In order to carry out the existing regulation, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that a letter from the Lady who is to make the presentation, stating it to be her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to the Queen, for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's Command, that no Presentations shall be made at the Drawing Rooms, except in accordance with the above regulations.

(No. 13.)—MEDITERRANEAN.—SICILY.

Light on Cape Santa Croce.

THE Sicilian Government has given notice, that on and after the 1st of May, 1859, a light will be exhibited from the lighthouse recently erected on Cape Santa Croce, in the province of Noto, on the east coast of Sicily.

The light will be a *fixed white* light, placed at an elevation of 91 English feet above the level of the sea, and in clear weather should be visible from a distance of 14 miles.

The illuminating apparatus will be dioptric or by lenses, and of the fourth order.

The light tower stands in lat. 37° 15' 18" N. long., about 15° 15' east of Greenwich.

Also, that on and after the same date, a light will be exhibited from the lighthouse recently erected on the peninsula of Magnisi, on the south side of the entrance to Port Augusta, province of Noto, east coast of Sicily.

The light will be a *fixed green* light, placed at an elevation of 49 English feet above the sea, and in clear weather should be seen at a distance of 10 miles.

The illuminating apparatus will be dioptric or by lenses, and of the fifth order.

The position of the light tower is in lat. 37° 9' 45" N. long., about 15° 15' east of Greenwich.
