Admiralty, June 17, 1858.

A DESPATCH, of which the following is a copy, has been received by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty from Captain Sotheby, of Her Majesty's steam-ship Pearl, commanding a Naval Brigade in India :

SIR, *Camp Kaptangunge, April 29, 1858.*

I HAVE the honour to inform you, for the information of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that the Pearl's Naval Brigade was engaged in a series of actions with the enemy on the 25th instant, near the village of Puchawas. Intelligence being received at 11 A.M. that they were approaching our camp, the Field Force, as per margin,* always ready, was immediately under arms, and marched out to meet them, Brigadier Rowcroft taking command of the right column, whilst Major Cox and myself took charge of the left ; on advancing one mile we soon found the enemy in front, posted in woods and villages, who commenced the action by firing shell from two 9-pounder guns (horsed) with great precision. but as all our men were nearly in skirmishing order, with little effect. As their range was considerably beyond our small 12-pounder howitzers, I immediately ran them up within 700 yards, and after a few rounds, shelled them out, but keeping up a running fire as they retreated for about two and a half miles, when a vidette gave notice that a body of 1,500 men with 3 guns was on our left ; we immediately went in that direction about two miles, and found them posted in some thick woods and jungle. As our men were very much fatigued from the intense heat, many already having dropped from coups-de-soleil, it was necessary to give them a few minutes' rest, and to keep up communication with the Brigadier, who had been engaged successfully on our right with another body, and was then moving towards us ; we then rapidly advanced with our guns, the seamen with the 13th Light Infantry as skirmishers, making beautiful practice, killed many of the enemy, who were under the Rajah of Gouda (seated on an elephant) ; in about half an hour they gave way, we pursuing them for two miles, towards the Gogra, over which many escaped, their retreat to Belware being threatened by the cavalry. In the meantime, the other two rebel forces, who had

been driven back, had joined and advanced within one mile of our camp to attack it, when the Brigadier, who had heard of their approach, moved quickly to the right, just in time to meet them on the road, and after some sharp firing and shelling on both sides, drove them back. On hearing of his being again in action we quickly rejoined him, and sent a few well-directed rockets into some woods, which hastened their retreat, and burnt them out of a village. It being nearly sunset, and the troops quite exhausted from the intense heat, and constantly moving for seven hours, we halted, and shortly afterwards returned to camp.

The enemy's force is reported upwards of 3,000, with 5 guns, but as they were so quickly worked, and taken to the rear, we were only able to capture 1 ammunition waggon.

They had about 70 killed.

I am happy to report we had no casualties, though it was perfectly miraculous how all escaped, for their practice with the guns, especially the shells, was unusually good.

The men behaved in their usual cool and cheerful manner, much to my satisfaction, and went over 18 miles under a burning sun.

The following officers were in the field, and rendered me much valuable assistance, and I beg permission to recommend them to the favourable notice of their Lordships.

Lieutenant N. E. B. Turnour, in charge of 2 guns.

Lieutenant H. D. Grant, with the seamen, a most zealous officer.

Lieutenant F. G. Pym, with the Marines.

Mr. A. W. Ingles, mate, very active with the skirmishers.

Mr. C. F. Foot, midshipman, with the other 2 howitzers.

Mr. H. F. Stephenson, midshipman, my Aide-de-Camp, always at hand, and ready to convey messages.

Messrs. Parkins, and Burton, warrant officers : the latter struck down by a coup-de-soleil.

Drs. W. J. Shone, and Dickinson, with the Rev. E. A. Williams, and Mr. T. H. L. Bowling, acting-clerk.

William Thompson, gunner's-mate, and Luke Pearse, carpenter's-mate, were also of much service.

I regret to say our sick list is very large, owing to the exposure to the sun, and living in tents at this period of the year.

