THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade have received from the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul-General at Christiania, enclosing the following translation of a law respecting the conveyance of passengers from Norwegian to foreign ports.

(Translation.)

§ 1.

No vessel purposing to convey passengers from a Norwegian harbour to any country beyond Europe, is to carry more passengers than one grown up person to every commercial last (two tons) of the ship's register measurement, cabin passengers, as well as master and crew, included.

§ 2.

The area apportioned to each grown up person must not be less than twelve square feet on the upper between deck, or round house on deck, and thirty square feet if on the lower or orlop deck. If the vessel takes merchandise, the distance between the surface of the cargo and upper deck of the space appointed for the passengers, must not be less than six feet.

The space selected for the passengers must be free and unoccupied, except that which may be taken up by the bedding, clothes, and other necessaries for their convenience.

The rules with respect to the area for each passenger cannot be encroached upon, even should it infringe upon the rule laid down as to the number fixed by Section 1.

§ 3.

The space which, according to the above section, is fixed upon for passengers, should be so arranged as to ensure them a sufficient amount of air and light, as well as ample protection against wet.

As cargo or ballast, the vessel must not carry any offensively smelling matter or goods injurious to health; neither herring, except in double tight casks, nor dry fish, unless in dry casks, or in grooved and glued cases; nor combustible wares, such as gunpowder, lucifer matches, and the like, in greater quantities than the necessary consumption of the vessel may demand.

§ 4.

If the persons on board amount in number to two-thirds, or above, of what is allowed by the First Section, the vessel must not load more when ready for sea, than to draw three-fourths of the depth between the water line when the vessel is empty, and the water line when she has a full cargo of heavy goods in her.

If the number is less, the cargo may be increased to four-fifths of the above depth.

These provisions are valid for vessels of fifty commercial lasts burden or above. Smaller vessels must not load more in the first case than to two-thirds, and in the second, to three-fourths of the above depth.

§ 5.

No berth must be larger than to contain three grown persons. The berth must be at least five and three-quarters feet in length, and one and a half feet in breadth, measured within side, shall be allowed for each adult person. The berths must not be nearer each other than that in every line there shall be a passage between, of at least two feet in breadth. No more than two berths must be above each other, and the distance between the bottom of the lowest berth and the bottom of the berth above, and between the latter and the underside of the deck at least two feet; and likewise one sick berth at least three feet in breadth for an eighth part of the aggregate number of berths. The bottom of the lowest berth must be raised at least four inches above the deck. By this it is understood that the number of places for berths must be in accordance with the number of adult persons who accompany the ship.

The provisions in this section do not apply to cabin passengers.

§ 6.

By a grown person in the preceding sections is understood, those who have attained the age of fourteen years or older. Two children between the age of one and fourteen years are reckoned as one, and infants one year and under are not reckoned.

§ 7.

Every vessel which conveys passengers to which this law refers shall be provided with such a supply of fresh water that every person, passengers and crew included, can obtain twenty pots

(quarts) every week, as long as the voyage continues. When the vessel is destined to the east coast of North America, West Indies, or North Africa, the length of the voyage in this respect is estimated, for a sailing vessel twelve weeks, and for a steamer seven weeks, and longer in proportion as the destination may be more distant. The vessel must likewise be provided with provisions and medicines, in conformity with the regulations to be determined.

§ 8.

Before the departure, the passengers, as well as the crew, shall submit to an examination by a medical man, specially appointed by the Sanitary Commission. This examination is to take place after the special list has been furnished to the Doctor by the Master, of all the passengers and crew either on board the vessel or at a convenient place appointed by the Doctor, not earlier than three days before the departure of the vessel.

For this examination the Master has to pay the Doctor one specie dollar for every twenty persons. The Doctor receiving free conveyance to and from the place of examination.

§ 9.

Likewise before the departure of the vessel, at the requisition of the Master, a survey must be made to prove that the vessel is seaworthy, and in every way fit to perform the contemplated voyage, and provided with one suitable large boat, and two smaller ones corresponding to the size of the vessel. The surveyors have then to declare how far the provisions have been carried out according to Sections 1 and 7. At this survey the Master shall produce a list of all the passengers and crew who accompany the ship, with a separate list of those who are between the age of one and fourteen, as well as of those who are one year and under.

Generally speaking, no vessel is to be deemed fit to perform the named voyages unless they are classed according to the rules of the insurance offices either as first or second class.

§ 10.

No vessels taking passengers to foreign countries, can be cleared before they have delivered—

1. The certificate from the surveyors that there exists no hindrance with respect to the ship's seaworthiness or supply of boats, or with respect to the provisions mentioned in Sections 1 and 7 of this law, or to her performing her destined voyage.

