NOTICE is hereby given, that Her Majesty's Levee, announced to be held at St. James's Palace on Wednesday, the 10th of March next, will not take place.

Her Majesty will hold a Levee (as already announced) on Wednesday, the 17th of March, and a further Levee on Wednesday, the 24th of March next.

N.B. The Knights of the several Orders are to appear in their Collars at the Levee on the 17th March, it being a Collar Day.

THE QUEEN'S LEVEES.

NEW REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED WITH REGARD TO THE QUEEN'S LEVEES AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE,

Issued by Her Majesty's Command, February 6, 1858.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levees, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names clearly written thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to the Queen.

PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented to the Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, before twelve o'clock, two clear days before each Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is necessary that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to the Queen, for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's command, that no presentations shall be

made at the Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be very distinctly written upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

Addresses.

Notice is hereby given, that all persons having petitions or addresses to present to Her Majesty at the Levees are to send a card having on it their names, a statement of the object of such Petitions or Addresses, and the names of the persons from whom they come, to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, before twelve o'clock on the day but one previous to each Levee; and that two other cards, having on them precisely what is written upon that sent to the Lord Chamberlain's Office, are to be taken to the Lèvee; one of the two cards to be delivered to the Page in the Corridor, and the other to the Lord Chamberlain, who will read its contents to Her Majesty; and, on these occasions, no other statement is to be addressed to Her Majesty.

A Deputation to present an Address is not to exceed four persons.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

ORDINANCE above referred to.

ORDINANCE framed by the COMMISSIONERS appointed for the Purposes of the STATUTE 17th and 18th Vict. c. 81, in relation to the Foundation of Mr. John Snell within Balliol College, Oxford.

WE, the Commissioners appointed for the purposes of an Act passed in the seventeenth and eighteenth years of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to make fur-"ther Provision for the good Government and "Extension of the University of Oxford, of the "Colleges therein, and of the College of St. Mary, "Winchester," hereby ordain as follows, in relation to the Exhibitions founded under the will of Mr. John Snell, deceased, within Balliol College in the said University, and to the estates and emoluments of the said Foundation.

It shall be lawful for the Master and Fellows of Balliol College on the one part, and the Principal and Professors of Glasgow College on the other part, to fix from time to time, by mutual agreement, the number of Exhibitioners to be maintained out of the revenues of Mr. Snell's Foundation, and the amount of their several emoluments, taking into consideration, amongst other things, the income of the Foundation for the time being, the amount of competition, and the expense of residence at Oxford. Every such agreement shall be in writing, and sealed with the seals of both Colleges, and shall be laid before the Visitor of Balliol College for his approval, and until approved by him shall not be valid. Until any such agreement shall be made and approved, and subject to such alterations as may be introduced thereby, the number and stipends of the Exhibitions shall be the same as at present. Provided that, whether any such agreement shall have been made or not, two Exhibitioners at least shall be elected in every year after all present Exhibitioners shall have

period shall arrive, not more than two shall be elected in any year, unless it shall be deemed expe-

dient to do so by both Colleges.

The Exhibitioners shall be elected from candidates born in Scotland, or whose fathers shall have been born in Scotland, and who shall have resided for two years at least in Glasgow College, or for one year in that College, and two at least in some other College in Scotland. The Principal and Professors of Glasgow College for the time being shall be sole judges of the question, what constitutes residence in that or any other College in Scotland within the meaning of this clause, if such question should arise.

An examination of the candidates shall be held annually at Glasgow College, on some day or days during the session of the University of Glasgow, by examiners to be appointed by the Principal and Professors of Glasgow College. Notice that such examination is about to be held, and of the number of vacancies to be filled up, shall be given by the Principal, in such manner as he shall deem best adapted to ensure publicity, thirty days at least before the commencement of the examination. The examination shall be in such subjects, and shall be held on such day or days, and in such manner, as the Principal and Professors of Glasgow College shall determine. The candidates who upon such examination shall appear to be of the greatest merit and most fit for election shall be nominated by the Principal and Professors to the Exhibitions which are then to be filled up. The Principal and Professors may require from the candidates such testimonials of moral character as they may think fit.

Every examiner not being a Professor of Glasgow College shall receive on each examination

fifteen pounds out of the Surplus Fund.

The candidates nominated may be examined by the Master and Fellows of Balliol College before being admitted to matriculation, in the same manner as other candidates for admission to the College; and if approved, shall be elected to their respective Exhibitions by the Master and Fellows, and admitted to rooms in the College on or before the twentieth day of October following each nomination respectively.

Exhibitioners hereafter to be elected shall hold their exhibitions for five years, and no longer, from the day of nomination inclusive, and the stipend of each Exhibitioner shall be deemed to accrue from the day of his nomination, and shall be paid to him quarterly; the first payment being made within three months after the day of his admission.

