THE following Addresses and Resolutions of Condolence, on the occasion of the death of His Royal Highness The Prince Consort, have been transmitted to the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Baronet, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, to be laid before the Queen.

To the QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most loyal and dutiful subjects, the Chancellor, Master, and Scholars of the University of Oxford, respectfully approach your Royal Presence, with the expression of our heartfelt condolence on the irreparable loss sustained by your Majesty and the whole British nation, in the decease of the late lamented Prince Albert, your Majesty's illustrious Consort.

In humbly tendering to your Majesty the assurance of our sympathy on this grievous and unlooked-for bereavement, we simply give utterance to the feeling at this time uppermost in the hearts of all your Majesty's faithful subjects. But when we call to mind the deep sense of religion, and the many intellectual accomplishments which distinguished the illustrious Prince thus suddenly taken from us, we cannot but feel that the Universities of this realm must be partakers in more than common measure of the general sorrow.

Blest with a vigorous understanding and highly cultivated mind, His Royal Highness had acquired a thorough knowledge of our national character, and with singular sagacity developed it in paths comparatively untrod and unknown. But it was not the possession of these rare endowments, nor the grateful sense of the benefits resulting from them to the nation, that won for His Royal

Highness the affections of the English people, it was because they beheld in the Consort of their beloved Queen the affectionate husband, the kind and watchful father, the wise and trusty adviser of their Sovereign in every exigency of her public and her private life, they felt an ever growing admiration of his character, and paid him the willing tribute of their reverence and affection. It is, we are well assured, the influence of these considerations that imparts its present overwhelming character to the national regret, and will cause the memory of this illustrious Prince to be revered by all succeeding generations of our posterity.

We are sensible, however, that our Heavenly Father has in His mercy not left your Majesty or our country altogether comfortless under the pressure of this great affliction. We have heard with grateful feelings, of the spirit of resignation in which your Majesty bows with submission to the Divine will; and we are not unobservant of many rays of consolation which mitigate our own sorrow, and will, we trust, tend in time to alleviate the bitter brief which now weighs so heavily upon your Majesty. We know His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales to be the inheritor of the many noble qualities of his highly gifted Father; and we are comforted by the reflection that His Royal Highness is now of an age to share with your Majesty the burden of every domestic anxiety, and to support your Majesty in the administration of the affairs of State. It will be our fervent prayer that these and all our other cheering anticipations may, by the Divine blessing, be fulfilled; and that serenity of mind, and even happiness, may yet be the appointed lot of a mother and a Sovereign, whose virtues must ever ensure for her the warmest love of her children, and the most loyal and devoted affection of her faithful subjects.

A PROCLAMATION.

VICTORIA, R.

WHEREAS Our Parliament stands prorogued to Tuesday the seventh day of January instant; We, with the advice of Our Privy Council, do hereby publish and declare, that the said Parliament shall be further prorogued, on the said seventh day of January instant, to Thursday the sixth day of February next; and We have given order to Our Chancellor of that part of Our United Kingdom called Great Britain to prepare a Commission for proroguing the same accordingly: and We do hereby further, with the advice aforesaid, declare Our royal will and pleasure, that the said Parliament shall, on the said Thursday the sixth day of February next, assemble and be holden for the dispatch of divers urgent and important affairs: and the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby ordered and commanded to give their attend-

ance accordingly, at Westminster, on the said Thursday the sixth day of February next.

Given at Our Court at *Osborne House, Isle of Wight*, this sixth day of *January*, in the year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two, and in the twenty-fifth year of Our reign.

AT the Court at *Osborne House, Isle of Wight*, the 6th day of *January*, 1862,

PRESENT,

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by the Act of Uniformity, which establisheth the Liturgy, and enacts, that no Form or Order of Common Prayer be openly used other than what is prescribed or appointed to be used in and by the said Book, it is notwithstanding provided, that in all those Prayers, Litanies, and Collects which do anywise relate to the King, Queen, or Royal Progeny, the names be altered and changed from time to time, and fitted to the present occasion, according to direction of lawful authority: Her Majesty was pleased this day in Council to declare Her Royal Will and Pleasure, that in all the Prayers, Litanies, and Collects for the Royal Family the words "Albert Edward, Prince of Wales" be inserted instead of the words "Albert, Prince of Wales."

