*Foreign Office, September 16, 1864.*

IT is hereby notified that Earl Russell, K.G., Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, has received from Mr. Walsham, in charge of Her Majesty's Legation in Mexico, a Despatch, inclosing a copy of a Decree by which the blockade established in the Gulf of Mexico and on the Pacific Coast of Mexico has been raised.

The following is a copy of the Decree above referred to :—

## LEVEE DU BLOCUS.

Le journal officiel publiait hier le décret suivant, en date du 29 Juillet :—

MAXIMILIEN, Empereur du Mexique,

Voulant donner au commerce une preuve de l'intérêt que nous prenons à sa liberté et à sa prospérité,

Avons décrété, et décrétons :

Art. 1. Est levé, le blocus de tous les ports de l'Empire, tant sur le Golfe du Mexique que sur le Pacifique.

Notre Secrétairerie des Finances, en communiquant le présent décret aux Douanes maritimes, leur transmettra les instructions nécessaires.

Fait au Palais de Mexico, le 29 Juillet, 1864.

THE Official Journal published yesterday the following decree, under date July 29 :—

MAXIMILIAN, Emperor of Mexico,

Desiring to afford to commerce a proof of the interest which we take in its freedom and prosperity,

We have decreed and do decree :

Art. 1. The blockade of all the ports of the Empire, both in the Gulf of Mexico and in the Pacific, is raised.

Our Secretary of Finance, in communicating the present decree to the Maritime Customs authorities, will transmit to them the necessary instructions.

THE Secretary of State for War has received a Despatch, with its enclosures, from Lieutenant-General Sir Duncan Cameron, K.C.B., Commanding Her Majesty's Forces in New Zealand, of which the following are copies :—

*Head Quarters,*

*Auckland, July 7, 1864.*

MY LORD,

I INFORMED your Lordship in my last Despatch that I had made arrangements for removing the troops not required for the defence of Tauranga to Auckland, and accordingly, on the 9th ultimo, Her Majesty's ship "Esk," and the steamer "Alexandra," proceeded to Tauranga for that purpose.

Before their arrival, however, intelligence had been received at Tauranga that the rebels were assembling in force in that neighbourhood with the avowed intention of attacking our position, whereupon Colonel Greer, 68th Regiment, whom I had left in command, suspended the embarkation of the troops, and, in my absence on the Waikato Frontier, reported the state of affairs to the Governor of New Zealand, who immediately reinforced him with 280 Waikato Militia. After the arrival of this reinforcement, the force at Colonel Greer's disposal amounted to 1500 men.

The district occupied by us at Tauranga is a peninsula about three and a-half miles long, connected with the main land by a very narrow neck, on which was situated the Gate Pah, abandoned by the rebels on the 30th April, and converted by my order into a strong redoubt. This work and another small redoubt, commanding the only ford by which the rebels could cross over from the main land to the peninsula, rendered our position so secure that, when Colonel Greer's report reached me, I felt sure the rebels would not venture to attack it. Considering it, however, not unlikely that they might attempt to construct a pah somewhere in the vicinity of our position, I instructed Colonel Greer to watch their movements closely; to patrol frequently, and if they made the attempt, to attack them before they had time to establish themselves.

In patrolling the country beyond the Gate Pah, on 21st June, Colonel Greer came suddenly upon a large body of natives who had just begun to entrench themselves. He at once attacked them and defeated them with great loss.

Two reports from Colonel Greer, containing the details of the action fought on that occasion, are

herewith enclosed. The conduct of all the officers and men engaged was admirable, and I beg to draw your Lordship's attention to the brilliant charge with the bayonet made by the 43rd and 68th Light Infantry, and to the great bravery displayed by those two distinguished regiments, in the hand to hand fight with the rebels at the rifle pits.

I cannot praise too highly the zeal and energy with which Colonel Greer carried out his instructions, and his able conduct, not only on the day of the engagement, but during the whole period he has been in command at Tauranga. I beg to recommend to your favourable notice his meritorious services, as well as those of all the officers and men mentioned by him as having particularly distinguished themselves in the action.

