WHEREAS by an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the eleventh and twelfth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to prevent until the first day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty, and to the end of the then session of Parliament, the spreading of contagious or infectious disorders among sheep, cattle, and other animals," (which Act has since been extended and continued, in force until the first day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, and to the end of the then next session of Parliament), after reciting that "a contagious or infectious disorder known or described as the Sheep Fox or Variola Ovina, now prevails among the sheep in some parts of the United Kingdom, and it is necessary to take measures to prevent such disorder from spreading," it was and is enacted (amongst other things) as follows, namely:—"In case any Sheep or Lambs infected with or labouring under the said Disorder, or any Disorder of the like Nature, be exposed or offered for Sale, or be brought or attempted to be brought for the Purpose of being so exposed or offered for Sale, in any market, fair, or other open or public Place where other animals are commonly exposed for Sale, then and in any such case it shall be lawful for any Clerk or Inspector or other Officer of such Fair or Market, or for any Constable or Policeman, or for any other person authorized by the Mayor, or by any Two Justices of the Peace having Jurisdiction in the Place, or for any person authorized or appointed by Her Majesty in Council, to seize the same, and to report such Seizure to the Mayor or any Justice of the Peace having Jurisdiction in the Place; and it shall be lawful for such Mayor or Justice either to restore the same, or to cause the same, together with any Pens, Hurdles, Troughs, Litter, Hay, Straw, or other Articles which he may judge likely to have been infected thereby, to be forthwith destroyed or otherwise disposed of in such manner as he shall deem proper, or as may be directed in manner hereinafter provided; and any Person bringing or attempting to bring any Sheep, Lambs, Oxen, Bulls, Cows, Calves, or other horned Cattle, into any such Market, Fair, or

"open or public Place as aforesaid, knowing such Sheep, Lambs, or Cattle to be infected with or labouring under either of such Disorders as aforesaid, shall, upon Conviction thereof, forfeit and pay for each and every such Offence a Sum not exceeding Twenty Pounds."

And whereas in and by the said Act, it was and is further enacted as follows, that is to say :

"If any Person turn out, keep, or depasture any Sheep or Lambs infected with or labouring under the said disorder, in or upon any Forest, Chase, Wood, Moor, Marsh, Heath, Common, waste Land, open Field, Road Side, or other undivided or uninclosed Land, such Person shall, on conviction thereof, forfeit and pay any Sum not exceeding Twenty Pounds."

And whereas in and by the said Act it was and is further enacted (for the more effectually preventing the spreading of contagious or infectious disease) as follows, that is to say :—

"It shall be lawful for the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Privy Council, or any two or more of them, from time to time to make such Orders and Regulations as to them may seem necessary for the purpose of prohibiting or regulating the removal to or from such parts or places as they may designate in such Order or Orders, of Sheep, Cattle, Horses, Swine, or other Animals, or of Meat, Skins, Hides, Horns, Hoofs, or other parts of any Animals, or of Hay, Straw, Fodder, or other articles likely to propagate infection; and also for the purpose of purifying any Yard, Stable, Outhouse, or other place, or any Waggons, Carts, Carriages, or other vehicles; and also for the purpose of directing how any Animals dying in a diseased state, or any Animals, Parts of Animals, or other Things, seized under the provisions of this Act are to be disposed of: and also for the purpose of causing Notices to be given of the Appearance of any Disorder among Sheep, Cattle, or other Animals, and to make any other Orders or Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of this Act, and again to revoke, alter, or vary any such Orders or Regulations; and all Provisions for any of the Purposes aforesaid, in any such Order or Orders contained, shall have the like Force and Effect as if the same had been inserted in this Act; and all Persons offending against the same shall for each and every offence forfeit and pay any Sum not exceeding Twenty Pounds, or such smaller Sum as the said Lords or others of Her Majesty's Privy Council may in any case by such Order direct;"

And whereas a Contagious or Infectious Disorder, known or described as the Sheep Pox, or Variola Ovina, now prevails among the Sheep, in a certain part of the United Kingdom, and it is expedient to take measures for preventing such Disorder from spreading;

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, do hereby, in pursuance and exercise of the powers so vested in them as aforesaid, make and ordain the several Orders and Regulations following; that is to say:—

I.

It shall not be lawful for any person to remove any Sheep or Lambs to or from the parish of Great Yeldham, in the county of Essex, or to drive or conduct any Sheep or Lambs through or by way of such parish.

II.

No skin, wool, horns, or hoofs of any sheep or lambs shall be moved out of the aforesaid parish without a certificate in writing, signed by some person who may have been authorised by two or more Justices of the said county of Essex to seize sheep or lambs infected with or labouring under the said disorder, under the first section of the said Act, to the effect that such skin, wool, horns, or hoofs, did not belong to any sheep or lambs forming part of a flock affected by the said disorder, or to any sheep or lambs on the farm or premises in which such disorder prevails.

