OTICE is hereby given, that The Queen will hold a Court at St. James's Palace, on Wednesday, the 7th of March next, at two o'clock, for the special and exclusive reception of Officers of Volunteer Corps, who may be desirous of presenting themselves before Her Majesty.

#### REGULATIONS.

The Officers of Volunteer Corps who are desirous of attending the Queen's Court, at Saint James's Palace, on Wednesday the 7th of March next, should forthwith communicate their intention to the Lord Lieutenants of the several Counties in which their Corps have been established.

A list of the Officers who have thus signified their wish to be present will be transmitted by the Lord Lieutenant of each County to the Secretary of State for the War Department.

These lists, which will distinguish the rank of each Officer and the Corps or Company to which he belongs, will be forwarded to the Lord Chamberlain from the War Department, at latest, upon Monday the 5th of March.

The Lord Lieutenants and the Military Authorities summoned to attend the Court, will enter the Palace at the Entrée Entrance in Ambassadors' Court, and will pass at once to the Entrée Room.

The Officers of Volunteers will enter the Palace at the usual Corridor Entrance, opposite Marlborough House, and will be shewn at once to the room appointed for the assembling of their corps, where they will form into Companies in the order in which they are to pass the Queen. In order to facilitate this arrangement, each Officer will be furnished with a card on which is distinctly written, his County, the number of his County in the Army List, and the name and number of his Corps, Company, or Sub-division. Artillery should be specially marked on the cards of Officers of Artillery Volunteer Corps.

The doors of the Palace will be opened at half past twelve o'clock, and no Officer can be admitted after a quarter before two o'clock.

Officers will appear in the Uniforms approved for their Corps by the Lord Lieutenants.

They will pass before the Queen by Regiments, Companies, or Sub-divisions, headed by the Senior Officer present. The Officers of each Corps will be introduced by the Lord Lieutenants of their Counties, who will join them before entering the Throne Room. In the absence of the Lord Lieutenants, they will be introduced by the Under Secretary of State for the War Department. The Officers will draw up in line before the Queen, and the Senior Officer of each Corps or Company present, will hand a card containing the names of those about to pass before Her Majesty, to the Lord Lieutenant. This Card will be passed to the Lord Chamberlain, who will read the names to the Queen. The Officers will then pass on.

The various Corps will take precedence according to their Seniority in the Army List.

#### REGULATIONS

TO BE OBSERVED WITH REGARD TO THE QUEEN'S LEVEES AT ST. JAMES'S PALACE.

By Her Majesty's Command.

The Noblemen and Gentlemen, who propose to attend Her Majesty's Levees, at St. James's Palace, are requested to bring with them two large cards, with their names clearly written thereon, one to be left with The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, who will announce the name to The Queen.

#### PRESENTATIONS.

Any Nobleman or Gentleman who proposes to be presented to The Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's Office, before twelve o'clock, two clear days before the Levee, a card with his name written thereon, and with the name of the Nobleman or Gentleman by whom he is to be presented.

In order to carry out the existing regulation that no presentation can be made at a Levee excepting by a person actually attending that Levee, it is also necessary that a letter from the Nobleman or Gentleman who is to make the presentation, stating it to be his intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen for Her Majesty's approbation. It is 11.7 Majesty's command, that no presentations shall be made at the Levees, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested, that in every case the names be very distinctly written upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

#### ADDRESSES.

The same regulations apply to the presentation of Addresses or Petitions.

A card containing a statement of the object of the Addresses or Petitions, with the names of the persons who are to present them, must be sent to the Lord Chamberlain's Office two clear days before the Levee. Two other cards, containing similar information, are to be taken to the Levee, one to be delivered to The Queen's Page in Attendance in the Corridor, and the other to the Lord Chamberlain, who will read its contents to The Queen.

On these occasions no other statement is to be addressed to Her Majesty.

A Deputation to present an Address is not to exceed four persons.

The members of a Deputation, who have not previously attended Court, must be presented to The Queen.

#### PRESENTATIONS.

Any Lady who proposes to be presented to The Queen must leave at the Lord Chamberlain's

Office, before twelve o'clock, two clear days before the Drawing Room, a card with her name written thereon, and with the name of the Lady by whom she is to be presented. In order to carry out the existing regulation, that no presentation can be made at a Drawing Room excepting by a Lady actually attending that Court, it is also necessary that a letter from the Lady who is to make the presentation, stating it to be her intention to be present, should accompany the presentation card above referred to, which will be submitted to The Queen, for Her Majesty's approbation. It is Her Majesty's Command, that no Presentations shall be made at the Drawing Rooms, except in accordance with the above regulations.

