whether forwarded between Belgium and the United Kingdom by packet boat or by private ship, and whether conveyed between the United Kingdom and Belgium direct, or sent in closed mails via France, there shall be charged and taken, an uniform rate of British postage of two pence, if such postage shall be paid either in money or by postage stamps at the time of posting the letter, and an uniform rate

of British postage of four pence, if such postage shall not be paid at the time of posting the same. And if any such letter shall be insufficiently pre-paid either in money or by postage stamps when posted, every such letter shall be charged with a postage of double the amount of the deficiency.

2. On every letter not exceeding one-half of an ounce in weight posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to any foreign country, and transmitted by the post *viâ* Belgium, or posted in any foreign country addressed to the United Kingdom, and transmitted by the post *viâ* Belgium, whether conveyed between the United Kingdom and Belgium by packet-boat or private ship direct, or sent in closed mails *viâ* France, (letters forwarded in the closed mails between the United Kingdom and Prussia or Holland excepted), there shall be charged and taken a uniform rate of British postage of sixpence.

3. On every letter not exceeding one-half of an ounce in weight, transmitted by the post between Belgium or any of Her Majesty's colonies, or any foreign country *viâ* Belgium, and any of Her Majesty's colonies, or any foreign country through the United Kingdom, conveyed direct by packet-boat or private ship between the United Kingdom and Belgium, or sent in closed mails *viâ* France, there shall be charged and taken a uniform rate of British postage of two pence for the conveyance of every such letter between Belgium and any part of the United Kingdom, and also such a further or additional rate of British postage for the conveyance of every such letter between the port in the United Kingdom, of the departure or arrival of the packet or ship conveying the same, and the colony or foreign country to or from which the same shall be forwarded, as shall, from time to time, be charged and payable for British postage on letters not exceeding half an ounce in weight, posted or delivered at the port in the United Kingdom, of the departure or arrival of the packet or ship conveying the same, and transmitted direct between such port and any such colony or foreign country.

4. All such respective letters so respectively transmitted as aforesaid, if exceeding half an ounce in weight, shall be subject to the several further and additional and progressive rates of postage hereinafter mentioned, that is to say :

On every letter so transmitted, if exceeding one half of an ounce in weight, and not exceeding one ounce in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, two rates of postage.

And on every letter so transmitted, if exceeding one ounce, and not exceeding two ounces in weight, four rates of postage.

And on every letter so transmitted, if exceeding two ounces and not exceeding three ounces in weight, six rates of postage.

And for every ounce in weight of any letter so respectively transmitted as aforesaid above the weight of three ounces, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, two additional rates of postage. And every fractional part of such additional ounce shall be charged as an additional ounce in weight, and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this clause, shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such letter would be charged with under this Warrant, if not exceeding one half of an ounce in weight.

5. All packets consisting of printed newspapers not exceeding four ounces in weight, posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to Belgium, and transmitted by the post between any part of the United Kingdom and any place in Belgium, whether conveyed between the United Kingdom and Belgium, direct by packet-boat or private ship, or sent in closed mails *viâ* France, may be so transmitted in

conformity with, and under, and subject to the several orders, directions, regulations and conditions hereinafter mentioned and contained, relating thereto, and there shall be charged, taken, and paid for the transmission of every such packet, an uniform rate of postage of one penny.

6. All packets consisting of printed papers other than newspapers, not exceeding four ounces in weight, posted in the United Kingdom, addressed to Belgium, and transmitted by the post between any part of the United Kingdom and any place in Belgium, the conveyance between the United Kingdom and Belgium being direct by Packet-boat or private ship, may be so transmitted in conformity with, and under, and subject to the several orders, directions, regulations and conditions hereinafter mentioned and contained relating thereto, and there shall be charged, taken and paid, for the transmission of every such packet, an uniform rate of postage of three pence.

7. All packets consisting of printed newspapers, not exceeding four ounces in weight, posted in the United Kingdom or any British Colony, and transmitted by the post through the United Kingdom, addressed to any foreign country, *viâ* Belgium, or posted in any foreign country and transmitted by the post *viâ* Belgium, addressed to the United Kingdom or to any British Colony, whether conveyed between the United Kingdom and Belgium direct by packet-boat or private ship, or sent in closed mails *viâ* France (newspapers forwarded in the closed mails between the United Kingdom and Prussia or Holland excepted,) may be so transmitted, in conformity with, and under and subject to, the several orders, directions, regulations, and conditions hereinafter mentioned and contained, relating thereto, and there shall be charged, taken, and paid for the transmission of every such packet an uniform British rate of postage of one penny.