On the 27th, at 10 P.M., having destroyed our entrenchments after dark, and blown up captured

guns, we retired on Kaptungunge, fourteen miles, as there were several bodies of rebels in our rear, and others threatening to cross from Oudh.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the seventeenth and eighteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make further provision for the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the metropolis," it is enacted that, in case it appear to Her Majesty in Council, upon the petition of the Town Council of any borough, stating that an Order in Council has been made for closing all or any of the burial grounds of one or more parishes, being wholly or partly within such borough, that there is difficulty or inconvenience in providing, under the powers of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the metropolis," requisite places of burial for the inhabitants of such parish or parishes, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that powers shall be vested in the Council of such borough, for providing such places of burial, under the provisions of the said Act; provided always, that notice of such petition, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order that the same be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and in one of the newspapers usually circulating in such borough, one month at least before such petition is so considered;

And whereas the Town Council of the city of Hereford have presented a petition to Her Majesty in Council, stating that an Order in Council has been issued directing burials to be discontinued in the cathedral church of Hereford, in the parish church of All Saints, and (with certain modifications) in the burial grounds of the parishes of All Saints, Saint Peter, Saint Owen, Saint Nicholas, and Saint John the Baptist, and in certain other burial grounds in some of the said parishes, all in the city of Hereford, and representing that there exists great difficulty in providing in or near the said city requisite places of burial for the inhabitants of the aforesaid parishes, under the provisions of the above-recited Act passed in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, and praying that powers may be vested in the said Town Council of the city of Hereford for providing a general burial ground or cemetery for the aforesaid parishes, under the provisions of the said first recited Act;

And whereas notice of such petition, and of the time when Her Majesty was pleased to order that the same be taken into consideration by Her Privy Council, has been duly published as required by the said first recited Act; and it appears to Her

Majesty in Council that there is difficulty and inconvenience in providing, under the above-mentioned Act passed in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, requisite places of burial for the inhabitants of the said parishes;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that powers be vested in the Town Council of the city of Hereford, for providing requisite places of burial, under the provisions of the said first-recited Act, intituled "An Act to make further provision for the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the metropolis," or of any other Act of Parliament relating to burials, for the inhabitants of the parishes of All Saints, Saint Peter, Saint Owen, Saint Nicholas, and Saint John the Baptist, in the said city.

THE Queen has been graciously pleased to confirm the grant of the Decoration of the Victoria Cross to the undermentioned Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers, and Men of Her Majesty's and of the East India Company's Armies, which Decoration has been provisionally conferred upon them by Major-General Sir James Outram, G.C.B., and by the late Major-General Henry Havelock, K.C.B., on account of Acts of Bravery performed by them in India, as recorded against their several names, in virtue of the power delegated to Generals commanding Corps, Divisions, or Brigades, by Her Majesty's Warrant of the 29th January, 1856, viz.:

Regiment or Corps.	Rank and Name.	Act of Bravery for which recommended.
Royal Artillery ...	Captain (now Major) Francis Cornwallis Maude, C.B.	This officer steadily and cheerily pushed on with his men, and bore down the desperate opposition of the enemy, though with the loss of one-third of his Artillerymen. Sir James Outram adds, that this attack appeared to him to indicate no reckless or foolhardy daring, but the calm heroism of a true soldier, who fully appreciates the difficulties and dangers of the task he has undertaken; and that, but for Captain Maude's nerve and coolness on this trying occasion, the Army could not have advanced. (Extract from Field Force Orders of the late Major-General Havelock, dated 17th October, 1857.)
Bengal Artillery ...	Captain (now Lieutenant-Colonel) William Olpherts Date of Act of Bravery, 25th September, 1857	For highly distinguished conduct on the 25th of September, 1857, when the troops penetrated into the city of Lucknow, in having charged on horseback, with Her Majesty's 90th Regiment, when gallantly headed by Colonel Campbell, it captured two guns in the face of a heavy fire of grape, and having afterwards returned, under a severe fire of musketry, to bring up limbers and horses to carry off the captured ordnance, which he accomplished. (Extract from Field Force Orders of the late Major-General Havelock, dated 17th October, 1857.)
78th Regiment ...	Lieutenant (now Captain) Herbert Taylor Macpherson Date of Act of Bravery, 25th September, 1857	For distinguished conduct at Lucknow, on the 25th September, 1857, in setting an example of heroic gallantry to the men of the regiment, at the period of the action, in which they captured two brass nine-pounders at the point of the bayonet. (Extract from Field Force Orders of the late Major-General Havelock, dated 17th October, 1857.)
78th Regiment ...	Assistant-Surgeon Valentine Munbee McMaster Date of Act of Bravery, 25th September, 1857	For the intrepidity with which he exposed himself to the fire of the enemy, in bringing in, and attending to, the wounded, on the 25th of September, at Lucknow. (Extract from Field Force Orders of the late Major-General Havelock, dated 17th October, 1857.)
84th Regiment ...	Serjeant-Major George Lambert Date of Acts of Bravery, 29th July, 16th August, and 25th September, 1857	For distinguished conduct, at Onao, on the 29th of July; at Bithoor, on the 16th of August; and at Lucknow, on the 25th of September. (Extract from Field Force Orders of the late Major-General Havelock, dated 17th October, 1857.)
1st Madras Fusiliers	Serjeant Patrick Mahoney Date of Act of Bravery, 21st September, 1857	For distinguished gallantry (whilst doing duty with the Volunteer Cavalry) in aiding in the capture of the Regimental Colour of the 1st Regiment Native Infantry, at Mungulwar, on the 21st of September, 1857. (Extract from Field Force Orders of the late Major-General Havelock, dated 17th October, 1857.)
84th Regiment ...	Lance - Corporal Abraham Boulger Date of Acts of Bravery, from 12th July to 25th September, 1857	For distinguished bravery and forwardness, as a skirmisher, in all the twelve actions fought between 12th July, and 25th September, 1857. (Extract from Field Force Orders of the late Major-General Havelock, dated 17th October, 1857.)