And Her Majesty doth strictly charge and command, that no edition of the Common Prayer be from henceforth printed but with this amendment; and that in the meantime, till copies of such edition may be had, all Parsons, Vicars, and Curates within this realm do (for the preventing of mistakes), with the pen, correct and amend all such prayers in their Church Books, according to the foregoing directions: And for the better notice hereof, that this Order be forthwith printed and published, and sent to the several parishes; and that the Right Reverend the Bishops do take care that obedience be paid to the same accordingly.

IN pursuance of an Act passed in the tenth year of Her Majesty Queen Anne, and of another Act passed in the thirty-second year of His Majesty King George the Third, wherein provision is made for praying for the Royal Family in that part of Great Britain called Scotland; it is ordered by Her Majesty in Council that henceforth every Minister and Preacher in Scotland shall, in his respective church, congregation, or assembly, pray in express words,

"For Her Most Sacred Majesty Queen Victoria,
 "Albert Edward, Prince of Wales, and all
 "the Royal Family."

of which all persons concerned are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the tenth year of the reign of Her Majesty, intituled "an Act for the more easy recovery of small debts and demands in England," it is among other things, enacted, that it should be lawful for Her Majesty, with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that the said Act be put in force in such county or counties as to Her Majesty, with the advice aforesaid, should seem fit, and to divide the whole or part of any such county (including all counties of cities and counties of towns, cities, boroughs, towns, ports, and places, liberties and franchises therein contained or thereunto adjoining) into districts; and to order that the County Court should be holden for the recovery of debts and demands, under the said Act, in each of such districts; and, from time to time, to alter such districts, as to Her Majesty, with the advice aforesaid, should seem fit; and from time to time, with the advice aforesaid, to declare by what name, and in what towns and places the County Court should be holden in each district:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased by an Order in Council, of the ninth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and forty-seven, to order that the said Act be put in force in the counties and places therein specified, and the same was put in force accordingly:

And whereas by certain other Acts, made and passed in the thirteenth, in the fourteenth, in the sixteenth, in the twentieth, and in the twenty-second years of the reign of Her Majesty, the provisions of the said recited Act have been amended and extended:

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased by a further Order in Council of the thirteenth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-eight, to order that the County Court of Cheshire, known by the name of "The County Court of Cheshire holden at Runcorn," should be held at Frodsham as well as at Runcorn, and the same was put in force accordingly:

And whereas it hath been represented that it is inexpedient to continue the holding of the County Court of Cheshire at Frodsham, in the same county:

Her Majesty, having taken the premises into consideration, is thereupon pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the thirty-first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-two:

The County Court of Cheshire, known by the name of "The County Court of Cheshire holden at Runcorn," shall cease to be holden at Frodsham, in the county of Chester.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament, passed in the session of Parliament, holden in the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to remove doubts as to the exercise of power and jurisdiction by Her

Majesty within divers countries and places out of Her Majesty's dominions, and to render the same more effectual," it is amongst other things enacted, that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty to hold, exercise, and enjoy any power or jurisdiction which Her Majesty now hath, or may at any time hereafter have, within any country or place out of Her Majesty's dominions, in the same and as ample a manner as if Her Majesty had acquired such power or jurisdiction by the cession or conquest of territory.

And whereas Her Majesty hath power and jurisdiction in the islands included between the different branches of the River Danube, at its mouth, and forming, and commonly designated as the Delta of the Danube, which by the Treaty between Her Majesty, His Imperial Majesty the Emperor of Austria, His Imperial Majesty the Emperor of the French, His late Majesty the King of Prussia, His Imperial Majesty the Emperor of all the Russias, His Majesty the King of Sardinia, and His Imperial Majesty the Sultan, signed at Paris, on the nineteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, were replaced under the immediate sovereignty of the Sublime Ottoman Porte.