June 21, 1864.*

I HAVE the honour to report, for the information of the Lieutenant-General Commanding, that I marched out of camp with a force, as per margin,\* this morning at eight A.M. I found a large force of Maories (about 600) entrenching themselves about four miles beyond Pukekahina, they had made a single line of rifle pits of the usual form across the road, in a position exactly similar to Pukekahina, the commencement of a formidable pah; having driven in some skirmishers they had thrown out, I extended the 43rd and a portion of the 68th in their front and on the flanks as far as practicable, and kept up a sharp fire for about two hours, while I sent back for reinforcements, as per margin;† as soon as they were sufficiently near to support I sounded the advance, when the 43rd, 68th, and 1st Waikato Militia charged and carried the rifle pits in the most dashing manner, under a tremendous fire, but which was for the most part too high.

For a few minutes the Maories fought desperately and then were utterly routed: 68 were killed in the rifle pits.

The position was very favourable for their retreat, otherwise few could have escaped. The defence force pursued them several miles but could not get well at them, owing to the deep ravines with which the country is everywhere intersected.

The infantry pursued as long they could keep the Maories in sight; all did their duty gallantly. The 43rd were under the command of Major Synge (whose horse was shot), the 68th under Major Shuttleworth, the 1st Waikato Militia under Captain Moore, and they each led their men well.

It is impossible for me, in this hurried report, to do justice; I will, therefore, have the pleasure in a supplemental report, to bring those to your notice who more particularly distinguished themselves.

I marched the men back to camp this evening.

One hundred and seven Maories were found and carried up to the rifle pits, and we have brought in 27 wounded, all severely, and 10 prisoners.

Many more must have been killed in the ravines, whom we did not find.

I enclose a return, which shews that a large number of chiefs have been killed, including Rawiri.

I am happy to say our casualties have been comparatively small.

I enclose a return of the killed and wounded.

I must not conclude without remarking on the gallant stand made by the Maories at their rifle pit, they stood the charge without flinching, and did not retire until forced out at the point of the bayonet.

The name of the position which the Maories occupied is "Te Ranga."

I have thought this of sufficient importance to request Captain Phillimore to take my report up in the "Esk."

I HAVE the honour to state, for the information of the Lieutenant-General Commanding in New Zealand, that I have little to add to the report which I sent in on the 21st instant, relative to the engagement at Te Ranga, beyond bringing to his notice those who more particularly distinguished themselves.

About half-past ten o'clock the troops were so disposed in front and on both flanks that retreat without heavy loss seemed impossible for the Maories.

About a quarter to one o'clock, having reinforced skirmishers (with two companies of the 68th), and cautioned the men to reserve their fire (which they did in the most steady manner), the advance was sounded, and the men moved as if on parade. To the dash, determination, and steadiness with which the attack was made, the success which followed is due.

From the fact that the attack was made in light infantry order, and from the Maories having waited for the charge, and made a desperate hand to hand resistance, more opportunity was offered of showing individual gallantry than might occur in much more extensive operations; but the attack was so simultaneous, and all did their duty so well, it is difficult to make selections.

I beg, however, to bring the following to the favourable notice of the Lieutenant-General Commanding.

Major Synge, 43rd Light Infantry, commanding the line of skirmishers; and who had his horse shot under him in two places, when close to the rifle pits.

Major Colville, 43rd Light Infantry, who gallantly led the left of the line of skirmishers into the rifle pits, being himself one of the first in.

Major Shuttleworth, 68th Light Infantry, who commanded the support, consisting of 68th Light Infantry and 1st Waikato Militia, and brought them up in the most soldierlike manner, and rushed on the pits at the critical moment.

Captain Trent, Acting Field Officer, 68th Light Infantry, who fell, severely wounded, when leading two companies of the 68th into the left of the rifle pits, and continued cheering on the men until the pits were taken.

Captain Smith, 43rd Light Infantry, who is reported to have been first into the right of the

line of rifle pits, and whose gallant conduct was so conspicuous. I have forwarded evidence, with a view to his being recommended for the Victoria Cross. He was wounded severely in two places.

Captain Casement, 68th Light Infantry, who was severely wounded in two places, in front of his company, when leading them into the rifle pits.

Captain Berners, 43rd Light Infantry, who was also severely wounded when leading in front of his company, close to the rifle pits.

Captain Seymour, 68th Light Infantry, who took Captain Trent's place when that officer fell, and led into the left of the rifle pits in the most gallant manner.

Lieutenant Stuart, 68th Light Infantry, who was one of the first into the left line of rifle pits, and had a personal conflict with a Maori, armed with an Enfield rifle and bayonet, and by whom he was slightly bayonet-wounded, but succeeded in cutting him down with his sword.

