1. Respecting the Rates of Pilotage on Ships.

2. Respecting Exemptions from Compulsory Pilotage.

1. PILOTAGE RATES.

Law respecting the payment of Pilotage in Norway, which came into operation on the 1st January, 1858.

WE, Oscar, by the Grace of God, King of Norway and Sweden, the Goths and Vandals, make known, that the Resolution of the at present assembled Storthing, of the 22nd September this year, as follows, has been laid before us:

SECTION 1.

Instead of the pilot rates in the 16th section of the Pilot Regulations of the 6th August, 1824, the following have been determined on:

For piloting into harbour, when the distance from the outermost Skerries to the anchorage, according to the sailing channel, does not exceed one mile (4 English), shall be paid,

During the Summer Months, from the 1st April to the 30th of September, inclusive.

2. Exemptions from Compulsory Pilotage.

Law containing Changes in the Law respecting the Pilot Establishment of the 6th August, 1824.

WE, Oscar, by the grace of God, King of Norway and Sweden, the Goths and Vandals, make known; that the resolution of the Ordinary Storthing at present assembled, made on the 21st March this year, has been laid before us as follows:

SECTION I.

Section V. in the law regarding the Pilot Establishment of the 6th August, 1824, is altered, so that every ship or vessel going from one place to another, either between Norway and Sweden, or between one port of Norway and another, shall be exempt from taking a pilot, if the Master venture to go without a pilot; on the other hand, every ship or vessel, coming from, or going to any place beyond the United Kingdom, shall be obliged to take a pilot, should the vessel be of five commercial lasts burden or over.

SECTION II.

Steamers going as regular mail or passenger vessels, shall be exempt from the obligation to take a pilot. Whereas we have approved and ratified this resolution as a law; we do hereby approve and ratify it.