84th Regiment ...	Private Joel Holmes	For distinguished conduct in volunteering to assist in working a gun of Captain Maude's Battery, under a heavy fire, from which gun nearly all the Artillerymen had been shot away. (Extract from Field Force Orders of the late Major-General Havelock, dated 17th October, 1857.)
78th Regiment ...	Private James Hollowell Date of Act of Bravery, 26th September, 1857	A party, on the 26th of September, 1857, was shut up and besieged in a house in the city of Lucknow, by the rebel sepoys. Private James Hollowell, one of the party, behaved, throughout the day, in the most admirable manner; he directed, encouraged, and led the others, exposing himself fearlessly, and by his talent in persuading and cheering, prevailed on nine dispirited men to make a successful defence, in a burning house, with the enemy, firing through four windows. (Extract from Divisional Orders of Major-General Sir James Outram, G.C.B., dated 14th October, 1857.)
5th Regiment ...	Private Peter McManus Date of Act of Bravery, 26th September, 1857	On the same occasion, Private McManus kept outside the house, until he was himself wounded, and under cover of a pillar, kept firing on the sepoys and preventing their rushing on the house. He also, in conjunction with Private John Ryan, rushed into the street, and took Captain Arnold, of the 1st Madras Fusiliers, out of a dooly, and brought him into the house in spite of a heavy fire, in which Captain Arnold was again wounded. (Extract from Divisional Orders of Major-General Sir James Outram, G.C.B., dated 14th October, 1857.)
1st Madras Fusiliers	Private John Ryan Date of Act of Bravery, 26th September, 1857	In addition to the above act, Private Ryan distinguished himself throughout the day by his intrepidity, and especially devoted himself to rescuing the wounded in the neighbourhood from being massacred. He was most anxious to visit every dooly. (Extract from Divisional Orders of Major-General Sir James Outram, G.C.B., dated 14th October, 1857.)
1st Madras Fusiliers	Private Thomas Duffy	For his cool intrepidity and daring skill, whereby a 24-pounder gun was saved from falling into the hands of the enemy. (Extract from Divisional Orders of Major-General Sir James Outram, G.C.B., dated 16th October, 1857.)
78th Regiment ...	Private Henry Ward Date of Act of Bravery, 25th and 26th September, 1857	"For his gallant and devoted conduct in having on the night of the 25th, and morning of the 26th of September, 1857, remained by the dooly of Captain H. M. Havelock, 10th Regiment, Deputy Assistant-Adjutant-General, Field Force, who was severely wounded, and on the morning of the 26th of September, escorted that Officer and Private Thomas Pilkington, 78th Highlanders, who was also wounded, and had taken refuge in the same dooly, through a very heavy cross fire of ordnance and musketry. This soldier remained by the side of the dooly, and by his example and exertions kept the dooly bearers from dropping their double load, throughout the heavy fire, with the same steadiness as if on parade, thus saving the lives of both, and bringing them in safety to the Baillie Guard." HER Majesty has also been graciously pleased to signify Her intention to confer the Decoration of the Victoria Cross on the undermentioned Officers of Her Majesty's and of the East India Company's Armies, who have been recommended to Her Majesty for that Decoration, in accordance with the Rules and Regulations laid down in Her Majesty's Warrant before referred to, on account of Acts of Bravery performed by them in India, viz. :

