(No. 30). BALTIC—GULF OF BOTHNIA.

Light Ship on Östra Finngrundet.

THE Royal Administration of Maritime Affairs at Stockholm has given notice, that on the 25th

July, 1859, a light ship was stationed at one mile and a half from the shoalest spot, on the bank named the Östra or Eastern Finngrund in the gulf of Bothnia.

The vessel carries a *fixed* white light, visible all round the horizon at a distance of about ten miles in clear weather.

The light ship is painted red, with the name Finngrundet in large white letters on each side. It carries two masts, having a ball at the main-mast head, and a bell is rung in foggy weather.

The vessel is placed in lat. 60° 55' 30" N., long. 18° 26' East of Greenwich, and will remain in position as long as the navigation is open.

Norway, West Coast—Höievarde Light.

Also that the Høievarde Fixed Light, in Karmø Sound, on the West Coast of Norway, will be re-lighted on the 1st September, 1859.

Kattegat—Buoy off the Svitringen Shoal.

A black and red chequered iron-pointed beacon buoy has been placed off the south-eastern end of the Svitringen shoal on the east coast of Jylland or Jutland, at 10 miles off Hals bar, in 6 fathoms water, with Muldbjerg highest point bearing N. 74° W., Hals church, N. 46° W., Knarhøer, N. 17° W. The buoy carries a reversed broom on the top of a red pole.

Gulf of Finland—Rock near the Glosholm Channel.

A rock having only 12 feet water on it has been discovered near the Glosholm channel, past the Pellinge lighthouse on the north shore of the gulf of Finland. It lies at one cable's length eastward of the southern point of Brokholm in the sound between Brokholm and the Basto land, and is marked by a pole

Revel Road—Katherinenthal High Light.

The repairs of the light tower having been completed, the Katherinenthal south or High light was re-established on the 27th July last. The light is only visible between the bearings from seaward of S. 4° E. and S. 48° E.
