THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul-General, in Norway, enclosing a translation of a Swedish Royal Decree, prohibiting the importation of corn brandy, and fixing as follows,

the duties upon other kinds of brandies imported into Sweden :

In pottles or jars, without reference to strength, per pot, 21½ skillings.

In other packages, of a strength not exceeding 88 per cent., per lb., 12½ skillings.

For every half per cent. strength above 88, $\frac{1}{10}$ skilling additional per lb.

The strength to be determined by the authorized hydrometer.

If the wares are mixed with sugar or other ingredients causing the hydrometer to indicate incorrectly, the duty is to be paid as on spirits of 100 per cent. strength.

Tare on casks weighing from 250 lbs. or more, allowance is to be given of 15 per cent; on casks of less weight, 23 per cent.

The above resolution will come into force on the 1st February next, and remain in operation until the 1st April following.

At the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of Our Lady the Queen, held at Durham, in and for the said county, on the 5th day of January, in the 26th year of the reign of our Sovereign Lady Victoria, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, and in the year of our Lord, 1863, before Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace, of and for the said county, then and there assembled.

HIGHWAY ACT.

Division of the County into Districts.

(Final Order confirming Provisional Order.)

WHEREAS in pursuance of the provisions of the Act passed in the last Session of Parliament (25 and 26 Vic. cap. 61), for the better management of Highways in England, notice was given by Henry Fenwick, Edward Johnson, John Fawcett, and William Lloyd Wharton, Esquires, and Edmund Hector Shipperdson, Clerk, five of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for this county, by writing under their hands, requiring the Clerk of the Peace to add to, or send with, the notice required by law to be given of the holding of the then next General or Quarter Sessions, a notice in the form set forth in the said Act, that at such Court of General Quarter Sessions, a proposal would be made to the Justices to divide the county into highway districts. And whereas the said Clerk of the Peace added the said notice to that required by law to be given of the holding of the said next Court of General Quarter Sessions, and posted in a prepaid letter the notice referred to by the said Act, to all the Churchwardens and Overseers of the said county. And whereas at a Court of General Quarter Sessions of the Peace for this county, held at Durham on the 13th day of October, now last past, a proposal was submitted to the said Court by the said Justices for dividing this county into highway districts. And whereas at the same Court of General Quarter Sessions of the Peace for this county, the said Court in pursuance of the powers vested in the Court in and by the said Act, did by a Provisional Order, after therein stating that it is not lawful to include in any highway district, any districts constituted under the Public Health Act, 1848, and the Local Government Act, 1858, or either of them, nor any parish or place, the highways of which were, at the time of the passing of the said Act, under the superintendence of a board established in pursuance of Section 18 of the Act of 5 and 6 Will. IV, cap. 50, divide this county into ten highway districts, for the more convenient management of highways; and did order that the said ten districts shall be called the Gateshead and South Shields District, the Durham and Chester-le-Street District, the Castle Eden and Seaham District, the Houghton-le-Spring and Sunderland District, the Lanchester District, the Auckland District, the Weardale District, the Stockton and Hartlepool District, the Darlington District, and the Barnard Castle District; and that each of the said districts shall comprise the parishes and places therein and hereinafter mentioned and set forth as belonging to such district (the word parish meaning every place maintaining its own highways); and whereas by the said provisional order the said Court ordered that there shall be one Waywarden elected for each such parish and place, such Waywarden to be elected in such parishes or places at the meeting and time and in the manner, and subject

to the same qualification and the same power of appointment in the Justices in the event of no election taking place, or, in the event of a vacancy, at, in and subject to which a person or persons to serve the office of Surveyor, would have been chosen or appointed if such parishes and places had been heretofore under the provisions of the said Act of 5 and 6 Will. IV, cap. 50.
