THE following Notices have been received by the Clerk of the Council from the Lords Authorities appointed under the Orders of the Lords of the Council, relating to the "cattle plague," and are published in the London Gazette in conformity with the requirements of the 18th section of their Lordships' Order of the 23rd November, 1865:—

CATTLE PLAGUE.

I, ALEXANDER MAXWELL ADAMS, Provost of the Royal Burgh of Lanark, in virtue of the powers conferred upon me by the Orders of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated respectively 23rd November and 16th December, 1865, hereby declare, in terms of the 18th section of the first mentioned Order, that with a view to prevent the spreading of the cattle plague, it shall be unlawful for any person to bring any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf from any part of Great Britain to any place within the Royal Burgh of Lanark from the date of this notice to the 1st day of March next, under this condition that any animal of the description above specified, after being slaughtered, may be admitted into the said Burgh, if accompanied by a certificate from the Inspector of the District from which it has been sent, that such animal was free from the cattle plague immediately previous to being slaughtered, and that it had not, to the best of his knowledge and belief, been in contact with other animals suffering from said disease, for a period of at least fourteen days prior to the date of his certificate, which certificate must be presented at the office of the Town Clerk of this Burgh within two days from its date.

Any person contravening this Order is liable for every breach thereof to forfeit a sum not exceeding £20.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

Borough of Plymouth.

To Cattle Dealers, Butchers, and others.

I, THE undersigned, Francis Hicks, Esq., Mayor of the borough of Plymouth, in the county of Devon, being the Local Authority acting within the district of the borough of Plymouth aforesaid,

in pursuance of the statutes in such case made and provided, and by virtue and in exercise of the powers given to me in that behalf by certain Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, bearing date respectively the 23rd day of November and the 16th day of December, 1865, do hereby declare, that with a view to prevent the spreading of the disorder now prevalent among cattle, generally designated the "Cattle Plague," it is expedient, and I do hereby order and direct that from and after the publication of this notice until the 28th day of February next, inclusive, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, not being intended for immediate slaughter be brought into any market or fair held within the said borough of Plymouth, or to any place whatever within the said borough, for the purpose of exhibition or sale, and that during the same period no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, whether intended for immediate slaughter or otherwise, be brought from any place beyond the said borough of Plymouth, into any place within the said borough, except between the hours of seven in the morning and six in the evening, nor without previous notice being given to Mr. James Rowley, the Inspector appointed for the said borough, of each animal so brought into the said borough, and the production to the said Inspector of a certificate under the hand of some duly qualified Veterinary-Surgeon that such animal is in a healthy state.

And I hereby give further notice, that any person offending against the said Orders in Council, or either of them, by acting contrary to this notice, after the publication hereof, will be subject for every offence to forfeit such a sum not exceeding twenty pounds as the Justices before whom he or she shall be convicted shall think fit to impose.—Dated this 13th day of January, 1866.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

Nottinghamshire to wit.

At the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Lady the Queen, holden at the Shire Hall in Nottingham, in and for the county of Nottingham, on Monday the 1st day of January, in the 29th year of the reign of our Sovereign Lady Queen Victoria, and in the year of our Lord, 1866, and adjourned from time to time and holden in pursuance of such adjournments at Newark-upon-Trent, in and for the said county, on Friday the 12th day of the same month of January,

before the Right Honourable Edward Lord Belper, the Right Honourable Sydney William Herbert, Earl Manvers, the Right Honourable John Evelyn Denison, the Honourable Edmund Gambier Monckton, Sir Thomas Woollaston White, Sir Henry Bromley, Baronets, and others, Justices of our said Lady the Queen, assigned to keep the peace in the said county.

The Justices of the Peace for the county of Nottingham in Quarter Sessions assembled the 12th day of January, 1866, in pursuance of the authority vested in them by an Order of the Privy Council, dated the 16th day of December, 1865, and of another Order dated the 23rd day of November, 1865, therein recited, do hereby give notice, declare, and order as follows:—

1st. That from and after the publication of this notice, the notices, orders, and declarations given and made by the said Justices, on the 3rd day of January instant, except so much thereof as relate to the revocation of any former notices, orders, or declarations given and made by any local authority in the county of Nottingham, be, and the same are hereby revoked.

2nd. The said Justices do by this notice, to be published in newspapers circulating within their jurisdiction, and also within the several counties bordering on the county of Nottingham, declare that with a view to prevent the spreading of the disorder called the Cattle Plague, it is expedient, until the 1st day of March next, to prevent the removal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine to any market or fair, or other place in the county of Nottingham, for the purpose of exhibition or sale. Also, that it is expedient that until the said 1st day of March, no such animal shall, except as hereafter provided, be brought from any other part of Great Britain into the county of Nottingham. Also, that it is expedient that until the said 1st day of March, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, shall, except as hereafter provided, be removed from any parish, township, or place, in the county of Nottingham, to any other parish, township, or place in the same county.

3rd. That from the publication of this notice it shall not be lawful until the 1st day of March next, for any person to bring or send any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, into any market or fair, or to any place within the county of Nottingham, for the purpose of exhibition or sale, or for any person to receive, exhibit, buy, or sell, any such animal so brought or sent.

Provided that any person may exhibit or sell, on his own land or premises, any such animal belonging to him which has been on such land or premises not less than fourteen days previous to such exhibition or sale.

4th. That from the publication of this notice until the 1st day of March next, it shall not be lawful for any person to bring or send any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, from any place in Great Britain, beyond the county of Nottingham, into any place within the county of Nottingham.

Provided that it shall be lawful for any person to send or carry any such animal by railway through the county of Nottingham, and for any person to bring, with the licence of any two Justices acting for the county of Nottingham, any such animal from any land or premises in his occupation beyond the county of Nottingham, to

any other land or premises in his occupation within the county of Nottingham.

5th. That from the publication of this notice until the 1st day of March next, it shall not be lawful for any person, except with the licence of two Justices in Petty Sessions assembled, to remove any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, from any parish or township in the county of Nottingham, to any other parish or township in the county of Nottingham.

Provided that it shall be lawful for any person to send or carry any such animal by railway through or out of the county of Nottingham, and with such licence as last aforesaid to remove any such animal from any parish to any railway station to be named in such licence.

Provided also that when any such animal is sought to be removed from a parish in one Petty Sessional Division to a parish in another Petty Sessional Division, the licence of two Justices in each Petty Sessional Division shall be obtained.

Provided also that when any person shall occupy land in two adjoining parishes or townships, it shall be lawful for such person to remove, without licence, any such animal from land in his occupation in one of such parishes or townships to land in his occupation in the other of such parishes or townships, until two Justices shall declare, as hereinafter mentioned, that the Cattle Plague has broken out, or is likely to break out, in either of such parishes or townships.

6th. That from the publication of this notice until the 1st day of March next, except with the licence of two Justices in Petty Sessions assembled, and except otherwise as hereinafter mentioned, it shall not be lawful for any person to permit any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, to be upon or pass along any highway or public road in the county of Nottingham, for a greater distance than 100 yards.

Provided that nothing herein contained shall prevent any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, from passing along a highway or public road, from one part of a parish or township to another part of the same parish or township, until two Justices of the Peace acting for the Petty Sessional Division, in which such parish or township is situate, shall in Petty Sessions assembled by notice published in two newspapers circulated in such Division, declare that the Cattle Plague has broken out, or is likely to break out in such parish or township, and provided that such animals shall *bonâ fide* belong to a person occupying lands or premises in such parish or township.

Provided that no animal to be moved from beyond the county of Nottingham into the county of Nottingham, or from one part of the said county into another part of the said county, under a licence of two Justices as hereinbefore provided, shall be moved between sunset and sunrise.

Any person offending against the foregoing notices, is liable to a penalty of £20.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

Suffolk to Wit.