Captain the Honourable A. Harris, 43rd Light Infantry, who was detached to the right, in command of two companies of the 43rd, to enfilade the enemy's position, and afterwards brought the companies, at the critical moment, to assist in the assault.

Captain Moore, who commanded the 1st Waikato Militia, and led his men up to the rifle pits, and shared in the assault.

Lieutenant and Acting Adjutant Hammick, 43rd Light Infantry, who performed his duty with great coolness and courage under a heavy fire.

Lieutenant Grubb, R.A., whose coolness and excellent practice with the 6-pounder Armstrong under his command, when under fire during the action, and subsequently on the retreating Maories, when they had got beyond the reach of the Infantry, was admirable.

Surgeon-Major Best, 68th Light Infantry, Principal Medical Officer, who performed his duty assiduously under fire, paying the greatest attention and care to the wounded; I can say the same of Assistant-Surgeons Henry, 43rd, Applin, 68th, and O'Connell, Staff, the former was particularly brought to my notice by Major Synge, commanding 43rd Light Infantry; Lieutenant and Adjutant Coory, 68th Light Infantry, Field Adjutant and Ensign Palmer, 68th Light Infantry, acting as my orderly officer, who performed their duty coolly and gallantly, affording me valuable assistance; Lieutenant Covey having been sent a message by me to Major Shuttleworth, when he was on the point of attacking, went with the supports, and was dragged into a rifle pit by a Maori, who thrust his spear through his clothes; Ensign Palmer was struck in the neck by a musket bullet, and knocked from his horse insensible when riding beside me, when he recovered and had his wound dressed, he performed his duty during the rest of the day.

Serjeant-Major Tudor, 68th Light Infantry, who went in front, and distinguished himself in several personal conflicts with the enemy in the rifle pits.

Serjeant-Major Daniels, 43rd Light Infantry, and Acting Serjeant-Major Lilley (70th Regiment), of the 1st Waikato Militia, who also distinguished themselves by their coolness and courage.

No. 2918. Serjeant Murray, 68th Light Infantry, whose gallantry and prowess were so distinguished, I have thought him worthy of being recommended for the Victoria Cross, and have with that view forwarded evidence.

No. 2832. Corporal J. Byrne, V.C., 68th Light Infantry, who, when the order to charge was

given, was the first man of his company into the rifle pits. A Maori, whom he transfixed with his bayonet, seized his rifle with one hand, and holding it firm with the bayonet through him, endeavoured to cut him down with his tomahawk; his life was saved by Serjeant Murray.

No. 3641. Private Thomas Smith (severely wounded), and No. 518, Private Daniel Caffrey, 68th Light Infantry, both distinguished themselves by their gallant conduct in the field, and their prowess in the rifle pits.

I beg to add that during the engagement several reports were forwarded to me, stating that a large body of natives were coming down by the Wairoa to attack the Camp Te Papa at low water; the information having been given by friendly natives. Low water on that day was at half-past three o'clock. I was back in camp about half-past two o'clock, and Artillery, Mounted Defence Force, and reinforcements of Infantry were following me. I however found that every necessary arrangement had been made by Lieutenant-Colonel Harrington (1st Waikato Militia), who was in command of the camp during my absence.

I beg to bring to the notice of the Lieutenant-General Commanding, the readiness with which Captain Phillimore, H.M.S. "Esk," senior naval officer at this station, and Commander Swann, H.M.S. "Harrier," responded to my request (which I sent immediately on finding the Maories) that they would land all their available force for the protection of the camp.

I have since ascertained that the report of the natives coming down to attack Te Papa was true, but that the result of the affair at Te Ranga disarranged their plans.

For nearly an hour previous to the assault I had seen Maori reinforcements coming down from the woods, yelling and firing their guns, and, when the advance was sounded, they were not more than 500 yards from the rifle pits.

I beg further to add that, while in command here, I have only endeavoured to carry out the instructions given me by the Lieutenant-General Commanding, and, if I have had any success, it is to the foresight of those instructions and to the good discipline and courage of the troops under my command it is to be attributed.

On Wednesday morning last (22nd inst.) I sent a strong patrol, under Major Colville, 43rd Light Infantry, to bury the dead, and fill in the rifle pits; 108 Maories were buried in the rifle pits, which they had themselves dug the morning before. The patrol returned the same afternoon, without having seen anything further of the hostile natives, nor have any been observed since in the neighbourhood.