And whereas it is expedient to provide for the efficient exercise of the said power and jurisdiction, for the purposes hereinafter mentioned, in like manner as the same have been customarily and of right exercised on behalf of Her Majesty by Her Majesty's Ambassadors, Ministers, Consuls, and other officers within the dominions of the Sublime Ottoman Porte.

And whereas by the fifteenth Article of the General Treaty of Peace between Her Majesty, His Imperial Majesty the Emperor of Austria, His Imperial Majesty the Emperor of the French, His late Majesty the King of Prussia, His Imperial Majesty the Emperor of all the Russias, His Majesty the King of Sardinia, and His Imperial Majesty the Sultan, signed at Paris, on the thirtieth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, it was provided as follows: "The Act of the Congress of Vienna having established the principles intended to regulate the navigation of rivers which separate or traverse different States, the contracting powers stipulate among themselves that those principles shall in future be equally applied to the Danube and its mouths. They declare that this arrangement henceforth forms a part of the public law of Europe, and take it under their guarantee."

"The navigation of the Danube cannot be subjected to any impediment or charge not expressly provided for by the stipulations contained in the following Articles: in consequence, there shall not be levied any toll founded solely upon the fact of the navigation of the river, nor any duty upon the goods which may be on board of vessels. The regulations of police and of quarantine to be established for the safety of the States separated or traversed by that river, shall be so framed as to facilitate as much as possible the passage of vessels. With the exception of such regulations, no obstacle whatever shall be opposed to free navigation."

"And whereas by the sixteenth Article of the said last-mentioned Treaty, it was further provided as follows: "With the view of carrying out the arrangements of the preceding Article, a Commission, in which Great Britain, Austria, France, Prussia, Russia, Sardinia, and Turkey shall each be represented by one delegate, shall be charged to designate and to cause to be executed the works necessary below Isatcha to clear the mouths of the Danube, as well as the neighbouring parts of the sea, from the sands and other impedi-

ments which obstruct them, in order to put that part of the river and the said parts of the sea in the best possible state for navigation."

"In order to cover the expenses of such works, as well as of the establishments intended to secure and to facilitate the navigation at the mouths of the Danube, fixed duties of a suitable rate settled by the Commission by a majority of votes may be levied, on the express condition that in this respect, as in every other, the flags of all the nations shall be treated on the footing of perfect equality."

And whereas, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven, by virtue of the said Articles of the said last-mentioned Treaty, a Commission was accordingly established for the purposes therein mentioned.

And whereas the said Commission, under the power and authorities given to it by the said Articles or otherwise, in and by the said last-mentioned Treaty, has, from time to time, made and promulgated certain rules, orders, and regulations, and is authorized and empowered, from time to time, to make and promulgate further and other rules, orders, and regulations as well concerning the navigation of the said River Danube, and the conduct and government of masters, seamen, and others navigating the same, as concerning the payment of duties to be levied and taken in respect of the navigation of the said river, and the enforcing of penalties for the breach of such rules, orders, and regulations respectively, or any of them.

And whereas it is expedient that power should be given to Her Majesty's Consuls, Vice-Consuls, and Consular Agents exercising jurisdiction over British subjects and Ionian within the dominions of the Sublime Ottoman Porte, to enforce the rules, orders, and regulations so made and to be made by the said Commission as aforesaid.

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the above-recited Act of Parliament, and in execution of the powers thereby vested in Her Majesty in Council, Her Majesty is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared as follows:

I. All rules, orders, and regulations so made, and to be made, by the said Commission, as hereinbefore mentioned, shall, from and after the date of these presents, or from and after the making of such rules, orders, and regulations respectively, be binding and in force, and shall have the force and effect of law, upon and against all British subjects, and Ionians and other persons, subject to the jurisdiction of Her Majesty's consuls, vice-consuls, and consular agents, within the dominions of the Sublime Ottoman Porte.

