This day the Lords being met a message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of a Commission under the Great Seal, signed by Her Majesty, for declaring Her Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate attendance of the Honourable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read;* and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act to authorise the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Works and Public buildings to acquire, by compulsory purchase or otherwise, certain lands, houses, and premises in the parish of Saint Margaret, Westminster; and for other purposes.

An Act to render it unnecessary to make and subscribe certain declarations as a qualification for offices and employments; to indemnify such persons as have omitted to qualify themselves for office and employment; and for other purposes relating thereto.

An Act to alter certain duties of Customs in the Isle of Man; and for other purposes.

An Act to confirm certain Provisional Orders under "The Local Government Act, 1858," relating to the districts of Winchester, Burton upon Trent, Longton, Accrington, Preston, Bangor, Elland, Halstead, Wadsworth, Canterbury, Dartmouth, Dukinfield, Stroud, and Bridlington; and for other purposes relative to certain districts under the said Act.

An Act to consolidate and amend the several laws regulating the preparation, issue, and payment of Exchequer Bills and Bonds.

**TREASURY WARRANT.**

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter ninety-six, for the regulation of the duties of postage certain scales of weight and rates of postage were fixed and made chargeable and payable upon, for, or in respect of letters, newspapers, parliamentary proceedings, and printed

papers transmitted and forwarded by the post, and various regulations were made for facilitating the transmission of such letters and papers by the post, and by the same Act powers were given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury from time to time, by Warrant under their hands, to alter and fix any of the rates of postage therein mentioned.

And whereas further powers were given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury by another Act of Parliament passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter eighty-five, for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post and for the regulating the duties of postage therein, and for other purposes relating to the Post Office.

And whereas it is expedient that certain regulations should be made for the transmission by the post from the United Kingdom to the Kingdom of Bavaria, via France, of certain packets, in the manner hereinafter mentioned.

Now we, the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, in exercise of the power reserved to us in and by the said hereinbefore recited Acts of Parliament, and every of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, do, by this Warrant, under the hands of two of us the said Commissioners, by the authority of the statute in that case made and provided, order and direct as follows; that is to say:—

1. All packets consisting of patterns or samples of merchandize of no intrinsic value posted in any part of the United Kingdom addressed to the Kingdom of Bavaria may be transmitted by the post from the United Kingdom to the Kingdom of Bavaria, via France, subject to the several rates of postage hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

On every such packet, if not exceeding four ounces in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid an uniform single rate of postage (British and Foreign combined), of four pence;

And on every such packet, if exceeding four ounces and not exceeding one half of a pound in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid two rates of postage;

And on every such packet, if exceeding one half of a pound and not exceeding one pound in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid four rates of postage;

And on every such packet, if exceeding one pound and not exceeding one pound and the half of another pound in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid six rates of postage;

And on every such packet, if exceeding one pound and the half of another pound and not exceeding two pounds in weight, there shall be charged, taken, and paid eight rates of postage;

And for every additional half of a pound in weight of any such packet above the weight of two pounds, there shall be charged, taken, and paid two additional rates of postage, and every fractional part of such additional half of a pound in weight shall be charged as an additional half of a pound in weight, and each progressive and additional rate chargeable under this clause shall be estimated and charged at the sum which any such packet would be charged with under this Warrant if not exceeding four ounces in weight.

2. Every packet which shall be transmitted by the post under the authority of this Warrant shall be so transmitted in conformity with and

under and subject to the several orders, directions, regulations, and conditions hereinafter contained, that is to say :—

3. No such packet which in length shall exceed two feet (British), or in breadth or depth one foot, shall be transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant.

4. No pattern or sample, being of any intrinsic value, or being an article or thing of a saleable nature, or having a value of its own apart from its mere use as a pattern or sample, shall be transmitted by the post under the provisions of this Warrant.

5. There shall be no enclosure, sealed or otherwise closed against inspection, nor any other enclosure not authorized by this Warrant, sent in or with any such packet.

6. There shall be no writing in or upon any such packet, or on the cover thereof, except the name and address of the person for whom it is intended, the name and address of the sender thereof, a trade mark and number, and price of the pattern or sample contained therein, which trade mark, and number, and price shall be written or printed on labels attached to the pattern or sample.

7. All such packets shall be sent in covers open at the ends so as to be easy of examination; nevertheless, samples of seeds, drugs, and such other articles and things as cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen, paper, or other material; but bags so closed that they cannot be readily opened, even although they be transparent, shall not be used for that purpose.

8. Every packet transmitted by the post under this Warrant shall be put into the Post Office at such hours in the day, and under all such regulations, as the Postmaster-General may appoint.

9. The postage of all such packets as aforesaid shall in every case be paid at the time of the same being posted, not in money, but by being duly stamped with the proper postage stamp or stamps affixed thereto, which stamp or stamps shall in every case be affixed or appear on the outside of every such packet, near the address or direction, and shall be of the value or amount of the postage duty payable thereon under or by virtue of this Warrant.