2. A certificate from the medical examiner that he found neither among the passengers nor crew any sickness or disease likely to disturb the general health on board.

§ 11.

Any master who, after the provisions treated of in Section 9 have been completed, receives more than the specified number of passengers on board, or affects any change in the space occupied by the passengers, or contravenes the provisions treated of in Sections 2 and 5, or loads the vessel with other goods than those allowed, or in any other respects neutralizes the provisions enacted for the security of the passengers, is liable to be fined in a sum from twenty to two hundred specie dollars; but the Master is not liable to this fine unless the complaint is made before the expiration of two years after the vessel started on her voyage. The fine is likewise not exacted if the master has been published by any foreign power for the infringements complained of. The case shall be settled

either by a naval court or the district court from whence the vessel took her departure.

§ 12.

This law, as far as relates to Sections 7 and 8, comes into operation immediately; and in other respects from the 1st of January next year. It is not applicable to men-of-war or other vessels when the number of passengers does not exceed one for every four commercial lasts (eight tons) of the ship's register tonnage.

TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the session of Parliament, holden in the third and fourth years of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter 96, for the regulation of the duties of postage, it was provided, that all letters and newspapers and other printed papers which should be posted in any town or place within the United Kingdom, or should be brought from parts beyond the seas to any port or place within the United Kingdom, or should be sent by post between the United Kingdom and places beyond the seas, or between any of the other places thereinafter mentioned, or should pass through the United Kingdom, should be subject to the several regulations and rates thereinafter contained, and that letters transmitted by the post should be charged by weight according to a certain scale and number of rates of postage to be charged as therein mentioned. And power was given to Her Majesty's Postmaster-General to charge on all letters conveyed by the post between places within any of Her Majesty's colonies or conveyed by packet-boats between one part of Her Majesty's dominions and another part of the same dominions, or between Her Majesty's dominions and foreign parts, or between one port in any foreign country and another port in the same, or any other foreign country where post communications should be

established, and also to charge on all letters conveyed by any vessels to or from any of the colonies, or between any of the colonies, or between any of the colonies and a foreign port; and on all letters which should be brought by the master of any vessel to the Post Office in any of the colonies, such rates of postage as the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by Warrant under their hands, should from time to time direct. And to charge for the use of Her Majesty on all letters sent by the post on which the postage should not be prepaid, and which should not be duly and properly stamped, and also on all letters sent by the post, without being duly and properly stamped, although the postage thereon should be wholly or in part prepaid, such higher rates of postage than would otherwise by law be payable on such letters as the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by Warrant under their hands, should from time to time deem expedient. And power was also given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, from time to time, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of British postage or inland postage payable by law on the transmission by the post of foreign or colonial letters or newspapers, or of any other printed papers, and to subject the same to rates of postage according to the weight thereof, and a scale of weight to be contained in such Warrant, and from time to time, by Warrant as aforesaid, to alter or repeal any such altered rates, and make and establish any new or other rates in lieu thereof, and from time to time, by Warrant as aforesaid, to appoint at what time the rates which might be payable were to be paid; and the power thereby given to alter and fix rates of postage was to extend to any increase or reduction, or remission of postage.

And whereas by another Act of Parliament passed in the session of Parliament holden in the tenth and eleventh years of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter 85, for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post Office, further powers were given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, and (amongst other things) power was given to the Postmaster-General to collect and receive the foreign and colonial postage charged or chargeable on any letters sent by the post, and also with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, to require the postage, (British, colonial, or foreign,) of any letters sent by the post, to be prepaid, either in money or in stamps (as he might think fit), on the same being put into the Post Office; and also with such consent to abolish or restrict the prepayment in money of postage on letters sent by the post, either altogether or on certain letters, and to require the prepayment thereof to be in stamps, and to refuse to receive or send by the post, any letters tendered contrary to any regulations made under that enactment. And power was also given to the Postmaster-General and any officer of the Post Office to detain any letters which should be posted or sent by the post, contrary to the regulations therein mentioned, and to open such letters, and either to return them to the senders thereof, or to forward them to the places of their destination, charged, in either case, with such rates of postage as the Postmaster-General, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, should from time to time direct.

And whereas it is expedient that letters should be transmitted by the post between the United Kingdom and the several places hereinafter men-

tioned *via* France, and by French packet-boat, at a combined British and foreign rate of postage, under a treaty entered into between Her Majesty and the Emperor of the French, for regulating the communications by the post between their respective dominions, and that certain regulations should be made for that purpose in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the power or authority in us for that purpose vested in and by the said hereinbefore recited Acts of Parliament, or either of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do by this Warrant (under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners, by the authority of the statute in that case made and provided) order, direct, and declare, as follows :

1.