II. For all the purposes mentioned in the said fifteenth and sixteenth Articles of the said Treaty, and for the purpose of enforcing, so far as Her Majesty's subjects and such other persons as aforesaid are concerned, the provisions of the said Articles; and all rules, orders, and regulations made, or to be made, by the said Commission, under the powers and authorities given to them by the said Articles, or either of them, or otherwise in or by the said last-mentioned Treaty, and all acts, payments, matters, and things, which in and by such rules, orders, or regulations shall have been or shall be ordered under such powers or authorities as aforesaid, to be made, done, or performed, or otherwise in relation thereto, the said consuls, vice-consuls, and consular agents of Her Majesty, within the dominions of the Sublime Ottoman Porte, shall, from and after the date of these presents, have, possess, and enjoy all and every the powers, jurisdiction, authorities, rights, privileges,

and immunities which, in and by a certain Order in Council, bearing date the twenty-seventh day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, are or is vested in or belongs to, are or is exercisable by, the Judge of the Supreme Consular Court of Constantinople, within the dominions of the Sublime Ottoman Porte. And all the clauses, Articles, and provisions of the said Order in Council, so far as the same respectively are now in force and unrepealed, and so far as the same, or any of them, are applicable to the purposes mentioned in the said fifteenth and sixteenth Articles of the said last-mentioned Treaty, or any of them, or to such rules, orders, or regulations as aforesaid, shall apply and extend to the said consuls, vice-consuls, and consular agents of Her Majesty, and to all acts, matters, and things whatsoever, done by, to, or in respect of them the said consuls, vice-consuls, and consular agents respectively, under or by virtue of these presents.

And the Right Honourable Earl Russell, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accord ingly.

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by "the Common Law Procedure Act, 1860," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for Her Majesty from time to time, by an Order in Council, to direct that all or any part of the provisions of the said Act, or of the rules to be made in pursuance thereof, shall apply to all or any Court or Courts of Record in England and Wales, and [within one month after such Order shall have been made and published in the London Gazette such provisions and rules respectively shall extend and apply in manner directed by such Order, and any such Order may be, in like manner, from time to time altered and annulled; and that in and by any such Order Her Majesty may direct by whom any powers or duties incident to the provisions applied under the said Act, shall and may be exercised with respect to matters in such Court or Courts, and may make any Order or regulations which may be deemed requisite for carrying into operation in such Court or Courts the provisions so applied.

And whereas it has seemed fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that all the provisions of the said Act, and of the rules made and to be made in pursuance thereof, shall extend and apply to the Court of Record of the borough of Scarborough, in the county of York, commonly called the Court of Pleas.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that, within one month after this Order shall have been published in the London Gazette, all the provisions of the said "Common Law Procedure Act, 1860," and of the rules made, or to be made, in pursuance of the said Act, shall extend and apply to the said Court of Record of the borough of Scarborough, called the Court of Pleas.

And Her Majesty is further pleased to order, by and with the advice aforesaid, that all the powers or duties exercisable by the Court, or a Judge under any of the sections of the said "Common Law Procedure Act, 1860," hereby extended and applied to the said Court of Record, shall, as

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of the Act of the eighteenth and nineteenth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-seven; of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of Her Majesty, chapter fifty-five; and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of Her Majesty, chapter one hundred and forty-two, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme bearing date the eighth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the eighteenth and nineteenth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and twenty-seven; of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five; and of the Act of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth years of your Majesty, chapter one hundred and forty-two; have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for making better provision for the spiritual duties of the parishes of South Dalton and Holme-on-the-Wolds, in the county of York, and in the diocese of York, by uniting those benefices.

"Whereas the several requirements of the said firstly hereinbefore-mentioned Act in respect of matters preliminary to, and in furtherance of, a proposal for the union of contiguous benefices, have been and are duly complied with in the present case by the inhabitants of the aforesaid parishes of South Dalton and Holme-on-the-Wolds, and by the patrons of the same two benefices, and by the bishop of the diocese as appears by this scheme and by the statement and certificate set forth in the schedule hereunto annexed.