90th Regiment ...	Surgeon Anthony Dickson Home Date of Act of Bravery, 26th September, 1857	For persevering bravery and admirable conduct in charge of the wounded men left behind the column, when the troops under the late Major-General Havelock, forced their way into the Residency of Lucknow, on the 26th September, 1857. The escort left with the wounded had, by casualties, been reduced to a few stragglers, and being entirely separated from the column, this small party with the wounded were forced into a house, in which they defended themselves till it was set on fire. They then retreated to a shed a few yards from it, and in this place continued to defend themselves for more than twenty-two hours, till relieved. At last, only six men and Mr. Home remained to fire. Of four officers who were with the party, all were badly wounded, and three are since dead. The conduct of the defence during the latter part of the time devolved therefore on Mr. Home, and to his active exertions previously to being forced into the house, and his good conduct throughout, the safety of any of the wounded, and the successful defence, is mainly to be attributed.

Assistant-Surgeon William Bradshaw Date of Act of Bravery, 26th September, 1857	For intrepidity and good conduct when ordered with Surgeon Home, 90th Regiment, to remove the wounded men left behind the column that forced its way into the Residency of Lucknow, on the 26th September, 1857. The dooly bearers had left the doolies, but by great exertions, and notwithstanding the close proximity of the sepoy, Surgeon Home, and Assistant-Surgeon Bradshaw, got some of the bearers together, and Assistant-Surgeon Bradshaw with about twenty doolies, becoming separated from the rest of the party, succeeded in reaching the Residency in safety by the river bank.

2nd Dragoon Guards	Lieutenant Robert Blair Date of Act of Bravery, 28th September, 1857	<p>"A most gallant feat was here performed by Lieutenant Blair, who was ordered to take a party of one serjeant and twelve men and bring in a deserted ammunition waggon. As his party approached, a body of fifty or sixty of the enemy's horse came down upon him, from a village, where they had remained unobserved: without a moment's hesitation he formed up his men, and, regardless of the odds, gallantly led them on, dashing through the rebels. He made good his retreat without losing a man, leaving nine of them dead on the field. Of these he killed four himself; but, to my regret, after having run a native officer through the body with his sword, he was severely wounded, the joint of his shoulder being nearly severed."</p> <p>Despatch from Major-General James Hope Grant, K.C.B., dated 10th January, 1858.</p>
9th Lancers ...	<p>... Lieutenant Alfred Stowell Jones (now Captain 18th Hussars Date of Act of Bravery, 8th June, 1857</p>	<p>"The Cavalry charged the rebels and rode through them. Lieutenant Jones, of the 9th Lancers, with his squadron, captured one of their guns, killing the drivers, and, with Lieutenant-Colonel Yule's assistance, turned it upon a village, occupied by the rebels, who were quickly dislodged. This was a well-conceived act, gallantly executed."</p> <p>Despatch from Major-General James Hope Grant, K.C.B., dated 10th January, 1858.</p>
2nd Punjab Cavalry	Captain (now Major) Dighton Macnaghten Probyn	<p>"Has been distinguished for gallantry and daring throughout this campaign. At the battle of Agra, when his squadron charged the rebel infantry, he was some time separated from his men, and surrounded by five or six sepoys. He defended himself from the various cuts made at him, and before his own men had joined him had cut down two of his assailants. At another time, in single combat with a sepoy, he was wounded in the wrist, by the bayonet, and his horse also was slightly wounded; but, though the sepoy fought desperately, he cut him down. The same day he singled out a standard bearer, and, in the presence of a number of the enemy, killed him and captured the standard. These are only a few of the gallant deeds of this brave young officer."</p> <p>Despatch from Major-General James Hope Grant, K.C.B., dated 10th January, 1858.</p>
1st Punjab Cavalry	Lieutenant John Watson Date of Act of Bravery, 14th November, 1857	<p>"Lieut. Watson, on the 14th November, with his own squadron, and that under Captain, then Lieutenant, Probyn, came upon a body of the rebel cavalry. The Ressaldar in command of them,—a fine specimen of the Hindustani Mussulman,—and backed up by some half dozen equally brave men, rode out to the front. Lieutenant Watson singled out this fine looking fellow, and attacked him. The Ressaldar presented his pistol at Lieutenant Watson's breast, at a yard's distance, and fired; but, most providentially, without effect; the ball must, by accident, have previously fallen out. Lieutenant Watson ran the man through with his sword, and dismounted him; but the native officer, nothing daunted, drew his</p>

