MEMORANDUM.

India Office, July 19, 1861.

OFFICERS of Her Majesty's Indian Forces are informed that their wishes as to volunteering under the conditions laid down in the following paragraphs of General Orders of the Government and Commander-in-Chief in India, dated 10th April last (republished in the London Gazette of 28th May), should be signified to the Adjutant-General of their respective armies.

Extract, paragraph 50, General Order by the Government of India, of 10th April, 1861.

"From these two general lists, officers of cavalry and infantry will be invited to volunteer for Her Majesty's general service to the number required for the new regiments of cavalry and infantry respectively, according as such officers belong to either branch of the service." * * * "The general lists will be immediately formed in the three Presidencies, and measures will be taken by the several Governments to ascertain the wishes of officers in regard to volunteering for Her Majesty's general service."

Paragraph 16, General Order by the Commander-in-Chief, of 10th April, 1861.

"16. Officers commanding divisions, brigades, and stations, will, without delay, ascertain the wishes of officers of cavalry and infantry of the local service in regard to volunteering to fill vacancies in the new line regiments of cavalry and infantry, should there be vacancies in them."

These bounties, however, will continue in operation during a month from the promulgation of the present Decree.