"And whereas proceedings for effecting the said proposed union had been commenced and were pending at the time of the passing of the said lastly mentioned Act.

"And whereas the Right Honorable Beaumont Baron Hotham has, at his own expense, and upon land conveyed to us for that purpose, erected a new church in the said parish of South Dalton, capable of affording sufficient accommodation for the inhabitants of South Dalton and Holme-on-the-Wolds.

"And whereas the said new church was consecrated by the Archbishop of York on the sixth day of this instant month of August, and by an instrument under our common seal, dated the seventh day of the same month, and made in pursuance of the Act passed in that behalf, we (with such consents as by the same Act are required) declared that such new church should be substituted for the old and dilapidated church of South Dalton; and did transfer to such new church the endowments, emoluments, and rights of, or belonging to, such old church, whereby such new church became, and now is, the parish church of the said parish of South Dalton; and the same is the church to be left standing and remaining within the proposed united benefice of South Dalton and Holme-on-the-Wolds.

"And whereas the existing parish church at Holme-on-the-Wolds is in a dilapidated condition, and it is desirable to provide for the pulling down thereof upon the completion of the union of the

said parishes as hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"Now, therefore, having instituted inquiry concerning the facts set forth in the said statement and certificate, and seeing fit to propose this scheme we do hereby certify and submit to your Majesty in Council the statement and certificate aforesaid, which is hereto annexed and appended by way of schedule; and we do recommend and propose that the said two several parishes of South Dalton and Holme-on-the-Wolds be united for ecclesiastical purposes only by the name of the United Benefice of South Dalton and Holme-on-the-Wolds.

"And we further recommend and propose that it shall be lawful for us at any time, and from time to time, after the issuing of a duly gazetted order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, to order and direct and carry out the pulling down of the said parish church at Holme-on-the-Wolds, or of such part thereof as shall to us seem meet.

" SCHEDULE.

" *To the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England*

"Whereas it was represented in writing to Thomas Lord Archbishop of York, my immediate predecessor in the see of York, by the inhabitants of the several parishes of South Dalton and Holme-on-the-Wolds, in the county and diocese of York, in their respective vestries assembled, that the benefices of the parishes of which they were inhabitants might with advantage to the interests of religion be united.

"And whereas I have enquired into the circumstances of the case, and it appears to me that such union may usefully be made; and that the patrons of the said benefices so proposed to be united are consenting thereto; such consent being signified in writing under the hands of such patrons.

"Now I, Charles Thomas Lord Archbishop of York, do hereby certify to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England the following statement of the facts, to wit:—

"That the population of the parish of South Dalton, according to the census taken in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one, was 299, and that of Holme-on-the-Wolds was 150.

"That the gross annual value of the said benefice of South Dalton is three hundred and ninety-seven pounds, or thereabouts, and that of the said benefice of Holme-on-the-Wolds sixty-five pounds, or thereabouts.

"That the ancient parish church of Holme-on-the-Wolds is in a dilapidated condition, and that there is no other church in the parish of Holme-on-the-Wolds.

"That there is a Parsonage-house in and for the said parish of South Dalton, but none in or for the said parish of Holme-on-the-Wolds.

"That the said two parishes are contiguous, and that the present parish church of South Dalton is distant not more than half-a-mile from the said parish church of Holme-on-the-Wolds.

"That the Right Honorable Beaumont Lord Hotham is the patron in fee of the benefice of Holme-on-the-Wolds, and is also patron during his life of the benefice of South Dalton, and that Charles Hotham, a lieutenant in Her Majesty's 18th, or Royal Irish Regiment of Foot, is the next heir of full age, entitled to the patronage of the last-named benefice, after the decease of the said Beaumont Lord Hotham, and that both benefices are held by one and the same incumbent, to wit, the Reverend Thomas Frederick Simmons, Clerk.

"That the said Beaumont Lord Hotham and Charles Hotham, as such patrons as aforesaid, are consenting to such union of the said parishes as aforesaid."