10. If any packet sent or tendered or delivered in order to be sent by the post under the provisions of this Warrant, shall be sent otherwise than in conformity with the conditions and regulations established by or under the authority of this Warrant, the same shall and may be detained and opened, and, at the option of the Postmaster-General, shall be either returned or given up to the sender thereof, or be given up to the person to whom the same shall be addressed, or be forwarded to the place of its destination; and any such packet, on being so returned, given up, or forwarded, shall, at the option of the Postmaster-General, either be free of postage or be charged with any rate of postage he may think fit, not exceeding the rate that would be chargeable on such packet as an unpaid letter.

11. In order to prevent any obstacles to the due and regular transmission of letters by the post, any officer of the Post Office may delay the transmission of any packet posted or forwarded by the post, under the provisions of this Warrant, either for the space of twenty-four hours after the time at which the same ought to be dispatched, in due course of the post, or (at his option) until the dispatch of the mail next after that by which the same ought in due course of the post to be forwarded by him.

12. In all cases in which any question shall hereafter arise whether any packet or any pattern or sample contained therein, transmitted under or by virtue of this Warrant, is entitled to the privileges of this Warrant, and to be so transmitted within the intent and meaning thereof, such question shall be referred to the determination of the Postmaster-General, whose decision thereupon shall be final and conclusive on all parties.

13. The term "weight" used in this Warrant shall mean British weight; and the several other terms and expressions used in this Warrant shall be construed to have the like meaning in all respects as they would have had if inserted in the said Act passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her Majesty, chapter 96.

14. The Commissioners for the time being of Her Majesty's Treasury may, by Warrant under their hands, duly made at any time hereafter, alter, repeal, revoke, or modify any of the rates of postage hereby fixed, or any of the regulations hereby made, and may make and establish any new or other rates or regulations in lieu thereof, and from time to time may appoint at what time the rates that may be payable are to be paid.

15. This Warrant shall come into operation on the day of the date hereof.

**ARTICLE II.**—That the Churchwardens and Overseers of the Poor of the said parish shall, unless the Poor Law Board otherwise direct, pay to the officer for the time being appointed to

the said office of vestry clerk for the said parish, under the authority of the Statutes in such behalf and this Order, for the performance of the duties of such office, a salary of seventeen pounds per annum.

**ARTICLE III.**—That the salary of such vestry clerk shall be payable up to the day on which he ceases to hold such office, and no longer, and shall be paid by quarterly payments at the several quarters ending at the usual Feast Days in the year, namely, Midsummer Day, Michaelmas Day, Christmas Day, and Lady Day, with a proportionate sum to be paid to his executors or administrators, in case he shall die while holding such office.

#### LIVERPOOL GUNPOWDER REGULATION, &c., ACT, 1865.

Bye-Laws made under and in pursuance of "The Liverpool Gunpowder Regulation, &c., Act, 1865," by the Mersey Docks and Harbour Board (hereinafter called the Board), for the purpose of guarding against Accidents from the Explosion of Gunpowder within the limits of the jurisdiction in that behalf, conferred upon the Board by the said Act, that is to say, within that part of the Port of Liverpool lying seaward of an imaginary straight line drawn across the River Mersey, from Eastham Ferry Slip to the North-westerly boundary of the present Garston Dock Quay, and also within the Mersey Dock Estate for the time being, on the Lancashire side of the River Mersey.

#### As to Limits for Anchorage of Vessels having on Board Gunpowder Cargo.

1. No Ship, Boat, Barge, Flat, Lighter, or other Craft, laden wholly or partly with Gunpowder, and having more than 300 lbs. weight thereof on board, shall stop or be moored, or anchored, in that part of the River Mersey situate above or to the Southward of an imaginary line drawn across the said River from Victoria Tower to Egremont Ferry, and below or to the Northward of a similar line drawn across the said River

from New Ferry Pier to Dingle Point. Provided that this Bye-law shall not extend to any Licensed Gunpowder-Hoy landing or shipping Gunpowder under Bye-Law No. 7.

*As to the loading and unloading of Vessels with limited quantities of Gunpowder whilst under weigh.*

2. No Ship or Vessel under weigh in the River Mersey above the Rock Lighthouse and below the said imaginary line in the title to these Bye-Laws mentioned, shall receive or discharge any quantity of Gunpowder exceeding 25 lbs. in weight, from or into any other Vessel, save a Licensed Gunpowder Hoy; and no Ship or Vessel under weigh within the limits mentioned in Bye-Law No. 1, shall receive or discharge from or into a Licensed Gunpowder Hoy, any quantity exceeding 10 barrels of 100 lbs. each. And no such Hoy shall go alongside of any Ship or Vessel under weigh within the limits last mentioned, or receive or discharge Gunpowder from or into such Ship or Vessel, if the quantity of Gunpowder on board the said Ship or Vessel, or the quantity on board the said Hoy, together with that to be received from such Ship or Vessel, exceeds the quantity of 20 of the said barrels.