Any Exhibitioner who shall marry, or shall cease to be a member of Balliol College, or shall be promoted to or accept any place or office in the Army or Navy, shall vacate his Exhibition; but no Exhibitioner hereafter to be elected shall forfeit his Exhibition by acceptance of any ecclesiastical preferment in England or Wales. Any Exhibitioner who shall be rusticated, or shall be absent from the College without the permission of the Master, shall forfeit a proportionate part of his emoluments for the period of his rustication or absence, unless the Master and Fellows shall think proper to permit him to receive the same. Exhibition which may become vacant by death or otherwise before the expiration of such term of five years shall not be filled up until after the expira-The emoluments of any tion of the said term. vacant Exhibition, until the nomination of the next holder thereof, shall be apportioned and paid to a surplus fund, which shall be applied as hereinafter directed.

The estates and funds of the said Foundation shall be vested in and administered by Balliol

College as trustees thereof; but the Master and Fellows of that College shall, within fourteen days after the fifth day of April in every year, render to the Principal and Professors of Glasgow College printed accounts of the income and expenditure of the said Foundation for the preceding twelve calendar months, and, if required by the said Principal and Professors, such vouchers for the said accounts as shall be in the possession of the Master and Fellows.

The allowances which have been heretofore made to the Master for his care and government of the Exhibitioners of the said Foundation (commonly called "Gubernation money"), and to Balliol College in consideration of the privileges of the Library enjoyed by the Exhibitioners of the said Foundation (commonly called "Privilege money") shall be continued. The allowance to the Master shall henceforth be at the rate of two pounds per centum on the net income of the estate and funds of the Foundation, and the allowance to the College at the rate of four pounds per centum on such net income. The annual sum heretofore allowed for a dinner, according to the directions of the testator's will, shall not hereafter be paid. Emoluments forfeited for rustication, absence without leave, or any other cause, by Exhibitioners of the Foundation, shall be added to the Surplus Fund.

The Master and Fellows may reserve in their hands, towards the expenses of managing the trust estate, and for improving the same, an annual sum not exceeding ten pounds per centum upon the said net income (or, with the approval of the Principal and Professors of Glasgow College, but not otherwise, any larger sum which may be thought necessary), and may, with the like approval, apply any part of the money so reserved in contributions or donations to charitable or benevolent purposes in any place where the estates of the Foundation or any part thereof are or may be situate. The surplus not required for the aforesaid purposes of the money so reserved shall

be added to the surplus fund.

The surplus fund shall be employed from time to time for the benefit of the Foundation in such manner as may be agreed upon between the Master and the Fellows of Balliol College and the Principal and Professors of Glasgow College. So much thereof, or of the produce thereof, as may remain unapplied, shall be invested from time to time in public securities as may be deemed expedient, and such investments shall be considered as still forming part of the surplus fund.

Any Exhibitioner of the said Foundation who may be elected to and accept an exhibition of the Foundation of Dr. John Warner, Bishop of Rochester, shall vacate the exhibition held by him

when so elected.

The election of Exhibitioners shall be held after a competitive examination of the candidates in such subjects, and conducted in such manner, as the electors shall from time to time appoint, and that candidate, being otherwise duly qualified according to the instrument of Foundation and this Ordinance, shall be elected, who after such examination shall appear to be of the greatest merit. Any Exhibitioner of the said Foundation who may be elected to and accept an Exhibition founded under the Will of Mr. John Snell, shall vacate the Exhibition held by him when so elected. Whenever there shall be no duly qualified candidate for a vacant Exhibition of the Foundation of Doctor John Warner, whom the electors shall judge of sufficient merit for election, the Exhibition shall be thrown open for that turn to general competition, and the election to it shall be held at some time within three months from the day originally fixed for that purpose, from which day the five years for which such Exhibition is now made tenable shall in that case be computed.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the Regulation of the Duties of Postage," power is given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Trensury from time to time, by warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British postage, or Inland postage, payable by law on the transmission by the post of Foreign or Colonial letters or newspapers, or of any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant, and from time to time, by Warrant, as aforesaid, to alter or repeal any such altered rates, and make and establish any new or other rates in lieu thereof, and from time to time, by Warrant, as aforesaid, to appoint at what time the rates which may be payable are to be paid.

And whereas by another Act of Parliament, passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her

present Majesty, intituled "An Act for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post-office," further powers are given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, and power is also given to the Postmaster-General (amongst other things) to collect and receive the foreign and colonial postage charged or chargeable on any letters sent by the post, and also with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury to require the postage, British, Colonial, or Foreign, of any letters sent by the post to be prepaid, either in money or in stamps, as he might think fit, on the same being put into the Postoffice, and also with such consent to abolish or restrict the pre-payment in money of postage on letters sent by the post either altogether or on certain letters, and to require the pre-payment thereof to be in stamps, and also to refuse to receive or send by the post any letters tendered contrary to any regulations thereby made, and power is also given to the Postmaster-General and any officer of the Post-office to detain any letters which should be posted or sent by the post contrary to the regulations therein mentioned, and to open such letters, and either to return them to the senders thereof, or to forward them to the places of their destination, charged in either case with such rates of postage as the Postmaster-General, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury should from time to time direct.