At the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Sovereign Lady the Queen, holden by adjournment at Bury Saint Edmund's, in and for the Western Division of the said county of Suffolk, on Tuesday the 9th day of January, in the

year of our Lord 1866, before Thomas Anderson, Clerk, Chairman, John Henry Heigham, Esq., Peter Huddleston, Esq., Benjamin Brydges Hunter Rodwell, Esq., and others their Companions, Justices of our said Lady the Queen, assigned to keep the Peace within the said county; and also to hear and determine divers felonies, trespasses, and other misdeeds, in the said county done and committed.

At this Court Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the county of Suffolk, assembled at the above-named Sessions in exercise of the power given to them by an Order of the Lords of the Privy Council dated the 16th day of December, 1865, do by this notice, intended to be published as by the said Order required, declare that the following Order be made, videlicet:—

Cattle Plague Resolutions for the Western Division of the county of Suffolk.

1st. That, subject to the provisions of the Order in Council, no animal be permitted to enter the Western Division of the county without the order of two Justices at Petty Sessions, acting for the Division into which they are to be imported.

2nd. That no cattle be moved from the occupation of one person to that of another, except they be in the same parish, without the Order of two Justices at Petty Sessions.

3rd. That while the Cattle Plague exists in any parish, and for a period of one calendar month after it has been certified to the Justices at Petty Sessions in which such parish is situate, by the Inspector for the District, that the parish is free from Cattle Plague, no live animal shall be sent to any market or fair, or to any place whatever within the Division, for the purpose of exhibition or sale, or moved out of such parish. And during such periods no person shall remove any manure, fodder, hides, skins, or offal out of the said parish: Provided always that the Justices in Petty Sessions may grant Orders for the removal of sheep and swine.

4th. That no person shall bring or send any cattle to any market or fair, or to any place within the Western Division of the county of Suffolk for exhibition or sale, nor shall any person receive, or exhibit, buy, or sell any such cattle if so brought or sent.

5th. That cattle be permitted, under the order of two Justices in Petty Sessions, to be taken to any place for slaughter, within three days after removal, or to the nearest railway station, when destined for the metropolitan markets.

6th. That no cattle shall, under any circumstances, be driven upon any highway or public road between the hours of six o'clock in the evening and six o'clock in the morning.

7th. That every person driving any cattle along any highway or public road shall, if required to do so, show his licence.

8th. That for the purposes of breeding, cows may be sent off the premises of the owner to a bull, provided that before so sending, the owner of the animals so sent shall procure from a Justice of the Peace, or the Guardian of his parish, a certificate, stating that the animals on the sender's premises are free from disease; and before bringing them home again, a similar certificate from a Justice of the Peace or a Guardian of the parish into which they have been sent, certifying that the animals among which they have been are also free from disease.

9th. That in this Order, the word animal shall mean any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, and that the word cattle

shall include all the above, with the exception of sheep, lamb, goat, or swine.

10th. That this Order be in force until the 1st day of March.

11th. That the mayors of boroughs be invited to co-operate and maintain uniformity of action throughout the county.

And it is further ordered, that the licence for the removal of any animal into or within the said western Division of the said county, shall specify the description and number of animals to which such licence refers, the time for which it is valid, the place to and from which such animals are to be moved, the name of the sender, and to whom sent, and the route by which they are to travel; and after every such removal, the licence shall be delivered to the Guardian of the parish into which such animals are sent, if it is a rural parish: to a police officer or clerk of the market, if it be a town.

And the said Justices so assembled as aforesaid do hereby revoke all notices at any time heretofore published by any previous local authority within the said western Division of the said county; except as to any liabilities which may have been incurred, or any legal proceedings which may have been taken under any of the said notices.

Every person offending against this notice, or the said Order in Council, is liable for any such offence to a penalty of £20, to be recovered summarily before the Justices acting for the Petty Sesssional Division within which the offence is committed.

Borough of Walsall.

By authority of an Order of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, bearing date the 23rd day of November, 1865, made in pursuance of the several Acts of Parliament therein mentioned or referred to, I, the undersigned John Brewer, the younger, Esquire, Mayor of the borough of Walsall, in the County of Stafford, do by this notice declare that it is expedient until the first day of March next, to prevent the removal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox and calf, to any market or fair, or to any place whatever within my jurisdiction, as Mayor of the said borough, or from place to place within my said jurisdiction, for the purpose of exhibition or sale.

I also declare and order that until the said first day of March next, no person shall bring or send, or cause to be brought or sent, any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, into any market, fair, street, or place within my jurisdiction as aforesaid, or receive, exhibit, buy or sell any such animal so brought or sent, except for the purpose of being slaughtered and as hereinafter mentioned, and that every such animal so brought or sent, shall be slaughtered within the limits of the said borough, within the space of five days (inclusive of the day of bringing or sending in) after it shall have been so brought or sent aforesaid; but this notice shall not be held to prohibit any person from exhibiting or selling on his own land or premises, any animal belonging to him, which has been on such land or premises for not less than fourteen days previous to such sale; nor to prevent the owner of any cow from driving such cow, so long as she shall remain free from disease, to and from her pasturage daily for the purpose

of milking and housing her; nor to prohibit the owner of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, to drive any such animal across any highway from any laud in his own occupation, to any other land in his own occupation, so long as the animals on his farm or land are free from disease.

And I also declare and order that no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, shall be removed from the Bescot railway station within the said borough, until after the expiration of two hours after notice in writing of the said intended removal shall have been given to Mr. John Griffiths, of Bescot Farm, farm bailiff, (one of the cattle inspectors for the said borough), nor from the Bloxwich railway station, until after the expiration of two hours after the like notice to Sergeant Martin, at the police station, Bloxwich, nor from the Walsall railway station, nor from any railway station (not before mentioned), railway junction, siding, or premises within the said borough, until after the expiration of two hours after the like notice to Mr. John Wyatt Cater, chief of police and sanitary inspector, at the police station, Ablewell-street, Walsall; and that every notice aforesaid shall state the number and description of the animals intended to be removed, and the names and residences of the persons respectively by and to whom consigned. Provided nevertheless that nothing herein contained shall prevent the owner of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, from removing any such animal from place to place within the said borough, upon such owner obtaining a certificate from one of the cattle inspectors for the said borough, stating the places from and to which the said animal is to be removed; a description of the animal, the name of the person to whom, and the time within which the animal is to be delivered; and that the said animal is free from disease, and has not been exposed in any public market, fair, or place within the space of fourteen days prior to the date thereof.

And the said certificate shall be available only for the day for which it is granted (being within twenty-four hours from the signing thereof), and for the removal of the animal described therein, to the place described therein.

And I also order and declare that no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, shall be brought into or removed from place to place within my said jurisdiction, for any purpose whatever, between the hours 6 o'clock p.m. and 6 o'clock a.m.

Every person in anywise offending in the premises, will for every offence forfeit any sum not exceeding £20 which the convicting Justices may think fit to impose.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

Borough of Oldham.

WHEREAS a contagious or infectious disorder, generally designated the "Cattle Plague," now prevails within the borough of Oldham, in the county of Lancaster.

Now, therefore, I, the undersigned, William Knott, the Mayor of the said borough of Oldham,

being the local authority under an Order of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated the 16th day of December, 1865, do hereby, by virtue of the said Order, and of a previous Order in Council of the 23rd day of November, 1865, and of all other powers and authorities enabling me in this behalf declare, that it is expedient, with a view to prevent the spreading of the said disorder, that on and after Wednesday, the 17th day of January instant, and until the 1st day of March next, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, shall be brought or sent from any part of Great Britain into any place within the said borough of Oldham, except as provided by the said Orders in Council, and that it is expedient to prevent the removal of any such animal to any market or fair, or to any place whatsoever within the said borough, for the purpose of exhibition or sale, and from place to place therein, except as provided by the said Orders in Council, and under certain conditions.

And I do hereby further declare and order as follows:—That it shall not be lawful after Wednesday, the 17th day of January instant, and until the 1st day of March next, for any person to bring or send any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, from any part of Great Britain beyond the said borough into any place within the said borough, except only as provided by the said Orders in Council.