"Given under my hand this seventh day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one.

And whereas a copy of the said scheme has, in accordance with the provisions of the said firstly herein before mentioned Act, been affixed on or near to the principal outer door of each of the churches of the said parish of South Dalton and Holme-on-the-Wolds, so proposed to be united, and in the usual place of notice in such parishes, and copies of the same scheme have also been duly transmitted to the bishop of the diocese, and to the patrons, ministers, churchwardens, overseers, and vestry clerks of the benefices and parishes of South Dalton and Holme-on-the-Wolds respectively, together with such a notice to every person interested in the matter as is by the same Act required.

And whereas two months have elapsed since the date of the affixing of the said scheme, and the transmission of the said notices as aforesaid; and no cause has been shown against the proposed union of the said parishes and benefices, or as to any part or parts of the said scheme.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct, that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the Diocese of York.

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of the Act of the fifty-ninth year of His Majesty King George the Third, chapter one hundred and thirty-four; of the Act of the second and third years of your Majesty, chapter forty-nine; and of the Act of the nineteenth and twentieth years of your Majesty, chapter fifty-five, have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following representation as to the assignment of a district

chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Mary, situate in the parish of Lowton, in the county of Lancaster, and in the diocese of Chester.

"Whereas it appears to us to be expedient that a district chapelry should be assigned to the said church of Saint Mary, situate at Lowton aforesaid.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of Chester, testified by his having signed and sealed this representation, we humbly represent that it would, in our opinion, be expedient that all that part of the said parish of Lowton, described in the schedule hereunto annexed, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed, should be assigned to the said church, and that the same should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Mary, Lowton.'

"And with the like consent of the said John, Bishop of Chester, testified as aforesaid, we further represent, that it appears to us to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed at such church, and that the fees to be received in respect thereof, should be paid and belong to the minister of the same church for the time being.

"We, therefore, humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your Royal consideration, and to make such order with respect thereto, as to your Majesty in your Royal wisdom shall seem meet.

part of the property of their Church to the establishment of a University in connexion therewith for the advancement of learning,' and of the engagements entered into by William, late Bishop of Durham, and the Dean and Chapter of Durham, shall be determined on with a view to maintaining the said University in a state of respectability and efficiency.

"And whereas in pursuance of the said in part recited Act, and upon due enquiry and consideration of the Act therein referred to, we have from time to time prepared and submitted to your Majesty in Council schemes for effecting the arrangements aforesaid, and such schemes have been ratified by your Majesty in Council, by Orders bearing date respectively, the fourth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and forty-one, the eighth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and forty-five, the first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, the twenty-fifth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one, and the first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of said Warden, Masters, and Scholars of the University of Durham, testified by their Common Seal being hereunto affixed, we humbly recommend and propose that immediately upon the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly published Order, all our estate and interest in the lands, tenements and hereditaments described in the Schedule hereunto annexed shall become, and be transferred to, and permanently vested in, the said Warden, Masters, and Scholars of the said University of Durham, and their successors for ever, in full substitution for the said annual sum of three hundred and fifteen pounds, and that they shall be entitled to the rents, profits, and proceeds thereof as from the twenty-ninth day of September last, and that the said annual money payment shall as from the said twenty-ninth day of September cease and determine.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the endowment of the said University of Durham, in accordance with the provisions of the said Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament.

perpetual curate to serve the church of the said consolidated chapelry of Saint Thomas, Islington, shall belong to, and be exercised jointly by, the incumbent, for the time being, of the district parish of the Holy Trinity, Islington aforesaid, and by the Reverend Charles James Goodhart, minister of Park Chapel, Chelsea, in the said county of Middlesex, the Reverend John Lees, incumbent of the new parish of Saint Mark, Tollynorton-park, in the said county of Middlesex, John Spurling, of Canonbury-square, in the said county of Middlesex, Gentleman, and Frederick Sanders, of Dorset Villa, Saint John's-park, Upper Holloway, in the said county of Middlesex, Gentleman, their heirs and assigns; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of London.