8. All packets transmitted respectively under the 5th, 6th, and 7th clauses of this Warrant, hereinbefore respectively contained, shall, if exceeding the weight of four ounces respectively, be subject to the several further and additional and progressive rates of postage hereinafter mentioned (that is to say) :

On every packet so transmitted, if exceeding four ounces in weight and not exceeding half a pound in weight, two rates of postage.

And on every such packet, if exceeding half a pound in weight and not exceeding one pound in weight, four rates of postage.

And on every such packet, if exceeding one pound and not exceeding one pound and a-half in weight, six rates of postage.

And on every such packet, if exceeding one pound and a-half and not exceeding two pounds in weight, eight rates of postage.

And for every additional half of a pound in weight of any such packet above the weight of two pounds, there shall be charged, taken, and paid two additional rates of postage, and every fractional part of such additional half of a pound shall be charged as an additional half of a pound in weight, and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this clause shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such packet would be charged with under this Warrant, if not exceeding four ounces in weight.

9. As to all packets consisting of printed newspapers or other printed papers, hereinbefore in the 5th, 6th, 7th, and 8th clauses of this Warrant authorized to be sent by the post, which shall be posted in the United Kingdom addressed to Belgium, or posted in the United Kingdom or in any British Colony addressed to any foreign country *viâ* Belgium, the postage thereof shall in every case be paid, either

in money or by being stamped with the proper British postage stamp or stamps affixed thereto, on the same being posted, which stamp or stamps shall in every case be affixed or appear on the outside of every such packet near the address, and shall be of the value or amount of the postage duty payable thereupon under or by virtue of this Warrant, unless any such packet be sent from any department or office in or connected with the public service of Her Majesty, which shall have a postage account with the General Post Office in London, in which case, the same shall be forwarded post paid, and the postage thereof shall be charged in such postage account. And as to every such packet posted in Belgium addressed to the United Kingdom it is the intention that the postage thereof shall in every case be paid at the time of the same being posted; and if the postage of any such packet posted in the United Kingdom addressed to Belgium, or posted in the United Kingdom or any British Colony, addressed to any foreign country via Belgium, shall not be duly and properly paid when posted, or if the postage of any such packet posted in Belgium addressed to the United Kingdom shall not be duly and properly paid when posted, every such packet shall be chargeable with the amount of postage to which it would have been liable as an unpaid letter; but if on any such packet posted in the United Kingdom addressed to Belgium, or posted in Belgium addressed to the United Kingdom, the postage paid or the postage stamps affixed thereto shall be less in amount than the rate of postage to which such packet would be liable under or by virtue of this Warrant, but equal in amount to the single rate of postage which would be chargeable under this Warrant, if such packet did not exceed four ounces in weight, every such last mentioned packet shall be forwarded charged with a postage of double the amount of any deficiency of postage between the amount paid thereon or the value of the stamp or stamps thereon or affixed thereto, and the amount of postage to which it would have been liable under the provisions of this Warrant if the postage had been fully paid in money or stamps when posted.

10. All packets consisting of printed newspapers or other printed papers, not exceeding two ounces in weight, transmitted by the post from Belgium to any of the British Colonies, through the United Kingdom or from any of the British Colonies, addressed to Belgium through the United Kingdom, the conveyance between Belgium and the United Kingdom being direct by packet-boat or private ship, may be so transmitted in conformity with, and under and subject to, the several orders, directions, regulations, and conditions hereinafter mentioned and contained relating thereto, and there shall be charged, taken, and paid for the transmission of every such packet an uniform rate of postage of two pence.

12. All packets consisting of printed newspapers or other printed papers, not exceeding two ounces

in weight, posted in the United Kingdom and transmitted by the post to any British Colony or foreign country beyond the sea, via Belgium, or posted in any British Colony or foreign country beyond the sea and transmitted by the post, via Belgium, addressed to the United Kingdom, which shall be chargeable with any Belgian transit or sea rate, may be so transmitted in conformity with, and under and subject to, the several orders, directions, regulations, and conditions hereinafter mentioned and contained relating thereto, and there shall be charged, taken, and paid for the transmission of every such packet an uniform British rate of postage of two pence.

13. All packets transmitted respectively under the 11th and 12th clauses of this Warrant hereinbefore respectively contained, shall, if exceeding the weight of two ounces respectively, be subject to the several further and additional and progressive rates of postage hereinafter mentioned, that is to say:—

On every packet so transmitted, if exceeding two ounces in weight, and not exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, two rates of postage.

And on every packet so transmitted, if exceeding four ounces, and not exceeding one-half of a pound in weight, four rates of postage.

And on every packet so transmitted, if exceeding one-half of a pound, and not exceeding one pound in weight, eight rates of postage.

And for every additional half of a pound in weight of any such packet above the weight of one pound, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, four additional rates of postage, and every fractional part of such additional half of a pound in weight shall be charged as an additional half of a pound in weight, and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this clause shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such packet would be charged with under this Warrant, if not exceeding two ounces in weight.