Nor shall it be lawful for any person to bring or send any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, to any market or fair, or to any place whatever within the said borough, for the purpose of exhibition or sale, except under the conditions herein-after specified.

Nor shall it be lawful for any person to remove, or cause to be removed any such animal or animals from any place within the said borough except as hereinafter provided.

Nor shall it be lawful for any person to remove, or cause to be removed any of the said animals along any turnpike road, or other highway for general traffic, without the licence in writing of the Inspector for the time being of the said borough, except from one part of any farm to another part of the same farm, or except in the case of any cow taken to the bull, nor between the hours of six o'clock in the evening and six o'clock in the following morning.

And it is hereby declared that the conditions on which any such animal may be removed to or from any place within the said borough shall be as follows, namely:—

1. Any person may sell on his own land or premises any animal belonging to him which has been on such land or premises for not less than fourteen days previous to such sale, and which shall be certified by the Inspector for the time being of the said borough to be free from the disorder called the cattle plague, and to be on premises free from all suspicion of the said disorder.

2. Any fat cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, may be removed within the limits of the borough, provided it be certified as aforesaid, and be taken direct to some place within the said borough and sold for immediate slaughter, or be forthwith forwarded direct to some accustomed market or fair for the sale of fat cattle, or to some slaughter-house beyond the said borough, but subject to such regulations as may be in force with reference thereto. Provided that every certificate shall state the place to which such animal is to be removed, and shall (together with the licence of the said Inspector whenever required) accompany the animal or animals so

removed, and provided that such animal continue free from disease up to the time of removal.

A duplicate of such certificate shall in every case be delivered or sent by post forthwith to the chief constable of the borough, and no certificate shall be in force for any longer period than four days from the date thereof.

Every person offending against these Orders and notices, or in whose possession or custody any animal shall be found in contravention thereof will be liable for each offence to a penalty not exceeding £20.

And that on and from the said 18th day of January instant to the 1st day of March next, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf shall be brought or removed from any place without the said city and borough and county of the same, to any place within the said city and borough and county of the same, nor be on nor pass over, along, or across any street, highway, or public road within the said city and borough and county of the same. Provided always that nothing in this Order contained shall make it unlawful for any person to send or carry any such animal by railway through or out of the said city and borough and county of the same. And also that nothing herein contained shall make it unlawful for any person to bring or send, with the licence of any two justices acting in and for the jurisdiction to which this notice relates, any such animals from any land or premises in his own occupation and beyond such jurisdiction; to any other land or premises in his own occupation, within such jurisdiction.

Durham to wit.

At the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Lady the Queen, holden at Durham, in and for the county of Durham, on Wednesday, the 3rd day of January, in the 29th year of the reign of our Sovereign Lady, Victoria, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, and in the year of our Lord 1866, before Rowland Burdon (Chairman), William Scurfield Grey, John Fogg Elliot, Henry Fenwick, M.P., Esquires, and others their fellows, Justices of our said Lady the Queen, assigned to keep the Peace of our said Lady the Queen, in the said county, and also to hear and determine divers felonies, trespasses, and other misdemeanours done and committed in the said county.

In pursuance of the Order of the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, dated 16th December, 1865, transferring all the power contained in the Orders of the said Privy Council of the 23rd November last, to the Justices of the Peace for this county in Quarter Sessions assembled, as the local authority for the purpose of carrying into effect the said Orders in Council, the said Justices at these Quarter Sessions, having weighed and considered the several matters referred to them, do make and pass the resolutions and Orders next hereinafter-mentioned, that is to say:

1st. It is resolved and ordered that with a view to prevent the spread of the Cattle Plague, from the 5th day of January, 1866, all notices heretofore published, declarations made, acts done, and proceedings taken by local authorities in the several Petty Sessional Divisions of the county of Durham, under or by virtue of the Order of the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, dated the 23rd day of November, 1865, respecting the Cattle Plague, be, and the same are hereby revoked.

2nd. That henceforth until the 1st day of March next, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any part of the county of Durham, over which this Court has jurisdiction, except that it shall not be unlawful for any person to send or carry any such animal by railway through or out of such jurisdiction, or to send or carry any such animal, if brought by sea from any place out of Great Britain into such jurisdiction, to the nearest convenient railway station, for the purpose of carrying and conveying the same through or out of such jurisdiction.

3rd. That until the 1st day of March next, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, be removed from any place within the jurisdiction aforesaid to any other place within the same jurisdiction.

4th. That it shall not be deemed a contravention of this Order for any person to remove any such animals as aforesaid from one part of a farm to another adjoining part of the same farm, within the jurisdiction aforesaid, although in order to effect such removal it may be necessary to drive or convey such animals over a public highway, or for any person to remove any such animals as aforesaid from one farm to another farm bona fide in his or her own occupation, however distant from each other such farms may be respectively, or to drive or take a cow to a bull on another farm within such jurisdiction, provided that in all such several cases the person intending so to remove or take such animals, shall, previous to such removal, obtain the written consent of two

of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace acting for the Petty Sessional Division of the county from which it is intended to take or remove the said animals, such consent to be granted only on proof to the satisfaction of such Justices that Cattle Plague does not exist at or in the neighbourhood of the place from whence such removal is proposed to be made, or along the route on which it is proposed to drive, take, remove, or convey the said animals.

5th. That the person in charge of animals permitted to be removed as aforesaid shall carry with, and when thereunto required produce to all inspectors, policemen, constables, overseers, and other public officers, requiring the same the order or consent for such removal.

Lastly. That where a farm is situate partly in the county of Durham and partly in another adjoining county, animals may be removed from such part of the farm as is without the county of Durham to the adjoining part of the farm within the said county.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

Bedfordshire to wit.

At the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Sovereign Lady the Queen, holden at Bedford, in and for the county of Bedford, on the 2nd day of January, and thence continued by several adjournments to and on the 13th day of January, in the year of our Lord 1866, before John Harvey, Esquire, Chairman, Lieutenant-Colonel William Stuart, M.P., Vice-Chairman, and others their fellows, Justices of our Sovereign Lady the Queen, assigned to preserve the Peace in the county aforesaid, and also to hear and determine divers felonies, trespasses, and other misdemeanors done and committed in the said county.

In pursuance of an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the 11th and 12th years of the reign of Her present Majesty, "To prevent, until the 1st day of September, 1850, and to the end of the then next session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals" (which Act has since been from time to time continued by subsequent Acts, and lastly by the "Expiring Laws Continuance Act, 1865"), and in pursuance of Orders of Her Majesty's Privy Council, dated respectively the 23rd day of November, 1865, and the 16th day of December, 1865, the said Justices in Quarter Sessions assembled as aforesaid, and sitting in open Court, on the 13th day of January, 1866, have resolved and determined to declare, and do hereby declare:—

That on and from the 18th day of January instant, all notices given and other acts done by any "local authority" within the county of Bedford, under and by virtue of any Order made by the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council under the authority of the said first-mentioned Act, shall be revoked, except the appointment of Inspectors by such "local authorities" respectively.

That it is expedient that on and from the 15th day of January instant until the 1st day of March next ensuing, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, shall be brought from any other part of Great Britain into any place within the said county.

That it is expedient, on and from the said 15th day of January instant until the said 1st day of March now next ensuing, to prevent the removal

of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, to any market or fair, or to any place whatever within the said county, for the purpose of exhibition or sale.

That it is expedient that on and from the 15th day of January instant until the 1st day of March next ensuing, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf (and which are hereinafter designated as cattle) shall, except under the conditions hereinafter set forth, be removed from place to place within the county of Bedford; but that nothing herein contained shall prevent the owner of any cattle from removing any cattle from place to place within the said county, if he or she shall have obtained the license of a Justice acting for the division from which it is intended that such cattle shall be removed, and if such cattle shall have been on land or premises from which it shall be intended to remove such cattle for twenty-eight days previously to the application for such license, and if at the time of the application for such license, the Cattle Plague does not exist, and within six weeks previously to such application has not existed on such land or premises, or within a mile thereof; but that it shall not be lawful to remove cattle through or into any parish or place in which the Cattle Plague exists or has existed within six weeks previously to the time of such intended removal.