III.

All Sheep and Lambs dying in any of the stages of the said disease, wheresoever such death or deaths shall or may occur, shall forthwith be buried by the person or persons in whose possession such Sheep or Lambs may be at the time of death, with their skins and wool on, in pits of not less than five feet in depth, and the carcases so buried shall be covered with quicklime.

IV.

All sheds and places whatsoever, and all railway trucks and other vehicles which may or shall have been used or occupied by Sheep or Lambs affected by the said disease, shall forthwith, after having been so used, be thoroughly cleansed with water, and immediately afterwards purified with chloride of lime by the person or persons in possession of such sheds, places, trucks, and vehicles respectively:

V.

Every person in possession of any Sheep or Lambs in or amongst which the said disease shall manifest itself, shall forthwith give notice, in writing, of the fact to the Chief Constable or Superintendent of Police of the county or borough in which such Sheep or Lambs may be.

VI.

And it is further ordered that this Order shall continue in force until revoked.

And whereas a Contagious or Infectious Disorder, known or described as the Sheep Pox, or Variola Ovina, now prevails among the Sheep, in a certain part of the United Kingdom, and it is expedient to take measures for preventing such Disorder from spreading;

Now, therefore, the Lords of Her Majesty's Privy Council, do hereby, in pursuance and exercise of the powers so vested in them as aforesaid, make and ordain the several Orders and Regulations following; that is to say:—

No skin, wool, horns, or hoofs of any sheep or lambs shall be moved out of the aforesaid parishes without a certificate in writing, signed by some person who may have been authorised by two or more Justices of the said county of Essex to seize sheep or lambs infected with or labouring under the said disorder, under the first section of the said Act, to the effect that such skin, wool, horns, or hoofs, did not belong to any sheep or lambs forming part of a flock affected by the said disorder, or to any sheep or lambs on the farm or premises in which such disorder prevails.

III.

All Sheep and Lambs dying in any of the stages of the said disease, wheresoever such death or deaths shall or may occur, shall forthwith be buried by the person or persons in whose possession such Sheep or Lambs may be at the time of death, with their skins and wool on, in pits of not less than five feet in depth, and the carcasses so buried shall be covered with quicklime.

IV.

All sheds and places whatsoever, and all railway trucks and other vehicles which may or shall have been used or occupied by Sheep or Lambs affected by the said disease, shall forthwith, after having been so used, be thoroughly cleansed with water, and immediately afterwards purified with chloride of lime by the person or persons in possession of such sheds, places, trucks, and vehicles respectively.

V.

Every person in possession of any Sheep or Lambs in or amongst which the said disease shall manifest itself, shall forthwith give notice, in

writing, of the fact to the Chief Constable or Superintendent of Police of the county or borough in which such Sheep or Lambs may be.

VI.

And it is further ordered that this Order shall continue in force until revoked.

THE following Notices have been received by the Clerk of the Council from the Local Authorities appointed under the Orders of the Lords of the Council relating to the "Cattle Plague," and are published in the London Gazette in conformity with the requirements of their Lordships' Orders :—

CATTLE PLAGUE.

East Riding of the county of York.

At the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace of our Sovereign Lady the Queen, held at the Sessions House, in Beverley, in and for the said Riding, on Tuesday, the 3rd day of April, 1866, before the Hon. Arthur Duncombe (Chairman), the Right Hon. Lord Wenlock, and others, Justices there.

The Order in Council dated the 24th day of March, 1866, relative to the cattle plague, having been read,

It is ordered :—

1. That the Orders of this Court dated the 27th day of February last, for the appointments of a General Committee of Petty Sessional Committees, and of inspectors and officers, and the dismissal of any such inspectors and officers, be and the same are hereby continued and confirmed.

2. That all the powers vested in this Court, as the local authority for the Riding, by clauses 12, 13, 14, 15, and 16 of "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," and by the said Order of Privy Council (except the power to make a rate, or to exempt from rate, or to make any orders whatever for payment of money), be and the same are hereby delegated to the several Petty Sessional Committees, to be exercised by each Committee in and for its own division.

3. No person shall remove any cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, or swine, from place to place in the said Riding except between sunrise and sunset, nor without first obtaining the licence, in writing, of a Justice of the Peace of the Riding, to be granted by such Justice on application by the owner or duly authorised agent of such owner, upon the Justice being satisfied that every such animal has been on the owner's uninfected premises for twenty-eight days and is then in good health, and that the cattle plague does not exist and has not existed on the said premises at any time during the twenty-eight days then next preceding and does not exist and has not existed for twenty-eight days on the premises to which the removal is licenced.