In addition to the number buried in the rifle pits, 15 of the wounded prisoners have died since they were brought in. I am sending up 8 wounded and 11 unwounded prisoners by the "Alexandra," and 9 are detained for further treatment in the hospital at this station, making a total of 151 Maories accounted for. Enclosed are lists of the arms captured from the enemy, and handed over to the Military Store Department, and returns of the killed and wounded of the force under my command.

**TREASURY WARRANT.**

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter 96, for the regulation of the duties of postage, certain scales of weight and rates of postage were fixed and made chargeable and payable upon, for, or in respect of letters, newspapers, parliamentary proceedings, and printed papers, transmitted and forwarded by the post, and various regulations were made for facilitating the transmission of such letters and papers by the post. And by the same Act powers were given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury from time to time, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of postage therein mentioned.

And whereas further powers were given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, by another Act of Parliament passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter 85, for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post, and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post Office.

And whereas it is expedient to authorize the transmission by the post, between the United Kingdom and the Mauritius, of certain packets, and for that purpose to make certain regulations in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the powers reserved to us in and by the said hereinbefore recited Acts of Parliament, and every of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do by this Warrant, under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners, by the authority of the statute in that case made and provided, order and direct as follows; that is to say:—

1. All packets consisting of patterns or samples of merchandise of no intrinsic value, posted in any part of the United Kingdom addressed to any part of the Mauritius, or posted in any part of the Mauritius addressed to any part of the United Kingdom, may be transmitted by the post between the United Kingdom and any part of the Mauritius, by British packet boat, direct or *via* Egypt, subject to the several rates of postage hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:—

On every such packet, if not exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid an uniform single rate of postage (British and colonial combined) of fourpence;

And on every such packet, if exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, for such transmission thereof, respectively as aforesaid, the several progressive and additional rates of postage hereinafter mentioned.

2. All packets consisting of patterns or samples of merchandise of no intrinsic value, posted in any part of the United Kingdom addressed to any part of the Mauritius, or posted in any part of the Mauritius addressed to any part of the United Kingdom, may be transmitted by the post between the United Kingdom and any part of the Mauritius, in closed mails *via* France (the sea conveyance being by British or by French packet boat), subject to the several rates of postage hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:—

On every such packet, if not exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid an uniform single rate of postage (British, colonial, and foreign combined) of sixpence;

And on every such packet, if exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid, for such transmission thereof respectively as aforesaid, the several progressive and additional rates of postage hereinafter mentioned.

3. Every packet which shall be transmitted by the post, under the authority of this Warrant, if exceeding four ounces in weight, shall be subject to the several further and additional and progressive rates of postage hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:—

On every such packet, if exceeding four ounces, and not exceeding one half of a pound in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid two rates of postage;

And on every such packet, if exceeding one half of a pound, and not exceeding one pound in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid four rates of postage;

And on every such packet, if exceeding one pound, and not exceeding one pound and one half of another pound in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid six rates of postage;

And on every such packet, if exceeding one pound and one half of another pound, and not exceeding two pounds in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid eight rates of postage;

And for every additional half of a pound in weight of any such packet, above the weight of two pounds, there shall be charged, taken, and paid two additional rates of postage; and every fractional part of such additional half of a pound in weight shall be charged as an additional half of a pound in weight, and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this clause shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such packet would be charged with under this Warrant, if not exceeding four ounces in weight.

4. Every packet which shall be transmitted by the post, under the authority of this Warrant, shall be so transmitted in conformity with, and under and subject to, the several orders, directions, regulations, and conditions hereinafter contained; that is to say:—

5. No such packet, which in length or depth or width, shall exceed the dimensions of two feet, shall be transmitted by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant.

6. No pattern or sample, being of any intrinsic value, or being an article or thing of a saleable nature, or having a value of its own, apart from its mere use as a pattern or sample, shall be transmitted by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant.

7. There shall be no enclosure, sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, nor any other enclosure not authorized by this Warrant, sent in or with any such packet.

8. There shall be no writing or printing in or upon any such packet, or on the cover thereof, except the address of the person for whom it is intended, the address of the sender thereof, a trade mark, and numbers and prices.

9. All such packets shall be sent in covers, open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination: Nevertheless samples of seeds, drugs, and such other articles and things as cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen, or of other material; but bags so closed that they cannot be readily opened (even although they be transparent), shall not be used for that purpose. Samples of dry sugar also may be sent in tin

boxes, of such shape and construction that they be not injurious to the contents of the mail bags, or to the officers of the Post Office; but boxes so closed that they cannot be readily opened, shall not be used for that purpose.