Provided always, that previously to the granting of any such license, the owner of the cattle to be removed, his or her bailiff or foreman, shall appear before such Justice, and make a declaration in the form hereunder set out, or to the like effect; and also produce to the said Justice a certificate by a churchwarden, overseer, waywarden, or guardian of the poor of the parish (or of some adjoining parish, in the case of cattle upon an extra-parochial farm) in which such cattle shall be at the time of the application for such license, and of the Veterinary Inspector of the Petty Sessional Division in which such parish or farm shall be situate, in the form hereunder set forth, or to the like effect; and that such license shall be in force for not more than three days, including the day of the granting thereof, and that the cattle in respect whereof such license shall have been granted shall be removed between the hours of sunrise and sunset, and at no other time; but that in the case of breeding cattle, the certificate of the Veterinary Inspector shall be dispensed with, and that any owner or occupier in any parish in the county be allowed to remove any such cattle to a distance not exceeding three miles from the farm homestead where such cattle shall be for breeding purposes without license of Justices, provided that at the time of such intended removal the Cattle Plague does not exist and has not existed during the space of six weeks within the parish or place from or to which it shall be proposed to remove such cattle.

Provided always, that if the person or persons removing the said cattle shall refuse or fail to produce for inspection such license, on demand of any Justice, or constable, or of any police or parish officer of the parish or place in which such cattle shall be or shall have been at the time of such demand, such license shall be thereupon null and void.

Provided always, that every person moving any cattle shall, immediately on the arrival of the cattle removed at the place for the removal whereto a license shall have been granted, return such license, by post, addressed to the Justice who shall have granted it, and that no cattle shall be moved from place to place within the said county by railway.

Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall make it unlawful for any person to remove his or her own cattle from one part to another part of land in his or her occupation, unless such cattle shall, in the course of such removal, be driven more than 300 yards upon any highway or public road, or upon any common or unenclosed land.

Provided also, that any owner or occupier of land in the boroughs of Bedford or Dunstable respectively, may remove on any one occasion one head of cattle, into the said county, to a distance not exceeding three miles from the said boroughs respectively, on obtaining the license of a Justice of the said county or a certificate from the Veterinary Inspector of such borough respectively, that the said cattle has been in the possession of such owner or occupier for twenty-eight days next previously to the application for such license, and that it is healthy.

Liberty of Ripon, in the county of York.

The Justices of the Peace for the Liberty of Ripon, in the county of York, assembled at a General Quarter Sessions of the Peace, holden by adjournment at the Court House, at Ripon, in and for the said liberty, on Friday, the 12th day of January, 1866, do hereby, in pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities in this behalf, vested in and conferred upon them by and in certain Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, having reference to a certain disorder generally designated "The Cattle Plague," and dated respectively the 23rd day of November, 1865, and the 16th day of December, 1865, or by and in one of the same Orders, and with a view to prevent the spreading of the said disorder, declare that it is expedient from this 12th day of January, 1866, until the 1st day of March next, to prevent the removal of all cows, heifers, bulls, bullocks, oxen, calves, sheep, lambs, goats, and swine, to any market or fair, or any place whatever within the said liberty, for the purpose of exhibition or sale; and for that purpose the said Justices do hereby renew, continue, and confirm the notice given and published by the previous local authority acting in and for the said liberty, bearing date the 22nd day of December, 1865.

And the said Justices of the Peace of the said liberty so assembled as aforesaid, do by this Notice declare, that (with a view to prevent the spreading of the said disorder), it is expedient that no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, shall be removed from any part of, or place or places within the said liberty, to any other part of, or place or places within the said liberty, except under the provisoes and conditions hereinafter mentioned; and the said Justices do therefore accordingly declare and give notice, that from and after the publication of this notice, until the 1st day of March next, it shall not be lawful for any person to remove any such animal as last hereinbefore mentioned from any part of, or place or places within the said liberty, or any other part of, or place or places within the said liberty:

Provided always, that any Justice of the Peace, acting in and for the said liberty, may grant (subject to being revoked at any time at the pleasure of the same, or any other such Justice) a licence, in writing, to any person occupying lands in one part of the said liberty, to remove any such animal as aforesaid between sunrise and sunset from such lands to any other lands in his own occupation, within the said liberty, for such purposes as shall be proved to the satisfaction of such Justice to be absolutely necessary, or to convey any cow or heifer to a bull within the distance of two miles from the land on which such cow or heifer shall then be; but every such licence shall specify the number and description of animals to be removed, and the place from which and to which the same shall be removed,

and the time during which such licence shall remain in force, but no such licence shall be issued unless every animal to be removed shall have been at least twenty-eight days in the possession of the applicant, nor shall any such animal be removed upon any ground or pretext whatever from any land or premises within the said liberty where the said disorder exists, or has existed, within the period of forty days:

Provided also, that it shall not be unlawful for any person to send or carry any such animal by railway through or out of the said liberty, or to send or carry any such animal if brought by sea from any place out of Great Britain into the said liberty, to the nearest convenient railway station, for the purpose of carrying it through or out of the said liberty.

And the said Justices so assembled as aforesaid do further declare and give notice, that every drover or other person having or holding a licence for the removal of any such animal as aforesaid, shall produce and show the same to any other person requiring him so to do.

And that no hoof or hide shall be removed from the place where any animal is slaughtered, without being first disinfected.

Every person offending against the regulations hereinbefore contained, shall forfeit for each and every such offence, any sum not exceeding £20, which the Justices before whom he or she shall be convicted of such offence may think fit to impose.

I, HUGH MACFARLANE, Junior, Provost of the Burgh of Paisley, in virtue of the powers vested in me as local authority under the Orders issued by Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, do hereby give notice, that from and after the date hereof, and up to the 1st of March next, it is expedient, and I do hereby declare, that no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine shall be permitted to enter the burgh or town of Paisley from any other part of Great Britain except by railway and for the purpose of being sent to the Paisley slaughter-house, and to no other place within the said burgh.

Further, I, as local authority aforesaid, do hereby give notice, that from and after the date hereof, and up to the 1st of March next, it is expedient, and I do hereby declare, that no such animal shall be allowed to pass from one part of the said burgh to another part thereof, except to the said slaughter-house for the purpose of being slaughtered, and that subject to the following conditions and regulations, viz.:

First. That on arrival of any such animal at the railway station within the burgh, notice thereof shall be immediately given to the Superintendent of Police, whose duty shall be to see that such animal is taken direct from the said railway station to the said slaughter-house.

Second. That before removal of any such animal from any part of the burgh, other than from the railway station, three hours' notice of the time fixed for removal shall be given to the Superintendent of Police.

Third. That all such animals on entering the slaughter-house shall be branded, and shall not be removed therefrom until slaughtered.

Fourth. Every cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf shall be inspected by the Government Inspector after being slaughtered, and shall not be allowed to be taken out of the slaughter-house for consumption until such examination has taken place.

Fifth. That no carcase of any such animal shall be brought into the slaughter-house without a certificate by the Government Inspector being previously delivered to the keeper thereof that the same is free from disease.

That it is expedient to prevent, until the 1st day of March next, the removal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf to any market or fair, or to any place whatever, within my jurisdiction, for the purpose of exhibition or sale. And notice is hereby given, that it will not be lawful, after the date of this notice until the 1st day of March next, for any person to bring or send any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf into any market or fair, or to any place within my jurisdiction, for the purpose of exhibition or sale; or to receive, exhibit, buy, or sell, any such animal so brought or sent: Provided that nothing herein contained shall be held to prohibit any person from exhibiting or selling, on his own land or premises, any animal belonging to him, which has been on such land or premises for not less than fourteen days previous to such sale.

