PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, sections six and eight, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the seventh day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act of the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty, chapter thirty-seven, sections six and eight, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for authorizing the sale of certain property formerly belonging to the prebend of Ruscombe Southbury, in the cathedral church of Salisbury, and now vested in us.

"And whereas all the lands, tenements, hereditaments, and endowments formerly belonging to the said prebend of Ruscombe Southbury (except any right of ecclesiastical patronage) became vested in us on the vacancy of the said prebend, which occurred on or about the first day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and forty-two, by the decease of the Reverend George Augustus Montgomery, the then prebendary, subject to any legally subsisting lease or leases thereof.

"And whereas application has been made to us for the purchase of all our estate and interest in certain portions of the said lands, tenements, and hereditaments; and after due consideration it appears to us to be expedient that we should be empowered to dispose of our interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, in such manner as shall appear to us to be advisable;

"We, therefore, humbly recommend and propose, that we may be authorized and empowered by instrument or instruments in writing duly executed according to law, from time to time to sell, or dispose of, and duly to convey, according to the provisions of the said Act, all or any of the said lands, tenements, hereditaments, or endowments heretofore belonging to the said prebend of Ruscombe Southbury, and so vested in us as afore-said, with their appurtenances, and all our estate,

right, title, and interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same, and his or their heirs, executors, administrators, or assigns, or otherwise as he or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and inquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Salisbury.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Com-

**A.—REGULATIONS AGAINST THE PLAGUE.**

(a.)—*Vessels, from whatever port, arriving with  
foul bills of health.*

The ship and crew, after the disembarkation of  
merchandize and suspected articles, 15 days.

Suspected merchandize, after being opened in the  
lazaretto, 22 days.

Passengers, not including the captain and clerks,  
when they go straight into lazaretto, 14 days.

Ditto, if their effects are fumigated, from the  
commencement of the quarantine, 12 days.

Ditto, if they are fumigated towards the close  
of the quarantine, 13 days.

Vessels of war, from the period of disembarkation  
of suspected goods and articles, 12 days.

(b.)—*Vessels with clean bills of health.*

I.—Arriving from any Turkish port of Europe,  
Asia, and Africa, including Egypt and Syria:

Vessels, crews, and cargoes, when the latter com-  
prise no goods especially suspected, and when  
the bill of health is given up or confirmed  
by the Consul of any European Power, free  
pratique.

Ditto, in the absence of a consular certificate, 24  
hours.

Ditto, if furnished with a consular certificate,  
whenever there may be on board suspected  
goods, after the latter are landed, free pratique.

Ditto, in the absence of the above certificate, 24  
hours.

Suspected articles (rags and left off wearing ap-  
parel), from the period of their being opened in  
the lazaretto, 5 days.

II.—Arriving from any Christian port of the  
Black Sea or the Sea of Azof, or from the Mouth  
of the Danube, without having touched at any  
intermediate Ottoman port:

Vessels crews, and cargoes, having cleared in free  
pratique, free pratique.

Ditto, having cleared in suspected pratique, but  
with a clean bill of health, free pratique.

Vessels having cleared in suspected pratique with  
a foul bill of health:

1.—Vessels and crews, immediately after dis-  
charging into the lazaretto the suspected  
merchandize and articles, 14 days.

2.—Suspected merchandize, from the period  
of its being opened in the lazaretto, 20  
days.

III.—Arriving from the Coast of Africa and  
Asia, not including those ports comprised under  
Section I, and from Australasia:

Vessels, crews, and cargoes, whenever furnished  
with a clean bill of health accorded by an  
authority of any European Power, free prac-  
tique.

Ditto, without a bill of health as above, 24 hours.

**B.—REGULATIONS AGAINST YELLOW FEVER.**

(a.)—*Vessels with foul bill of health, whencesoever  
arriving.*

Vessels, crews, and cargoes, 10 days.

(b.)—*With a clean bill of health, whencesoever  
arriving.*

Vessels, crews, and cargoes, free pratique.

The maximum amount of quarantine against the  
plague is fixed at 40 days.

Ditto, ditto, yellow fever, 15 days.

**TREASURY WARRANT.**

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation of the duties of postage," it is enacted that it should be lawful for the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, from time to time, and, at any time after the passing of that Act, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British postage or inland postage, payable by law on the transmission by the post of foreign or colonial letters or newspapers, or of any other

printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant, and that the power thereby given to alter and fix rates of postage should extend to any increase or reduction or remission of postage.

And whereas, it is expedient that further regulations should be made for the transmission by the post of, and reduction of the postage now payable on, the letters hereinafter mentioned:

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers vested in us in and by the said recited Act, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do by this Warrant (under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners, by the authority of the Statute in that case made and provided), order and direct as follows:

1. On every letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight, transmitted by the post by vessels not being packet boats, between the United Kingdom and any place beyond the seas (at whatever place within the United Kingdom the letter may be posted or delivered), there shall be charged and taken, in lieu of any rates of postage now chargeable on such letters, a uniform British rate of sixpence.

2. On every letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight, transmitted by the post by vessels not being packet boats, between any places beyond the seas, through the United Kingdom, there shall be charged and taken, in lieu of any rates of postage now chargeable on such letters, a uniform British rate of one shilling.

3. On every letter transmitted as is mentioned in this Warrant exceeding half an ounce in weight there shall be charged, taken, and paid-progressive and additional rates of postage as follows, that is to say:

On every such letter exceeding half an ounce in weight and not exceeding one ounce in weight, two rates of postage.

On every such letter exceeding one ounce and not exceeding two ounces in weight, four rates of postage.

On every such letter exceeding two ounces and not exceeding three ounces in weight, six rates of postage.

On every such letter exceeding three ounces and not exceeding four ounces in weight, eight rates of postage.

And for every ounce in weight above the weight of four ounces, there shall be charged and taken two additional rates of postage, and every fraction of an ounce above the weight of four ounces shall be charged as one additional ounce; and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this clause shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such letter would be charged with under this Warrant, if not exceeding half an ounce in weight.

4. The several letters transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant shall be subject to the several orders, directions, and regulations contained in a certain Warrant of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, bearing date the 19th day of February, 1855, relating to re-directed rates of postage upon letters and packets which shall be re-directed and again forwarded by the post, so far as the same are applicable to such letters.

5. Nothing in this Warrant contained shall affect or alter the postage now payable upon letters transmitted by the post by vessels not being packet-boats under or pursuant to a certain War-

rant of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, bearing date the 20th day of December, 1856, relating to letters transmitted between the United Kingdom and France, or under or pursuant to a certain other Warrant of the said Commissioners, bearing date the 24th day of September, 1857, relating to letters transmitted between the United Kingdom and Belgium, or any other letters transmitted by the post by vessels not being packet-boats the ship rate of postage whereof (if not exceeding half an ounce in weight) is less than sixpence.

6. Nothing in this Warrant contained shall in anywise alter, prejudice, or affect the exemptions and privileges granted by the said recited Act, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, nor in anywise prejudice or affect the privilege which officers, seamen and soldiers, employed in Her Majesty's service, and seamen and soldiers employed in the service of the East India Company are now by law entitled to, of sending and receiving letters by the post subject to the regulations and restrictions in respect of the same.

7. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight.

8. The Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury may by Warrant, under their hands, duly made at any time hereafter, alter or repeal any of the rates hereby altered, or the regulations hereby made, and make and establish any new or other rates or regulations in lieu thereof, and from time to time appoint at what time the rates that may be payable are to be paid.