4. It shall not be lawful henceforth for any person to remove from place to place in the said Riding any raw or untanned hides or skins, or any horns or hoofs of any of the last-named animals, unless the same are effectually covered; or any dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter likely to propagate infection.

5. Every drover or person removing any animal shall, on demand, produce his licence and show

the same to any Justice, police constable, or inspector requiring the same.

6. That the clauses in the Order of this Court made on the 27th day of February, 1866, and numbered 1, 2, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 10 (substituting the 16th day of April for the 25th day of March in clause 10), be and the same are hereby continued and confirmed.

7. That clauses 3, 9, 11, 12, 13, 14, and 15 of the said Order of the 27th day of February last, shall henceforth cease to have any effect, without prejudice nevertheless to the prosecution of any offence that may have been committed against the last-mentioned clauses, or any of them, or the recovery of any penalty in respect of such offence.

8. That this Order be deemed published by notice in the Eastern Morning News newspaper of Wednesday, the 4th day of April instant.

Pursuant to the foregoing Order of Sessions, I do hereby give notice thereof accordingly.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

County of Dumfries.

NOTICE is hereby given, that the County Board of the county of Dumfries, constituting the Local Authority of the said county, under and for the purposes of "The Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866," and as such invested with the powers conferred by the Orders of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, deeming it to be expedient, with a view to prevent the further spreading of the disorder generally designated the "Cattle Plague," further to consolidate, alter, and amend the resolutions previously declared and published by Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the said county, and by the said Board, have resolved and declared, and hereby declare, that, subject to the exceptions and conditions after mentioned, it is expedient, with the said view, on and after the 7th day of April current, and until the 1st day of May next, or until the present notice shall be revoked :—

I. That no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, and no raw or untanned hides or skins, horns, hoofs, or offal, of any such animals, and no dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, shall be brought or sent from any place in Great Britain beyond the jurisdiction of the said County Board, into any place within such jurisdiction :

Excepting and providing always, that sheep, lambs, goats, and swine, and such articles as aforesaid, may be brought or sent by any person, with the licence of any two Justices of the Peace acting in and for such jurisdiction, from any land and premises in his own occupation beyond, to any other land or premises in his own occupation within, such jurisdiction, during a time to be specified in such licence; the licence, in the case of sheep, being accompanied by a certificate by an Inspector acting in the jurisdiction from which they are to be moved, that the sheep are free from disease of any kind, that the farm from which they are to be removed is not infected with Rinderpest or Cattle Plague, or within a radius of three miles from the nearest point of any infected farm, premises, or place, and that the route by which it is intended to drive the said sheep is not

within one mile of any part of any infected farm, premises, or place;

And, further, excepting and providing that dung may be removed from the burgh of Dumfries into the jurisdiction of the said Board, on the conditions following; viz.:-

1. That the Local Authority of the said burgh shall first have prohibited the importation of dung into the said burgh;
2. That before any dung is removed from the said burgh into any part of the jurisdiction of the said Board, the same shall have been disinfected, at the expense of the said burgh, and at the sight and to the satisfaction of the Inspector appointed by the said Board; and
3. That such dung shall not be so removed without the certificate of the said Inspector to the effect that the same has not been imported into the said burgh from another jurisdiction, has been disinfected as aforesaid, and is not likely to propagate infection.

II. That no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, and no raw or untanned hides or skins, horns or hoofs, or offal, of any such animals, and no dung, hay, straw, fodder, or litter, shall be removed from any infected farm, premises, or place, within the said jurisdiction, or from any point within a radius of two miles from the nearest part of any infected farm, premises, or place.

III. Uninfected cattle may be moved from place to place, within the jurisdiction of the said Board, subject to the exceptions and conditions following; viz.:-

1. No such animal shall be moved to any infected farm, premises, or place, or to any point within a radius of two miles from the nearest part of any infected farm, premises, or place;
2. Before any such animal shall be moved from place to place, as aforesaid, excepting in the case of animals moved from place to place on the same farm, a licence in the form prescribed by the Board, accompanied by a declaration by the owner of the cattle, shall be obtained from a member of the Divisional Committee resident in the parish from, and a member of the Divisional Committee resident in the parish to, which the animal is to be moved.

The resolutions previously declared and published are revoked so far as to give effect to the foregoing declaration.

Forms of licences and certificates may be obtained on application to the Clerk to the Board, or the Chairman or Clerks to the Divisional Committees.

“CATTLE DISEASES PREVENTION ACT, 1866.”