3. That it is expedient to prevent until the 1st day of March next, any such animal as aforesaid being brought or sent from any part of Great Britain beyond my jurisdiction into any place within the same jurisdiction. And notice is hereby given, that, after the date of this notice until the 1st of March next, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf shall be brought or sent from any part of Great Britain beyond my jurisdiction to any place within the same jurisdiction: Provided that nothing herein contained shall make it unlawful for any person to send or carry any such animal as aforesaid by railway through such jurisdiction; and provided also, that nothing herein contained shall make it unlawful for any person to bring or send, with the licence of any Justice acting in and for this borough, any such animal from any land or premises in his own occupation, and beyond such jurisdiction, to any other land or premises in his own occupation and within such jurisdiction; and provided further, that nothing herein contained shall make it unlawful for any person to remove any such animal which is in the possession of such person at the date of this notice, and which shall be marked and licensed by and Inspector, from part to part of any contiguous land or premises situated partly within and partly without such jurisdiction.

4. That, if any such animal as aforesaid shall be brought by sea from any place out of Great Britain to any place within my jurisdiction, it is expedient to prevent, during the period aforesaid, the removal of such animal from the place of disembarkation to any other place, or from place to place, within the same jurisdiction. At the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Sovereign Lady the Queen, holden by adjournment at Carlisle, in and for the county of Cumberland, on Saturday, the 13th day of January, in the twenty-ninth year of the reign of our Sovereign Lady Queen Victoria, and in the year of our Lord 1866, before certain Justices of our said Lady the Queen, assigned to keep the Peace of our said Lady the Queen, in the same county, and also to hear and determine divers felonies, trespasses, and other misdemeanours, in the same county committed:

In pursuance of the powers vested in the said Justices in Quarter Sessions assembled by two Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated respectively the 23rd day of November, and the 16th of December, 1865, this Court doth hereby order,—

1. That Mr. Faulder, of Cockermouth, and Mr. Septimus Hodgson, of Broughton Cross, be appointed Inspectors under the said Orders of Council for Derwent Division; Mr. Coates, of Brampton, for Eskdale Ward; Messrs. Bell and Carlisle, for Cumberland Ward and Longtown Division; Mr. William Fisher, Veterinary Surgeon, Whitehaven, for Allerdale Ward above Derwent; Mr. Carlyle, of Penrith, Mr. Pears, Mr. Illingsworth, and Mr. Robson, for Leath Ward; and Mr. Potts, of Wigton, Mr. Thompson, of Aspatria, and Mr. Little, of Abbey Town, for Allerdale below Derwent.

2. That the Order made by this Court on the 6th instant, requiring a certificate for the removal of cattle to be signed by two Justices acting on the Cattle Plague Committee, be revoked, and that all certificates required by any Order of this Court shall in future be sufficient if signed by two Justices acting in Petty Sessions; and that on occasion of all farm sales and change of tenants, an Inspector or Superintendent of Police shall, on the production of such certificate, grant a pass to each purchaser or other person, specifying the number and description of cattle to be removed under its authority, and the route it is proposed they should travel from place to place (no part of such route being within two miles of any place where the cattle plague shall then exist), and also that the cattle comprised in such pass are perfectly healthy, and have been in possession of their owner for three weeks previous to their removal, and further that the cattle plague has not been within two miles of the place where such cattle have been for two months preceding such removal; such pass to remain in force for forty-eight hours.

3. That the Chief Constable do draw out and enforce such regulations at farm sales as he may judge expedient to prevent the cattle plague from being communicated to cattle by persons attending such sale.

4. That no cattle, moved under the Orders of this day, regulating sales by auction, shall be allowed to enter the wards of Eskdale, Leath,

and Allerdale above Derwent from any other part of the county.

5. That every person driving cattle along a highway or road shall, if required, produce his licence authorizing the removal of such cattle to any person demanding the same, and on refusing to do so, or on deviating from the route specified in such licence, the said licence shall be null and void, and the persons so offending shall be liable to the same penalties as he would have been liable to in case the said licence had not been granted.

6. That where any farm or holding shall be within two or more parishes or townships, cattle *bonâ fide* belonging to the occupier, may be moved to any part of such farm or holding upon the certificate of two Magistrates in Petty Sessions.

7. That cattle out on grass may be removed by their owners to their respective farms under the licence of two Justices in Petty Sessions.

8. That the Chief Constable be authorized to make use of the parish constables as far as he is able to do so.

9. That the Orders of this Court be advertised in all the newspapers published in this county, and that large handbills be forthwith printed and circulated through the county by the police.

At the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Sovereign Lady the Queen, holden at Carlisle, in and for the county of Cumberland, on Tuesday the 2nd, and by adjournment, on the 3rd, 6th, and 13th days of January, in the 29th year of the reign of our Sovereign Lady Queen Victoria, and in the year of our Lord 1866, before certain Justices of our said Lady the Queen, assigned to keep the peace of our said Lady the Queen, in the same county, and also to hear and determine divers felonies, trespasses, and other demeanours, in the same county committed:

In pursuance of the powers vested in the said Justices in Quarter Sessions assembled, by two Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated respectively the 23rd day of November and the 16th day of December, 1865,—

This Court doth order and declare—

That all orders made and notices given by any local authority in the said county, under the said orders, previous to the 2nd day of January instant, be revoked;

That no cattle fairs, markets, or auctions (except farm sales of cattle as hereinafter provided for), be held within the said county of Cumberland until the 1st day of March next;

That no sheep, swine, or other animals described in the said Orders of Council, shall be brought or sent to any market or fair, or to any place within the said county, for the purpose of exhibition or sale until the said 1st day of March next;

That no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf shall be brought into the said county from any adjoining county, or from any other

part of Great Britain, or into any parish or township within the said county from any other parish or township within the same until the said first day of March next, except as hereinafter provided for, or by virtue of some future Order of this Court.

Provided that where any farm or holding shall be within two or more parishes or townships, cattle *bonâ fide* belonging to the occupier, may be moved by any part of such farm or holding upon the certificate of two Justices in Petty Sessions.

Provided also that cattle out on grass may be removed by their owners to their respective farms, under the licence of two Justices in Petty Sessions.

Provided also that cattle may be sent to the nearest station for the purpose of being sent out of the district by railway.

And this Court doth further order, that in case of farm sales or change of tenants, a certificate for the removal of cattle, signed by two Justices acting in Petty Sessions, shall be sufficient authority for the removal of any cattle so sold or moved, and shall exempt the parties moving such cattle from any penalty under the Orders of Council, provided the rules and regulations hereinafter mentioned be complied with.

Provided always, and this Court doth further order, that at all farm sales and change of tenants, a superintendent, inspector, or serjeant of police shall, on the production of the last mentioned certificate, grant a pass to each purchaser or other person, specifying the number and description of cattle to be removed under its authority and the route it is proposed they should travel from place to place (no part of such route being within two miles of any place where the Cattle Plague may then exist), and also specifying that such cattle are perfectly healthy, and have been in possession of their owner for three weeks previous to their removal, and that the Cattle Plague has not been within two miles of the place where such cattle have been kept for two months preceding such removal, provided that such pass shall only remain in force for forty-eight hours.

Provided also, that every person driving cattle along any highway or road shall, if required, produce his pass, licence, or certificate, authorizing the removal of such cattle to any person demanding the same, and on refusal so to do, or on deviating from the route specified in such pass, licence, or certificate, the same shall be null and void, and the person so offending shall be liable to the same penalties as he would have been liable to in case the said pass, licence, or certificate had not been granted: provided also, that the chief constable be, and he is hereby empowered, to draw out and enforce such regulations at farm sales as may, in his opinion, be expedient to prevent the Cattle Plague from being communicated to cattle by persons attending such sales.