It is particularly requested that in every case the names be very distinctly written upon the cards to be delivered to the Lord Chamberlain, in order that there may be no difficulty in announcing them to The Queen.

The state apartments will not be open for the reception of Company coming to Court, until half-past one o'clock.

Board of Trade, Whitehall, February 17, 1860.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Notification issued by the Neapolitan Board of Health, declaring that all vessels leaving the ports of the following countries, on or after the dates specified, will be received at Naples in free pratique:

Hanover, on or after the 24th December, 1859. Norway, on or after the 12th December, 1859. Sweden, on or after the 1st January, 1860.

Holland, on or after the 14th January, 1860. Sierra Leone and Guinea, on or after the 11th October, 1859.

Spain, except Algesiras, on or after the 13th December, 1859.

Belgium, except Antwerp, on or after the 10th January, 1860.

Algiers, except Oran, on or after the 12th January, 1860.

Algesiras, on or after the 2nd January, 1860. Antwerp, on or after the 30th January, 1860. Oran, on or after the 1st February, 1860.

The same notice states that vessels arriving from the port of Ceuta, will be subjected to ten days' quarantine, with airing of merchandize.

THE Queen having been graciously pleased, by a Warrant under Her Royal Sign Manual, bearing date the 13th of December, 1858, to declare that Non-Military Persons who, as Volunteers, have borne arms against the Mutineers, both at Lucknow and elsewhere, during the late operations in India, shall be considered as eligible to receive the decoration of the Victoria Cross, subject to the rules and ordinances already made and ordined for the government thereof, provided that it be established in any case that the person was serving under the orders of a General or other Officer in Command of Troops in the Field, when he performed the Act of Bravery for which it is proposed to confer the decoration;—Her Majesty has accordingly been pleased to signify Her intention to confer this high distinction on the undermentioned Gentleman, whose claim to the same has been submitted for Her Majesty's approval, on account of an Act of Bravery performed by him in India, as recorded against his name; viz.:

Name and Designation.	Act of Bravery for which recommended.
Mr. William Fraser M'Donell, of the Bengal Civil Service, Magistrate of Sarun,	For great coolness and bravery on the 30th of July, 1857, during the retreat of the British Troops from Arrah, in having climbed, under an incessant fire, outside the Boat in which he and several Soldiers were, up
Date of Act of Bravery, 30th July, 1857	to the rudder, and with considerable difficulty cut through the lashing which secured it to the side of the boat. On the lashing being cut, the boat obeyed the helm, and thus thirty-five European Soldiers escaped certain death.

HER Majesty has also been graciously pleased to signify Her intention to confer the decoration of the Victoria Cross on the undermentioned Officers and Private Soldier, whose claims to the same have been submitted for Her Majesty's approval, on account of Acts of Bravery performed by them in India, as recorded against their several names; viz:

lst European Bengal Fusiliers	Lieutenant Francis David Millett Brown  Date of Act of Bravery, 16th November, 1857	For great gallantry at Narrioul, on the 16th November, 1857, in having, at the imminent risk of his own life, rushed to the assistance of a wounded soldier of the 1st European Bengal Fusiliers, whom he carried off, under a very heavy fire from the enemy, whose cavalry were within forty or fifty yards of him at the time.
10th Regiment (1st Battalion)	No. 2134, Private Denis Dempsey  Date of Acts of Bravery, 12th August, 1857, and 14th March, 1858	For having, at Lucknow, on the 14th March, 1858, carried a Powder Bag through a burning village, with great coolness and gallantry, for the purpose of mining a passage in rear of the enemy's position. This he did, exposed to a very heavy fire from the enemy behind loopholed walls, and to an almost still greater danger from the sparks which flew in every direction from the blazing houses.  Also, for having been the first man who entered the village of Jugdispore on the 12th August, 1857, under a most galling fire.  Private Dempsey was likewise one of those who helped to carry Ensign Erskine, of the 10th Regiment, in the retreat from Arrah, in July, 1857.

The tower is circular, of gray limestone, and the whole height from its base to the top of its lantern is 105 feet. A range of storehouses surround the lower story of tower; the dwellinghouses are built to the north westward, on a lower level of the rock.

From and after the date of the exhibition of the Rockabill light (1st July, 1860), the intermitting light on St. John's Point, Dundrum Bay, will be coloured red, the times of its eclipses will continue as heretofore.