NOTICE is hereby given, the County Board of the stewartry of Kirkcudbright, constituting the local authority of the said stewartry, under and for the purposes of the “Cattle Diseases Prevention Act, 1866,” considering it expedient with the view of preventing the spread of the disease known as the “Cattle Plague,” to alter and amend the resolutions previously declared and published by Her Majesty’s Justices of the Peace for the said

stewartry, have resolved and declared, and hereby declare, that subject to the exceptions and conditions after mentioned, it is expedient that from and after the 26th day of March, 1866, and until the 30th day of April, 1866, or until this notice shall be recalled,—

I. That no bull, cow, ox, heifer, calf, sheep, goats, or swine, and no raw or untanned hides or skins, horns, hoofs, or offal of any such animals, and no dung, hay, straw, fodder, litter, or street manure shall be brought or sent from any place in Great Britain beyond the jurisdiction of the said County Board into any place within such jurisdiction.

Provided always that nothing contained in this Order shall make it unlawful for any person to bring or send with the licence of this local authority, under such restrictions as may be specified in such licence, any such animals from any land or premises in his own occupation and beyond such jurisdiction to any other land or premises in his own occupation within such jurisdiction. And providing also that nothing contained in this Order shall make it unlawful for any person to bring or send any such cattle or animals from the burgh of New Galloway and the burgh of Kirkcudbright, except such as may be brought by sea to, and landed at the port of Kirkcudbright; declaring that nothing in the above notice shall apply to animals passing by the highway through said burghs. And provided also that sheep and swine may be brought or sent from Wigtonshire, while said county is free from cattle plague, into said jurisdiction with the licence of this local authority, which licence shall only be granted on receiving a certificate from an Inspector lawfully appointed by a local authority for Wigtonshire that the said animals are free from cattle plague, provided also that such animals have not been imported in to that jurisdiction by sea or brought thereinto from Ayrshire.

The Act imposes the following penalties:—

“If any person acts in contravention of any Order made by a local authority in pursuance of this Act, he shall for each offence incur a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds, and when such offence is committed with respect to more than four animals, a penalty not exceeding five pounds for each animal may be imposed instead of the penalty of twenty pounds.”

NOTICE is hereby given, that by authority and in pursuance of Orders of the Lords of Her Majesty’s Most Honourable Privy Council, dated respectively the 16th day of December, 1865, and the 20th day of January, 1866, and by virtue of all other Orders empowering them in this behalf, Her Majesty’s Justices of the Peace for the county of Merioneth in Quarter Sessions assembled at Dolgelly, in the said county, on Tuesday, the 3rd day of April, 1866, have declared and do now order and declare,

1. That it is expedient that until the 16th day of April instant, no cow, heifer, bull, bullock, ox, calf, sheep, lamb, goat, or swine, or any raw or uncured hides, skins, horns, hoofs; or offal of any such animal, and no dung, hay, straw, corn in the

straw, fodder, or litter, likely to propagate infection, shall be brought from any place in Great Britain beyond the jurisdiction of this county, into any place within the said county of Merioneth.

2. That until such 16th day of April instant, no such animal or article as aforesaid, except pigs under the age of twelve weeks, bred by occupiers of land in the county, shall be removed or taken to any market or fair within any part of the said county for the purpose of exhibition or sale.

3. That until the 3rd day of July next no such animal or article as above-mentioned shall be removed from or out of any one Petty Sessional Division of the said county to any other Petty Sessional Division of the said county, except the person or persons so removing any such animals or articles as aforesaid, shall be thereunto licensed and empowered by certificate under the hands of two of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the said county, one of whom shall be a Justice usually acting in the division from which such animals or articles are to be removed, and the other usually acting in the division to which such animals or articles are proposed to be taken.

Every person offending against the said Order shall for every such offence forfeit any sum not exceeding twenty pounds.

Provided always, that it shall not be unlawful for any person to bring or carry into the said county of Merioneth, any hay or straw from the counties of Cardigan and Carnarvon, and the union of Machynlleth, in the county of Montgomery, if the person or persons so bringing the same shall have the licence in writing thereunto of two Magistrates of the said county of Merioneth.

Provided also, that it shall not be unlawful to remove or carry from one Petty Sessional Division of the county of Merioneth to any other Petty Sessional Division within the same, any hay or straw cut up into chaff, provided such chaff is being carried for immediate consumption by the horses carrying or drawing the same.

Provided also, that it shall not be unlawful for any person to bring sheep or swine from the county of Carnarvon, and from disinfected districts in the counties of Denbigh, Cardigan, and Montgomery, into the county of Merioneth, until the 16th day of April, if the person bringing the same have a licence in writing thereunto, under the hands of two Magistrates, one of whom shall be a Magistrate for the county from which such sheep or swine are being brought, and the other for the county of Merioneth.