Provided always, and this Court doth further order, that no cattle moved under the preceding Orders regulating farm sales by auction, shall be allowed to enter the wards of Eskdale (including Longtown Division), Leath, or Allerdale-above-Derwent, from any other part of the county; and that no animals as described in the said Orders of Council shall, under any pass, licence, order, or certificate whatever, be removed from one parish or township in the said county to another parish or township in the same, between the hours of six P.M. and six A.M. until the 1st of March next.

And this Court doth further order, that the following persons be, and they are hereby appointed inspectors of cattle for the several Petty

Sessional Divisions hereinafter mentioned, viz. :—

For Allerdale Ward above Derwent:—Mr. William Fisher, Veterinary Surgeon.

For Allerdale Ward below Derwent:—Mr. Potts, of Wigton; Mr. Thompson, of Aspatria; and Mr. Little, of Abbey Town.

For Derwent Division:—Mr. Faulder, of Cockermouth; and Mr. Septimus Hodgson, of Broughton Cross.

For Cumberland Ward and Longtown Division:—Messrs. Carlisle and Bell, of Carlisle.

For Eskdale Ward:—Mr. Coates, of Brampton; and

For Leath Ward:—Mr. Carlyle, of Penrith; Mr. Pears, Mr. Illingsworth, and Mr. Robson.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

Sussex.

At the General Quarter Session of the Peace of our Lady the Queen, holden at Lewes, in and for the county of Sussex, on Monday, the 1st day of January, in the 29th year of the reign of our Sovereign Lady Victoria, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen Defender of the Faith, and in the year of our Lord 1866, and from thence continued by divers adjournments to and holden at Lewes, in and for the said county, on Tuesday, the 16th day of the same month of January, before the Right Honourable Henry Thomas Earl of Chichester, The Honourable Walter John Pelham, commonly called Lord Pelham, and others their Fellows Justices of our said Lady the Queen, assigned to keep the peace in the said county, and also to hear and determine divers felonies, trespasses, and other ill deeds done and committed in the county aforesaid.

It is ordered by this Court, that the Order made at the General Quarter Session of the Peace, holden at Lewes, in and for the said county, on the 1st day of January instant, by virtue of an Order of Her Majesty's Privy Council, dated the 16th day of December, 1865, and of an Order of Her Majesty's Privy Council, dated the 23rd day of November, 1865, be absolutely revoked. And this Court doth further order, by virtue of the said Orders of Her Majesty's Privy Council, as follows:—

I. That all orders made under the powers given by the said Order of Her Majesty's Privy Council, dated the 23rd day of November, 1865, or given by any Order of Her Majesty's Privy Council therein mentioned, and thereby consolidated by any previous local authority constituted under the last-mentioned Orders, or any of them, within the Eastern Division of the county of Sussex, or so much of the said division as is within the jurisdiction of the Justices of the Peace of the said county, in Quarter Sessions assembled, be revoked on and after the 3rd day of January, 1866, with the exception of any order, or part of any order made by any such previous local authority as aforesaid, whereby any Inspector or Inspectors may have been appointed for the purpose of carrying into effect the rules and regulations made by the said Orders in Council, or any of them, all which appointments of Inspectors, so far as they are now in force, are hereby confirmed.

II. And it is hereby declared that it is expedient that from and after the 3rd day of January instant, until the 1st day of March, 1866, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, shall, except in accordance with the proviso contained in the

18th section of the said Order of Council, of the 23rd day of November, 1865, and subject, so far as the same is applicable to the condition hereafter stated, be brought from any part of Great Britain without the jurisdiction of the Justices of the said county of Sussex, in Quarter Sessions assembled, into any place within the Eastern Division of the said county, or so much of such division as is within such jurisdiction, provided that in case any farm shall be partly without the jurisdiction of the said Justices in Quarter Sessions assembled and partly within the Eastern Division of the said county, or so much of such division as is within such jurisdiction, any such animal as aforesaid may be brought from the part of such farm without such jurisdiction, into the part of the said farm within the said Eastern Division or so much of such division as is within such jurisdiction, on condition that at the time such animal is brought in as aforesaid, it has been in the possession of the occupier of the said farm one month at least, and is in a healthy condition, but lands in the occupation of the same person entirely separated from one another shall for this purpose be deemed separate farms, although such lands may be held as the same occupation and at one rent.

III. That the authorities of corporate towns and boroughs within the county be invited to cooperate with the Justices of the county.

IV. That this Order be published in the *Sussex Express* and *Sussex Advertiser*, and in papers circulating in Hampshire, Kent, and Surrey.

V. That this Order be sent to the Clerk of Her Majesty's Privy Council, to be published by him in the *London Gazette*.

VI. And notice is hereby given, that every person offending against this Order is liable for every such offence to a penalty not exceeding £20.

NOTICE.

East Riding of Yorkshire.

At the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Sovereign Lady the Queen, held by adjournment at the Sessions House, in Beverley, in and for the East Riding of the county of York, on Friday the 12th day of January, 1866, before the Honourable Admiral Duncombe, Chairman, the Right Honourable Lord Wenlock (Lord Lieutenant), the Right Honourable Lord Herries, and other Justices, Orders were made of which the following are copies:—

Pursuant to and in exercise of the powers and authorities in this behalf vested in and conferred upon them by and in certain Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council having reference to a certain disorder generally designated the Cattle Plague, and dated respectively the 22nd day of November, 1865, and the 16th day of December, 1865, or by and in one of the same Orders, and in exercise of any other powers enabling them in this behalf, the said Justices in Quarter Sessions assembled do hereby revoke and rescind from and after the date of the publication of this notice, all appointments made and notices given by the Justices acting in and for any Petty Sessional Division within the said riding, under and by virtue of the said Order of the 23rd day of November, 1865, or any of the Orders thereby revoked,

except so far as respects the appointment of any Inspector or Inspectors under any of the said Orders, and also hereby revoke and rescind so much and such part and parts only of the Order made by this Court with reference to the said Cattle Plague, on the 3rd day of January instant, as is or may be inconsistent with the Orders hereinafter mentioned:

And the said Justices of the Peace of the said riding now assembled, do by this Order declare that (with a view to prevent the spreading of the said disorder) it is expedient to prevent the removal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, or swine, between the 15th day of January, 1866, and the 1st day of March, 1866, to any public fair or market, or to any place whatever in the said riding, for the purpose of exhibition or sale, except under the conditions next hereinafter imposed. And the said Justices do accordingly declare and hereby order that, between the dates aforesaid, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, or swine, shall be brought or sent into any such public fair or market, or place as aforesaid, unless with the licence in writing under the hand of a Justice of the Peace acting in and for the said riding, dated at the time of issue, specifying the number and description of animals to be brought or sent, and the place from and the public market or fair or other place to which the same shall be brought or sent, and the time during which the licence shall remain in force, such licence to be lodged by the person using the same, with some East Riding police constable, or at the East Riding police station nearest the fair, market, or other place to which such animal shall be brought or sent, within twelve hours after the expiration of the time for which the licence was granted; and unless such cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, or swine be marked, by the hair being clipped off the end of the tail by the officers of the said fair or market, or in case there be no such officer, by the person or persons selling the same; and also unless such cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, or swine be slaughtered within twenty-four hours after the same shall have been so brought or sent, in such fair or market, or the town or place in which the same is held, and be not allowed to leave such town or place alive; but no such licence shall be issued unless the animal to be removed shall have been at least twenty-one days then last past in the possession of the applicant.

And the said Justices of the Peace of the said riding so assembled as aforesaid, do by this Order declare that (with a view to prevent the spreading of the said disorder) it is expedient that between the 15th day of January, 1866, and the 1st day of March, 1866, no cow, heifer, bullock, ox, calf, or swine shall be brought from any part of Great Britain into any place in the said East Riding. And the said Justices do accordingly declare and order, that it shall not, between the dates aforesaid, be lawful for any person to bring any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, or swine from any other part of Great Britain into any place in the said East Riding.

