IT is hereby notified that the Right Honourable The Lord John Russell, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, has received from Sir Andrew Buchanan, K.C.B., Her Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary to the Court of Spain, a Despatch, dated Madrid, April 17th, 1860, inclosing a copy of a Notification which was published in the Gazette at Madrid on the same day (April 17th),

announcing that the Blockade of the Moorish Ports, instituted by the Spanish Government on the 28th October, 1859 (the existence of which blockade was notified in the London Gazette of the 8th November, 1859), was raised on and from the 25th March last.

The following is a translation of the Notification published in the Madrid Gazette of April 17, 1860:—

It is hereby made known that, according to communications addressed to the Minister of State by the Minister of Marine, who refers to the Commander-in-Chief of the Naval Forces intended to act on the coast of Africa, from the 25th of the month of March last, the day on which the Preliminaries of Peace and the Armistice between both armies were signed, the Blockade of the Moorish Ports, established on the 28th of October, of the year last passed, 1859, has been and is raised.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACT, 1858.

NOTICE OF ADOPTION OF ACT BY MARSDEN, YORKSHIRE.

WHEREAS, the Local Government Act, 1858, was duly adopted on the 5th day of April, 1860, by the township of Marsden, in the parish of Almondbury, in the county of York, and notice of such adoption has been duly given, in writing, to me, as one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, as required by such Act. And whereas it has now been duly certified to me that a copy of such notice has been advertised for three successive weeks in the Huddersfield Examiner, and the Huddersfield Chronicle, those being two of the local newspapers published and circulated in the aforesaid township, and that copies of such notice have also been affixed to the principal doors of each church and chapel in such township to which notices are usually affixed; and the period of twenty-one days, fixed by the said Act for appeal against the resolution for the adoption of the said Act by such township, has now expired, and no such appeal has been made:

Now, therefore, I, as one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, do hereby give notice, that the Local Government Act, 1858, has been adopted within the said township of Marsden, in the parish of Almondbury, in the county of York, and that in accordance with the provisions thereof, the said Act will, at the expiration of

two months from the date of the passing of the aforesaid Resolution, have the force of law within such township.