In this rencontre, Lieutenant Watson received a blow on the head from a <i>tulwar</i> , another on the left arm, which severed his chain gauntlet glove, a <i>tulwar</i> cut on his right arm, which fortunately only divided the sleeve of the jacket, but disabled the arm for some time; a bullet also passed through his coat, and he received a blow on his leg, which lamed him for some days afterwards." MEMORANDUM.

Lieutenants Duncan Charles Home and Philip Salkeld, Bengal Engineers, upon whom the Victoria Cross was provisionally conferred by Major-General Sir Archdale Wilson, Bart., K.C.B., for their conspicuous bravery in the performance of the desperate duty of blowing in the Cashmere Gate of the Fortress of Delhi, in broad daylight, under a heavy fire of musketry, on the morning of the 14th September, 1857, preparatory to the assault, would have been recommended to Her Majesty for confirmation in that distinction, had they survived.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the eighth year of the reign of her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the better Regulation of Colonial Posts," power is given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of colonial postage payable by law for the transmission of letters by the post, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant, and from time to time, by Warrant as aforesaid, to alter or repeal any such altered rates and make and establish any new or other rates in lieu thereof, and by Warrant as aforesaid to appoint at what time the rates that might be payable were to be paid:

And whereas further powers are given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by another Act of Parliament, passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for giving further facilities for the transmission of Letters by Post, and for the Regulating the Duties of Postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post Office:—"

And whereas it is expedient to make regulations for the transmission by the post within Jamaica of the packets hereinafter mentioned:

1. Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers vested in us in and by the said beforementioned Acts, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do by this Warrant, under the hands of two of us, the said Commissioners, by the authority of the Statute in that case made and provided, order and direct as follows, (that is to say):

All packets consisting of books, publications, or works of literature or art, posted in the colony

of Jamaica, may be transmitted by the post within the colony of Jamaica, subject to the several rates and regulations hereinafter contained (that is to say):

On every such packet, if not exceeding one ounce in weight, there shall be charged and taken one uniform rate of colonial postage of one penny.

And on every such packet, if exceeding one ounce, and not exceeding two ounces in weight, there shall be charged and taken one uniform rate of colonial postage of twopence.

And for every additional ounce in weight of any such packet above the weight of two ounces, there shall be charged and taken an additional rate of colonial postage of one penny, and every fractional part of every such additional ounce in weight shall be charged as one ounce in weight.

No such packet, which in length, or width, or depth, shall exceed the dimensions of two feet, shall be forwarded by the post, under the provisions aforesaid.

No such packet, which shall exceed the weight of three pounds, shall be forwarded by the post, under the provisions aforesaid.

The terms "books, publications, or works of literature or art," in this Warrant used, shall for the purposes of this Warrant, mean and comprise all such articles as in their general character, are either literary, or consist of printed, written, engraved, or lithographed matter (although not strictly literary) including books (whether printed, written, or plain) publications, or compilations (whether in print or in manuscript), almanacks, printed or lithographed letters, and such artistic productions as prints, maps (whether on paper, or canvas, or cloth, and whether printed or written), and photographs when not on glass or in frames containing glass, and any description of paper, parchment, or vellum (whether printed, lithographed, written upon, or plain, or any mixture of the four), together with any binding, mounting, or covering, of or upon, or belonging to any such article or production, or any portion thereof, or of, or belonging to any paper, parchment, or vellum, and including also any cases or rollers of prints, or maps, book markers (whether of paper, or otherwise), pencils, pens, or other thing, usually appertaining to any such article, or production, paper, parchment, or vellum, or necessary for its safe transmission which shall be sent in the same packet with any such article, or production, to which they or it shall belong: Provided, nevertheless, that nothing herein contained shall extend to authorize the sending by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant, of any patterns, or books of patterns, or papers of patterns, of any article or thing whatsoever, unless such patterns consist merely of paper.