And the said Justices do by this Order further declare that (with a view to prevent the spreading of the said disorder) it is expedient that between the 15th day of January, 1866, and the 1st day of March, 1866, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, or swine shall, except under the conditions hereinafter imposed, be removed from place to place in the said riding. And the said Justices do accordingly declare and hereby order, that it shall not be lawful between the dates aforesaid, for any person to remove any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, or swine from place

to place in the said riding, except for the purpose of slaughter, and with the licence of a Justice of the Peace as hereinafter mentioned, and every such animal shall be immediately marked by the hair being clipped off the end of the tail by the vendor, and shall on no account be allowed to leave the premises of the purchaser alive.

Provided always, that upon obtaining the written licence of one Justice of the Peace acting in and for the said riding, it shall be lawful for any person to remove any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, or swine, which is uninfected, from any uninfected lands or premises in his own occupation, to any other uninfected lands also in his own occupation, in the same or an adjoining township, and with the like licence to drive or take a cow or heifer to a bull, or any sow to a boar, on any other farm or lands. Provided also that any Justice acting in and for the said Riding may, by order in writing, allow any uninfected fat cattle, or any uninfected lands or premises within the riding (on application by or on behalf of the owner thereof, and upon being satisfied that the said last named cattle have been on the owner's uninfected premises for twenty-one days, and are then in good health, and that no "Cattle Plague" exists, and has not existed on the said premises at any time during the twenty-eight days then next preceding), to be removed to any slaughter house within such riding, for slaughter, within twenty-four hours after their arrival at such slaughter house; and provided further that nothing herein contained shall render it unlawful, with the like licence, for any person to send or carry any such uninfected animal from uninfected premises along any highway to the nearest convenient railway station, nor to prohibit the sending or carrying such animal by railway through or out of this riding, nor the sending or carrying any animal, if brought by sea, from any place out of Great Britain into this riding, to the nearest railway station, for the purpose of carrying it through or out of the riding.

And, provided also that no manure shall be allowed to be moved along any turnpike road or common highway in this Riding, from any premises upon which the Cattle Plague has existed at any time during forty days immediately preceding.

Nothing in this clause shall authorize the removal of any such animal as hereinbefore mentioned, between an hour after sunset and an hour before sunrise. No hoof or hide shall be removed from the place where any such animal is slaughtered, without first being disinfected. Every drover or person removing any cattle shall, on demand, produce his certificate, and show the same to any justice, police constable, or inspector requiring him so to do.

It is expedient, and the justices recommend that all dogs be tied up or kept confined on the premises to which they respectively belong.

That the justices now assembled being satisfied of the existence of the Cattle Plague in this riding, do hereby appoint the following veterinary surgeons or duly qualified persons to be inspectors, for the purpose of carrying into effect the rules and regulations of the said Order of the 23rd day of November, 1865, within the several districts following, that is to say,

That the forms of licence now settled be printed, and copies sent to each magistrate of the riding.

That this order be deemed published by notice in the "Hull Times" newspaper of Saturday, the 13th day of January instant.

That in the notice to be given of the foregoing orders, it be declared that any person offending against the said Orders in Council, and this order or any of them, after the due publication of such notice, will be liable to a penalty not exceeding £20, for every head of cattle unlawfully removed, or for any other infringement of these orders, which will be enforced by Colonel Layard, the chief constable and inspector general, appointed to superintend and carry out the various orders of this Court connected with the Cattle Plague.

The Court having made the foregoing orders, directs the Clerk of the Peace to communicate the same to the Lord Mayor of York, and the Mayors of Hull, Beverley, and Hedon, earnestly requesting that they will further the carrying out of such orders by every means in their power.

That the foregoing orders be printed, and a copy sent to each Magistrate of the riding, and to each cattle inspector.

That this Court be adjourned to Tuesday, the 30th day of January instant, at half-past eleven o'clock in the forenoon, to be held at this place.

Pursuant to the foregoing orders, I do hereby give notice thereof accordingly.

At the General Quarter Session of the Peace, held by adjournment at Preston, in and for the County Palatine of Lancaster, the 13th day of January, 1866.

By the authority of certain orders made by the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, dated respectively the 23rd day of November, and the 16th day of December, 1865,

and of all other powers and authorities enabling them in this behalf.

The Justices of the Peace for the County of Lancaster, assembled at this present Court of General Quarter Session of the Peace, do hereby declare that it is expedient, with a view to prevent the spreading of the disorder called the Cattle Plague, that on and after the 20th day of January instant, and until the 1st day of March next, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf shall be brought or sent from any part of Great Britain into any place within the jurisdiction of the said justices for this purpose in the Hundreds of Amounderness, Blackburn, and Leyland, in the said county, except as provided by the said Orders in Council; and to prevent the removal of such animal to any market or fair, or to any place whatever within the said jurisdiction in the said hundreds, for the purpose of exhibition or sale, and from place to place therein, except as provided by the said Orders in Council, and under certain conditions.

And the said Justices do hereby further declare and order as follows, namely:—That all orders or declarations heretofore made and notices given by any local authority within the said jurisdiction in the said hundreds, under the powers given by any Order in Council be and the same are hereby revoked, such revocation to take effect on and after the 20th day of January instant, provided that such revocation shall not affect any appointment made or any penalty recoverable under the said orders or declarations and notices, or any of them.

And the said Justices do hereby further declare that it shall not be lawful on and after the 20th day of January instant, and until the 1st day of March next, for any person to bring or send any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf from any part of Great Britain, beyond the said jurisdiction, into any place within the said jurisdiction, except only as provided by the said Orders in Council.

Nor shall it be lawful for any person to bring or send any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf to any market or fair, or to any place whatever within the said jurisdiction, in the said Hundreds of Amounderness, Blackburn, or Leyland, in the said county, for the purpose of exhibition or sale, except under the conditions hereinafter specified.

Nor shall it be lawful for any person to remove any skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or offal to or from any place within the said jurisdiction, except the skins and hides of healthy, and unsuspected animals sent direct to a tanner's. Notice must be given, by post or otherwise, twenty-four hours at least before any such removal, to the superintendent of the police district in which the said premises shall be situate.

Nor shall it be lawful for any person to remove any such animal or animals from any Petty Sessional Division to any other Petty Sessional Division within the said jurisdiction in the said hundreds, except as hereinafter provided.

Nor shall it be lawful for any person to remove any of the said animals along any turnpike road or other highway, without the licence in writing of a Justice of the Peace for the said county, except from one part of any farm to another part of the same farm, or except in the case of any cow taken to the bull, nor between the hours of six o'clock in the evening and six o'clock in the following morning.

And it is hereby declared, that (that subject to the regulations prescribed by the said Orders in Council,) the conditions on which any such animal may be removed to or from any place within the

said jurisdiction in the said Hundreds, shall be as follows, viz. :—

1. Any person may sell on his own land or premises any animal belonging to him that shall have been on such land or premises not less than fourteen days previous to such sale, and any animal so sold may be removed from such land or premises provided it be certified by a veterinary surgeon, or by some other competent person or persons to be appointed for that purpose by the Justices in Petty Sessions assembled to be free from the said disorder, and to be on premises free from all suspicion of the said disorder.

2. Any fat cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf, may be removed within the limits of each Petty Sessional Division, provided it be certified as aforesaid, and be taken direct to some place within the said Petty Sessional Division and sold for immediate slaughter or forthwith forwarded direct to some accustomed market or fair for the sale of fat cattle, or to some slaughter-house beyond the jurisdiction of the said Justices, but subject to such regulations as may be in force with reference thereto.

Provided that every such certificate shall have been granted not more than four days before the removal of such animal, and shall (together with the licence of the said Justice, whenever required) accompany the animal or animals so removed, and a duplicate thereof shall be delivered or sent by post to the Superintendent or Superintendents of Police, or one of them, for the district in which the land or premises are situate, two days at least before the animal to which it relates shall be removed from the owner's premises.

Every person offending against the terms of this declaration and notice will be liable for every offence to a penalty not exceeding £20.