14. The term "printed papers," used in this Warrant, shall, for the purposes of this Warrant, mean and include books stitched or bound, and all printed papers other than newspapers, whether British, Colonial or foreign, and whether printed, engraved, or lithographed; and the several other terms and expression used in this Warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as they would have had if inserted in the said recited Act of the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty.

15. Nothing herein contained shall be construed in anywise to annul, prejudice, or affect any of the exemptions or privileges granted by the said recited Act, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty; or to annul, prejudice, or affect any of the privileges which seamen and soldiers employed in Her Majesty's service, and seamen and soldiers employed in the service of the East India Company are now by law entitled to, of sending and receiving by the post, letters not exceeding one-half of an ounce in weight, subject to the regulations and restrictions in respect of the same.

Every British newspaper which shall be posted in the United Kingdom, shall be printed and published at intervals not exceeding thirty-one

days between any two consecutive numbers or parts of such publication, and the same shall be registered at the General Post-office in London, and shall be posted within fifteen days from the date of its publication, and the title and date of the newspaper shall be printed at the top of every page thereof.

Every packet of printed newspapers or other printed papers shall be sent open at the ends or sides, and either without a cover, or in a cover, or envelope open at the ends or sides, and there shall be no word or communication printed on the contents of any such packet after the publication thereof, or upon any cover thereof, nor any writing or marks upon any such contents or the cover thereof, other than and except the name and address of the person to whom the same is sent; but the name or title of any newspaper, and the name and address of the publisher, news-vender, or agent by whom the same is sent, may be printed on the cover thereof.

No packet of printed newspapers or other printed papers transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant, shall contain any letter or communication, nor any inclosure other than printed newspapers or other printed papers.

Every newspaper and packet of printed newspapers or other printed papers transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant, and posted in the United Kingdom, shall be put into the Post-office at such hours in the day and under all such regulations as the Postmaster-General may appoint.

17. If any newspaper or packet of printed newspapers or other printed papers transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant, be sent by the post otherwise than in conformity with the conditions and regulations established by or under the 16th clause of this Warrant, the same shall and may be detained and opened at any place in the United Kingdom, and, at the option of the Postmaster-General, shall be either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or be given up to the person to whom the same shall be addressed, or be forwarded to the place of its destination; and any such newspaper or packet on being so returned, given up, or forwarded, shall be chargeable with any rates of postage the Postmaster-General may think fit, not exceeding the rates that would be chargeable on such newspaper or packet as an unpaid letter.

18. The rates of postage chargeable on letters, printed newspapers, and other printed papers transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant, and the freedom from postage hereby granted shall be in lieu of any rates of British postage now chargeable by law thereon.

19. The respective letters, newspapers, and packets transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant, shall be subject to the several orders, directions, regulations, and rates of postage respectively contained in a certain Warrant of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, bearing date the 19th day of February, 1855, relating to redirected rates of postage upon letters and packets which shall be redirected and again forwarded by the post.

20. The Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury, may, by Warrant under their hands duly made, at any time hereafter alter, repeal, or revoke any of the rates of postage hereby fixed, or any of the orders, directions, regulations, and conditions hereby made, and may make and establish any new or other rates, orders, directions, regulations, or conditions in lieu thereof, and

from time to time appoint at what time the rates which may be payable are to be paid.

21. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of October next.

Rocks in Broad Sound.

SEVERAL rocks having been lately discovered in the vicinity of Skokham Island and Broad Sound, near Milford Haven, during the progress of the Admiralty Survey under Commander Alldridge, R.N., the following notice is published for the benefit of the mariner:—

1. A rock awash lies to the northward of the east end of Skokham Island, 200 yards N.E. $\frac{1}{4}$ N. from the Stack.

2. A rock with 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ fathoms on it, lies in the same direction from the Stack, at 400 yards off.

3. Two other rocks, with 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ fathoms, exist at 533 yards N.N.E. $\frac{3}{4}$ E. of the Stack. All these rocks are directly in the track of vessels passing through the Sound to or from Milford Haven.

4. To the southward of Skokham Stack, there are also rocks with 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ fathoms, at 820 yards S.S.E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E. from the Stack.

5. To the westward of Skokham Island, rocks have been found in the race known as the Wild Goose Race, with 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ and 5 fathoms, at 1,300 yards N.W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. from the west end of Skokham Island, and the west end of Skomer Island, bearing N. by E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E.

6. To the northward of Skokham Island, there are rocks with from 3 $\frac{3}{4}$ fathoms to 4 $\frac{1}{4}$ fathoms on them, which lie midway between, and in a line from, the west end of Skokham Island, and the Mewstone of Skomer Island, or 1 $\frac{1}{4}$ mile N.W. by N. from Skokham Stack.