And whereas the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury have, by divers Warrants under their hands fixed, made, and established certain rates of British postage payable on the transmission by the post of certain Colonial letters therein respectively mentioned.

And whereas the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by a certain other Warrant under their hands bearing date the 15th day of January, 1858, did make regulations for the prepayment of the several rates of postage payable on letters posted in the United Kingdom addressed to any of the colonies therein mentioned, and on letters posted in any of such colonies addressed to the United Kingdom, and did (amongst other things) order and direct that on every letter posted in any of Her Majesty's colonies in the West Indies (the islands of Barbadoes, Trinidad, and Tuik's Island excepted), or in Malta, Gibraltar, or Hong Kong, addressed to the United Kingdom, the postage thereof should be paid at the time of the same being posted; and also that if any letter should be posted in any of the colonies before mentioned, addressed to the United Kingdom, without any postage having been paid thereon, or with a postage paid thereon less in amount than the single rate of postage chargeable thereon, every such letter should be detained and opened, and should be either returned or given up to the sender thereof; and also that if any letter should be posted in any of the before mentioned colonies addressed to the United Kingdom, and the postage paid thereon should be less in amount than the rate of postage to which such packet would be liable under and by virtue of the regulations in force relating thereto, but equal in amount to the single rate of postage chargeable on any such letter, if not exceeding half an ounce in weight, every such last mentioned letter should be forwarded charged with the amount of the difference between the postage paid thereon, and the postage to which it would have been liable if the postage had been paid when posted together, with the further and additional rate of postage of sixpence;

and also that the Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury might by Warrant, under their hands duly made at any time thereafter, alter, repeal, or revoke any of the orders, directions, or regulations thereby made, and might make and establish any new or other orders, directions, or regulations in lieu thereof.

And whereas it is expedient to alter the said regulations so made by the said Treasury Warrant of the 15th day of January, 1858, as to the prepayment of the rates of postage upon certain of the said letters therein mentioned, and also as to the detaining and opening, and either returning or giving up to the senders thereof of certain other of the said letters therein mentioned in the manner hereinafter contained.

Now we the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers reserved to us in and by the said hereinbefore recited Acts, or either of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do by this present Warrant, under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners, by the authority of the statute in that case made and provided, order and direct as follows (that is to say):

- 1. That on every letter posted in any of Her Majesty's colonies in the West Indies (the Islands of Barbadoes, Trinidad, and Turk's Island excepted), or in Malta, Gibraltar, or Hong Kong respectively addressed to any department or office in or connected with the public service of Her Majesty, which shall have a postage account with the General Post Office in London, it shall not be necessary that the postage thereof shall be paid at the time of the same being posted; and that every such letter so posted in any of the said colonies respectively, addressed as last aforesaid, shall and may be forwarded to the place of its destination, although the postage shall not have been paid thereon at the time of the same being posted; and the postage thereof shall be charged in such postage account anything in the said before-recited Treasury Warrant, bearing date the 15th day of January, 1858, contained to the contrary thereof notwithstanding.
- 2. And, with respect to letters posted in Gibraltar or Malta, if any letter, not being a letter addressed to any department or office in or connected with the public service of Her Majesty which shall have a postage account with the General Post-Office in London, shall be posted in Gibraltar or Malta, addressed to the United Kingdom without any postage having been paid thereon, or with a postage paid thereon less in amount than the rate of postage chargeable thereon under and by virtue of the regulations in force relating thereto, and such letter, on being opened, shall be found to have originated in, and been sent from, any country or place out of Gibraltar and Malta, every such letter shall be forwarded to the place of its destination, charged with the rate of postage to which it would have been liable if the postage thereof had been paid when posted, together with the further and additional rate of postage of sixpence, anything in the said beforerecited Treasury Warrant bearing date the 15th day of January, 1858, contained to the contrary thereof notwithstanding.
- 3. The terms and expressions used in this Warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as they would have had if inserted in the said Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty.
- 4. The Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury may by Warrant under

their hands duly made at any time hereafter alter, repeal, or revoke any of the orders, directions, and regulations hereby made, and may make and establish any new or other orders, directions, or regulations in lieu thereof.

5. This Warrant shall come into operation on

the first day of March, 1858.

ADMIRALTY NOTICE respecting LIGHTS and Fog SIGNALS to be carried and used by Sea-going Vessels, to prevent Collision.