*As to Signals to be exhibited by Vessels laden with Gunpowder, and as to the Navigation of such Vessels.*

3. Every Ship, Boat, Barge, Flat, Lighter, or other craft laden wholly or partly with Gunpowder, and having more than 300 lbs. of Gunpowder on board, shall, while within the limits specified in the title of these Bye-laws, and whether at anchor or under weigh, fly a Red Flag at her Foremast Head by day, and when at anchor at night shall exhibit a RED LIGHT over the White Light prescribed by Article 7 of the Regulations for Preventing Collisions at Sea, enacted by "The Merchant Shipping Amendment Act, 1862," and every such Vessel, whether at anchor or under weigh, shall keep as near mid-channel of the River as possible, and all reasonable despatch shall be used in Navigating any such vessel through the space lying within the limits mentioned in Bye law No. 1.

*As to the Extinguishing of Fires and Lights in Vessels having on board, or receiving, or discharging Gunpowder.*

4. Every Ship, Boat, Barge, Flat, Lighter, or other craft laden wholly or in part with Gunpowder, and having more than 300 lbs. of Gunpowder on board, shall, before commencing to discharge Gunpowder, and during the discharging thereof, and until the same is fully completed, have all lights (save signal lights) and all fires (save the furnace-fires of Steam Vessels) extinguished. And every such Vessel about to receive on board Gunpowder as cargo exceeding the said quantity of 300 lbs., shall, before beginning to receive the same on board, and during such receiving, and until the same is fully completed and the Gunpowder is properly stowed away and covered over, have all lights and fires (except as aforesaid) extinguished. Provided always, that when absolutely necessary, a light contained in a locked lantern may be used in discharging or stowing Gunpowder from or into the hold of such Vessel, but only in the actual and continual presence of a Police Officer of the Borough, the expense of whose attendance shall be defrayed by the Master or other person having the charge or command of the said Vessel.

*As to the presence of an Officer of the Vessel during the receipt or discharge of Gunpowder.*

5. During all the time of the receiving or delivering of Gunpowder by or from any Vessel within the limits first mentioned in Bye-law No. 2, laden wholly or partly with Gunpowder, and having more than 300 lbs. on board thereof, and until the completion of the receiving, delivering, and stowage thereof, there shall be present some officer of such Vessel especially charged with the supervision of such receipt or discharge.

*As to attendance of Constable on board while receiving or discharging Gunpowder.*

6. The Owner, Master, or other person having the charge or command of any Ship or Vessel (other than a Licensed Gunpowder-Hoy) about to receive or discharge more than 300 lbs of Gunpowder, shall, if practicable, have a Police Constable of the Borough on board, in order to see that the provisions and regulations contained in these Bye-laws are duly observed; and if there shall be no such Constable on board, the burthen of proof that it was not practicable to obtain the attendance on board of such Constable shall rest upon the person in charge of such Vessel. Provided always, that if reasonable notice in writing shall have been given at the office of the Head Constable requiring the attendance of a Constable on board, the non-attendance of such Constable shall not subject any person to a fine under this Bye-law.

*Naphtha, &c., not to be used.*

7. No Naphtha, Paraffine, Petroleum, or other Volatile Oil shall be used for any purpose, or on any pretence whatever on board any Ship, Boat, Barge, Flat, Lighter, or other Craft, laden wholly or in part with Gunpowder, and having more than 300 lbs. of Gunpowder on board, whilst such Vessel is within the limits first mentioned in Bye-law No. 2.

*As to the appointment of places for the shipment or discharge of Gunpowder.*

8. Gunpowder may be shipped or discharged at the undermentioned places abutting on the River Mersey, namely:—1. The slip at the north side of the entrance of the Toxteth Dock. 2. One berth on the south side of Harrington Basin. 3. The Pierhead outside of the Egerton Dock in Toxteth Park. 4. The magazines landing place at Bromborough. 5. The Ferry Slip at Tranmere. And 6thly, quantities not exceeding 25 lbs. in weight may be embarked from the north end of the Prince's Landing Stage, on notice being previously given to the Stage Master. And save at the places aforesaid, no Gunpowder exceeding 2 lbs. in weight shall be landed or shipped at any place abutting on the River Mersey, situate below or to the northward of the said imaginary line mentioned in the title of these bye-laws.