7. A dangerous rock with 3 fathoms on it, lies directly in the track of vessels passing through Jack Sound, to or from Milford Haven, it lies nearly $\frac{1}{4}$ mile W. by S. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. from the Bench rocks, with the outer point of Gateholm Island, bearing S.E. by S. 1,733 yards distant.

8. A rock also lies off Long point, bearing W.N.W. $\frac{1}{4}$ N., three quarters of a mile distant, with $4\frac{1}{2}$ fathoms on it, the outer part of Gateholm Island, bearing N. by W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W.

Red Light on Mole Head.

THE Spanish Government has given notice, that on the 1st of July last a fixed red light was established on the outer extreme of the Mole at Santa Cruz, Tenerife.

The light is 21 $\frac{1}{2}$ feet above the level of high water, and is visible at the distance of 4 miles.

As soon as the light is shown, all others on the Mole are screened.

Masters of vessels approaching the anchorage from the southward are informed that the light bears S.W. from it, and they are cautioned to keep it well open on the port hand, and to be careful of nearing the shore to the southward of the Mole within a depth of 25 fathoms, in order to avoid some sunken rocks recently reported there: Spring tides rise 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ feet, neaps 6 feet.

Lights on the Arran Islands.

THE Port of Dublin Corporation has given notice that two new lighthouses have been erected on the Arran Islands, off the west coast of the county of Galway, from which lights will be exhibited on the night of the 1st of December, 1857, and thenceforth will be lighted every night from sunset to sunrise.

Arran Islands North Lighthouse is built on Eragh or Ruck Island, the outermost of the chain,

in lat. $53^{\circ} 8' 55''$ N. and Long. $9^{\circ} 51' 30''$ west of Greenwich, bearing from Slyne Head South Light, S. b E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E., distant $20\frac{1}{2}$ nautical miles; from Skird Rocks, S. b E., distant $8\frac{1}{4}$ miles; from Loophead, N.E. b N., distant 36 miles.

This light will be a revolving light, of the natural appearance, showing a bright flash once in every three minutes, and will be visible from seaward between the bearings of W.N.W., round by the westward to N.W. by N. The apparatus is catadioptric of the first order, and is 115 feet above the mean level of the sea; and in clear weather the light should be visible at the distance of 16 miles.

The tower is circular, of gray stone colour, 101 feet in height from base to summit; the top below the lantern sash will be painted red, also two horizontal belts will be coloured red, on the tower.

The South Lighthouse of the Arran Islands is erected on the south-western point of Inisheer, the southernmost of the islands, in lat. $53^{\circ} 2' 40''$ N., and long. $9^{\circ} 31' 30''$ W.; it bears from Blackhead, W. $\frac{1}{4}$ S. distant $11\frac{1}{4}$ miles; from Finnis Rock (off S.E. point of Inisheer), W. b N. $\frac{1}{4}$ N., distant $1\frac{1}{4}$ mile; from Loophead, N.E. b E. distant 33 miles.

This light will be a fixed light, visible from seaward between the bearings of S.E. $\frac{3}{4}$ S., round by the southward to W. b S., and is 110 feet over the mean level of the sea, and should be seen in clear weather within the distance of 15 miles. The illuminating apparatus is catadioptric of the first order. A strip or sector of red light will be shown in the direction of the Finnis Rock; in all other directions the light will be of the natural appearance.

The tower is circular, of gray stone colour below the projecting gallery, and is 112 feet in height from its base to the top of the dome.

From and after the date of exhibition of the new lights, the old light heretofore on the summit of Inishmore, or the Great Island, will be discontinued, and the lantern and top of the old lighthouse tower will be removed.

(No 30.) UNITED STATES COAST (ATLANTIC).

Cape Roman and Charleston (S.C.) Lights.

THE Government of the United States has given notice, that on the evening of January 1, 1858, a *first order catadioptric light, revolving once every minute*, will be exhibited from the new tower, now in course of erection, on Cape Roman, S.C., in place of the present fixed light at that point.

The new tower (which is near the present low one of 65 feet elevation, painted with red and white horizontal stripes) is octagonal, built of dark reddish gray brick, and will be 150 feet high when completed.

The light from this tower should be seen under ordinary states of the atmosphere, from the deck of a vessel 15 feet above the water, about 23 nau-

tical miles, or 17 nautical miles outside of the dangerous shoals of Cape Roman.

This light station will be readily known during daylight by the appearance of the two towers, the old one (65 feet high) being painted with red and white horizontal bands, and the new tower (150 feet high), from which the light will be exhibited, being of the natural colour of the brick, and lantern painted black.