10. If any packet sent, or tendered, or delivered, in order to be sent by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant, shall in length, or depth, or width, exceed the dimensions of two feet, or shall consist wholly of patterns or samples of any intrinsic value, as in the sixth clause of this Warrant mentioned, or if there shall be any writing or printing in or upon any such packet, or on the cover thereof (except the address of the person for whom it is intended, the address of the sender thereof, a trade mark, and numbers and prices), or if any such packets shall not be sent in covers, open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination (except as in the ninth clause of this Warrant mentioned), or in case of bags or boxes being used, if such bags or boxes shall be so closed that they cannot be readily opened, every such packet shall be chargeable and shall be treated in all respects as a letter.

11. If any packet sent, or tendered, or delivered, in order to be sent by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant, shall contain any enclosure, sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, or any other enclosure not authorized by this Warrant, every such enclosure may be taken out by any officer of the Post Office, and either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or be forwarded to the address on the packet, charged not only with the full rates of postage as an unpaid letter, but also with a further and additional rate of postage equal in amount to the single rate of postage chargeable under the provisions of this Warrant on a packet not exceeding four ounces in weight, and the remainder of the packet, if duly prepaid by stamps, may be forwarded to the place of its address, without any extra charge.

12. If any packet be sent, or be tendered, or delivered, in order to be sent by the post under the authority of this Warrant, containing samples of sugar in tin boxes, of a shape and construction that they may be injurious to the contents of the mail bags, or to the officers of the Post Office (of which the Postmaster-General shall be the sole judge), every such respective packet shall and may be detained and opened, and at the option of the Postmaster-General shall be either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or be given up to the person to whom it shall be addressed; and every such packet on being so returned, or given up, shall be chargeable with any rate or amount of postage the Postmaster-General shall think fit, not exceeding the letter rates of postage.

13. The postage of all such packets as aforesaid, posted in the United Kingdom, shall in every case be paid at the time of the same being posted, not in money, but by being duly stamped with the proper postage stamp or stamps affixed thereto, which stamp or stamps shall in every case be affixed or appear on the outside of every such packet near the address or direction, and shall be of the value or amount of the postage duty payable thereon under or by virtue of this Warrant.

14. The postage of all such packets as aforesaid, posted in the Mauritius, shall in every case be paid at the time of the same being posted, either in money or by the proper colonial postage stamp or stamps being affixed thereto.

15. If any packet sent, or tendered, or delivered, in order to be sent by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant, shall be posted in the United



Kingdom or in the Mauritius, and the postage paid thereon, or postage stamp or stamps affixed thereto, shall represent a less amount than the rate of postage to which such packet would be liable under and by virtue of this Warrant, every such last-mentioned packet shall be forwarded charged with the amount of the difference between the postage so paid thereon or postage stamp or stamps so being thereon or affixed thereto, and the postage to which such packet would be liable as aforesaid, together with a further and additional rate of postage of four pence; but if any such packet shall be posted in the United Kingdom or in the Mauritius without any postage having been paid thereon or without having thereon or affixed thereto any postage stamp, every such respective packet shall be forwarded charged with a postage of double the amount of postage to which it would have been liable under and by virtue of this Warrant if the postage had been paid when posted.

16. In order to prevent any obstacles to the due and regular transmission of letters by the post, any officer of the Post Office may delay the transmission of any packet posted or forwarded by the post under the provisions of this Warrant, either for the space of twenty-four hours after the time at which the same ought to be dispatched in due course of the post, or (at his option) until the dispatch of the mail next after that by which the same ought in due course of the post to be forwarded by him.

17. In all cases in which any question shall hereafter arise whether any packet or any pattern or sample contained therein, transmitted under or by virtue of this Warrant, is entitled to the privileges of this Warrant, and to be so transmitted within the intent and meaning thereof, such question shall be referred to the determination of the Postmaster-General, whose decision thereupon shall be final and conclusive upon all parties.

18. The several terms and expressions used in this Warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as they would have had if inserted in the said Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter 96.

19. The Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury may by Warrant under their hands, duly made at any time hereafter, alter, repeal, revoke, or modify any of the rates of postage hereby fixed, or any of the regulations hereby made, and may make and establish any new or other rates or regulations in lieu thereof, and from time to time may appoint at what time the rates that may be payable are to be paid.

20. This Warrant shall come into operation on the first day of October next.