> By the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, &c.

BY virtue of the power and authority vested in us, we hereby revoke, as from and after the thirtieth day of September, 1858, the regulations made and published by us on the first day of May, 1852, relating to the Lights to be carried by Seagoing Vessels to prevent collision: And we hereby make the following regulations, and require and direct that the same be strictly observed and carried into effect on and after the first day of October, 1858.

STEAM VESSELS.

All Sea-going Steam Vessels, when under Steam, shall, between sunset and sunrise, exhibit the following Lights:

- 1. A bright White Light at the Foremast Head.
 - A Green Light on the Starboard side. A Red Light on the Port side.
- 2. The Mast-head Light shall be so constructed as to be visible on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least 5 miles, and shall show an uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 20 points of the compass, and it shall be so fixed as to throw the light 10 points on each side of the ship, viz.: from right ahead to 2 points abaft the beam on either side.

3. The Green Light on the Starboard side and the Red Light on the Port side shall be so constructed as to be visible on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least 2 miles, and show an uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 10 points of the compass,

and they shall be so fixed as to throw the light from right ahead to 2 points abaft the beam on the Starboard and on the Port sides respectively.

4. The side Lights are to be fitted with inboard screens projecting at least 3 feet forward from the light, so as to prevent the lights from being seen across the bow

5. Steam Vessels under Sail only, are not to carry their masthead Lights.

Fog Signals.

All Sea-going Steam Vessels, whether propelled by paddles or screws, when their steam is up, and when under way, shall in all cases of Fog use as a Fog Signal a Steam Whistle, placed before the Funnel at not less than 8 feet from the deck, which shall be sounded once at least every five minutes ; but when the steam is not up, they shall use a Fog Horn or Bell, as ordered for Sailing Ships.

SAILING VESSELS.

1. All Sea-going Sailing Vessels when underway or being towed, shall, between sunset and sunrise, exhibit a Green Light on the Starboard side and a Red Light on the Port side of the vessel, and such Lights shall be so constructed as to be visible on a dark night, with a clear atmosphere, at a distance of at least 2 miles, and shall show an uniform and unbroken light over an arc of the horizon of 10 points of the compass, from right a-head to 2 points abaft the beam on the Starboard and on the Port sides respectively.

2. The Coloured Lights shall be fixed whenever it is practicable so to exhibit them; and shall be fitted with inboard screens projecting at least 3 feet forward from the Light, so at to prevent

the Lights being seen across the bow.
3. When the Coloured Lights cannot be fixed (as in the case of small vessels in bad weather), they shall be kept on deck between sunset and sunrise, and on their proper sides of the vessel, ready for instant exhibition, and shall be exhibited in such a manner as can be best seen on the approach of, or to, any other vessel or vessels in sufficient time to avoid collision, and so that the Green Light shall not be seen on the Port side, nor the Red Light on the Starboard side.

FOG SIGNALS.

All Sea-going Sailing Vessels, when under-way, shall, in all cases of Fog, use when on the Starboard Tack a Fog Horn, and when on the Port Tack shall Ring a Bell. These signals shall be sounded once at least every five minutes.

Sailing Pilot Vessels are to carry only a White Light at the mast head, and are to exhibit a Flareup Light every 15 minutes, in accordance with Trinity House regulation.

VESSELS AT ANCHOR.

All Sea-going Vessels when at anchor in roadsteads or fairways, shall between sunset and sunrise exhibit where it can best be seen, but at a height not exceeding 20 feet above the hull, a White Light in a Globular Lantern of 8 inches in diameter, and so constructed as to show a clear, uniform, and unbroken light all round the horizon, at a distance of at least one mile.

FIRST.-When both Red and Green Lights are seen:

A sees a Red and Green Light ahead;—A knows that a vessel is approaching her on a course directly opposite to her own, as B;




If A sees a White masthead Light above the other two, she knows that B is a steam-vessel.

SECOND.—When the Red, and not the Green Light, is seen:

A sees a Red Light ahead or on the bow ;—A knows that either, 1, a vessel is approaching her on her port bow, as B;



or, 2, a vessel is crossing in some direction to port, as D D D.




If A sees a White masthead Light above the Red Light, A knows that the vessel is a steam-vessel, and is either approaching her in the same direction, as B, or is crossing to port in some direction, as D D D.

THIRD.—When the Green, and not the Red Light is seen:

A sees a Green Light ahead or on the bow; A knows that either, 1, a vessel is approaching her on her starboard bow, as B;



or, 2, a vessel is crossing in some direction to starboard, as D D D.



If A sees a White masthead Light above the Green Light, A knows that the vessel is a steam-vessel, and is either approaching her in the same direction as B, or is crossing to starboard in some direction, as D D D.