*No vessel to be used for conveying of Gunpowder, unless licensed.*

9. No Ship, Boat, Barge, Flat, Lighter, or other craft shall be used for the conveyance of Gunpowder exceeding 25 lbs. in weight, within the limits specified in the title of these Bye-laws, to or from the Floating Magazines, from or to any other vessel, or from or to any place abutting on the River Mersey, within the said limits, or to or from any vessel in the said River, within the said limits, or to or from any place abutting on the said River, within the said limits, from or to any other vessel or place as aforesaid, unless duly licensed for such employment by the Board.

*As to the licensing of Gunpowder Hoys.*

10. A Vessel to be licensed as a Gunpowder-Hoy must be of not less than five tons burthen, decked over fore and aft, and copper-fastened throughout; she must have no iron in her fittings, either in the hull, masts, or rigging, save such as may be expressly approved of by the Marine Surveyor of the Board, and she must be well and sufficiently founds in masts, sails, and ropes, to the satisfaction of the Board.

The Owner of any such Vessel desirous of having her licensed as a Gunpowder-Hoy may apply for such License under the following regulations:—

The application is to be in writing, signed by the Owner or by one of the Owners, if more than one, stating the name of the Vessel, her length on deck, breadth, extreme depth from the deck to limber strake, name and address of owner, name of master, name of builder, date of building, date of latest repairs, general description of such repairs, number and date of former license, if any, number and date of master's license, if any, and if the Vessel has been recently employed in any other trade, the nature of such employment to be stated. And the Board will thereupon, within 14 days after the delivery of such notice, cause the vessel to be examined, and, if satisfactory the Board will license the same as a Gunpowder-Hoy.

*No person to act as Master or Mate of a Gunpowder-Hoy unless Licensed.*

11. No person shall take charge or command of a Licensed Gunpowder-Hoy, or act as Master or Mate of the same, unless he be duly Licensed thereto by the Board.

*As to License of Masters and Mates of Gunpowder-Hoys.*

12. Any person desirous of obtaining a License to act as Master or Mate of a Licensed Gunpowder-Hoy, may apply in writing to the Board for such License. The applicant must be over 21 years of age, and he will be required to produce a written recommendation from his present or intending employer, and also a certificate as to his sobriety, steadiness, abstinence from smoking, and competence as a Seaman, from three other trustworthy persons, testifying from their personal knowledge of his conduct and habits.

*As to the Renewal of Licenses.*

13. Every License granted as aforesaid, as well for Vessels as for Masters and Mates, shall expire on the 30th day of June next after the date of its issue, and all applications for renewals are to be made within the 30 days next before the expiration of such License.

*As to the production and inspection of Licenses.*

14. Every such licensed Master or Mate whilst on board any Licensed Gunpowder Hoy, shall have on board with him his Vessel's License and his own License, and the said Licenses shall be produced, when required, to the Master or person in command for the time being of any Magazine, Ship, or Vessel, alongside of which the said Licensed Gunpowder Hoy may be loading or discharging, or to the said Marine Surveyor or the Water Bailiff of the Board, the Head Constable or other Officer as aforesaid, or to any Officer of Her Majesty's Customs or Inland Revenue on duty.

*Power of inspection of Gunpowder Hoys.*

15. Every Licensed Gunpowder Hoy shall be at all times open to inspection and examination by

the Marine Surveyor of the Board, and by the Head Constable and the Superintendents of the Police of the Borough, and by any Police Constable producing a written authority for that purpose from the Head Constable.

16. No Fire nor Light (save Signal Lights) shall be permitted, nor shall any Tobacco or other substance be smoked on board any Licensed Gunpowder Hoy.

*As to the cancelling or suspending of Licences.*

17. Any Gunpowder Hoy License may be cancelled or suspended by the Board, if it shall appear to their satisfaction that by reason of alterations or improper fittings on board, or accident or otherwise, the Vessel has become unfit to be used as a Gunpowder Hoy; and any License to act as the Master or Mate of a Gunpowder Hoy, may also be in like manner cancelled or suspended for any disobedience of these Bye-Laws or other misconduct, provided always that seven days' notice of inquiry shall be given by the Secretary of such Board, in writing, in such cases as follows, viz.—In the case of a Vessel's License to the owner at the address set out in the License, and in the case of a Master or Mate to be delivered on board his Vessel. And in the interval between the service of such notice, and the hearing of the charge, the license named in such notice shall be suspended.

*Bye-Laws not to extend to the Floating Magazines or to Gunpowder required for destroying Wrecks, &c.*

18. Nothing in these Bye-Laws shall be construed to extend to the Floating Magazines, nor to prevent the Marine Surveyor, or other Person acting under the authority of the Board, from carrying in any Vessel, or from using such quantities of Gunpowder as may be necessary for the removal or destruction of Wrecks, or other obstacles to navigation or otherwise, in the execution of his office.

*Penalties.*

19. Every person offending against these Bye-Laws shall be liable for the first offence to a penalty of £10, and for the subsequent or any other offence to a penalty of £20.
