

sent out 400 Horse, under the Command of the *Sieur Orlich*, who burnt the said Mills, and between 50 and 60 Houses that stood thereabouts, having beat back the *Turks* that sallied upon them out of the Castle. Our Advices from the *Ottoman* Territories assure us, that the *Turks* make great Preparations for the next Campagne, and that the Grand Signior will command in Person his Army in *Hungary*.

Ratisbonne, Jan. 24. The 17th Instant; the Deputies of the Elector of *Mentz*, Director of the Empire, proposed to the Diet, to deliberate upon the Points that concern the execution of the Truce; The several Colledges have been since assembled upon this Subject, but have not yet taken any Resolution in the matter. The States of *Franconia* are separated, but with a Resolution to meet again at *Nuremberg* the 15th of the next month. The last Letters from *Hungary* told us, that the Garrison of *Alba Regalis* seeing the Convoy of Money and Provisions, which they had so long expected, did not arrive, grew very mutinous; And that the *Spahis* going in a Body to the *Bassa*, had declared to him, that if they were not very suddenly paid what was due to them, and supplied with Provisions, they would abandon the place; and that the *Bassa* had thereupon sent Deputies to *Belgrade*, to hasten the Succors. Other Letters say, That the *Turks* were drawing together near *Essecke*, and that they had prepared a great Convoy for the Relief of *Alba Regalis*, *Sigeth*, and *Canisa*. The Imperial Garrisons on this side the *Drave* are likewise in some want of Provisions, the Country round them being so ruined, that they cannot be supplied from thence, and therefore a Convoy will be sent to *Five Churches* and *Coposwar* from *Stiria*. The Count de *Nostitz* the Imperial Minister at *Stockholm*, has concluded a Treaty, in pursuance of which, the King of *Sweden* is to assist the Emperor the next Campagne with 3000 Men.

Hamburg, Jan. 30. The Magistrates of this City have lately raised a Company of Grenadiers, and 100 Gunners, and have ordered several Houses to be pulled down which stood too near the Outworks of the Town. The Count de *Roye*, who lately commanded the King of *Denmark's* Forces, is gone to *Posdam*, to make the Elector of *Brandenburg* a Visit. A Regiment of Horse, and another of Foot, are raising in the Country of *Lunenburgh*, as is said, for the Service of the Republick of *Venice*. The Letters from *Poland* tell us, That the King had written Circular Letters to the several Palatinates, containing the Reasons upon which he had resolved not to call a Dyet this year.

Paris, Febr. 8. The Court returned yesterday from *Marli*. It's said the King will take a Journey to *Compeigne* presently after *Easter*. The Pope's Nuncio had a long Audience of the King on Sunday last. The Officers of the Marine have Orders to repair forthwith to their several Ports. We are told from *Rome*, that the *French* Ambassador had had a second Audience of the Pope, upon the same Subject he had his former. The Duke de *Craqui* continues very ill.

Whitehall, Febr. 4. This Evening the Body of the Lady *Ann Sophia* was privately Entered in the Vault of the Royal Family in King *Henry VII's* Chappel, having been received at the West-gate of the Abby by the Lord Bishop of *Rocheſter* Dean of *Westminster*, and the Prebendaries, attended with the Quire, with the usual Ceremony.