Every packet transmitted by the post under the authority of this Warrant shall be sent open at the ends or sides, and either without a cover or in a cover or envelope open at the ends or sides; and there shall be no written letter, either closed or open, nor any written communication, in the nature of a letter, either closed or open (whether such letter or communication be addressed to, or intended for, the person to whom the packet shall be directed or any other person), nor any inclosure, sealed or otherwise closed against in-

spection, nor any other inclosure, not authorized by this Warrant, sent in or with any such packet; nor shall there be any written letter or any written communication in the nature of a letter, in or upon any such packet, or on the cover or envelope thereof.

2. In order to prevent any obstacles to the due and regular transmission of letters by the post, any officer of the Post Office may delay the transmission of any packet, posted or forwarded by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant, for the space of twenty-four hours after the time at which the same ought to be dispatched, in due course of the post or (at his option) until the despatch of the mail next after that by which the same ought in due course of the post to be forwarded by him.

3. The transmission of the packets aforesaid, under this present Warrant, shall be restricted to such as shall be sent by the post between places within the Island of Jamaica, and by the post of any post town in the said island.

4. If any packet, or the cover or envelope of any packet sent, or tendered or delivered, in order to be sent by the post under the provisions of this present Warrant, shall not be open at the ends or sides, or shall, in length or width, or depth, exceed the dimensions of two feet, or if any such packet shall exceed the weight of three pounds, or if there shall be any written letter, or any written communication in the nature of a letter, in or upon any such packet, or on the cover or envelope thereof, (whether such letter or communication be addressed to, or intended for the person to whom the packet shall be directed or any other person,) every such packet shall and may be detained and opened, and, at the option of the Postmaster-General, shall be either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or be given up to the person to whom it shall be addressed, or be forwarded to the place of its destination, and every such packet on being so returned, or given up, or forwarded, shall be chargeable with the like amount of postage to which it would have been liable as a letter if the postage had been paid when posted, and such postage may be either paid by the sender, or be charged to the person to whom such packet shall be given up or forwarded.

5. If any packet sent, or tendered or delivered in order to be sent by the post under the provisions of this Warrant, shall contain any written letter, or any written communication in the nature of a letter, whether closed or open, or any inclosure sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, or any other inclosure not authorized by this Warrant, every such letter, or communication, or inclosure, may be taken out by any officer of the Post Office, and either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or forwarded to the address on the packet, charged in either case, not only with the full rates of postage as an unpaid letter, but also with a further and additional rate of one penny, and the remainder of the packet, if the postage be duly paid when posted, may be forwarded to the place of its address without any extra charge.

6. Upon every packet transmitted by the post under the authority of this Warrant, the postage thereof shall be paid at the time of the same being posted.

7. If any packet sent, or tendered or delivered in order to be sent by the post under the provisions of this Warrant, shall be posted, and the postage paid thereon at the time of the same being posted, shall be less in amount than the rate of postage to which such packet would be liable

under and by virtue of the several regulations, orders, directions, and conditions hereinbefore contained, but equal in amount to the single rate of postage which would be chargeable under this Warrant if such packet did not exceed an ounce in weight, every such packet shall be forwarded, charged with the amount of the difference between the postage so paid thereon and the postage to which such packet would be liable as aforesaid, together with a further and additional rate of postage equal in amount to the single rate of postage chargeable under this Warrant on a packet not exceeding one ounce in weight, but if any such packet shall be posted without any postage having been paid thereon, or with a postage paid thereon less in amount than the single rate of postage chargeable under this Warrant, every such last mentioned packet shall and may be detained and opened, and at the option of the Postmaster-General, shall be either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or be given up to the person to whom it shall be addressed or be forwarded to the place of its destination.