Now, therefore, the Justices of the Peace of the county of Lancaster, in Quarter Sessions assembled, being the local authority under an Order of the Lords of Her Majesty's most Honourable Privy Council, dated the 16th day of December, 1865, do hereby (by virtue of the said Order of the 16th day of December, 1865, and of a previous Order in Council of the 23rd day of November, 1865, and of all other powers and authorities enabling them in this behalf,) declare that it is expedient, with a view to prevent the spreading of the said disorder, that on and after the 24th day of January instant, and until the 1st day of March next, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf shall be brought or sent from any part of Great Britain into any place within the jurisdiction of the said Justices in the Hundred of West Derby, in the said county, except as provided by the said Orders in Council; and it is expedient to prevent the removal of any such animal to any market or fair, or to any place whatever within the said jurisdiction in the said

Hundred, for the exhibition or sale, and from place to place therein, except as provided by the said Orders in Council, and under certain conditions.

And the said Justices further declare and order as follows :—That all notices now in force in and for any Petty Sessional Division within the said jurisdiction in the said Hundred, under the powers given by any Order in Council be and the same are hereby revoked, such revocation to take effect on and after the 24th day of January instant, save and except so far as relates to the appointment of any inspector or inspectors made under any former Order or Orders.

And the said Justices do hereby further declare that it shall not be lawful, after the 24th day of January instant, and until the 1st day of March next, for any person to bring or send any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf from any part of Great Britain, beyond the said jurisdiction, into any place within the said jurisdiction, except only as provided by the said Orders in Council.

Nor shall it be lawful for any person to bring or send any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf to any market or fair, or to any place whatever within the said jurisdiction, in the said Hundred of West Derby in the said county, for the purpose of exhibition or sale, except under the conditions hereinafter specified.

Nor shall it be lawful for any person to remove or cause to be removed any skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or offal to or from any place within the said jurisdiction, except the skins and hides of healthy and unsuspected animals sent direct to a tanner's, and in such case notice to be given, by post or otherwise, twenty-four hours at least before any such removal, to the Superintendent of the Police District in which the said premises shall be situate.

Nor shall it be lawful for any person to remove or cause to be removed any such animal or animals from any Petty Sessional Division to any other Petty Sessional Division within the said jurisdiction in the said Hundred, except as hereinafter provided.

Nor shall it be lawful for any person to remove or cause to be removed any of the said animals along any turnpike road or other highway for general traffic, without the licence in writing of a Justice of the Peace of the county of Lancaster, except from one part of any farm to another part of the same farm, or except in the case of any cow taken to the bull; nor between the hours of six o'clock in the evening and six o'clock in the following morning.

And it is hereby declared, that the conditions on which any such animal may be removed to or from any place within the said jurisdiction in the said Hundred, shall be as follows, viz. :—

1. Any such person may sell on his own land or premises any animal belonging to him which has been on such land or premises for not less than fourteen days previous to such sale, and which shall be certified by some veterinary surgeon, or other competent person appointed for that purpose by the Justices in Petty Session assembled, to be free from the said disorder called the Cattle Plague, and to be on premises free from all suspicion of the said disorder.

2. Any fat cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf may be removed within the limits of each Petty Sessional Division, provided it be certified as aforesaid, and be taken direct to some place within the said Petty Sessional Division and sold for immediate slaughter or forthwith forwarded direct to some accustomed market or fair for the sale of fat cattle, or to some slaughter-house beyond the jurisdiction of the said Justices, but

subject to such regulations as may be in force with reference thereto. Provided that every certificate shall state the place to which such animal is to be removed, and shall (together with the licence of the said Justice, whenever required) accompany the animal or animals so removed, and provided that such animal continues free from disease up to the time of removal.

A duplicate of such certificate shall in every case be delivered, or sent by post forthwith, to the Superintendent of Police for the Division in which the land or premises are situate; and no certificate shall be in force for any longer period than four days from the date thereof.

Every person offending against these Orders and notices, or in whose possession or custody any animal shall be found in contravention thereof, will be liable for each offence to a penalty not exceeding £20.

And I do hereby further declare that it shall not be lawful after the publication of this notice and until the 1st day of March next, for any person to bring or send any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine from any part of Great Britain beyond the said borough, into any place within the said borough, except only as provided by the said Orders in Council.

Nor shall it be lawful for any person to bring or send any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine to any market or fair, or to any place whatever within the said borough for the purpose of exhibition or sale, except under the conditions hereinafter specified.

Nor shall it be lawful for any person to remove any skins, hides, horns, hoofs, or offal, to or from any place within the said borough, except the skins and hides of healthy and unsuspected animals sent direct to a tanner. Notice to be given by post or otherwise twenty-four hours at least before any such removal to the Superintendent of Police stationed in the said borough.

Nor shall it be lawful for any person to remove any of the said animals along any turnpike road, or other highway within the said borough without

my licence in writing, except from one part of any farm to another part of the same farm, or except in the case of any cow taken to the bull, nor between the hours of six o'clock in the evening and six o'clock in the following morning.

And I do hereby declare that the conditions on which any such animal may be removed to or from any place within the said borough shall be as follows, namely—

1. Any animal may be sold by the owner thereof that shall have been on his land or premises not less than fourteen days previous to the sale thereof, and that shall be certified by the inspector of the said borough or other competent person or persons appointed by me for that purpose, to be free from the said disorder, and to be on premises free from all suspicion of the said disorder, except by licence of a duly appointed inspector.
2. Any fat cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine may be removed within the limits of the said borough provided it be certified as aforesaid, and be taken direct to some place within the said borough, and sold for immediate slaughter, or be forthwith forwarded direct to some slaughter-house beyond the said borough, but subject to such regulations as may be in force with reference thereto.

Provided that every such certificate shall be granted not more than four days before the removal of such animal, and shall (together with my licence whenever required) accompany the animal or animals so removed, and a duplicate thereof shall be delivered to the Superintendent of Police stationed in the said borough, two days at least before the animal to which it relates shall be removed from the owner's premises.

Every person offending against this Order, or in whose possession or custody any such animal shall be found, by means of which this notice shall be contravened, will be liable for each offence to a penalty not exceeding £20.

Now, by virtue of the said Orders by the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, dated the 23rd day of November, and the 16th day of December, 1865, respectively, this Court doth order and direct:—

That all appointments made, notices given, and other acts done by any Local Authority within the jurisdiction of the Court of Genera

and Quarter Sessions of the Peace for the said county, under and by virtue of any Order of the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council in this matter be, and the same are hereby revoked, provided that nothing in this Order contained shall affect any breaches of any existing Orders or any proceedings in respect of any such breaches.

That it shall not be lawful to remove any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf to any market or fair within the aforesaid jurisdiction for the purpose of exhibition or sale, or to receive, exhibit, buy, or sell any such animal so brought or sent.

That no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf shall be removed from or through any place within the aforesaid jurisdiction to or through any other place within the same jurisdiction.

With such exceptions and conditions as in the said Order of Council of the 16th day of December, 1865, mentioned, and with such exceptions and conditions as hereinafter specified. viz. :—

This Order shall not apply to the removal of any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf from one part to another part of the same holding where there is no intervening highway, public road, bridle road, canal, or navigable river :

That this Order shall not, as regards fat cattle fit and intended for immediate slaughter for human food, apply to any place within a radius of four miles from Charing Cross, and within the above-mentioned jurisdiction :

That it shall be lawful to remove any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, or calf across or along any highway, public road, river, or canal, from one part of a farm to another part of the same farm, provided that no disease exists, or for the space of 14 days prior to the date of the authority hereinafter mentioned, had existed, in any animal on such farm, and provided that an authority in writing from a Justice of the Peace or Police Magistrate for such removal be produced by the person or persons having charge of any such animal or animals, and provided the distance along such highway, public road, river, or canal to be so traversed shall not exceed 440 yards. Every such authority shall be in the form following, and shall be in force for 48 hours only, inclusive of the day of the date thereof :—
